The June 11, 2025 Curriculum Committee meeting was called to order by Chair Ghida Neukirch at 10:32 a.m.

III. APPLICATION FOR SCHOOL/COURSE CERTIFICATION

None at this time.

IV. IN-SERVICE, ADVANCED AND SPECIALIZED COURSES for CERTIFICATION/RECERTIFICATION ~ Paul Petty

Petty asked for approval of the in-service, advanced and specialized certified courses submitted through the Mobile Team Units and the Executive Institute for January 1, 2025 through May 25, 2025. This report is located under Tab K in the Board book.

Motion was made by Ryan, seconded by Schassburger, and carried by all members present to approve the In-Service, Advanced and Specialized

training courses submitted through the Mobile Team Units and Executive Institute from January 1, 2025 through May 25, 2025.

V. LEAD HOMICIDE INVESTIGATORS 32-HOURS APPROVED CONTINUING EDUCATION COURSES for CERTIFICATION/RECERTIFICATION ~ Paul Petty for Barb Wood

Petty asked for approval of the Lead Homicide Investigator 32-Hour Continuing Education certified courses submitted for January 1, 2025 through May 25, 2025. This report is located under Tab M in the Board book.

Motion was made by Bulnes, seconded by Ryan, and carried by all members present to approve the Lead Homicide Investigator 32-Hour Continuing Education courses submitted for January 1, 2025 through May 25, 2025.

VI. CIT/OFFICER WELLNESS COURSE UPDATES ~ Jennifer Wooldridge & John Keigher

A. 40-Hour CIT Training Program - Pilot Update to Medical Conditions and Psychotropic Medications Section

Wooldridge reported a pilot adjustment made to the Medical Conditions and Psychotropic Medications Section of the CIT 40-Hour training curriculum. The CIT Illinois model is a leader in statewide standardized curriculum. Recently there has been a recognized curriculum that CIT International has stated 'may be used as your CIT curriculum or can be used for in-service or refresher training or may even be used to enhance your training curriculum'. Wooldridge stated her team has reviewed the content and is making a small adjustment to the Medical Conditions and Psychotropic Medications two-hour block of instruction. The new CIT curriculum model has eliminated this as a stand-alone section and incorporated the core concept within other areas of the 40-hour course. The team believes this adjustment will be well received as it will still cover the core content while allocating time for additional role play.

B. Redirecting the Abyss (formerly known as Moral Injury)

Wooldridge stated this course was previously brought before the Board in December 2023 entitled Moral Injury. Recently, the instructors (who are part of the statewide CIT Team) have reviewed the content of this course and made a few minor adjustments for more impact. Even though these changes total a less than 10% change, Wooldridge is requesting approval for the changes. Wooldridge stated the updates can be found under Tab L in the Board book. This course, even though it has been renamed, will still address officer wellness, PTSD and moral injury. There will eventually be a retreat option added to this course as a booster. This is an 8-hour training for individuals and self-care, it will be offered beginning in July.

Motion was made by Ryan, seconded by Bulnes, and carried by all members present to approve the changes to the mental health course Redirecting the Abyss (formerly known as Moral Injury).

C. Advanced Petition Writing & Peer Support Strategies

In response to feedback from the 40-hour CIT training course, two CIT instructors have created an eight-hour class titled Advanced Petition Writing and Peer Support. The eight-hour class is split into two sessions: the morning will focus on advanced petition writing, emphasizing detailed content and articulation and the afternoon will focus on peer support, centered around the principle of "see something – say something." If approved, this training will be available to all MTU's beginning in July.

Motion was made by Bulnes, seconded by Ryan, and carried by all members present to approve the CIT course Advanced Petition Writing & Peer Support Strategies.

D. Law Enforcement K-9 Therapy Dog Certification Policy

As a follow up to the Curriculum Committee and the Board's approval of the law enforcement K-9 therapy dog certification program Wooldridge presented the Board members with a detailed draft policy. She stated the purpose of this volunteer certification program is to evaluate prospective teams for suitability and to demonstrate that the K-9 and handler have a rapport and the ability to work together effectively. This certification is an important step in ensuring K-9 therapy dog teams used throughout the state have proper temperament and behavioral characteristics to be successful. Wooldridge also noted that Senate Bill 1491, which requires ILETSB to develop a course and certification program for certified therapy dog teams, has passed both chambers and is now awaiting the Governor's signature.

Keigher stated the proposed draft, found under Tab L in the Board book, follows the format of other specialized training programs and will likely become administrative rules via the JCAR process. He stated the proposed Therapy Canine Certification program outlines a new specialized certification for canines that have already completed general obedience and therapy dog training recognized by the American Kennel Club. The program focuses on additional training for crisis response, assessing both the canine and handler for effectiveness in these situations. This standard is based on the Cook County Sheriff's Tails of Redemption program, modeled after Brevard County Sheriff's "Paws & Stripes College," a recognized leader in the field. Brevard County certified the Cook County team to conduct training and assessments. The certification is valid for two years, with optional annual refresher courses to maintain credentials and serve as part of the deployment program. These certified teams can opt into a registry for crisis deployment as mutual aid. The primary purpose is to ensure continued proficiency, updated best practices, and readiness for crisis response. Keigher asked the committee to approve the policy guidelines as presented so staff can move forward as soon as SB 1491 becomes law.

Before the motion was finalized Wooldridge spoke briefly about the recent incident at YNOT daycare in Chatham, IL. Teams were called and those who could come came. Eventually there will be a Team registry posted on the Board's website for those who want to participate.

Motion was made by Bulnes, seconded by Ryan, and carried by all members present to approve the Draft of the Law Enforcement K-9 Therapy Dog Certification Policy.

METRA: BLE Reimbursement Request ~ John Keigher

Keigher advised the Committee that METRA, the regional rail corporation which serves about seven counties in the state, has requested BLE reimbursement for their officers. Historically, METRA was grouped with a handful of other entities that received external grant funds. In recent years, the Boards funding has changed, and METRA is now eligible for funding from the Board. Due to METRA's external funds being dried up they have come to us for assistance. Keigher plans to bring this matter to the full Board, he just wanted to make this Committee aware of the situation.

Chairman Smoot thanked everyone for attending the meeting. He thanked Board staff and the MTU directors and staff for the work they continue to do.

VIII. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A. Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee Meeting March 6, 2025

Motion was made by Neukirch, seconded by Watson, and carried by all members present to approve the meeting minutes for the Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee Meeting from March 6, 2025.

B. Joint Finance & Legislative Committee and Executive Committee March 6, 2025

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to approve the meeting minutes for the Joint Finance & Legislative Committee and Executive Committee meeting minutes from March 6, 2025.

C. Quarterly Board Meeting March 7, 2025

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to approve the meeting minutes for the Quarterly Board Meeting minutes from March 7, 2025.

IX. REPORT OF STANDING AND ADVISORY COMMITTEES

<u>Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee ~ Ghida Neukirch</u>
Neukirch stated the Committee meeting was held earlier today, and noted the staff reports are included in the Board book. She stated the Committee unanimously approved the certification of In-Service training courses submitted through the MTU's and the Executive Institute for January 1, 2025 through May 25, 2025. Neukirch shared that the In-Service conducted approximately 3,300 classes resulting in almost 19,000 hours. [Through third quarter] there were more than

96,000 officers trained in over 350,000 hours of training. She stated the Committee unanimously approved the certification of Lead Homicide Investigators 32-Hour continuing education courses submitted for January 1, 2025 through May 25, 2025. A report was received on CIT Officer wellness course updates and the Committee unanimously approved changes to three courses: 1.) the course now titled *Redirecting the Abyss* (formerly known as *Moral Injury*), 2.) the 8-Hour Advanced Petition Writing & Peer Support Strategies, and 3.) Law Enforcement K-9 Therapy Dog Certification Policy.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Price, and carried by all members present to approve the Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee report.

X. EXECUTIVE MATTERS

A. Financial Items ~ Courtney Bott

Bott explained the spreadsheets located under Tab F in the Board book. The first table shows the expenditures for FY25 as of May 27th, the next two tables show the cash flow analysis as of May 27th, and the final table shows FY24 through the upcoming FY26 budget. The Governor has not yet signed the budget, but it is anticipated ILETSB will receive around \$131M. Bott noted for FY26 there is no additional funding for NIBIN grants or the Recruitment & Retention grants.

Motion was made by Nugent, seconded by Watson, and carried by all members present to approve the Financial Report.

B. Personnel Matters & DEIA Report ~ Ellen Petty

Petty stated ILETSB's headcount is at 49, but will reach 52 on Monday, June 16th. This leaves 14 positions to fill to reach the max headcount of 66 for FY26. On Monday three new employees will be onboarded: a Classifications, Transactions & Leave Specialist, a Special Projects & Policy Advisor, and an Assistant Certification Counsel for Sangamon County. Positions in the pipeline include: an Accounts Payable Coordinator, a Benefits and Retirement Representative, and an HR Associate. Petty noted the Chief Fiscal Officer was discharged on May 20th.

Petty stated there was a three week freeze on submitting newly created and updated positions in the Employee Central system. HR staff was cleared to enter these workflows in the system early last week and are currently awaiting CMS Classifications approval. Once approved, HR staff will work with the new CMS SMART Team, which has been developed to assist small agencies, to get the positions posted. Once all of these are filled headcount will be 65, with one more

position to fill for FY26. Petty then listed the eight positions left to post over the next few months.

Motion was made by Neukirch, seconded by Price, and carried by all members present to approve the Personnel Matters & DEIA Report.

C. Legislative and Litigation Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated the Crouch case is in the discovery phase and depositions are being scheduled with CMS personnel. The Board's Motion to Dismiss in the defamation case, Leavell v. Matteson, was granted. This was due to the tight protective language in the SAFE-T Act regarding Professional Conduct information. Both sides have filed for a Motion to Dismiss in the Magnus case. In this case the officer submitted a FOIA for his own investigation files, and while the Board is protected from releasing this information due to the SAFE-T Act, local agencies are not.

Keigher reported that the General Assembly wrapped up session last week. Important bills from this session:

- <u>SB 2510 Appropriations Bill</u>: awarding the Board \$130 million in appropriations [for FY26].
- <u>HB 1075 Budget Implementation</u>: Technical changes for the PTSD Coordinator position and the funding of the Intern program.
- <u>SB 1491 Therapy Canines</u>: Allows the Board to offer a specialty certification to therapy canine teams so that they can be deployed in times of crisis.
- <u>SB 1195 Sexual Assault Investigators</u>: Requires the Board to add a component to its sexual assault trainings that will help officers identify conflicts of interest and their options to address them.
- <u>SB 1953 Law Enforcement Officer Employment Records</u>: Requires Law Enforcement agencies to share more employee records with the Board and requires the agencies to check more records when seeking to hire a new officer. It also requires officers to sign release forms for their own records so any disciplinary records will be fully disclosed before a hiring decision is made.
- <u>SB 2323 Human Trafficking</u>: Adds new definitions for "trauma and trauma informed" and requires screening techniques to be taught for addressing human trafficking. It requires agencies to develop policies for addressing human trafficking based on guidelines that the Board must create by July 1, 2026. The Illinois State Police will be providing resources to the Board and to the agencies to help meet these requirements.
- HB 2350 Body Cameras for Auxiliary Officers: This bill did not pass. ILETSB staff helped initiate and draft this bill that would have allowed Auxiliary

officers to be eligible for the body camera funds and would require them to wear cameras if serving in the public. The plan is to bring this bill back next year.

Cook County Clerk Designee Elias Voulgaris arrived and was added to the roster.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to approve the Legislative and Litigation Update Report.

 Cobb reported since the June Board meeting staff has received 103 Notices of Violations for a [calendar year] total of 128 Notices received as of June 5, 2025. For comparison, at this time last year staff had received a total of 95 Notices.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Neukirch, and carried by all members present to approve the Professional Conduct Database Quarterly Report.

- 2. <u>Waiver Disposition Quarterly Report ~ Anthony Cobb</u>

 Cobb noted the complete reports can be found under Tab H and the reporting period for all reports is February 1, 2025 April 30, 2025. Cobb's division processed a total of 457 waiver requests during this period.
 - a. Law Enforcement Municipal 294 waivers approved, 17 denied

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Nugent, with Price and Schassburger recusing, and carried by all other members present to approve the Municipal Law Enforcement Waiver Disposition Report.

b. Law Enforcement – Counties
50 waivers approved, o denied Cobb noted an error in the report
under the Branches section of the report, the reported numbers are for
Law Enforcement only.

Motion was made by Nugent, seconded by Neukirch, with Schassburger, Voulgaris and Watson recusing, and carried by all other members present to approve the Law Enforcement Waiver Disposition Report for Counties.

c. Law Enforcement – State and Others 66 waivers approved, 3 denied

Motion was made by Neukirch, seconded by Watson, with Price, Feld, Ryan, and Schassburger recusing, and carried by all other members present to approve the Waiver Disposition Report for Law Enforcement State and Others.

d. Corrections
22 waivers approved, 2 denied

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to approve the Waiver Disposition Report for Corrections.

e. Court Security
3 waivers approved, o denied

Motion was made by Redd, seconded by Watson, and carried by all other members present to approve the Waiver Disposition Report for Court Security.

3. Decertification ~ Pat Hahn

Hahn noted his report, which lists the individuals recommended for removal from certification, can be found under Tab I in the Board book. He presented the eight officers listed in his report who have received convictions:

Hahn stated notice was given to all, a chance to respond was given to all, and none responded. He also stated there are three officers who have voluntarily surrendered their certification. Hahn then introduced Jae Kwon; the new Assistant Certification Counsel located in the Chicago office.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to approve the Decertification Report.

XI. PROGRAM PROGRESS REPORTS AND CONCEPTS

A. Illinois Law Enforcement Executive Institute ~ Heather Hotz

- In addition to her printed report, Hotz reported the Executive Institute has logged over 260,000 hours of online training this fiscal year. They expect to
 - exceed over 300,000 hours both online and in person by the end of this fiscal vear. Hotz noted the Illinois Women in Criminal Justice Conference was held April 15-16, 2025 at the Embassy Suites in East Peoria, IL. It was their largest conference to date with 359 participants. The conference included a preconference leadership session, an awards banquet, over 20 breakout sessions and four featured speaker sessions which generated just shy of 3,000 training hours, a 36.9% increase from the 2024 conference. Hotz noted the Executive Institute's continued impact and growth of both their online learning programs, and in person training events, reflect the agency's dedication to developing forward thinking, well prepared, law enforcement professionals across the state.
- B. A Statewide System of In-Service Training (ASSIST) Program ~ Paul Pettu Petty stated his report can be found under Tab K in the Board book. He discussed the three primary training costs: per officer, per hour, and per instructional hour. These costs are currently around 20% below where they are expected to be due to the Executive Institute and MTU's ability to include more officers in training. Petty also noted in FY26 officers will complete the first three-year compliance requirement for mandated training. Staff will roll out the first warning verification period for officers with last name A-G due in April 2026. Petty thanked Jeff Schelling from MTU 2 for hosting the MTU meeting held yesterday.
- C. CIT, Mental Health & Therapy Dog Training Update ~ Jennifer Wooldridge Wooldridge highlighted a few items from her report which can be found under Tab L in the Board book. She noted that earlier today several curriculum advances were brought to the Curriculum Committee for review and approval. She noted there is a new advanced petition and peer support course, a pilot adjustment to the 40-Hour CIT curriculum, a change in name and minor modification to a previously certified officer wellness course, and a new draft policy for law enforcement K-9 therapy dog certification. Wooldridge also mentioned the State CIT Conference is happening June 25th & 26th in East Peoria. This year's theme is Building Bridges, Strengthening Collaborations, and Crisis Intervention. The conference will include speakers, breakout sessions, panel discussions, networking opportunities, and K-9 therapy dogs. Wooldridge mentioned the press is active with the new K-9 initiative for crisis intervention and officer wellness. She then spoke briefly about the recent incident at YNOT daycare in Chatham, IL. where teams were called and those who could come came; they had nine dogs available on day one and seven dogs on day two. There is a sample picture in the Board book of the CIT Therapy dog patch to use for Canine Therapy dog teams for use with the call out system.

D. Specialty Training Update ~ Paul Petty for Barbara Wood

Petty noted Barb's report can be found under Tab M in the Board book. He noted there are no Crash Reconstruction Specialist certifications to approve at this time.

E. <u>Information Technology Update ~ Kelly Ingram</u>

Ingram stated his report can be found under Tab N in the Board book. In addition to his report, Ingram noted a storage expansion will take place on Monday which will take about a month to get up and running. This expanded storage will house all evidence submissions, legal hearing recordings, and all digital archives of paper copies. Neukirch asked if the emergency event notification system for employees can be extended to family members, and Ingram responded that staff would take that into consideration.

Motion was made by Price, seconded by Watson, and carried by all members present to approve the Program Progress Reports.

XII. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. SAFE-T Act Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated the Rules for Hearings have been approved. They were approved at the April JCAR meeting and became effective April 29, 2025. Staff hopes to have cases ready for filing by the end of this month and will post the ALJ contract opportunities soon. Keigher noted an on-line case management portal has been created, and the new certification attorneys for Cook and Sangamon Counties have been hired.

Keigher spoke to the Omnibus bill created by the Attorney General's office. It did not pass; however, staff was advised in February by the AG's Policy Team that due to the Rules meetings that had occurred they were considering possible changes to the statute. Things discussed were, consideration of mitigating circumstances for discretionary decertification, any appeal could be filed by the officer rather than the employer, and the reorganization of the Certification division. Going forward staff will engage with stakeholders over the summer and update the language in the bill to clean up some of the SAFE-T Act provisions.

B. Grant Updates ~ Courtney Bott

Bott stated the Recruitment & Retention grant had 189 agencies apply asking for a total of \$45M. Staff was able to award 60 agencies \$6.7M. This appropriation is going away next year, and the fund is being dissolved. NIBIN grants had 31 agencies apply for a total of around \$2.8M, staff was able to award 20 agencies around \$1.8M. Camera grants had 217 agencies apply asking for around \$14M, staff was able to award 125 agencies \$3.2M. ILETSB received new money for next year's camera grant which is a new \$4M pot and what is leftover from the current year will be rolled into that pot. Bott noted staff is

revamping the grant process for next year; they will be moving towards better assisting the agencies, and bridging the GATA knowledge gap that currently exists with GATA requirements for compliance. Staff is currently in the process of notifying the agencies of awards, and quarterly reporting is a requirement of GATA.

XIII. NEW BUSINESS

A. METRA: BLE Reimbursement Request ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated historically, the Board only issued reimbursement for training expenses from the Traffic and Criminal Conviction Surcharge Fund to those agencies that were dependent on tax revenues for their operational expenses – essentially limiting these to municipalities and counties. For this reason, METRA was regularly denied reimbursement because it was supported by external funds, namely ridership contributions.

In recent years, there have been two significant changes that have caused METRA to request a reconsideration of the Board's longstanding position. First, the Board's source of funding has changed primarily to the Law Enforcement Training Fund – which is less restrictive and can be used for more training purposes than the Surcharge Fund. Second, METRA's ridership contribution has been substantially reduced and now accounts for under 15% of their annual budget.

Staff has run the numbers and believes there are sufficient funds to issue BLE reimbursements to METRA in the next fiscal year. Their request is explained in the letter that has been provided, and it is staff's recommendation to reverse the old policy and allow METRA to become officially eligible for reimbursement of their new recruit training expenses in the same manner as municipal agencies. METRA currently operates with around 100 officers with 15 new recruits each year.

Motion was made by Watson, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to allow METRA to become officially eligible for reimbursement of their new recruit training expenses.

B. Part-time Correctional Training ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated the Police Training Act, and the corresponding rules address the requirements for full and part-time law enforcement officers, as well as full-time correctional officers, but they do not provide any requirements or guidance for part-time correctional training or certification.

There are currently about 250 part-time correctional officers serving throughout the state. These officers have received no formal or documented training compared to their full-time counterparts. Staff plans to explore ways

to legitimize these part-time correctional appointments and ensure they are meeting some basic standards.

Over the next few months staff will research this issue further, consult with some of the sheriffs utilizing part-time correctional officers, and develop a bassline set of coursework that will likely include the 40-hour firearm course, an introduction to PRIA standards, and the basic county jail standards. In addition, staff will also develop a process for conducting a background check tracking these officers as they move to new employers. Keigher stated it is very early in the process, but wanted to advise the Board as staff moves forward.

XIV. PUBLIC INPUT

There was no public input.

XV. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Smoot announced the next Committee meetings will be held on September 10, 2025, and the next Quarterly Board meeting will be held September 11, 2025 with the location still to be determined.

Ms. Williams:

Metra Police Department hereby respectfully requests Basic Law Enforcement training reimbursement from the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board ["Board"] pursuant to Ill.Adm.Code Title 20, Section 5, Part 1720.50. Section 1720.50(a) asserts that "the Board will, within certain limitations, reimburse the local governmental agency for one half the cost of training the officer...". Metra Police Department qualifies for reimbursement pursuant to the statute, and requests the Board accept and reimburse BLE training moving forward.

Metra is a governmental entity organized under the Regional Transportation Authority Act, 730 ILCS 3615/2.20, and operates one of the largest commuter rail systems in North America. The Metra Police Department is a department within the Northeast Illinois Regional Commuter Railroad Corporation ["Metra"]. It is without dispute that Metra is a unit of local government. See, Copes v. Northeast Illinois Regional Commuter R.R. Corp., 45 N.E.3d 1123 (1st Dist. 2015) and, Smith v. Northeast Illinois Regional Commuter R.R. Corp., 569 N.E.2d 41 (1st Dist. 1991). The Metra Police Department was statutorily created with the exact powers with regard to protection of persons and property as those exercised by any other municipal police department. 70 ILCS 3615/2.08. To be sure, Metra Police Department exhibits its policing authority throughout its jurisdiction servicing six counties including: Cook, DuPage, Will, Lake, Kane, and McHenry Counties -- a jurisdictional service area roughly equal to the size of Connecticut.

Metra Police Department is not only dedicated to protecting its own constituents, property, and employees, but also to the common good of all citizens of Northern Illinois. Metra provides mutual police aid to surrounding police departments vis-à-vis intergovernmental agreements, including Metra Police Department's active memberships in the following police teams: Fifth District S.W.A.T. team; the South Suburban Emergency Response Team ["SSERT"]; DuPage County Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigations Team ["MERIT"] S.W.A.T.; and the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System ["ILEAS"] Teams for both zones 3 and 4. Metra Police Department also regularly provides mutual aid to events in the Chicagoland area.

Metra provides a critical public service to Northern Illinois, including being the sole mode of transportation for many citizens. As previously shared, ridership fees account for less than 15% of Metra's operating budget. Despite ever increasing costs and financial challenges, Metra still ensures that its constituents have a reliable, comfortable, and most importantly, a safe form of transportation. This highest level of safety is achieved through the Metra Police Department's unwavering commitment to proper training and exemplary policing. Therefore, by providing BLE training reimbursement assistance to

Metra, the Board is directly and positively benefiting the entire Northern Illinois community that Metra serves.

Metra Police Department qualifies for reimbursement assistance under III.Adm.Code Title 20, Section 5, Part 1720.50. Please consider this correspondence as a petition to the Board to honor Metra's Basic Law Enforcement training reimbursement requests moving forward.

This report contains financial data for Fiscal Year 2026 as of August 21, 2025. Any updated information that becomes available will be provided at the Board Meeting.

Fiscal Year 2025:

- 1. Recruitment & Retention Grant: The Board awarded \$6,685,192.19 to 59 of the 189 agencies who applied. The original requests totaled \$45 million. Merit based review was completed based on an approved scoring tool that assessed intentions, and socioeconomic, demographic, and geographic characteristics. Unfortunately, we were not able to fund the remaining 130 applicants due to cash and appropriation constraints. There is no FY26 appropriation, and the fund is being dissolved.
- 2. NIBIN Grants: The Board awarded funds to 20 agencies of the 31 agencies who applied for a total of \$1,791,787.25. Requests totaled roughly \$2.8 million. Due to limited amount of funding for this appropriation, we made it a priority to fund agencies that had not previously been funded for the NIBIN grant in FY24. Of those 11 unfunded grantees, 10 received a grant in FY24 and 1 had GATA issues. There is no FY26 appropriation.
- 3. Camera Grant: The Board awarded funds to 125 agencies of the 215 agencies for a total of \$3,202,229.07. Total applications totaled almost \$14 million. FY26 appropriations will consist of a new \$4 million dollar appropriation, and then the remainder of what was not spent out in FY25 in a re-appropriation. 57 grant applications were given the opportunity to fix their application issues prior to the FY25 deadline, but the agencies did not remediate the problems by the due date. Listed below are the main reasons these 57 applicants did not receive an award:

Agency Withdrew: 7 Annual Reporting Issues: 5 GATA Issues: 14 Incomplete Applications: 31

Fiscal Year 2026:

With the re-appropriation of camera grant funds signed in the FY26 budget, ILETSB was able to continue down the review list to assist those grantees that had issues with their original FY25 application submission. We are granting \$1,993,142.21 to 33 agencies for additional camera grants. Grantees will be contacted in the coming weeks to sign their agreements and be issued their award payments.

The Grant Team also worked with IT to update the website. Current information was updated to reflect the upcoming, new FY26 camera grant opportunity. We are working with GATU and AmpliFund to make trainings available to assist grantees with their duties to stay in compliance with the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act. We plan to host these trainings prior to the new camera grant opportunity being posted. Our goal is to better assist the agencies and bridge the knowledge gap of GATA requirements. We hope agencies will better understand the grant process and how to be in compliance.

- 6 employees have transferred out to other agencies.

- 1 employee resigned to take a different job.
- 3 employees have been discharged
- 1 employee was returned to work due to an arbitration award & then retired.
- 1 employee returned to work after a 4-year leave of absence.
- 2 retired employees returned on a 75-day temporary appointment both are now ended.
- 11 positions are currently in various stages of the hiring process.
- 1 new job description still remains to be developed, approved, posted, and filled through the end of FY26.

This job has been posted to hire two incumbents the week of August 15, 2025 for a period of 10 days. Anticipate a November 1st start date.
- 12. <u>Certification Manager</u> Public Service Administrator "PSA" Option 7 This supervisory position falls under the Certification Section of the Professional Standards Division and will report to the Deputy Director of Professional Standards. This job has been posted to hire two incumbents the week of August 15, 2025 for a period of 10 days. Anticipate a November 1st start date.
- 13. <u>Manager of Basic and Part-Time Training</u> Public Service Administrator "PSA" Option 7 This split-class supervisory position falls under the Basic Training Section of the Training Division and will report to the Deputy Director of Training. This job has been posted to hire two incumbents the week of August 15, 2025 for a period of 10 days. Anticipate a November 1st start date.
- 14. <u>Assistant to the Associate Director of Information Services</u> Senior Public Service Administrator "SPSA" Option 1 This position serves as an assistant to the Associate Director of Information Services, as database administrator, consults with application development staff on development, modification, and enhancement of the agency's proprietary database applications and provides training and support to non-technical staff on these applications. Additionally, this position serves as the online testing services administrator. This job was posted from July 30, 2025 through August 14, 2025 and the application validation has begun to determine the pool of applicants to be invited to interview. Anticipate interviews in early September with an October 1st start date.

STATUS OF REMAINING FY26 HIRING SEQUENCES PLANNED

15. <u>Curriculum Legal Specialist</u> – Public Service Administrator "PSA" Option 8L – This training attorney position falls under the Legal Section and will report to the Chief Legal Counsel, but will coordinate closely with the Training Division. This job is currently under development and will be submitted for approval by CMS Classifications for approval and split-class determination prior to the December Board meeting.

Once we fill the positions above and have backfilled any additional positions which have been vacated due to internal promotions, transfers, and separations, we will have reached our FY26 headcount of 66 employees. We are on track to reaching our approved headcount for the first time in at least a decade.

We will continue to work on the creation of the remaining job descriptions and the preliminary work for posting those additional positions so that we can begin posting in May 2026, in order to be able to onboard new hires on or as soon as possible after July 1, 2026, which is the first day of FY27.

Those remaining positions to be posted during the last quarter of FY 26 and onboarded during the first quarter of FY27 are as follows:

- 16. <u>Internal Auditor</u> This position will report to the Chief Fiscal Officer. It is yet to be determined what the classification and job details of this position will be, however there have been discussions about the essential functions of the position and it being developed as a Senior Public Service Administrator (SPSA) classification. *More details to come as plans develop*.
- 17. <u>Basic Law Enforcement (BLE) Curriculum Specialist</u> Executive I or II This position will report to the Basic & PT Training Manager and will develop, maintain, and oversee the BLE curriculum. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 18. <u>Basic Correctional Officer & Court Security Officer (BCO/CSO) Curriculum Specialist</u> Executive I or II This position will report to the Basic & PT Training Manager and will develop, maintain, and oversee the BCO & CSO curriculums. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 19. <u>Academy Auditor</u> Executive I or II This position will report to the Basic & PT Training Manager and will perform auditing functions of the ILETSB certified academies throughout the state. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 20. <u>Academy Accreditation Monitor</u> Executive I This position will report to the Basic & PT Training Manager to coordinate and perform functions in support of an Academy Accreditation program. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 21. <u>Professional Standards Secretary</u> Executive Secretary I This existing position will report to the Deputy Director of Professional Standards and will be revised from its current state to provide secretarial and administrative support for this division. This job can be posted with only minimal formatting changes to accommodate the new system. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 22. <u>Training Division Secretary</u> Executive Secretary I This position will report to the Deputy Director of Training and will provide secretarial and administrative support for this division. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.

- 23. <u>Mandated Training Assistant</u> Administrative Assistant I This position will report to the Mandated Training and ASSIST Manager and will provide secretarial and administrative support for this section, due to anticipated increased workload as the agency expands. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 24. <u>Intake Specialist</u> Office Specialist This position will report to the Certifications Manager. Depending upon operational need, we may opt to hire multiple incumbents. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 25. <u>Certification Assistant</u> Office Specialist This position will report to the Certifications Manager. Depending upon operational need, we may opt to hire multiple incumbents. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 26. <u>Investigations Assistant</u> Office Specialist This position will report to the Investigations Manager. Depending upon operational need, we may opt to hire multiple incumbents. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 27. <u>FOIA & Records Assistant</u> Administrative Assistant I This position will report to the FOIA Officer due to anticipated increased workload as agency expands. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.
- 28. <u>Basic Training Associate</u> Office Associate This position will report to the Basic & PT Training Manager to provide clerical and data entry support for this section. This is an AFSCME bargaining unit covered position.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, INCLUSION & ACCESSIBILITY (DEIA)

As a reminder to all Board members, the mandatory <u>Diversity</u>, <u>Equity</u>, <u>Inclusion</u>, <u>and</u> <u>Accessibility Training</u> and <u>LGBTQIA+ Equity and Inclusion Training</u> for 2025 is available on OneNet. This training is due to be completed by all staff and Board members prior to December 31st of each year.

ILETSB's newly promoted DEIA/EEO/AA & Recruiting Specialist has now taken over these duties from the HR & Labor Relations Manager and has been immersed in training and researching to become more knowledgeable in this area. She is currently attending meetings in order to prepare the agency's 2025 Strategic Planning Report, which is due on June 20, 2025.

Kenley has recently completed and submitted the FY26 DEIA Action Plan, the FY25 Race and Gender Wage Report as well as the 4th Quarter Equal Employment Opportunity Reports. She is currently working on the FY26 Affirmative Action Plan and the FY25 Workforce Report due in December.

HUMAN CAPITAL MANAGEMENT (HCM) PROJECT STATUS

ILETSB is now all caught up on pending personnel transactions in this new system and is entering transactions in real time. The automatic transactions are still not yet running in the system, so we are sending them to CMS every other month so that they can enter them as needed. We hope that by January 1, 2026, these automatic transactions will be functioning so that we can rely upon accurate system reporting.

The Payroll, Time & Attendance, Learning Management, and Performance & Goal Management modules of the HCM will be rolled out until a later date. No anticipated timeframe for this has been shared at this time.

We been working in conjunction with CMS Labor and CMS Classifications on a reclassification project regarding <u>Police Training Specialists</u> (Field Investigators). This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between CMS and AFSCME was finalized in March, but due to some technical issues, a revision to the MOU was required. We received the revised MOU on August 13th. Our Police Training Specialists will now be classified as <u>Police Training Specialist – Advanced</u>. The pay for these positions jumped 5 grades, from 17 to 22. We are now in the process of updating the creditable service dates, salaries, and pay steps of these incumbents and calculating and issuing backpay in accordance with the MOU.

- "Chief Dolan's Proximity Conundrum" & "Knock it Off" Principle
- "Why do supervisors and managers find it so difficult to hold subordinates accountable and track performance?"
- "An increase in the frequency of 'Knock it Off Meetings' directly corresponds with a decrease in Disciplinary Actions."

2. Live webinar – 7 Steps of Crime Scene Processing for Death Investigations – Kiersten Reif; July 22, 2025; Zoom; 76 attendees

The 7 Steps of Crime Scene Processing for Death Investigations is a live two-hour webinar designed to provide law enforcement officers with in-depth instruction on a systematic approach to death investigation crime scenes. Having laid the foundation of various types of death investigations in previous webinars, this session will focus on how to approach death-related crime scenes systematically to ensure they are processed thoroughly and effectively. The presenter will utilize the seven-step process outlined in Crime Scene Investigation courses to demonstrate how to approach death investigation crime scenes methodically while allowing for flexibility in the presence of evolving case elements. From suspicious circumstances to apparent homicides, crime scenes must be processed keeping in mind legal requirements, collaboration within and among

agencies, and precise attention to detail. The webinar will begin with the initial scene response, break down each of the seven steps used in various death-related crime scenes, and culminate with the conclusion of the scene investigation. Case examples will be provided through the lens of a law enforcement officer utilizing the seven-step crime scene processing system.

3. Live webinar – Small Agency Leadership Lessons for Police Executives – Chief Henry Dolan; July 29, 2025; Zoom; 114 attendees

The vast majority of chiefs, sheriffs, and other police executives in the United States are responsible for leading relatively small agencies, and yet much of what is written and taught to new law enforcement executives draws lessons from major city agencies with hundreds or thousands of sworn personnel. Over the course of a 32-year career in law enforcement, and before serving as chief of two major city police departments, Chief Harry P. Dolan (Ret.) led two smaller agencies—one agency with fewer than 20 sworn over the course of 4 years and another with fewer than 70 sworn over the course of 6 years. During that decade, he learned lessons that are unique to the challenges that come along with the "close contact" nature of leading a smaller agency. In many respects, the smaller agency leadership challenges were significantly more difficult than those he would experience as a major city chief.

In this two-hour webinar, Chief Dolan will discuss:

- Supervision, coaching, counseling, and discipline in smaller agencies
- Overseeing investigations of men and women you know well and work with every day
- Overcoming imposter syndrome when your officers knew you back when
- "Leading from the front" without micro-managing

4. Live webinar – Leadership Fatigue – Katharine Manning; August 5, 2025; Zoom; 76 attendees

Strong leadership demands clear thinking, emotional resilience, and the ability to support others through ongoing stress and upheaval. But in high-pressure environments, even the most dedicated leaders can find themselves running on empty. This session explores the signs and impact of leadership fatigue—how prolonged stress, uncertainty, and responsibility can drain our energy and cloud our judgment. Participants will gain practical tools for recognizing fatigue in themselves and others, strategies to recharge and maintain focus, and ways to lead with empathy and steadiness even in turbulent times.

Course Objectives:

- Identify signs and symptoms of leadership fatigue in oneself and others.
- Understand the impact of prolonged stress, uncertainty, and responsibility **on leadership performance and decision-making.**
- Develop practical strategies to recharge, build emotional resilience, and maintain focus under pressure.
- Enhance the ability to lead with empathy, clarity, and steadiness **during periods of stress** and upheaval.

5. Live Webinar – Lights! Action! Camera! First Amendment Auditors – Are you Prepared?; Jaclyn Keane; May 15, 2025; 107 registrations (Aug 8)

What are First Amendment auditors and what is the proper police role in these occurrences? This course offers essential insights into the rights and tactics of auditors who test public and government spaces for constitutional violations which can oftentimes be controversial, confrontational and disruptive. Through instruction on legal foundations, common auditing techniques, policy and training considerations, as well as real-world case studies, students will learn how to effectively navigate these encounters while respecting First Amendment rights and reducing risk and liability for officers and agencies alike. Gain the tools to handle public interactions with professionalism, avoid legal pitfalls, and maintain public trust. Whether aiming to enhance an understanding of constitutional rights, establish sound policy, or improve training and response strategies in the field, this course provides the knowledge needed to protect you and your agency with confidence and professionalism.

6. Live Webinar – Police Ethics Training – Matt Dolan; August 19, 2025; Zoom; 72 registrations (Aug 8)

In recent years, amidst an increase in public calls for police training in the areas of implicit bias, cultural sensitivity, and diversity, equity, and inclusion, something fundamental has been noticeably absent from much of the discourse surrounding police misconduct and the need for more training: police ethics. The 18th-century author Samuel Johnson asserted that "People need to be reminded more often than they need to be instructed." It may be time to remind law enforcement officers, at various stages of their careers, why they got into the profession and why they signed up for one of the most difficult and honorable vocations there is, when the job is done the right way. In this webinar, Attorney Matt Dolan will analyze issues of poor police operations through the prism of police ethics. Reminding Your People of the Honorable Policing Tradition that they Have a Duty to Uphold, Recognizing Acts of Commission and Acts of Omission in Law Enforcement, Coming to Grips with the Dangers of a "No Contact, No Complaint" Mentality, Seeing the Dangerous Power of the Rationalization Slope and the Victim Mentality, Remembering Your WHY.

7. Grant Writing Workshop – Evan Sorg; September 3 & 4, 2025; Orland Park; 38 registrants – Sold Out

Law Enforcement Grant Writing 101 is a two-day, 14-hour training program designed to provide the knowledge, tools, and skills required for law enforcement agencies to successfully apply for federal, state, and foundation grant funding for equipment, technology, training, personnel, and more.

The overall goals for the course include:

- (1) providing participants with the requisite knowledge to write effective and winning grant applications and
- (2) preparing students for the grant writing process by having them compile all information/data necessary to write applications and enter this information into the provided grant writing toolkit.

To pass the training, students must receive a 70% or greater on the post-test administered at the conclusion of the course. QUARTERLY REPORT FOR THE SEPTEMBER 11, 2025 BOARD MEETING

Federal Homeland Security Grant Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council

Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Executive Institute

This report provides an update of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Federal Homeland Security Grant funded through the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council (HSAC).

TRAINING AND FUNDING

ILETSB has been a voting member of the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council and recipient of homeland security funds since 2002. ILETSB has four active awards, Federal Fiscal Years 2021, 2022, 2023, and 2024; years 2021, 2022, and 2023 the award is \$391,000. For FFY 2024 the award is in the amount of \$136,000. The decrease is the result of a 10 percent reduction to the State of Illinois Homeland Security Grant Program. This 10 percent reduction impacted all stakeholders receiving homeland security funds in Illinois. ILETSB is currently in Federal Fiscal Year 2022 with the performance period ending June 30, 2026.

ILLINOIS HOMELAND SECURITY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council May 28th meeting was cancelled due to uncertainty with the FFY 2025 budget and the freezing of the Homeland Security Grant Program by the Trump Administration. The HSAC full committee met on July 23rd at 10:00 at IEMA-OHS.

Acting IEMA-OHS Director Ted Berger introduced himself and provided opening remarks. At the time of this meeting Department of Homeland Security has not released the FFY 2025 Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) to the states. An unclassified/FOUO intelligence briefing was provided by ISP Intelligence Chief Aaron Kustermann. Jason Bowen from the Department of Innovation and Technology (DoIT) provided a cyber security update. Phishing attacks are on the rise in Illinois. This is the number one way hackers get into your systems. VPN's can be compromised and need to be updated regularly and consistently. Microsoft Sharepoint, if not patched has been compromised.

An impromptu HSAC meeting at IEMA-OHS was called on August 11th. The Department of Homeland Security released FFY 2025 NOFO. Chicago Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI)

was cut by 44% or 25 million dollars. The state share was cut by 2 million dollars. HSAC members were asked to reduce their budgets at this meeting.

Next full quarterly meeting of the HSAC will be on October 22, 2025 at 10:00 am at IEMA.

LAW ENFORCEMENT MUTUAL AID COMMITTEE

LEMAC did not meet during this quarter.

CENTER FOR HOMELAND SECURITY LEADERSHIP

Program Director – Derek Carle

Derek Carle continues to serve on the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council (IHSAC) and serves on three sub-committees of the IHSAC: Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Committee, Cyber Security Committee and, Prevention Committee.

Derek serves on three national committees pertaining to law enforcement and incident management. Derek is a member of a law enforcement committee to address incident command/NIMS to law enforcement executives, command staff and officers. Derek is also on the Incident Commander and Intelligence/Investigations committees.

Derek is also a credentialed Type 2 Incident Commander for the State of Illinois.

Planning Workshops

During this quarter the Mobile Training Units held 14 workshops for 284 officers totaling 4,924 hours of training. UASI held 0 workshops. The workshops were paid out of the FFY2021 HSGP.

The ILETSB-Executive Institute using Homeland Security funds introduced a two-day advanced drone operators' course. Two of these courses were held at University of Illinois – Springfield and Elgin Police Department. The advanced drone operators' course includes instruction on interior flight, mapping, counter drone operations and area searching, culminating in two practical exercises. Additional classes will be offered in the Spring.

Illinois Active Threat Master Instructor Course

The Spring 2025 Illinois Active Threat Master Instructor Course (IATMIC) has been completed. Currently we are preparing for the Fall 2025 IATMIC. The fall class will start on August 4-8 in Gurnee/Lake Villa. Week 2 is September 8-12 in Lake Villa and Elgin. Week 3 is September 28-October 3 at the Muscatatuck National Guard Training Center in Muscatatuck, Indiana. Week 4 is October 20 -24 in West Memphis, Arkansas at T1G.

The Illinois Active Threat Master Instructor Certification Program builds upon the ITOA's (Illinois Tactical Officers Association) TPO (Tactical Patrol Officer) program by offering an advanced certification for current instructors throughout the state.

The 4-week program will certify instructors to teach: Use of Force, High Risk Patrol Tactics, Active Threat/Rapid Deployment, Solo Officer Response, Rescue Task Force, and Urban Tactic/MACTAC (Multiple Assault Counter Terrorist Action Capabilities).

Homeland Security Workshop Catalog

With guidance from Mobile Team Unit Coordinators, staff continues to review and revise the workshop catalog. Coordinators are encouraged to submit new workshops for consideration.

Based on the desire of the Illinois Homeland Security Director and the IHSAC, the homeland security grant guidance and catalog will be going through a small revision. The core courses for the catalog will consist of the Active Threat Master course (every other year), Active Threat End-User courses, Community Behavioral Threat Assessment (different from school based Behavioral Threat Assessment), Digital Threat Assessment, Cyber Security, Domestic Violent Extremism, Soft Targets/Crowded Spaces and a few of the popular courses that address the Vision 2028 Homeland Security Strategy.

Illinois School and Campus Safety Program

Behavioral Threat Assessment

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working to deliver training regarding the threat assessment & management process.

The program continues to work with David Okada, President of the Association of Threat Assessment Professionals, on sessions of the K-12 class Threat Assessment Team Training.

The program continues to work with Dr. Gene Deisinger and Jeffrey Cugno on Higher Ed Behavioral Threat Assessment classes.

Furthermore, the program continues to work with Safer Schools Together on sessions of Digital Threat Assessment®, Advanced Digital Threat Assessment®, and Behavioral and Digital Threat AssessmentTM, as well as with Rich Wistocki on sessions of Preventing Targeted Violence Through Leakage and Cyber Investigations (PTVTLCI).

Site Safety Security Assessment

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working to deliver sessions of the Site Safety Security Assessment training.

Crisis Communications

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working with Deputy Chief Chris Covelli on sessions of Effective Communication Principles Before, During, and After Critical Incidents.

Website

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program continues to promote and update the Illinois School and Campus Safety Resource Center website. The website features a comprehensive resource compendium of school safety topics, has a multimedia platform that features public service video work, features many of our collaborative state and federal partners, and provides information about the school and campus safety program. We are continuing to seek input from both K-12 and higher education institutions and associations to drive the content of the website. Staff is currently working on adding additional resources and topic areas to the website, as well as testing and updating links.

Weekly Update Emails

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program continues to promote school safety topics and spread awareness through our Weekly Update emails, which go out weekly to over 24,000 individuals in the School and Campus Safety directories. The Weekly Update emails feature important school safety topics, share breaking news/resources, promote upcoming classes, and provide links to the Illinois School and Campus Safety Resource Center website. Past Weekly Update emails are added to the Resource Center website to make their content accessible to individuals who do not receive them via email.

K-12 School Directory and Institution of Higher Education Directory

Staff continue to update the K-12 public and private school directory and the statewide institution of higher education directory. Presently the directory has over 24,000 contacts. For April through June, staff worked on updating the K-12 directories for Chicago, ROE 4, and ROE 8.

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EXECUTIVE INSTITUTE – A.S.S.I.S.T PROGRAM

FY26 1st QUARTER BOARD REPORT

The Executive Institute A.S.S.I.S.T. Program (A Statewide System of In-Service Training) was started at the end of July 2023. This program consists of three major sections: State Law Enforcement Agencies (Course Certification, Instructor Approval, and class recognition), ILETSB K9 Certification and the ILETSB IROCC (Illinois Retired Officer's Concealed Carry) Program, along with several entities that do not fall within these sections directly. The EI-A.S.S.I.S.T. Program also works directly with the rest of the Executive Institute and ILETSB staff with assistance in conferences and training, along with the administration of the IDOT Grant.

Since the inception of the EI - A.S.S.I.S.T. Program, several State Law Enforcement agencies have used our program to get their courses ILETSB certified, along with getting their instructors approved to provide the instruction. This is helping agencies to fulfill mandate requirements per the Illinois Safe-T Act.

Recently there was a Modified High-Risk Traffic Stops Course held at the ILETSB Building in Springfield on July 15th. The class was full with very positive feedback from the participants and instructors, despite the extreme heat. As a reminder, this course is specific to certain State Law Enforcement Agencies, that do not fit the criteria of typical law enforcement agencies. The course was created by the Executive Institute/ EI-A.S.S.I.S.T. along with ITOA. There are also two of these scheduled at MTU 15 in Bellville, on November 6th and 7th. We want to thank MTU 15 for their assistance again for welcoming us to their location.

We have another EI-A.S.S.I.S.T./State Law Enforcement Agency Training Coordinator meeting scheduled for September 23rd at the ILETSB building involving several State Law Enforcement Agencies throughout the state. At the first meeting we held there were several agency representatives that showed up such as: ILETSB, Illinois Attorney General's Office, Illinois Secretary of State Police, Illinois State Police, Illinois Department of Revenue, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Illinois Gaming Board, CMS Illinois State Police Protective Services Unit, Illinois Supreme Court Marshals Office, along with Heather Hotz from Executive Institute. Heather went into great detail regarding what the Executive Institute Offers from online learning to conferences that they can attend, answering any questions they had. The meeting itself was informal, with open discussions, suggestions, and questions. This meeting, putting several State Law Enforcement Agencies in the same room, was highly beneficial and probably does not happen normally. Their information was shared, so they have a direct contact on each agency, along with agencies sharing trainings that they conduct in-house, which they will open up for other State Law Enforcement Agencies to attend when available. The Agencies understand the importance of the trainings, the Safety

Act, along with the required mandates and they strive to train beyond the minimum. There was an overwhelming reception on what was discussed, with several wanting to have this meeting two to four times a year, hence having another. We are planning to have twice a year.

The VirTra System located at the ILETSB Building is being utilized by departments with more looking to start. We have added even more ILETSB certified courses for the system, to give more opportunities to get training and mandates needed. More courses are being reviewed to add as well.

The K9 Certification/Re-certification team, which includes ILETSB Legal Counsel, has been working on ways of updating the program. This is to help ensure accurate information on forms and keep the certification process up to date. This program has scheduling in several locations around the state with dates scheduled throughout the year to assist the Department's K9 handlers and the K9 assessors. We have gone back to using a fiscal year calendar for record keeping. For updates on the 1st quarter of fiscal year 2026 K9 Program statistics, see the included report.

The IROCC, which consists of nearly 10,000 applicants yearly and has been working alongside Levi, Ray and Shoup, Inc. in the updating of the website and application process to help with the vetting of applicants and making operations more efficient. The good news is that we are now in the testing and final changes phase of the process. For details of updates on the IROCC Program calendar year 2026 numbers, see the included report.

As you can see, the Executive Institute A.S.S.I.S.T. Program has achieved a great deal in a short amount of time and continues to strive as a program.

September 2025 Quarterly Board Report

This report provides an update on the administration of the ASSIST Program including: the 4th Quarter Report for FY25. Presented below are some of the ASSIST administrative matters to include Training and Fiscal reports.

Attachment I provides the ASSIST program training activity report results through the fourth quarter of Fiscal Year 2025 to include all 13 MTU's. This chart provides information from each Mobile Team Unit: number of training course hours, total number of students attending the training programs, man hours and number of courses offered. The Fiscal Year totals for the first, second, & third quarters are listed below: (It should be noted that MTU 3 data is provided to IT at ILETSB and is not automatically generated or uploaded like all others and this can cause delays in reporting & data import errors). Additionally, it should be noted that MTU 3 was provided bulk loading opportunity after the start of FY25 which is currently being utilized to assist both MTU 3 and ILETSB in data collection and efficiency.

Attachment II provides a financial overview of the total budgets operationally for the MTU's including yearly MTU Payments, Specialized Training Reimbursements along with the MTU's Ten Percent match. To date, the Board made four quarterly payments to the Mobile Team Units including payments to CPD for their In-Service Training needs.

Attachment III provides one graph depicting ALL Certified Training for MTU's and the reported total number of hours as well as a breakdown regarding mandate assignment for each of the 18 Mandated Training areas. A total of 59,925.5 hours of Certified Training is currently available to officers state-wide with Use of Force Courses reporting the highest demand with 21,907 training mandate hours in addition to over 8,086.25 scenario training hours currently certified in De-escalation Techniques and High-Risk Vehicle Stops. It is vital to understand the dynamics of Law Enforcement Training and the pyramid learning that occurs within nearly ALL of training minus minimal subject matters that specifically relate to individualized training which can be outside the mandate areas of training. Lastly, scenario hours are calculated in five areas of mandate training including: De-escalation Techniques, High Risk Traffic Stop, Officer Safety, Stops/Searches/4th Amendment, & Emergency Medical Response Training (not included within the numbers listed above).

Attachment IV represents the current listing of MTU directors and locations of MTU offices and training sites. (Addition to the map includes the State ASSIST Division located within ILETSB office in Springfield that represents all state agencies for In-House Training Applications, Instructors, and Certification through the Executive Institute).

Attachment V represents the current listing of MTU geographical locations and represented agencies and officers being trained and listed within each MTU area.

Attachment VI represents the current Part-time Police Training Academy dates and graduations as set by each entity.

Attachment VII represents ALL In-Service Courses presented for Approval since the last Board meeting for period ending August 20th, 2025. MTU's currently have a total of 5,662 Certified Courses to which they present to their memberships (many of these are represented within each MTU, In-House, and through the Executive Institute and Department of Justice – COPS Portal).

Attachment VIII represents ALL LHI In-Service Courses presented for Approval since the last Board meeting for period ending August 20th, 2025. These courses are provided to ALL LHI Certified Officers to enable their recertification during a four-year period requiring 32-hours of continuous education in LHI.

Closure

The Board has been extremely pleased with the MTU's over the course of the last three years following the implementation of the SAFE-T Act. In review of compliance records to date, it appears Law Enforcement Officers state-wide are approximately 94.77% in compliance with Agencies being over 96% in compliance with Mandates outside the Use of Force area and approximate 85% compliant in Use of Force Mandates in De-escalation Techniques & High-Risk Traffic Stop Trainings area. It is believed these two primary areas would be the most difficult to close the gap regarding compliance due to the extended number of hours as these two mandate areas require six-hours in each area for compliance and a lower number of officers per instructor ratio given the scenario-based atmosphere. With approximately 36,000 law enforcement officers state-wide at a maximum class size for scenario-based instruction generally being established at 20, this requires over 1,800 classes at no less than 6-hours of training for each mandate area. MTU's & the Executive Institute are working vigorously to ensure these classes are provided to ensure the opportunity to train exists for every officer.

In October of 2025, we will be working with Certification Division & the IT Department to roll out the Verification Process for those with the last name ending in A-G. With an approximately six months remaining before verification is required for these officers who are deficient in hours, we believe a 100% compliance is very ascertainable for everyone. The ILETSB Training Division continues to seek the highest level of effective training with partners like our MTU staffs as we seek to provide our officers the best opportunity of success and growth within their professional endeavors. We can expect the highly anticipated Verification Process to be successful and to report by the end of this FY the successful roll out of Mandate Compliance state-wide based on the previously developed Officer Portal. Currently, we have approximately 20,139 officers signed up for the Officer Portal with over 16,000 still needing to register. The vital aspects of sign-ups is that the only manner in which an officer will be able to verify will be through the Officer Portal System.


Attachment III-C Tri-Annual Mandates & Psychology of Domestic Violence (5-yr)





CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM TRAINING (CIT)

September 2025 QUARTERLY REPORT

Jennifer Wooldridge Deputy Director of Operations State CIT Coordinator Handler to State K-9 Therapy Dog, Trooper

This report provides an update on the administration of the Board's Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training programs, therapy dog initiative and various related mental health and deescalation trainings.

CIT Training Courses/Series:

As mentioned at the June Quarterly Board meeting, interest in the CIT training programs and related mental health related trainings remain strong. For this fiscal year, staff has tentatively approved over \$1.5 million for training around the state in CIT, mental health awareness, deescalation/conflict resolution, peer support, officer wellness and crisis response. We are grateful for our MTU partners and thank them for their assistance with all these important programs.

Another important note in the CIT series is that our team will be working with Dr. Michael Schlosser in the creation of a co-response training that may be used around the state. Mike was previously involved with the creation of and training for the co-response system utilized at UIUC PD which is quite successful. While the concept of offering such a course has been floating around our team for a while, I'm excited to see this initiative coming through to fruition. I will keep the Board apprised as this training initiative progresses.

I know that I briefly mentioned a request for assistance from the Haymarket Center of Chicago but wanted to give you a quick follow up. The Haymarket Center (whose mission is to aid people with substance use disorders in their recovery) reached out to see if our trainers would be able to provide (6) one-day trainings (which include role play) for their entire staff on deescalation/CIT concepts. In lieu of payment, they have offered in-kind assistance for these trainings to include participation in our 40-hour CIT training courses (sharing stories/journeys/recovery and resources), assistance with recruiting and training those with lived-experiences for work in our trainings as well as other in-kind assistance. We are excited about this partnership and look forward to working with their team.

One additional point of interest I'd like to mention regarding the CIT training program is that we are gearing up for our next CIT instructor/evaluator training "retreat" where we bring in all

our instructors, evaluators and actors for a day of training and round-tabling to ensure we are providing the best training to our officers and first responder partners around the state.

CIT K-9 Therapy Dog Initiative:

Since last reported at the June Board meeting, this initiative has really taken off! Not only does Trooper continue to make appearances statewide, but this "pound pup" traveled via plane to Anaheim, California for our training session on therapy dogs at the CIT International Conference in early August! From visits with the plane's captains and flight staff, to travelers and international conference attendees, there was no doubt, Trooper and has friends, K-9 Zilly (Cook County TOR) and K-9 Chase (SIU-E) made huge impressions on everyone! While additional information on the CIT International Conference will be noted later in this report, here are some other highlights of the therapy dog initiative since last reported in June:

* Signing of Senate Bill 1491 – now PA 104-106

This legislation mandates the Board develop a course and certification program for certified therapy dog teams. (please see the attached press release for additional information)

* Implementation of PA 104-106

As the Board has already approved the outline for this optional law enforcement therapy dog certification program for law enforcement and those working with first responders in a CIT or related capacity, Board staff and our TOR partners continue to collaborate on the necessary training required to be compliant with this legislation which becomes effective in January, 2026. Board staff will bring our recommendations to the Board at the December Board meeting.

* Welcome K-9 Ghost: MTU 7

MTU Director, Brian Fengel, had expressed interest in acquiring a Tails of Redemption (TOR) therapy dog for his MTU/region. As we continue to work closely with our TOR partners, they let us know that therapy dog Ghost was ready to serve in the community. After a successful meet and greet at the June State CIT conference in Peoria, I'm happy to report that Ghost is now serving the officers, staff and first responder community of Peoria with his handler Brian Fengel. Ghost has already been making a difference with numerous trainings and events within their community and is now a part of the CIT mutual aid K-9 therapy dog team. (please see attached press release)

* National Night Out, August 5, 2025

Trooper and I received an invitation to participate in the Hines VA's National Night Out event. Here we met and mingled with the attendees of the festivities as well as made a special visit to the long-term care residents of the VA hospital. Because this was such a hit with the residents, they asked if we could make a visit more of a planned, re-occurring event. And then we rounded out the day with a visit to the Holden Elementary School in Chicago with their National Night Out activities.

* Continuing Training

Trooper and I attended (and will do so monthly) the TOR sponsored continuing skills training for K-9 therapy dogs and their handlers. This training reinforces basic skills, provides tricks to acquiring more advanced techniques/approaches, and allows for team interacting events and site visits, including the Hines VA.

* First Responders Day at Brookfield Zoo

Trooper and I have been invited to participate in this year's First Responder's Day at Brookfield Zoo. The event will be happening on Sunday, September 7th, so make sure you head on over to the zoo to say hello to all the special pups that will be on hand to greet the visitors on this special recognition day.

* Trooper Vehicle

I'm excited to share that we now have a properly fitted vehicle designed specifically for Trooper's transportation needs. The vehicle (Ford Explorer) includes a kennel and built in safety features to ensure his comfort and well-being during every ride.

We believe those in attendance left inspired and energized to bring their new collaborations back to their agencies and communities to foster effective crisis response. Special thanks to Heather Hotz, Cindi Bricker and the entire staff at the Executive Institute for their tireless work on this conference; we truly couldn't do it without them!

CESSA:

Just a quick update to let you know that the CESSA statewide group continues to meet as well as the subcommittees. Progress is being made for implementation around the state; however, because of the enormous task at hand, a new legislative extension (via bill) has been submitted was approved to extend the deadline until July 2027. I will keep the Board apprised of substantive updates.

Along the same lines, the CESSA Training Subcommittee has approached the Board for assistance in creating an 8 hour in-person de-escalation course (including scenarios) for all PSAP's (public safety answering point). We are currently working on an Intergovernmental Agreement with the Department of Human Services to accomplish this task.

CIT International Conference:

<u>"See Spot Serve: Incorporating Therapy Canines in Crisis Response Programming & Deployment: & But Wait, There's More: Advance CIT Courses and Programing to Continue Growth and Development</u>

I'm happy to report that the Board was once again selected to speak at the CIT International Conference in Anaheim, California. Not only were we able to showcase the new statewide law enforcement therapy dog initiative, but we were selected for a repeat performance of our "But Wait There's More"... session. Our team of instructors for the 'See Spot Serve' presentation, included the Director of Cook County's Tails of Redemption Program, Jerry Roman (with K-9 Zilly), Officer Curtis Schwartzkopf from SIUE (with K-9 Chase), our chief legal counsel, John Keigher and I (along with Trooper) where we showcased the newly signed legislation on certifying law enforcement therapy dogs, the Tails of Redemption program, the use of these law enforcement therapy dogs around the state for officer wellness and community events and how this new initiative will also allow for a mutual aid response should there be a need. The response from those in attendance was overwhelming, to the fact we are still receiving inquiries from other states wanting to implement something similar in their jurisdictions! I am grateful for the opportunity to present and for the friendships made along the way. Illinois and the Board are truly onto something huge!! And special thanks to John Keigher, John William and Mark Benson for presenting the repeat presentation on "But Wait There's More". We once again received rave reviews, so much that Michigan reached out to say this presentation was the "only reason they attended the conference". They have asked for our presentation to take back and try to implement in their state. Our forward thinking, continual expansion of the CIT basic program is truly one of a kind. I couldn't be more proud to be a small part of this flagship

program since its inception twenty-two plus years ago. (press release on the presentations is attached)

CIT and Mental Health Awareness Training and Resource Institute:

As the Board has been offering the basic CIT training since 2003 and various off-shoots of mental health training including the CIT series, Mental Health Awareness and Response – and Intro to CIT, peer support pilot programs, officer wellness, etc. we are looking to the future to the possibility of creating a CIT and Mental Health Awareness Training & Resource Institute – perhaps in conjunction with the 988/CESSA roll out. It is really just a larger defined umbrella to the works we are already doing including but not limited to:

- CIT training series for in-service
- Intro to CIT training in academies (CIT Concepts)
- CIT resources
- MHA and Response Training and Resources
- Peer support training and resources (model policies and best practices)
- Support pilot programs on peer support
- Officer wellness training and resources
- Resources for families of law enforcement officers
- Co-responder model policy and best practices
- Therapy/Comfort dog assistance Tails of Redemption (TOR) through the Cook County Sheriff's Office and Operation TT through the PBPA
- Add on training for social workers, paramedics, fire and additional courses for dispatch (as allowed)
- De-escalation training by CIT Instructors
- Provide opportunities for ICAT training
- Summits/conferences (may also assist with training mandates)
- Increase awareness of resources via first responder app
- Become a repository for best practices statewide
- Create a reporting mechanism (to assist with getting federal funds)
- Ongoing research and curriculum updates/development

Although we have not yet begun on this initiative, as soon as the Board retains additional staff to help support such an extensive resource platform, we will move forward with this concept.

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ILETSB to Develop Certification Program for Law Enforcement Therapy Dog Teams

Putting Our Best Paw Forward to Support Illinois Communities

SPRINGFIELD, IL – Today, the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB) is pleased to announce the passage of Senate Bill 1491, a new law that will enhance crisis and emergency response capabilities across the state through the integration of certified therapy dog teams. Senate Bill 1491 was recently signed into law by Governor JB Pritzker on Friday, August 1, 2025.

Effective January 1, 2026, Senate Bill 1491 requires ILETSB to develop a comprehensive course and certification program for law enforcement officers who will work with therapy dogs in crisis and emergency response situations. This initiative aims to ensure that trained therapy dog teams are available to provide comfort and support during critical incidents, benefiting both individuals in crisis and responding officers. This program will allow for a mutual aid network of therapy dog teams to be dispersed throughout the state when they are needed the most.

"This is a significant moment for communities across Illinois," said **Jennifer Wooldridge**, **the state CIT coordinator and K-9 handler of 'Trooper' from the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board**. "Now more than ever, our communities need this support. The ability for people to express their grief and relieve their stress in the presence of these wonderful K-9s is truly impactful."

This new program will build upon existing crisis intervention team training efforts, providing additional valuable resources for law enforcement agencies and the communities they serve. ILETSB will be working diligently to establish the curriculum and certification standards, and further details regarding the program development and rollout will be shared on the website in the coming months.

"Therapy dogs have the ability to help reduce stress-induced trauma, bringing instant comfort and relief," said **Sen. Mary Edly-Allen (D-Libertyville)**. "This law will improve officer wellness and make certified therapy K-9s more accessible to help those in a time of need."

Following the passage of Senate Bill 1491, ILETSB will develop a course and certification program for law enforcement therapy dog teams. ILETSB will emphasize the use of therapy dogs with crisis and emergency response. Furthermore, our board will aim to ensure that certified K-9 teams are available in various regions throughout the state.

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Illinois Spotlights Groundbreaking Therapy K-9 Program at International Conference, Featuring Cook County Sheriff's Tails of Redemption

Innovating Crisis Intervention Training One Paw at a Time

SPRINGFIELD, IL — Illinois showcased its efforts in combining therapy K-9s with crisis response at the 2025 CIT International Conference, held Aug. 11-13 at the Anaheim, California Marriott. Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB) State Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Coordinator Jennifer Wooldridge and Chief Legal Counsel John Keigher presented alongside therapy K-9 Trooper, highlighting the state's innovative "See Spot Serve: Incorporating Therapy K-9s in Crisis Response Programming & Deployment" session.

Trooper, a 3-year-old Border Collie mix who came from the Cook County Sheriff's Office's renowned Tails of Redemption program, impressed attendees with his comforting presence. His participation highlighted the vital role therapy K-9s play in de-escalating high-stress situations and providing comfort. "See Spot Serve" detailed how Illinois has launched a specialized certification program for CIT officers and co-responders who use therapy dogs, a program developed to ensure statewide standards for training and deployment.

This initiative received official approval with the signing of Senate Bill 1491 into law by Gov. JB Pritzker on Aug. 8. Sponsored by Sen. Mary Edly-Allen, SB1491 granted ILETSB to develop a comprehensive course and certification program for law enforcement officers working with therapy dogs in crisis and emergency response.

"This is a significant moment for communities across Illinois," said **Wooldridge**, who also serves as Trooper's K-9 handler from the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board. "Now more than ever, our communities need this support. The ability for people to express their grief and relieve their stress in the presence of these wonderful K-9s is truly impactful."

"The new certification program will provide a vital framework for effective regional aid during crises," said **Keigher**. "This systematic approach ensures that our therapy K-9 teams are not only exceptionally trained but also readily available to support communities and first responders across Illinois."

Beyond the therapy K-9 presentation, the Illinois delegation, including Wooldridge, Keigher, and Regional Coordinators John Williams and Mark Benson, also highlighted Illinois' robust advanced and refresher CIT courses. Jerry Roman from the Cook County Sheriff's Office and therapy K9 Zilly, along with Curtis Schwartzkopf from the SIUE Police Department and K-9 handler of Chase, discussed the many benefits of therapy K-9s and their effectiveness in various settings.



The **Tails of Redemption** program, established by the Cook County Sheriff's Office, has played a crucial role in the development of Illinois' therapy K-9 initiative. Individuals in custody who participate in this program provide basic obedience training to rescue dogs that eventually become Therapy K-9s. This all-encompassing program is beneficial in many ways, as it not only aids in the rehabilitation of the individuals in custody but also prepares the dogs for their future roles. By providing trained therapy K-9s for crisis response, the program has forged vital partnerships across the state. The program's impact is exemplified by K-9 Ghost, a lab mix therapy dog trained through Tails of Redemption, who now serves Mobile Training Unit 7 and offers comfort and support to the Peoria area and its surrounding communities. Tails of Redemption has facilitated over 170 adoptions to date.

In 2018, Sheriff Tom Dart launched this innovative program uniting dogs, individuals in custody, and members of the community in a powerful journey of rehabilitation and hope. Participants not only learn to train dogs in basic obedience, and preparing the animals for adoption, but they also acquire essential life skills such as patience, compassion, and problem-solving, thus enhancing their job readiness upon release.

"Providing public safety is more than answering emergency calls, it is also comforting our communities during a crisis," Cook County Sheriff Thomas J. Dart said. "I am especially proud of Tails of Redemption's role in helping our local law enforcement agencies support the residents they serve."

The recent vehicle crash at the YNOT After School Camp in Chatham that claimed the lives of 5 children underscored the significance of Illinois' therapy K-9 program in helping the community cope with tragedy. In the aftermath, a dedicated team of therapy K-9s and their handlers provided comfort to affected children, community members, and first responders. This support system included K-9 Trooper and Wooldridge, along with:

- K-9 Zilly & Bolt Cook County Sheriff's Office "Tails of Redemption"
- K-9 Selena Troy Police Department
- K-9 Lollipop University of Illinois Police
- K-9 Snow Kendall County Sheriff's Office
- K-9 Chase SIUE Police Department
- Puppies Bean & Nugget Waggin' Tails Animal Shelter/Cicero Animal Control

These presentations firmly established Illinois' leadership in CIT training among other states, a testament to ILETSB's active participation in conferences, stakeholder meetings, and instructor retreats. During breaks, Trooper, Zilly, and Chase proved to be highly popular attractions, frequently drawing attendees eager to interact and experience their calming presence. This hands-on engagement sparked significant interest, with several other state affiliates requesting additional information on Illinois' innovative programs, particularly its therapy K-9 certification, to implement similar initiatives.

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Ghost Joins MTU 7 as Central Illinois' Newest Therapy K9

Abandoned Puppy Becomes Beacon of Support

SPRINGFIELD, IL – A remarkable journey has brought a 10-month-old Labrador mix named **Ghost** to Mobile Training Unit (MTU) 7, where he will serve as a dedicated therapy K9 providing critical emotional support and a calming presence for law enforcement officers across Bureau, LaSalle, Marshall, Peoria, Putnam, Stark, Tazewell and Woodford counties.

Ghost's story began in December 2024 when he was found abandoned in Cicero, Illinois, at just two and a half months old, along with his brother. Despite efforts by local animal control, he went unclaimed. His path soon led to a transformative opportunity through the **Cook County Sheriff's Office Tails of Redemption program**. This life-saving program provides professional dog training through a partnership with incarcerated individuals, giving both dogs and handlers a second chance.

Through rigorous training and maintaining a naturally calming, friendly, and intuitive demeanor, Ghost proved to be the perfect candidate for therapy work. He has successfully earned certifications from both the Cook County Sheriff's Office and the American Kennel Club (AKC), demonstrating his readiness to provide comfort and support.

"We are incredibly excited to welcome Ghost to MTU 7 and integrate him into our officer wellness efforts," said **Brian Fengel, MTU 7 Director and Ghost's handler**. Mr. Fengel, a retired Chief of Police with 30 years of law enforcement experience and an extensive background managing K9s brings a unique blend of familiarity to his role. "Having been around K9s my entire career, I've seen firsthand the profound impact dogs can have. Ghost is more than just a dog, he's an ice-breaker, a source of comfort, and a silent supporter for our officers facing daily stressors. Even in these first few days, his presence has already brought smiles and joy to the entire community."

Ghost's gentle nature is immediately apparent. Nothing seems to phase Ghost, such as his calm reaction to fireworks and his easy interactions with children at a local store, where he allowed them to playfully hang on his ears without issue. His calming temperament makes him ideally suited to alleviate stress and provide a safe outlet for officers.

Together, Ghost and Mr. Fengel will promote crisis intervention training, offer direct mental health support, and serve as an approachable presence at community events and in classrooms.

"The inclusion of therapy K9s like Ghost is a critical component of our comprehensive approach to officer wellness across Illinois," said **Jennifer Wooldridge**, **State CIT Coordinator**. "This innovative program,



developed by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB), will create a vital network, ensuring that officers statewide have access to these invaluable resources. Ghost, and the affiliated teams, provide crucial emotional support and serve as a testament to our ongoing efforts to prioritize mental health within our ranks."

Ghost is already "on duty," ready to provide comfort and connection. He will soon participate in a training class at Illinois Central College, interacting with students, and is available for rapid deployment to support officers during critical incidents throughout MTU 7's service area.

STATE CERTIFIED CRASH RECONSTRUCTION SPECIALIST PROGRAM

September 2025 Quarterly Board Report

In September 1986 the Illinois Law Enforcement Training & Standards Board adopted a formal Crash Reconstruction program, in order to validate the professional expertise of individuals engaging in crash reconstruction in Illinois.

This program requires that an applicant complete specific training programs from vendors that are certified by the Board. Upon completion of these courses an application is submitted to Board staff for review. If the application is approved, the applicant is required to take and pass all three parts of a state exam with a score of 70% or better. Finally, upon recommendation of the Manager of Specialized Programs the individuals will be approved for certification by the Board.

The following individuals have successfully completed all portions of the certification exam and Board staff recommends these 13 individuals be approved, as Board certified as Crash Reconstruction Specialist.

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SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER (SRO) PROGRAM & LEAD HOMICIDE INVESTIGATOR (LHI) PROGRAM

September 2025 Quarterly Board Report

In the wake of multiple school tragedies, the Illinois General Assembly addressed the use of police personnel within the school setting by passing PA 100-984 in Spring of 2018. Beginning January 1, 2021, any officer serving in the role of School Resource Officer (SRO) must obtain a certificate by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board ('Board"). These SRO certificates are good for two (2) years before an officer/agency must reapply. Officers serving as SRO's must either complete specialized training developed through ILETSB and other stakeholders or attain a waiver by the Board.

To date since January 2021, the Board has provided a total of approximately 1130 new certificates to SROs throughout the state. Currently there are approximately 780 active SROs certified by ILETSB in the state. Within the 1st quarter the Board office processed approximately 80 new requests for certification and 100 requests for recertification. I would like to point out that this is the first time since the SRO certification/recertification program began January 1, 2021, that recertifications have exceeded certification. I have been working hard to attend SRO conferences statewide, SRO training statewide and offer myself to departments as a resource for the program with questions and concerns they have about certification/recertification of their officer. I also want to point out that the 2 lead instructors for the 40-hour SRO basic course and the 16-hour SRO recertification course, Danielle Butts and Gail Sullivan, have done a fantastic job of walking the individuals in their course through the application process whether that is the program application or the recertification application. Kudos to them as well for getting these numbers up!! The increase in numbers is showing that all our hard work is beginning to pay off. I am confident that this trend will continue as well.

June of 2025 was a busy month for me as 2 of my specialty areas hosted conferences. The Illinois Juvenile Officers Association and the Illinois DARE Officers Association co-hosted their annual conference in Peoria, Illinois from June 11th – 13th with approximately 200 in attendance for the conference. The Illinois School Resource Officers Association hosted their annual conference from June 18th – 20th in Normal, Illinois with a sellout number of 350 in attendance. This was the 3rd year in a row that this conference has sold out and what a fantastic conference it was. The nighttime activities were filled with SRO camaraderie and a ton of networking. I loved seeing all the networking that went on at both the conference and at the evening get togethers. SRO's really take advantage of the network they have amongst themselves. Way to go ILSROA what a great job and I can't wait until 2026!!! I have attached a few of the photos from both conferences and included some of SRO Therapy Dog Pip at some of the various trainings done by certified handler Danielle Butts and AJ Hull.



Currently there are 4,794 active LHI certified officers in the state of Illinois.

June 2025 Quarterly Board Report

Data Services:

Information Services Team successfully implemented the Data Storage Expansion Project - The expansion has Quintupled ILETSB's Digital Storage Capacity and will provide the space required to house Evidentiary Video Submissions, Legal Hearing Recordings and Document Archives - Additional Servers are being established to suit the changing operational needs of ILETSB Operational and Network Services – The process of creating additional Public-Facing Servers for Web and Database Services continues with focus being on individualized services for management and service availability needs – Active Directory Service restructuring continues to streamline data collaboration and logistical availability –Departmental Data Mapping is reviewed regularly to provide the most efficient back-up and restoration capabilities in the event of a catastrophic failure or compromised data – With the implementation of the Data Storage Expansion, future Back-Up Services will provide real-time synchronization and preservation of ILETSB Databanks

Next Phase:

- Begin configuration of Alletra Storage on Internal and External infrastructure.
- Begin configuration of StoreOnce storage which will be used for expanded backups of ILETSB data.
- Knowledge transfer of Qumulo Storage hardware to be completed by end of August, which will utilized for public data submissions

Chicago Office:

Several projects are currently in-flight to update and build-out the ILETSB Chicago Office

- ILETSB continues to work with CMS Property Services on the Camera & Badging project
 The next phase of the Project is currently with CMS Project Management with
 expectation that implementation will begin in the coming month
- Two Testing and Meeting Rooms are under review for additional Audio-Visual Hardware to accommodate the needs for Presentations, Training, Testing & Legal Hearing Requirements - ILETSB is working in conjunction with DoIT Services for fulfillment
- Cellular Extenders are to be installed at the facility to enhance Telecom Services for Staff and Guests
- Emergency 911 VoIP Services are to be incorporated into the existing Service to enhance
 the response and location services of first responders
 Several Workspaces have been established to accommodate In-House and Remote
 Employees to conduct their daily work activities

IT Help Desk Staffing:

ILETSB Human Resources is in-process of reviewing candidates for Two Information Services Help Desk Positions - These positions will supplement the services of current IS Staff and enhance the technical needs and requests of ILETSB Staff

Emergency Event Notification System:

Current efforts are underway to incorporate an advanced Emergency Notification System to provide Staff, both In-House and Remote, with real-time alerts regarding emergency events, safety concerns and weather-related issues - These notifications will be provided via Audible Broadcast, Cellular and eMail Services - The project is currently in-process of acquisition and is slated for implementation in the coming months

ILETSB In-House Applications:

Steering Committee meetings are conducted on a weekly basis with ILETSB Division Representation for opportunity to provide input of functionality improvements, necessary modifications and reporting provisions of the applications - Next Wave Modifications have been identified, prioritized and are currently in the process of development

Andrew:

Legal Hearing System Portal:

This System will be utilized for tracking and storing the documentation of hearings pertaining to Officer reactivation and decertification – Development and end-user testing of the application is has completed – Go-Live and full utilization is slated for the week of August 18th

LETM:

Law Enforcement Training Management (LETM) development continues with weekly Meetings and concurrent recommended enhancements – The application is undergoing a full review, and necessary modifications and improvements are being identified and implemented - Through the efforts of review and development, a restructure of the application will provide improved functionality and an intuitive user experience – The updated version of the application is slated to complete 2nd/3rd quarter of FY2026

- 1. Data Import improvements and enhancements
- 2. Targeted Development on:
 - i. Instructor's and Classes
 - ii. Active/inactive filters
 - iii. Extensive analysis to assure the inclusion of existing reporting services and functionality

PTB/LEDI:

PTB is utilized internally to provide records management to ILETSB Staff in the areas of basic training, specialized certification, Professional Conduct records, and data reports for officers and agencies - LEDI serves as an agency records submission portal, while assisting agencies in reviewing and maintaining compliance with legal requirements to ILETSB mandates - Development of the application continues with regular improvements and enhanced features

- 1. Officer complaints allows public to submit Notice of Alleged Violations to ILETSB electronically
- 2. LEDI update for part-time corrections and court security officers will now be flagged for the Certification Division to review to ensure they meet their training requirements before becoming active

Officer Portal:

The applications provides Officers with the opportunity to review their own Law Enforcement Records and Requirements – With the integration of the Professional Conduct Database individuals are able to review and respond to Professional Conduct Reports Electronically – Mandate Expiration notices are sent weekly to Officers to provide advance notice of Mandates that will expire within 60-days - Hard Copy notifications regarding training, certification status and complaints are provided in direct correspondence to the officer's home mailing address – Integration of verification procedures are being identified to comply with 3-year certification process - The Officer Portal now supports more than 24,000 Law Enforcement Officers throughout the State of Illinois - Developmental review of the Portal is on-going in conjunction with the PTB-LEDI application.

On-Line Testing:

Digital On-Line Testing Services for State-Wide Law Enforcement entities and individuals continues with success and acceptance by Testing Entities, Candidates and ILETSB Staff – Testing locations have expanded beyond the ILETSB Chicago and Springfield Offices to include our Partner MTUs and Academy Facilities -These additions have provided Candidates with opportunity for convenient On-Line Testing based on proximity to their Training Locations – 600+ On-Line Tests were conducted during the Months of June, July and August

Network & Security Services:

Enhancement of the Network Firewall and VPN Services have provided improved reliability and reduced cyber vulnerability – Splunk, a network data retrieval and reporting application, was recently incorporated into Network Services to compliment both the ECM and ISE applications - Progress continues in the implementation of Microsoft's Enterprise Configuration Management (ECM) Services and Cisco's Identity Services Engine (ISE) Management Software – Both ECM and ISE have improved technical services, structure and reliability, while providing insight into the network, digital traffic and potential vulnerabilities -MCM will be designed to create hardware inventory reports and software distribution to Staff Systems and ILETSB Servers – 95% of ILETSB Staff Systems have been upgraded to Windows 11 in advance of the discontinued support of Windows 10, which will take place in October 2025 - Regular Penetration Scanning for potential vulnerabilities of public-facing network and web services continues for awareness of potential network security vulnerabilities -Completed Setup of new VMware clusters on internal and external environments. Created and successfully tested Distributed Switching on new VMware cluster. This will allow the transfer of servers between environments with minimal downtime. -Created new Production Servers for Web and DB upgrades. Phase 2 will be the planning of migration to new servers. -Created new Staging Servers for Web and DB environment. Continuing to work with web staff on initial setup. -Beginning of initial stages for Windows Server 2025 testing for future upgrades of servers.

Disaster Recovery/Contingency Planning:

Information Services is conducting a review and re-write of its current Disaster Recovery Plan (DRP) - In the event of Catastrophic Failure or Cyber-Compromised Events, future protocols will include the synchronous data integration of the Springfield and Chicago Offices for redundancy and Off-Site Storage of data preservation and restoration — Updated redundant Power Supply Services are slated to be implemented in the Chicago Office to offer a more reliable provision of power to essential Network and Data Services in the event of a power-loss

Evidentiary Video Submissions Repository:

Planning is underway to establish a secure, readily accessible and expandable digital environment apart from Board Data to accommodate the ever-growing number of Digital Video Submissions provided by Municipal, County and State Entities for storage, availability and preservation – To be completed post implementation of the ILETSB Storage Expansion

Document-Archiving:

Digital scanning and storage of ILETSB "Hard-Copy" Files for data preservation and archival retrieval purposes – In-process of planning and consideration of potential solutions and vendors – To be completed post implementation of the ILETSB Storage Expansion
