Questions arose around the Basic Arson investigator course and why it has been on hold for two years. Eric Danford, Director of SWIC approached the podium and explained it is mostly a tracking issue between the State Fire Marshall's office and police agencies. Paul Petty added that the tracking issue is outside the scope of ILETSB, all the Board is required to do is approve the training, which the Board has done.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Bulnes, and carried by all members present to approve the list of Other Board Academy Courses to be certified for 2026.

IV. **MANDATORY FIREARMS TRAINING** ~ *Cheryllynn Williams*

Williams read the following statement: *Mandatory Firearms Training (MFT) Policy Re-Affirmation: Board approved Basic Law Enforcement, Correctional Training Academies and the Mobile Team Units are the only entities authorized to conduct the Mandatory Firearms Training Course and the Mandatory Firearms Training Waiver Course at a Board approved range.*

Paul Petty briefly defined the MFT course and noted that this course is designed to avoid any conflict of interest.

Motion was made by Bulnes, seconded by Williams, and carried by all members present to approve Mandatory Firearms Training Policy Re-Affirmation.

V. **APPLICATION FOR SCHOOL/COURSE CERTIFICATION** ~ *Paul Petty*

Petty explained there are currently 4,485 certified courses with the Board. These include in-service and in-house trainings through the MTU's, the Executive Institute, Cook County and the Chicago Police Department that have been certified through the Board. Petty noted that courses brought before the Committee are usually the most high-risk high liability courses, including any statutorily recommended courses. Petty then asked Danielle Butts, lead instructor for the SRO certification program, to approach the podium and present the School Resource Officer (SRO) – 8-Hour Update course. She stated this course is not the 16-hour recertification course which includes class time and active scenario training. It has been determined that most already have their active scenario training hours, but they are lacking in Officer Youth Interaction and Juvenile Law. This course is to be treated as an additional option.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Bulnes, and carried by all members present to approve the School Resource Officer (SRO) – 8-Hour Update course.

Petty went on to discuss the Universal High Risk Traffic Stop (HRTS) Course and the Universal High Risk Traffic Stop (HRTS) Refresher Course. He asked Justin Spencer,

police training specialist with MTU 15, to review the courses for the Board. Spencer reported the two courses are mandated courses, and these courses create continuity across departments. He stated that MTU 15 will share lesson plans with all MTU's. Keigher noted the hope is to have standard minimum requirements to meet the law and provide more guidance for the MTU's. Spencer stated officers are mandated to take six hours of high risk traffic stop every three years and the 4.5-Hour Refresher was designed to be used in between.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Bulnes, and carried by all members present to approve the Universal High Risk Traffic Stop (HRTS) 8.5 Hour Course.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Williams, and carried by all members present to approve the Universal High Risk Traffic Stop (HRTS) 4.5 Hour Refresher Course.

Dave Rednour, MTU 15, addressed the Board regarding the *Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) course for Corrections*. He stated the 4-Hour course covers an overview of ASD, the signs and symptoms and the challenges of incarcerated inmates with ASD, and techniques to minimize these challenges.

Motion was made by Ciganek, seconded by Davis, and carried by all members present to approve Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) for Corrections.

VI. **IN-SERVICE, ADVANCED AND SPECIALIZED COURSES for CERTIFICATION/RECERTIFICATION** ~ Paul Petty

A. Petty read the following statement: *Certification/Recertification Disclaimer: If the Mobile Team declines the delivery of any course within its region for reasons other than duplication, the Board may determine whether the course is otherwise certifiable and/or reimbursable based upon the best interests of law enforcement.*

Courses are only certified for the calendar year they are submitted, except at the Board's December quarterly meeting, courses are reviewed and certified for the following calendar year.

If modifications are made to a certified course that exceed 10% of course content as originally presented for approval; that course must be resubmitted for certification through LETM. Please consult Board Staff whenever course revisions are made to determine if this provision is applicable.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Bulnes, and carried by all members present to approve the Course Certification/Recertification Disclaimer.

B. Petty asked for the Certification of In-Service training courses submitted through the Mobile Team Units & Executive Institute from January 1, 2026 – December 31, 2026. These courses can be found under Tab K in the Board book.

Motion was made by Williams, seconded by Ciganek, and carried by all members present to approve the In-Service, Advanced and Specialized training courses submitted through the Mobile Team Units and Executive Institute from January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026.

VII. LEAD HOMICIDE INVESTIGATORS 32-HOURS APPROVED CONTINUING EDUCATION COURSES for CERTIFICATION/ RECERTIFICATION ~ Barbara Wood

Wood asked the Committee for the approval of the Lead Homicide Investigators 32-Hour Continuing Education Courses submitted from January 1, 2026 – December 31, 2026.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Bulnes, and carried by all members present to approve the Lead Homicide Investigators 32-Hour Continuing Education Courses submitted from January 1, 2026 – December 31, 2026.

IX. NEW BUSINESS

A. Updates to BLE & BCO Curriculum ~ Van Muschler

Muschler presented the updates as recommended by Dr. Cindy Jones and University of Illinois Springfield. Muschler stated there are two course additions that have been updated and standardized in both the BLE and BCO programs. The first is a new two-hour course titled *Safeguarding Children of Arrested Parents*. The second two-hour course is *Individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorders Awareness and Response*, with course objectives that have been revised to meet the new standards. The autism course matches the Executive Institute's online course. The curriculum will be sent to ILETSB and the academies in January. In addition, the BCO program has added the 11.5-hour PREA course, with specific objectives and the outline to the curriculum, and has reduced gender awareness down to 4.5 hours which allows the mandate to be met in the academy. Muschler provided members with copies of the curriculum, and the outline pages and objectives.

Motion was made by Schassburger, seconded by Williams, and carried by all members present to approve the updates to the BLE & BCO Curriculum.

B. CIT Updates ~ Jennifer Wooldridge

Wooldridge presented two courses for approval and certification. The first is a statewide *Collaborative Crisis Co-Response* course. In response to the growing number of co-response teams across the state, Board staff worked with subject-matter experts to develop this two-day course for sworn law enforcement and

behavioral health professionals. The training is designed to provide a comprehensive understanding of modern co-response roles, responsibilities, and operations, while building practical skills in safety planning, crisis assessment, scene management, non-escalation and de-escalation strategies, mental health law, privacy constraints, and interagency collaboration. Instruction will include lectures, discussions, demonstrations, resource materials, video analysis, and scenario-based training, with implementation through the MTU system planned for the start of the calendar year if approved. Chair Neukirch asked if the criteria which referenced character could be reviewed as it is very subjective.

Motion was made by Ciganek, seconded by Davis, and carried by all members present to approve the statewide Collaborative Crisis Co-Response Course.

The second course Wooldridge presented was the *Law Enforcement Crisis Response Therapy Dog Certification Initiative*. She is seeking approval of the specialty certification parameters, including eligibility, training matrix, and course outline developed with consultants and Tails of Redemption (TOR) partners. The proposed three-day training includes classroom components on therapy canine techniques, a CIT refresher, co-response overview, peer support, advanced handling skills, and specialized response to community members or victims. The program also incorporates field training appraisals, role-play scenarios, and a final team assessment.

Eligible participants include law enforcement officers, behavioral health co-responders who respond with law enforcement, and law enforcement crisis response support personnel, all of whom must be affiliated with a law enforcement agency. Prerequisite training varies by role, and additional requirements include veterinary record verification for the therapy dog and a background check for the handler. Upon preliminary approval, handler and therapy dog teams will attend the three day in-person training and assessment conducted by TOR-approved instructors, with the formal MOU with Cook County and TOR being finalized. Successful participants will be entered into the PTB database, receive a numbered certificate and CIT therapy dog patch, and become eligible for monthly continuing training and participation in the statewide call-out team. Annual training will be required to maintain certification.

Illinois will be the first state to establish a standardized statewide law enforcement crisis response therapy dog certification program, setting a potential model for national standards. Davis asked for clarification, Wooldridge stated teams coming into the program must already have a therapy dog, this program is not training a dog to be a therapy dog. TOR can pair a dog with a handler and train the team for certification. Schassburger commended Wooldridge and Cook County's Tails of Redemption Director, Jerry Roman for the work they have accomplished with this program.

Motion was made by Schassburger, seconded by Davis, and carried by all members present to approve the Law Enforcement Crisis Response Therapy Dog Certification Initiative.

C. In-Service Updated Guidelines for Mandated Training ~ Pat Hahn

Hahn reported that the new in-service guidelines are located under Tab I in the Board book. He explained that in 2016, the legislature passed the Police in Community Improvement Act, marking the first time specific training topics were mandated for every officer statewide. The Board was already training on the seven specified topics, the challenge was to pull out the now mandated topics. The Board adopted the [in-service] guidelines in relation to those mandates. Hahn noted when the SAFE-T Act passed [2021] it significantly revised in-service training requirements, leading to continued updates to the guidelines.

Additionally, three new recently passed statutes have introduced further mandates:

- **P.A. 103-0949** (Autism): Establishes a three-year in-service training requirement for all officers (page 4).
- **P.A. 104-0159** (Human Trafficking): Adds human trafficking as a required topic for investigators of sexual assault and sexual abuse (page 18) and expands sensitivity training requirements for all officers (page 19).
- **P.A. 104-0084** (Anna’s Law): Addresses conflicts of interest and aims to reduce victim trauma by creating a new three-year mandated in-service training requirement tied to trauma-informed response (page 20), which is currently being taught.

Hahn stated the highlighted sections of the Guidelines Manual reflect these statutory changes, with updated language taken directly from the statutes. Chair Neukirch inquired whether the team could review the remaining guidelines within the policy over the next one to three years.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Ciganek, and carried by all members present to approve the In-Service Updated Guidelines for Mandated Training.

X. NEXT BOARD MEETING DATE AND LOCATION

Neukirch noted the next Board meeting will be held December 11, 2025 in Oak Brook, Illinois.

III. FINANCIAL MATTERS

A. Financial Items ~ Courtney Bott

Bott stated her report can be found under Tab F in the Board book. Bott asked for approval of the FY26 expenditures through November 17, 2025. She noted the Board has spent roughly \$13M, or 10% of the budget, and has approximately \$150M in cash spread across the Board's five different funds. The Board has spent roughly 30% of appropriated funds.

Motion was made by Neukirch, seconded by Gomez, and carried by all members present to approve the fiscal report as presented.

Bott stated the FY26 Camera Grant is open through December 31, 2025 at 5:00 p.m. She noted staff presented a live WebEx training with Amplifund, and a separate Q & A session with the GATU (Grant Accountability and Transparency Unit) group for agencies to learn about and understand the application process. Recordings of both training sessions can be found on the Boards website for agency reference.

B. Personnel Matters & DEIA Report ~ Ellen Petty

Petty stated her report can be found under Tab G in the Board book. She noted current staff headcount is at 55, with an expected increase to 59 by January 2026. HR staff has just posted another position, and they are working on two additional at this time. Petty stated the three Administrative Law Judge position interviews have concluded and staff hopes to have those contracts completed soon. Petty said that CMS is working with staff, HR and Payroll, regarding the January 1, 2026 law on no tax on overtime.

C. Legislative and Litigation Update ~ John Keigher

Regarding legislation, Keigher reported the bills that passed in the spring session are being implemented through curriculum or policy changes, and there are currently no bills specifically amending the Police Training Act in this veto session. Keigher noted that HB 1321, (Public Act 104-440) signed into law yesterday, limits certain police activities in specific locations such as schools, hospitals, and courthouses. The legal team is reviewing this for any updates to the BLE and it will likely be included in the legal update courses in 2026. Looking to the spring session, staff has been in discussion with the Governor's legislative team. Staff hopes to tighten up the training requirements for CIT and Juvenile Officers to create specialty certification programs for them, expand camera grant funds to Auxiliary officers, and clean up some of the basic and in-service training mandates.

Regarding litigation, Keigher reported on three cases:

- Magnus: This is a FOIA case brought by Magnus to access the Board's files. Per the judge's order, staff was required to produce investigation reports and were allowed significant redactions. In the next phase, the judge will assess the Board's initial position and determine if any damages are warranted.
- Crouch: This is a rescinded employment case. Depositions have been taken, and this is still in the discovery phase. There has been no word yet if any ILETSB employees will be deposed.
- Gibson: Several Human Rights actions were filed by this individual who was denied a waiver. The Supreme Court recently dismissed a companion case, and the main case against the Board is pending at the 1st District Appellate Court. Six of Gibson's other matters have been dismissed, but he filed a new case over the summer and the investigation phase was just completed.

Motion was made by Neukirch, seconded by Gomez, and carried by all members present to approve the Legislation and Litigation report.

IV. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

SAFE-T Act Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher reported the verification process is being implemented, and he will report more on that at tomorrow's meeting. The first third of the alphabet, last names A-G, are due this year. He noted the Certification Review Panel had their second meeting

in November, and four more cases were referred for hearings. The Administrative Law Judges have been interviewed, and that process is moving forward. There are ongoing discussions with stakeholders to clean up the SAFE-T Act. Finally, Keigher noted the Illinois Justice Project is publishing recommendations based on the SAFE-T Act and some of their recommendations will deal with the Board. Staff is willing to accommodate most of what they are recommending as long as the Board has the staff to make it happen.

Motion was made by Gomez, seconded by Neukirch, and carried by all members present to approve the SAFE-T Act Update.

V. NEW BUSINESS

None presented.

VIII. CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS

Vice Charman Idleburg wished everyone a warm and happy holiday, a happy New Year, and a prosperous 2026.

IX. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion was made by Tyler, seconded by Kelly, and carried by all members present to approve the meeting minutes for the Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee Meeting from September 10, 2025, the Joint Finance & Legislative Committee and Executive Committee from September 10, 2025, and the Quarterly Board Meeting from September 11, 2025.

X. REPORT OF STANDING AND ADVISORY COMMITTEES

A. Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee ~ Ghida Neukirch

Neukirch stated the Committee met yesterday. She thanked staff for their contributions and encouraged Board members to review the information. She noted there are over 4,000 courses certified through ILETSB. Committee actions yesterday included the certification of all 2026 academy courses, and the mandatory firearms training policy was reaffirmed. The Committee also approved an eight-hour update course for School Resource Officers, two Universal High Risk traffic courses; an 8.5-hour and a 4.5-hour refresher, and a four-hour Autism Spectrum Disorder course for Corrections Officers. A presentation was made to the Committee on the Crisis Response Therapy Canine Program policy; one 24-hour curriculum, and one 16-hour curriculum for crisis co-response, and Neukirch noted this is the first of its kind in the nation. Board policy for minimum in-service training requirements was updated as well with added regulations for autism, sexual assault/abuse trauma informed response, and trauma informed programs, procedures and practices meant to minimize traumatization of the victim.

B. Joint Finance & Legislative and Executive Committee ~ John Idleburg

Idleburg reported the FY26 budget is \$128M, and the Board has spent \$13M. Current staff is at 55 as of December 9, 2025, with three job offers were recently made to hopefully bring staff count to 59 by mid-January 2026.

C. Waiver Review Committee ~ Brendan Kelly

Kelly reported the Committee had two requests for waiver review yesterday, one was resolved, and one needs staff to provide additional follow-up on before a resolution can be made. Kelly thanked staff for their clear and concise process for reviewing issues and voting.

Motion was made by Redd, seconded by Gomez, and carried by all members present to approve the Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee report, the Joint Finance & Legislative and Executive Committee report, and the Waiver Review Committee report.

XI. EXECUTIVE MATTERS

A. Financial Items ~ Courtney Bott

Bott stated her report can be found under Tab F in the Board book. She noted the FY26 budget is \$128M, and the Board has spent just over \$13M or 10% of the budget. Bott reported the Board has sufficient cash and appropriated funds to finish out the year.

Bott stated the FY26 Camera Grant is open through December 31, 2025 at 5:00 p.m. She noted applicants are required to complete their applications online through Amplifund. Grant staff presented a live grantee training on November 5, 2025, and a separate Q & A session on November 19, 2025 for agencies to learn about and understand the application process. Recordings of both training sessions can be found on the Boards website for agency reference. Bott noted prior year award costs have been included this session as specified by the Camera Grant Act, and reimbursement or upfront awards are both available.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Tyler, and carried by all members present to approve the fiscal report as presented.

B. Personnel Matters & DEIA Report ~ Ellen Petty

Petty noted her report is under Tab G in the Board book. She noted current staff headcount is at 55, with an expected increase to 59 by January 2026 as a fourth offer will have been made by the end of the week. The maximum headcount for FY26 is 66, and overall, it is currently at 87. Petty stated the three Administrative Law Judge position interviews have concluded and staff hopes to have those contracts completed soon. Petty reported that HR staff is working on three additional positions at this time. Petty also noted that CMS is working with staff regarding the January 1, 2026 law on no tax on overtime. Petty then reminded all Board members and staff of the mandated trainings that are due to be completed by December 31, 2025. She asked that members log into OneNet early to complete the training because with the holidays approaching there may not be any DoIT staff available if there are any issues.

C. Legislative and Litigation Update ~ John Keigher

Regarding legislation, Keigher reported the bills that passed in the spring session are being implemented through curriculum changes, and there were no bills specifically amending the Police Training Act in this veto session. Keigher noted HB 1321 (Public Act 104-440), which is now signed into law, limits certain police activities in specific locations such as schools, hospitals, and courthouses. The legal team is reviewing this for any updates to the BLE, and it will likely be

included in the legal updates for 2026. Staff is moving forward with drafts for next session; the plan is to tighten up the training requirements for CIT and Juvenile Officers by creating specialty certification programs for both, expand camera grant funds to Auxiliary officers, and clean up some of the basic and in-service training mandates.

Regarding litigation, Keigher reported on four cases:

- Magnus: This is a case brought by a citizen who made a complaint because he wanted to FOIA the records of an investigation. Per the judge's order, staff was required to produce some material but was allowed to redact sensitive information. In the next phase, the judge will either dismiss the case or assess for any damages are warranted.
- Henrichs: This is the IROCC case. Staff has asked for a formal dismissal.
- Crouch: This is a rescinded employment case. Depositions have been taken, and this is still in the discovery phase. There has been no word yet if any ILETSB employees will be deposed.
- Gibson: Several Human Rights complaints were filed by this individual who was denied a waiver. Six of the complaints have been dismissed. The initial case is now being appealed in the 1st District Appellate Court, a companion case was recently dismissed by the Supreme Court, and a new case was filed in the spring, and it is in the investigation phase.

D. Division of Professional Standards

1. Notice of Violations ~ Anthony Cobb

Cobb reported the Board has received 208 Notices of Violation (Form Qs) for a total of 436 notices received as of November 30, 2025. During the same period in 2024 we received 218 notices.

2. Waiver Disposition Quarterly Report ~ Anthony Cobb

Cobb reported the waiver reports can be found under Tab H in the Board book and noted the reporting period for all reports is August 1 – October 31, 2025. The information is broken up into 5 separate reports. A total of 519 waiver requests were processed during this reporting period with 489 requests approved and 30 requests denied. The further break down of the processed Waivers are as follows:

- a. Municipal - Law Enforcement: 345 waivers approved; 20 denied

Motion was made by Kelly, seconded by Davis, with Gomez, Redd, Neukirch, Tyler, Scaman, Bulnes, and Schassburger recusing, and carried by all other members present to approve the Municipal Law Enforcement Waiver Disposition Report.

- b. Counties - Law Enforcement, Corrections, Court Security:
 - County Police Deputies: 59 waivers approved; 1 denied
 - Correctional Officers: 20 waivers approved, 5 denied
 - Court Security Officers: 9 waivers approved, 2 denied

Motion was made by Kelly, seconded by Neukirch, with Idleburg, Schassburger, and Ciganek recusing, and carried by all other members present to approve the Law Enforcement Waiver Disposition Report for Counties.

- c. State & Others - Law Enforcement: 56 waivers approved, 2 denied

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Redd, with Schassburger, Hokenson, Kelly, and Ryan recusing, and carried by all other members present to approve the Waiver Disposition Report for Law Enforcement State and Others.

3. Decertification ~ Pat Hahn

Hahn asked members to refer to Tab I in the Board book. Hahn stated his report lists five individuals recommended for removal, and three that have asked for removal from certification. He stated notice was given to all, a chance to respond was given to all, and none responded. He presented the five officers listed in his report who have received convictions:

2. Jeffrey Kriv (65053657)
3. David P. DeLeon (65129785)
4. Dante A. Salinas (65120570)

Hahn also stated there are three officers who have voluntarily surrendered their certification:

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Tyler, and carried by all members present to approve the above listed officers be stricken from the role of certified law enforcement officers of the state.

XII. PROGRAM PROGRESS REPORTS AND CONCEPTS

A. Illinois Law Enforcement Executive Institute ~ Heather Hotz

Hotz shared that the Executive Institute's in person Executive Summits are up 20.58%, and the Online Learning Network training hours are up by 8.8%. This year's New Chiefs of Police orientation attendance increased by 26.7% with 71 chiefs graduating the program. She noted this orientation equips leaders to guide their departments with integrity, innovation, and accountability. Davis asked, with support from Neukirch, that an effort be made to make this training mandatory for all new chiefs in the state.

B. A Statewide System of In-Service Training (ASSIST) Program ~ Paul Petty

Petty noted his report can be found under Tab K. Petty focused members attention on Attachment 1 and discussed the training hours represented in the report; over 3,200 MTU classes held with over 222,000 hours of training. He also noted the hourly training cost came in a bit higher this quarter as was expected.

C. CIT, Mental Health Training & Therapy Dog Initiative Update ~ Jennifer Wooldridge

Wooldridge shared highlights from the CIT training program and the new law enforcement crisis-canine therapy dog certification initiative. She noted two courses that were presented to the Curriculum Committee yesterday. The first course presented was the new statewide Co-responder course titled: *Collaborative Crisis Co-response* which is a two-day program created in response to the increasing number of co-response teams operating across the state. The second course presented was the full training framework and eligibility standards for the law enforcement crisis-response therapy dog certification initiative. This three-day certification includes classroom content, field training, actor-led scenario-based assessments and a final team evaluation. Both courses were approved by the Curriculum Committee. Wooldridge went on to discuss the impact the therapy dog program is having across the state as well as out of state. She thanked Chairman Smoot and Operation TT for making the first out of state law enforcement therapy canine crisis response deployment possible to Evergreen, Colorado. Davis and Schassburger congratulated Wooldridge and briefly discussed the importance of the work being done with the program.

D. Specialty Training Update ~ Barbara Wood

Wood noted her report can be found under Tab M in the Board book. She presented a handout for an additional course, which is classroom focused and titled *SRO Update*, to be added for School Resource Officer (SRO) recertification. Wood also requested the four individuals listed in the Crash Reconstruction report be approved as Board Certified Crash Reconstruction Specialists. Davis interjected the importance of making this type of training available for the police liaisons in schools and asked the Board to look to work this into legislation to make it mandatory. Wood noted there are several SRO conferences available which are open to all personnel working within a school district.

E. Information Technology Update ~ Kelly Ingram

Ingram noted his report is found under Tab N in the Board book. Ingram reported the Chicago office is moving forward, and the badging and camera service is finally being completed. He also reported there are two help desk people starting in January, application development continues with five apps being worked on by two developers, and online testing has reached 5,000 participants.

Motion was made by Williams, seconded by Neukirch, and carried by all members present to approve the Program Progress Reports.

XIII. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Mandated Annual Training for Board Members ~ Pat Hahn

As the Ethics Officer, Hahn reminded all Board members that the mandatory trainings are due to be completed by the end of the year. He stated the Ethics Officer is required to file a report in April with the Ethics Commission reporting on the members who have not completed the mandatory trainings.

B. SAFE-T Act Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher reported the Certification Review Panel had its second meeting in November and referred four more cases for hearing, and the interviews for the Administrative Law Judges are complete. He mentioned the A-G section of the Verification process is coming due. Keigher noted staff is resuming discussions with stakeholders regarding a follow-up bill for the trailer act, and that the Illinois Justice Project is publishing recommendations and staff is looking to accommodate most of them as staff is able.

Motion was made by Redd, seconded by Tyler, and carried by all members present to approve both items A and B in Unfinished Business.

XIV. NEW BUSINESS

A. Updates to BLE & BCO Curriculum ~ Van Muschler

Muschler presented the updates as recommended by Cindy Jones and University of Illinois Springfield. Muschler stated there are two courses that have been updated in both the BLE and BCO programs. The first is a two-hour course titled *Safeguarding Children of Arrested Parents*. The second course is titled *Spectrum Disorders Awareness and Response*, with course objectives that match the Executive Institute online programs for standardization. He noted the BCO program has been revised to include the full prison rape elimination act.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Kelly, and carried by all members present to approve the updates to the BLE & BCO Curriculum.

B. Transitional Certification ~ John Keigher

Keigher asked to table this item as he will be discussing in the next section.

C. New Verification Process ~ John Keigher

Keigher reported the verification process is the last step of the Safe-T Act that the Board needs to implement. The main component to this process is that every officer will now have to verify eligibility every three years. Keigher proceeded through his presentation slides which are attached. He noted a first email has already been sent to all officers in the A-G section, and the best form of communication is through each agency LEDI coordinator. Staff is also working closely with chiefs, MTU's and Chicago PD to make sure every officer is made aware. Chief Tyler confirmed information is being pushed out to everyone involved. Director Caloway commended staff and stated all of the preparation for this required process was done in house by Board staff.

Motion was made by Redd, seconded by Gomez, and carried by all members present to approve the New Verification Process as presented.

XV. PUBLIC INPUT

Barron Alston, Retired Investigator, Cook County Sheriff's Department: Alston mentioned his story from a previous meeting about being out of town on vacation with his family, running into someone he had admitted to jail, and he was not carrying his weapon since he was retired and not allowed an IROCC card. He was stopped by local police and asked if he was working, and they wanted to know why he wasn't armed. Alston asked Board members why he cannot have an IROCC card like everyone else.

Marcus Hargrett, Retired Sergeant, Cook County Sheriff's Department: Hargrett discussed that IROCC cards are being denied to Sheriff Dart's Retired Corrections officers and accused the Board of not processing their applications because they do not meet the definition of a law enforcement officer. He also threatened the Board that he will put pressure on politicians to force a change, and then asked how Smoot was ethically able to obtain an IROCC card. Hargrett noted that he was not able to say the Pledge of Allegiance, because not everyone is receiving justice. He asked that the Board members adhere to the federal and the state definition of law enforcement officers.

Janice Austin, Retired Officer, Cook County Sheriff's Department: Austin stated she would not repeat what the others have already said, and asked that the Board give them their rights. She said they should not have to go to other states to get what is due to them in Illinois, stating they should be respected here.

XVI. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Idleburg announced the next Committee meetings will be held on March 4, 2026, and the next Quarterly Board meeting will be held March 5, 2026 all to be held in Springfield, Illinois.

XVII. ADJOURNMENT

Motion was made by Tyler, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to adjourn the meeting at 10:40 a.m.

8.4 - COMPLIANCE VERIFICATION

8.4 – *WHAT IS VERIFICATION?*

Under the SAFE-T Act, officers must “verify” their certification status every 3 years.

New Section 8.4 requires affirmation that they are compliant with the requirements of the police training Act.

For the last 3 years, each officer must verify:

- Compliance with the training requirements
- Employment history is accurate
- No misconduct

Staggered reporting periods based on last name:

- A-G January 30, 2023 to January 29, 2026
- H-O January 30, 2024 to January 29, 2027
- P-Z January 30, 2025 to January 29, 2028

After officers report, agencies must verify their status.

Officers who fail to report may become inactive in May and must comply before eligible for reactivation.

Officers who falsify their response may be subject to discretionary decertification procedures.

8.4 – *WHAT MUST BE VERIFIED?*

Each officer must verify:

- A. Training mandates have been met for the specific period
 - Annual topics
 - Tri-Annual topics
 - Total hours and Scenario hours

- B. Employment status is properly reflected in the ILETSB database
 - All employers are listed
 - All terminations are properly reflected
 - Any security jobs must be disclosed

- C. No arrests, convictions, or guilty pleas for decertifiable misconduct
 - No felonies
 - No decertifiable misdemeanors (list of 41)

8.4 – *WHEN ARE THE DEADLINES?*

Reporting:

Main Deadline: January 30, 2026

Accepted until: March 31, 2026

Can start reporting verifications: January 1, 2026

Extension Waiver:

Extension requests must be submitted by: December 31, 2025

If approved, training and verification must be completed by July 31, 2026

Grace Period:

Still need to complete verification by January 30, 2026

Grace Period Deadline: March 31, 2026

Inactive Penalty:

Inactive Status for failure to report: May begin after May 1, 2026

Pursuant to 50 ILCS 705/8.4 of the Illinois Police Training Act, every certified law enforcement officer is required to submit an Officer Verification Form to the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB) on a periodic basis.

Through this submission, each officer verifies:

- Compliance with all mandatory training requirements established by statute for the applicable three-year reporting period;
- Accurate disclosure of all law enforcement and security-related appointments held during the period and separations from those appointments during the period; and
- Eligibility for certification and adherence to professional conduct standards under 50 ILCS 705/6.1, confirming that no acts of misconduct or disqualifying offenses have occurred.

Pursuant to statute, officers are assigned to a fixed reporting cohort based on the first letter of their last name. Once established, this assignment remains unchanged for all future reporting cycles, even if the officer's name later changes.

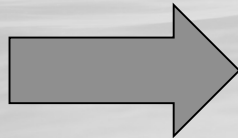

The FY26 Law Enforcement Camera Grant application period is closed! There were 183 applications submitted totaling \$37,893,276.24. The grant team will be reviewing these applications over the coming weeks then working with grantees to establish awards.

The purpose of this program is to provide grants to Illinois police agencies of municipalities, counties, park districts, public universities, and all units of Illinois local governmental for the purchase or lease of in-car video cameras for use in law enforcement vehicles; officer-worn body cameras for law enforcement officers and data storage related to officer-worn cameras; and training for law enforcement officers in the operation of the cameras. (20 Ill. Adm. Code 1705.100-199).

Live grantee training was conducted on 11/5 in conjunction with a representative from AmpliFund and live Q&A on 11/19. These trainings were to show grantees how to apply for the grant and how to submit reporting post-award using the AmpliFund system, and answer any questions. Recordings of the trainings are placed on our website listed above.

HIGH LEVEL OVERVIEW OF HIRING PROGRESS SINCE THE PASSAGE OF THE SAFE-T ACT

- 77 positions have been filled as of 2/1/26:
 - 14 internal promotions.
 - 5 internal transfers.
 - 27 new hires to State of Illinois employment.
 - 23 promotions from other agencies.
 - 1 reinstatement from another agency.
 - 7 transfers from other agencies.
- 8 employees have transferred out to other agencies.
- 9 employees have retired.
- 1 employee resigned to take a different job.
- 3 employees have been discharged.
- 1 employee was returned to work due to an arbitration award & then retired.
- 2 retired employees returned on a 75-day temporary appointment – both are now ended.
- 10 positions are currently in various stages of the hiring process.
- 4 (or more) additional jobs will need to be posted to backfill before the end of FY26, due to internal promotions and movements.
- 2 new job descriptions have been developed and approved. They will be posted, and filled in FY26 as soon as they have gone through the split-class determination process with CMS Labor.
- 12 additional job descriptions still remain to be developed, approved, posted, and filled through the end of FY27.
- The agency headcount included in the approved FY26 budget allows for 66 employees.
- FY27 budget includes a request for a headcount of 86 (+20).

-
- Headcount as of February 1st is 57, up four from the December report due to six new hires, one internal promotion, one internal transfer, one transfer out to another agency, and one retirement during that period.
 - There has been one job offer made and accepted which will result in at least one additional new hire being onboarded between 2/1/26 and the March Board meeting.

DETAILED STATUS OF HIRING SEQUENCES CURRENTLY IN PROGRESS

1. Investigations Manager - Public Service Administrator “PSA” Option 7 – A job offer has been made and accepted. This new manager will onboard on February 17th.
2. Certification Specialist – Job posted to backfill after an employee transferred to another agency. First job offer was declined. A second job offer is in progress. We have requested to hire a second incumbent for this position, as we’ve been notified that another Certification Specialist has accepted a job offer at another agency and will be transferring on February 17th.
3. Chief Accountability Officer – Interviews for this position have been scheduled for February 24th and 25th.
4. Assistant General Counsel – Public Service Administrator, Option 8L – Preliminary work has been done to prepare for posting to backfill. Posting will go live soon.
5. Field Investigator - Police Training Specialist Advanced – This position needs to be posted to backfill. However, we cannot post the position until CMS resolves the outstanding issues which still remain after the 2023 class study and subsequent 2025 Memorandum of Understanding were completed. We are currently involved in discussions with the various sections of CMS involved in this process to resolve the ongoing issues so that the position can be posted.
6. Vehicle Coordinator and Property Control Manager – Executive II – Preliminary work is underway to prepare for posting to backfill. Minor edits need to be made to the job description.
7. GATA/GATU Specialist – Executive I - Preliminary work is underway to prepare for posting to backfill. Minor edits need to be made to the job description.

-
1. Director’s Confidential Assistant – This position has been vacant since 8/16/25 due to the resignation of the incumbent to accept another non-state position. This is an appointed position. As soon as the Director has identified a suitable candidate, this appointment will be made.
 2. Agency Curriculum and Testing Counsel – Public Service Administrator “PSA” Option 8L – This training attorney position falls under the Legal Section and will report to the Chief Legal Counsel but will coordinate closely with the Training Division. This position has been established and we are awaiting split-class determination from CMS Labor, which will determine if the position is included or excluded from the union. As soon as we receive this decision, the job will be posted to fill.
 3. Audit Liaison & Reporting Manager – Public Service Administrator “PSA” Option 2 – Governor’s Office on Management and Budget (GOMB) has indicated a strong need for all agencies to include a position with these duties. This position has been established and we are awaiting split-class determination from CMS Labor, which will determine if the position is included or excluded from the union. As soon as we receive this decision, the job will be posted to fill. *GOMB has indicated that we will be approved to exceed our*

headcount by one in order to fill this position, if we reach our headcount max by June 30, 2026.

Once we fill the positions above and have backfilled any additional positions which have been vacated due to internal promotions, transfers, and separations, we will have reached our FY26 headcount of 66 (or possibly 67) employees. We remain on track to reach our approved headcount for the first time in at least a decade.

We will continue to work on the creation of the remaining job descriptions and the preliminary work for posting those additional positions so that we can start the hiring process in May 2026, in order to be able to onboard new hires on or as soon as possible after July 1, 2026, which is the first day of FY27.

I started working in the law enforcement training field as the Administrative Assistant to the Director at Mobile Team Unit #10 in March of 1991, when the MTU office was still in Jacksonville and Al Apa was still the Director of the Board, known back then as the Illinois Local Governmental Law Enforcement Officers Training Board. The MTU office moved to Sherman shortly thereafter, and the Part-Time Officer Basic Training Program was getting geared up about that same time, as well.

I was appointed as the Director of MTU #10 in September of 2005 upon the retirement of the previous Director, around the same time that the IROCC office was opened. Dr. Thomas Jurkanin was the Director of the Board by then, now known as the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board. The MTU had been moved to a small office in Springfield by that time, and then later into a facility with a dedicated training room on the southwestern edge of town.

About five years later, the MTU was moved into the lower level of the PBPA building, in a beautifully renovated space built out to suit our needs, where I got to know our current Board Chairman, Sean Smoot. By that time, Kevin McClain was the Director of the Board.

When Brent Fischer was appointed as the Board’s new Director, I was asked to come work for him as his Secretary in May of 2016. I was appointed as the Human Resources and Labor Relations Manager in March of 2021, just as the SAFE-T Act came about. Shortly after that, Keith Calloway was appointed as the Director of the Board, and our work started in earnest to build out and expand the Board’s operation under the SAFE-T Act.

The Board and the MTU’s have changed so much since 1991, as has law enforcement and society overall, and I feel as though I have learned so much over the past 35 years. I’ve been fortunate to have made a lot of great friends along the way, and it has been a real adventure at times. I would like to thank the Board staff and Board members, past and present, for all of the opportunities that I’ve been given along the way. It’s been a true pleasure and a privilege, and I wish every one of you all of the best going forward, both personally and professionally.

1. Live Webinar – Lights! Camera! Action! First Amendment Auditors – Are you Prepared?; Jaclyn Keane; January 9, 2026

What are First Amendment auditors and what is the proper police role in these occurrences? This course offers essential insights into the rights and tactics of auditors who test public and government spaces for constitutional violations which can oftentimes be controversial, confrontational and disruptive. Through instruction on legal foundations, common auditing techniques, policy and training considerations, as well as real-world case studies, students will learn how to effectively navigate these encounters while respecting First Amendment rights and reducing risk and liability for officers and agencies alike. Gain the tools to handle public interactions with professionalism, avoid legal pitfalls, and maintain public trust. Whether aiming to enhance an understanding of constitutional rights, establish sound policy, or improve training and response strategies in the field, this course provides the knowledge needed to protect you and your agency with confidence and professionalism.

2. LEAD Series – Police Supervisory Role in the 21st Century; January 12 – February 6, 2026; O’Fallon PD

This updated 80-hour course delivers the fundamental skills that new and experienced first-line supervisors who have not completed formal supervisory training need to be successful. PSR21C focuses on the role and functions of the first-line supervisor and builds a rock-solid introduction to management-level decision-making. The course is designed against the backdrop of current challenges in policing to provide a leadership foundation for the upwardly mobile supervisor.

Course Content Areas:

- Navigating the Transition to Supervisor
- Evolution of Modern Police Management
- The DISC Model of Human Behavior
- Risk Management: Dealing with Organizational Stress
- Adaptive Leadership
- Principled Policing: Cultural Competence & Police -Community Relationships
- Principled Policing: Integrity, Accountability, and Transparency
- Persons with Mental Illness/Behavioral Health Challenges
- Investigating the Use of Force for Field Supervisors
- Supervisor’s Role in Critical Incident Management

Course topics and content may change or be modified from time to time, ensuring that topics are recent and relevant, to address emerging issues impacting policing and provide the most up-to-date information meeting the current needs of law enforcement leaders.

Course Format – PSR21C consists of two one-week (40 hours per week), in-person, classroom sessions led by Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Executive Institute instructors, supplemented by reading and writing assignments. In addition to classroom discussions, this course provides participants with the opportunity to network with supervisory staff members from other agencies.

Prerequisites – Applicants must be sworn law enforcement officers or law enforcement support personnel employed by a local, state, or federal agency who have first-line supervisory responsibilities (implementing agency procedures and supervising/evaluating personnel) or who are preparing for advancement to a supervisory position within six months.

3. Live Webinar – On-Scene Decedent Body Examinations: Essential Skills for Death Investigations; Kiersten Reif; January 22, 2026; Zoom

On-Scene Decedent Body Examinations: Essential Skills for Death Investigations is designed to enhance participants' death investigation skills and knowledge, with a particular focus on gathering critical information from the decedent - both on-scene and during the autopsy.

This two-hour webinar will cover the following topics:

- Fundamentals of on-scene body examinations
- Importance of initial observations and avoiding confirmation bias
- Stages of decomposition and their investigative significance
- Categorization of injuries
- Recognition and articulation of red-flag observations
- Understanding postmortem artifacts
- Collaborating with death investigation agencies to ensure accurate outcomes

Often, on-scene law enforcement professionals have the only opportunity to examine a decedent prior to removal from the scene. Families, law enforcement agencies, forensic pathologists, and death investigators rely heavily on the observations made by first responders and detectives. The tools and resources covered in this session will encourage participants to confidently conduct systematic decedent examinations, effectively describe their observations to their jurisdiction's death investigation agency, prepare clear and thorough reports, consider potential criminal implications, provide comprehensive information to next of kin, and support a proper determination of cause and manner of death.

4. Live Webinar – Organizational Risk Management; Gordon Graham; January 27, 2026; Zoom

Organizational risk management looks inside any organization to show what can be done today to avoid/minimize incidents from going wrong. It focuses on the 5 Pillars of a successful organization and gives the informed listener ideas that can be initiated in the workplace immediately upon return to improve performance. Included in this class are a series of rules to prevent incidents from going wrong. It runs for 4 hours and is recommended to be followed by operational risk management classes specific to the involved organization.

5. Live Webinar- Performance Coaching: Building and Sustaining High Performance; Harry Dolan; January 29, 2026; Zoom

This webinar is an examination of the dynamics of effective performance coaching and counseling within an organization. Today's organizational leaders must be provided with essential principles of providing team members with supportive and corrective feedback. Developing leader confidence to confront negative employee and supervisory behaviors free from emotional stumbling blocks is vital to the leader's success. Failure to master these fundamentals results in low morale and significant organizational stress.

In order to influence others and move today's work team forward, we must develop a clear understanding of how performance coaching principles lead to organizational goal attainment. This webinar will serve to provide leaders with the necessary skills and tools to both inspire team members to achieve success and effectively confront performance inadequacies.

Course Objectives:

- Develop an understanding of why the leader's failure to coach & counsel team members negatively impacts both service delivery and organizational morale.
- Identify and confront negative employee and supervisory behaviors free from emotional stumbling blocks.
- Develop a solid understanding of the performance theory, principles of motivation, high-performance coaching skills, and individual and team engagement strategies.
- Review the essentials of supportive and corrective feedback.
- Courageously confront negative performance issues Retain the right people through mentoring and succession planning Implement key strategies proven to improve productivity and morale.

6. Live Webinar – Empowering Women in the Workplace; Brenda Dietzman; February 11, 2026; Zoom and November 18-20, 2025; Mt. Vernon

Men and women are different...and that's a good thing! We both bring different strengths to the table that helps our organizations become stronger. Discover the insights gained from research studies and personal experiences that highlight unconscious actions and beliefs that can hold women back in the workplace.

This session will delve into:

- Uncovering and addressing unconscious shortcuts
- Understanding the impact of imposter syndrome on professional growth
- Practical strategies for overcoming feelings of inadequacy and self-doubt
- Techniques for managing the inner critic and boosting self-confidence
- Enhancing speech and body language to positively influence perception

Participants will gain a deeper understanding of the hidden challenges and actionable strategies to overcome them. Supervisors will leave with practical steps to develop their co-workers and create a more successful, diverse workforce. Join us in this evidence-based course to equip yourself and your organization with the tools needed for a more inclusive and empowering workplace.

7. Workshop – Grant Writing for LE Agencies; Evan Sorg; February 17-18 and March 10-11, 2026; ILETSB Offices, Springfield

Law Enforcement Grant Writing 101 is a two-day, 14-hour training program designed to provide the knowledge, tools, and skills required for law enforcement agencies to successfully apply for federal, state, and foundation grant funding for equipment, technology, training, personnel, and more.

The overall goals for the course include:

- (1) providing participants with the requisite knowledge to write effective and winning grant applications and
- (2) preparing students for the grant writing process by having them compile all information/data necessary to write applications and enter this information into the provided grant writing toolkit.

To pass the training, students must receive a 70% or greater on the post-test administered at the conclusion of the course. This course is tailored for sworn and civilian law enforcement employees entrusted with, or aspiring to undertake, grant writing responsibilities for their departments. Past participants have included Chiefs of Police, executive-level supervisors, line-level supervisors, and officers, as well as civilian administrative staff employed by law enforcement agencies. Participants receive the custom-made grant writing workbook, the proprietary grant writing toolkit, and state and federal grant examples.

8. Live Webinar - Safeguarding Public Trust: The Legitimacy Hazards of AI-Generated Content; Judy Pal; February 19; Zoom

This session examines the growing legitimacy hazards posed by AI-generated content and its consequences for public safety. Our ability to distinguish the difference between real and disinformation is being undermined by malicious actors who manipulate narratives by exploiting anger, fear, and divisiveness. AI-generated imagery and video not only distort perception, but also risk creating false memories, further complicating legal proceedings and public confidence. With trust in government at historic lows and experts predicting that 90% of social media content will be synthetically generated by 2026, we face an impending ‘information apocalypse’. Learn how to mitigate these threats and put into place practices that will help strengthen resilience against AI-driven disinformation

This report provides an update of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Federal Homeland Security Grant funded through the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council (HSAC).

TRAINING AND FUNDING

ILET SB has been a voting member of the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council and recipient of homeland security funds since 2002. ILET SB has four active awards, Federal Fiscal Years 2021, 2022, 2023, and 2024; years 2021, 2022, and 2023 the award is \$391,000. For FFY 2024 the award is in the amount of \$136,000. The decrease is the result of a 10 percent reduction to the State of Illinois Homeland Security Grant Program. This 10 percent reduction impacted all stakeholders receiving homeland security funds in Illinois. ILET SB is currently in Federal Fiscal Year 2022 with the performance period ending June 30, 2026.

ILLINOIS HOMELAND SECURITY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The HSAC did not meet during this quarter.

The Council of Chairs did meet during this quarter. Acting Director Ted Berger provided remarks about the current state of the Homeland Security Grant Program. Director Berger was not optimistic about the funding and Illinois should brace for a significant decrease in funding moving forward.

Next full quarterly meeting of the HSAC will be on February 3, 2026 at 10:00 am at IEMA.

LAW ENFORCEMENT MUTUAL AID COMMITTEE

LEMAC did not meet during this quarter.

CENTER FOR HOMELAND SECURITY LEADERSHIP

Program Director – Derek Carle

Derek Carle continues to serve on the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council (IHSAC) and serves on three sub-committees of the IHSAC: Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Committee, Cyber Security Committee and, Prevention Committee.

Derek serves on three national committees pertaining to law enforcement and incident management. Derek is a member of a law enforcement committee to address incident command/NIMS to law enforcement executives, command staff and officers. Derek is also on the Incident Commander and Intelligence/Investigations committees.

Derek is also a credentialed Type 2 Incident Commander for the State of Illinois.

Planning Workshops

During this quarter the Mobile Training Units held 16 workshops for 277 officers totaling 3,933 hours of training. UASI held 0 workshops. The workshops were paid out of the FFY2022 and FFY 2023 HSGP.

The ILETSB-Executive Institute using Homeland Security funds will be hosting an Advanced SWAT training at T1G in West Memphis, Arkansas, March 16 -20. This training will be addressing gaps in Illinois that will bring the basic SWAT officer to a level that will help them in a response for a “lone wolf” assailant to multiple assailants in a complex-coordinated attack, crowded spaces and soft targets.

Illinois Active Threat Master Instructor Course

The Fall 2026 IATMI course flyer has been pushed out across the state.

The Illinois Active Threat Master Instructor Certification Program builds upon the ITOA’s (Illinois Tactical Officers Association) TPO (Tactical Patrol Officer) program by offering an advanced certification for current instructors throughout the state.

The 4-week program will certify instructors to teach: Use of Force, Safety Officer/Scenario Based Instruction, High Risk Patrol Tactics, Active Threat/Rapid Deployment, Solo Officer Response, Rescue Task Force, and Urban Tactic/MACTAC (Multiple Assault Counter Terrorist Action Capabilities).

Homeland Security Workshop Catalog

With guidance from Mobile Team Unit Coordinators, staff continues to review and revise the workshop catalog. Coordinators are encouraged to submit new workshops for consideration.

Based on the desire of the Illinois Homeland Security Director and the IHSAC, the homeland security grant guidance and catalog will be going through a small revision. The core courses for the catalog will consist of the Active Threat Master course, Active Threat End-User courses, Community Behavioral Threat Assessment (different from school based Behavioral Threat Assessment), Digital Threat Assessment, Cyber Security, Domestic Violent Extremism, Soft Targets/Crowded Spaces and a few of the popular courses that address the Vision 2028 Homeland Security Strategy.

Illinois School and Campus Safety Program

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program provides awareness and preparedness training to enhance organizational capacity to plan for, respond to, and recover from an emergency or disaster. The Program also runs the Illinois School and Campus Safety Resource Center website.

Presentations and Work Groups

Derek Carle, the Program Director for the Illinois School and Campus Safety Program, serves on the Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Subcommittee, the Prevention subcommittee, and the Cybersecurity Subcommittee of the HSAC. Derek also attended the Association of Threat Assessment Professionals Winter Conference and presented at an ERBS school safety day in Algonquin.

National Domestic Preparedness Consortium (NDPC)

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program works in collaboration with NDPC members, including the Energetic Materials Research and Testing Center at New Mexico Tech, to bring a variety of courses to Illinois, including classes on Understanding and Planning for School Bombing Incidents and Surviving Bombing Incidents for Educators. The Program is working on the schedule for 2026 and plans on scheduling sessions of both classes.

Behavioral Threat Assessment and Online Threat Assessment

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working to deliver training regarding the threat assessment & management process and online threat assessment.

The Program continues to work with David Okada, past President of the Association of Threat Assessment Professionals, on sessions of the K-12 class Threat Assessment Team Training (TATT).

The Program continues to work with Dr. Gene Deisinger and Jeffrey Cugno on both the K-12 class Behavioral Threat Assessment and Management in a School Setting (BTAM) and the higher ed class Campus Threat Assessment and Management (CTAM).

Furthermore, the Program continues to work with Safer Schools Together on sessions of Digital Threat Assessment® (DTA), Advanced Digital Threat Assessment® (ADTA), and Current Online Behavioral Trends and Updates (COBT), as well as with Rich Wistocki on sessions of Preventing Targeted Violence Through Leakage and Cyber Investigations (PTVTLCI).

The Program held sessions of COBT on January 22nd, February 27th, and March 25th; sessions of DTA on Feb. 17th & March 9th; a session of TATT on March 5-6th; a session of CTAM on March 23-24th; and a session of BTAM on March 25-26th.

Additionally, the Program has sessions of CTAM scheduled for April 20-21st, May 12-13th, May 18-19th, and June 10-11th; a session of PVTLCI on April 27-28th; a session of TATT on May 7-8th; a session of BTAM on June 8-9th; and is in the process of scheduling additional sessions of DTA, ADTA, TATT, BTAM, CTAM, and PVTLCI. The Program is also hosting 7 more sessions

of the monthly 2-hr COBT classes, which are scheduled for April 23rd, May 27th, June 25th, Sept. 24th, Oct. 22nd, Nov. 19th, and Dec. 17th.

Cybersecurity and Cyber Safety

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working with Safer Schools Together on sessions of the Cyberbullying, Sextortion, and the Pathway to Radicalization class. The Program held sessions of the class on Jan. 28th and March 2nd, 2026.

Additionally, the Program held a session of Cybersecurity in Education: Risk Assessment, Mitigation, and Management with Safer Schools Together on March 31st, 2026.

Site Safety Security Assessment

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working to deliver sessions of the Site Safety Security Assessment training throughout Illinois. The Program is working on the schedule and plans to hold around 8 sessions of the training in 2026.

Crisis Communications

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working with Deputy Chief Chris Covelli on sessions of Effective Communication Principles Before, During, and After Critical Incidents. The Program plans to hold around 8 sessions of the training in 2026. One session was held on March 13th and the next session is scheduled for June 5th.

Crisis Response and Reunification

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working with the “I Love U Guys” Foundation to schedule sessions of the 2-Day SRM-REx training, which includes a full-day SRP/SRM (Standard Response Protocol and Standard Reunification Method) Train the Trainer and a full day of reunification exercises. The Program has sessions scheduled for April 29-30 and June 3-4, and is in the process of scheduling 3 more sessions.

The Program is also working on scheduling Critical Incident Response and Management classes.

Trauma-Informed Practice and Interpersonal Violence

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program continues to work with Michelle Denault to hold sessions of her class “It IS Your Business”: Grooming and Sexual Assault Awareness for K-12 Schools and Institutions of Higher Education, including a session scheduled for April 2, 2026.

The Program is working with Safer Schools Together on sessions of their Trauma-Informed Safe and Caring School Communities class. The Program held the first session on Feb. 10th and a second session is being held April 7th, 2026.

Website

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program continues to promote and update the Illinois School and Campus Safety Resource Center website. The website features a comprehensive

resource compendium of school safety topics, has a multimedia platform that features public service video work, features many of our collaborative state and federal partners, and provides information about the Illinois School and Campus Safety Program. We are continuing to seek input from both K-12 and higher education institutions and associations to drive the content of the website. Staff is currently working on adding additional resources and topic areas to the website, as well as testing and updating links.

Weekly Update Emails

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program continues to promote school safety topics and spread awareness through our Weekly Update emails, which go out weekly to over 23,000 individuals in the School and Campus Safety directories. The Weekly Update emails feature important school safety topics, share breaking news/resources, promote upcoming classes, and provide links to the Illinois School and Campus Safety Resource Center website. Past Weekly Update emails are added to the Resource Center website to make their content accessible to individuals who do not receive them via email.

K-12 School Directory and Institution of Higher Education Directory

Staff continue to update the K-12 public and private school directory and the statewide institution of higher education directory. Presently the directory has over 23,000 contacts. For January through March, staff worked on updating the K-12 directories for ROE 13, ROE 16, ROE 20, ROE 26, ROE 28, ROE 33, and ROE 56.

The Executive Institute A.S.S.I.S.T. Program (A Statewide System of In-Service Training) was started at the end of July 2023. This program consists of three major sections: State Law Enforcement Agencies (Course Certification, Instructor Approval, and class recognition), ILETSB K9 Certification and the ILETSB IROCC (Illinois Retired Officer's Concealed Carry) Program, along with several entities that do not fall within these sections directly. The EI - A.S.S.I.S.T. Program also works directly with the rest of the Executive Institute and ILETSB staff with assistance in conferences and training, along with the administration of the IDOT Grant.

Since the inception of the EI – A.S.S.I.S.T. Program, several State Law Enforcement agencies have used our program to get their courses ILETSB certified, along with getting their instructors approved to provide the instruction. This is helping agencies to fulfill mandate requirements per the Illinois Safe-T Act.

We are planning to hold another EI-A.S.S.I.S.T./State Law Enforcement Agency Training Coordinator meeting this Spring at the ILETSB building involving several State Law Enforcement Agencies throughout the state. Present at the prior meetings or via Webex were several agency representatives that showed up such as: ILETSB, Illinois Attorney General's Office, Illinois Secretary of State Police, Illinois State Police, Illinois Department of Revenue, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Illinois Gaming Board, CMS Illinois State Police Protective Services Unit, Illinois Supreme Court Marshals Office, along with Heather Hotz from Executive Institute. The Agencies' Contact's information was shared, so they have a direct contact on each agency, along with agencies sharing trainings that they conduct in-house, which they will open for other State Law Enforcement Agencies to attend when available. The Agencies understand the importance of the training, the Safety Act, along with the required mandates and they strive to train beyond the minimum.

We have also developed a course library for the courses that have been ILETSB Certified for the Agencies that we represent. It contains breakdowns of the particular mandate sections and by Agency that had it ILETSB Certified, which is shared periodically with all the State Law Enforcement Agencies for them to utilize. It is for reference on training courses to use or help with development of training. We strive for the State Law Enforcement Agencies to work with each other on trainings and share information, so that Officers can get the best and most training that they can.

The VirTra System located at the ILETSB Building is being utilized by departments with more looking to start. We have added even more ILETSB certified courses for the system, to give more opportunities to get training and mandates needed. More courses are being reviewed as well.

The K9 Certification/Re-certification team, which includes ILETSB Legal Counsel, has been working on ways of updating the program. This is to help ensure accurate information on forms and keep the certification process up to date. This program has scheduling in several locations around the state with dates scheduled throughout the year to assist the Department's K9 handlers and the K9 assessors. We have gone back to using a fiscal year calendar for record keeping. For updates on the 3rd quarter of fiscal year 2026 K9 Program statistics, see the included report.

The IROCC Program, which consists of nearly 10,000 applicants yearly and has been working alongside Levi, Ray and Shoup, Inc. in the updating of the website and application process to help with the vetting of applicants and making operations more efficient. The good news is that we are now in the final testing phase and look forward to launch in the very near future. For details of updates on the IROCC Program calendar year 2025 and current year 2026 numbers, see the included report.

ASSIST PROGRAM - FY26 2nd Quarter Report *for* MARCH 2026 BOARD MEETING

This report provides an update on the administration of the ASSIST Program including: the 2nd Quarter Report for FY26 and FY25 Governors' Report which is located at <https://www.ptb.illinois.gov/> under MTU Reports. Due to the length of this report, only the summary version is being provided for your review. Presented below are some of the ASSIST administrative matters through Training and Fiscal reports.

██████████ represents the ASSIST program training activity report results through the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2026 to include all thirteen MTU's. This chart provides information from each Mobile Team Unit: number of training course hours, total number of students attending the training programs, man hours and number of courses offered. The Fiscal Year totals for the first & second quarters are listed below: (It should be noted that MTU 3 & Executive Institute data is provided to IT at ILETSB and is not automatically generated or uploaded like all others and can cause delays in reporting). Additional numbers represented include State ASSIST & DOJ/COPS performance. Lastly, these numbers reflect officers strive to complete mandated training as we approached the first phase of 'verification' for officers whose last name 'A-G'.

██████████ provides a financial overview of the total budgets operationally for the MTU's including expected Specialized Training requests along with the MTU's Ten Percent match. To date, the Board has approved release of two payments with a third payment to be released near the date of our Board meeting. It should be noted that monies provided for 'Specialized Trainings' have been released based upon reimbursements for said trainings that qualify.

██████████ represents the current listing of MTU directors and locations of MTU offices and training sites. (Addition to the map includes the State ASSIST Division located within ILETSB office in Springfield that represents all state agencies for In-House Training Applications, Instructors, and Certification). This attachment located within the Governors' Report for FY25.

██████████ represents ALL In-Service Courses presented for Approval for the upload to the newly designed LETM Platform for all MTU's to provide. Additionally, this list includes those courses that have been previously certified that are being de-activated as we review and standardize our training platform.

Governors' Report for Fiscal Year 2026

A comprehensive summary of Mobile Team Unit training activity and funding for Fiscal Year 2025 has been created and disseminated to both the Governors' Office and the State Legislature as required by law. This annual report is required to be submitted to the Governor and to the General Assembly prior to February 1, 2026 (annually by the 1st of February). FY25 report is located at <https://www.ptb.illinois.gov/> under MTU Reports in its' entirety. The information contained with this this report is collected throughout the FY while other information is submitted over 120 days following the conclusion of the any FY.

Application for Fiscal Year 2027

The Board will announce Mobile Team Unit funding application procedures in March for the next fiscal year. Board staff will be in the process of updating and compiling the Fiscal Year 2027 application materials and letter of announcement. Those packets of information and instructions will be sent and made available to all interested parties prior to March 15th, 2026. MTU's will be afforded the opportunity to submit the budget application electronically. Conditions of Award for Fiscal Year 2027 will be reviewed and amended as necessary based upon an MTU's needs and funding availability. MTU Coordinators and Manager of In-Service Training, along with other vital Training Division employees, will schedule budget request and review meetings prior to announcement of awards in May 2026 to present to the Board at the June 2026 meeting. Funding discussions for FY27 began at the state level in August of 2025 between the Training Division ILETSB Fiscal regarding overall requesting allocation of funds for in-service to manage the MTU's requests and needs to ensure the necessary resources are made available for MTU's to meet the demands for their membership training needs.

Closure

The Board has been extremely pleased with the MTU's and their coordinator's response to the ever changing and challenging duties brought about by the SAFE-T Act. Coordinators have weighed heavy the responsibility to ensure proper and necessary training for their memberships were not only available, but enhanced as our profession identifies the needs of are various areas throughout the state. ILETSB has certified nearly 5,000 courses to which MTU's have conducted **3,614** classes throughout the state in all aspects of training during the Second Quarter of FY26. As we approach the rollout of the newly designed LETM Platform, we are hopeful that standardizing many trainings and specifically focusing on the high-liability trainings will enable the advancement of our instructor development.

The ILETSB Training Division will focus on the continued need to provide for adequate training facilities as it relates to in-service training and particularly ensuring that each geographical area of the state provides for such environments for the most realistic and professional settings which will allow officers to get the maximum from their training experience.

This report is a summary of the most significant staff activity related to the administration of the ASSIST Program during the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2026. This report reflects the dedication, commitment, and partnerships involving the MTU's, the Executive Institute, Certification, IT, and the Fiscal Divisions within the ILETSB office.

On behalf of my office, I respectfully submit the FY25 Annual Report on the operations of the Mobile Team Units (MTUs). The Annual Report provides a summary of data and information on the funding and operational activities of the thirteen established MTUs from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025. This report will reflect the data recorded on training, including in-person training through the MTUs and select classes held by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Executive Institute (ILETSB-EI), as well as Online Learning Network courses through the MTUs. Additionally, ILETSB-EI online learning hours and attendee numbers are attached for a full overview of training conducted and completed for Law Enforcement Officers throughout the State of Illinois, including Law Enforcement, Corrections, and Court Security.

Since the establishment of the MTUs in the early 1980s, pursuant to Public Act 82-674, the State of Illinois has effectively created a law enforcement training network recognized throughout the nation as “state of the art.” It is a training system that provides continuous professional and rigorous training for local and State law enforcement agencies, including Law Enforcement Officers, Correctional Officers, Court Security Officers, Auxiliary Officers, and State’s Attorney personnel, as well as supporting emergency services staff. This Annual Report provides evidence of the continued effectiveness and productivity of the Statewide System of In-Service Training (ASSIST) and its extremely important role, including its partnership with both the Governor and our State’s legislature, which has never been more valuable to law enforcement than these past three years following the implementation of the SAFE-T Act.

This report marks the completion of the third full year of data collection following the implementation of the SAFE-T Act in July 2022. This report outlines the changes that have occurred and evaluates the systemic changes mandated by the Governor and the General Assembly. We believe that with the continued support of our state leadership and a renewed emphasis on instructor development, we will achieve the high-caliber training results envisioned by the Act. This report reflects our commitment to professional excellence and our strategic role in ensuring the successful, full implementation of these standards.

Mobile Team Unit Funding in FY25

The Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB) awarded a total of \$9,648,284.22 in state funds to 13 Mobile Team Units (MTUs) for FY25. These funds were distributed through quarterly payments under the authority of the Intergovernmental Law Enforcement Officers In-Service Training Act (Public Act 82- 674). In addition, \$1,814,765.11 was allocated for Specialized Training (including Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Training, School Resource Officer (SRO) Training, and Lead Homicide Investigator Training). Furthermore, \$334,525.04 in federal traffic safety grants was distributed through the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) as part of U.S. Department of Transportation funding (Ill. #11). An additional \$173,232.83 in federal Homeland Security funds has been awarded to ten MTUs. Total funding for the MTUs amounted to \$12,662,788.05 in state and federal funds, along with local funds and tuition fees totaling \$3,734,902.00. This total includes a \$434,732.43 deduction for FY24 Grant Recovery.

The 13 MTUs collectively brought in \$16,503,227.02 in federal, state, and local funds in FY25, excluding funds expended outside the MTUs (Ill. #4). For a detailed breakdown of the MTUs, including a map and directory of each unit's geographic area, see Illustration #1. This report also includes a comprehensive summary of the funding received and distributed to the MTUs, as well as additional breakdowns in Illustrations #3, #4, and #12.

Mobile Team Units Productivity in FY25

MTUs have consistently demonstrated their commitment to implementing the SAFE-T Act and have recognized the necessary changes to enhance the development of trainers. This, in turn, leads to improved training that aligns with the best practices and standards of the profession, both in training environments and in our service calls.

In FY25, MTUs conducted 12,667 classes, delivering 80,586 hours of instruction across the state. A total of 307,155 course registrations were processed and law enforcement agencies completed 1,464,034 man-hours of training. This represents a three-year growth in every aspect of data collected as we enter our first year of

verification in 2026. This consistent growth in training and attendance provides for the optimal application of the SAFE-T Act and the value our MTUs have in the law enforcement community. Illustrations #5 and #11 provide further details on MTU training productivity, costs, and investments.

Mobile Team Unit Cost-Effectiveness in FY25

The efficiency and cost-effectiveness of the MTUs remain strong. In FY25, the MTUs delivered a high volume of training at a reasonable cost per instructional hour, per trainee hour, and per training man-hour. These costs are categorized as follows:

- State Funds Only
- State & Federal Funds Combined
- Total Costs (including State, Federal, and Local contributions)

Local costs include membership dues and "soft match" funds, which cover officer salaries during training. Despite variations in costs across different regions (due to factors such as department size and officer numbers), the overall cost-effectiveness remains highly favorable to this state's design of the MTUs and their funding criteria. For detailed cost-effectiveness data, refer to Illustration #6. Additionally, the MTUs continued to provide mandatory firearms training, in compliance with the Illinois Peace Officer Firearm Training Act (P.A. 86-1324). Illustration #7 details the courses offered, and the number of officers trained. All firearms ranges used for training were inspected for safety and compliance by qualified ILETSB staff, and the inspections were documented and filed. Notable areas of improvement necessary to ensure that any personnel qualified to carry a firearm in the state as a result of any appointment to a position where force may be utilized in the performance of their job would be to require all personnel carrying a firearm in their professional capacity to train annually in the four subcategories of Use of Force found within the SAFE-T Act. This would include Fire Marshals, Probation Officers, Parole Officers, and any other emergency personnel carrying a firearm that falls outside the SAFE-T Act with regard to mandatory training.

Current and Future Funding

In FY26, the State of Illinois allocated \$14,791,787.93 to the 13 MTUs through the ASSIST Program under the Intergovernmental Law Enforcement Officers In-Service Training Act. As the Board plans for future training need include:

- Ensure continued funding to maintain and invest in training needs;
- Grant funding for the continued demand within specialized training (CIT/SRO/LHI);
- Emphasize Illinois' leadership in law enforcement training for executives;
- Following the goal of the Police Training Act (50 ILCS 705/1) in aiding in the establishment of adequate training facilities;

- Establishing Policy & Procedure which will guide in the development of our instructors;
- Establishing Policy & Procedure which will enhance level of training offered within our profession through the MTUs;
- Identify the need to establish certifications and refresher trainings in areas of high demand within the professions including: Juvenile Officer, Firearms Instructors, and Weapons minimum standards;
- Identify the High Liability Trainings and standardize the scenario-based trainings in areas such as High Risk Traffic Stops, High Risk Patrol Operations, and Active Threat Response trainings.

The needs of law enforcement are regularly assessed, and plans for further improvements are being created. This includes the Board's responsibility to establish standards and to develop and deliver high-quality training and education for the profession, in line with current professional standards and best practices.

Summary

Through the efforts of Governor JB Pritzker, the Illinois General Assembly, and ILETSB all state and local law enforcement officers have access to high-quality professional development and in-service training. The MTUs continue to evolve to meet the state's law enforcement needs, working alongside the Governor, Legislature, and each of our stakeholders. ILETSB will continue to evaluate standards across every aspect to ensure we are creating an environment that breeds better trainers and, in turn, produces a greater product.

Our emphasis will be on Instructor Development with evolving curriculum and lesson plan design. Establishing a training environment with prioritization on scenario-based training, especially in areas regarding Use of Force decision-making. These efforts are believed to prepare officers for real-life situations better and enhance their decision-making skills. As the demands on law enforcement increase, so too will the need for the Board to grow and enhance our current practices.

We thank Governor Pritzker, the General Assembly, and the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board for their continued support, and we look forward to working together to ensure law enforcement officers are fully prepared to serve and protect Illinois citizens and all who visit this great state.

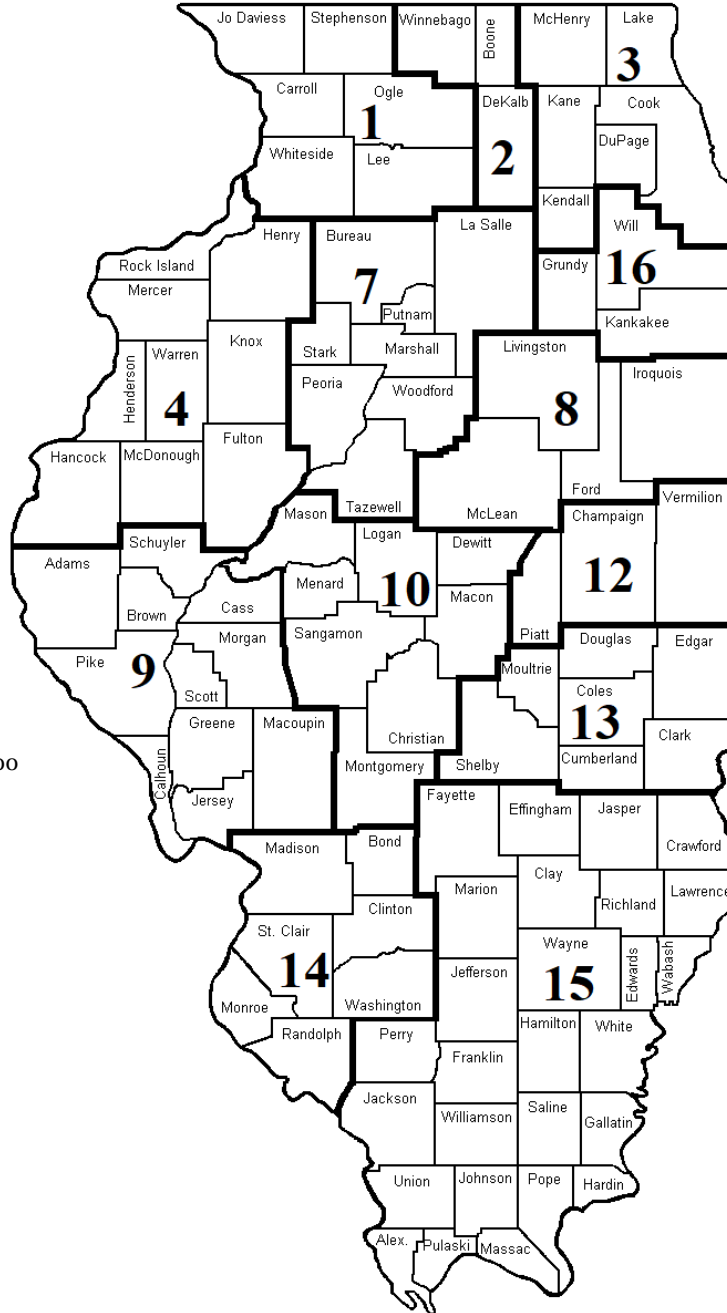

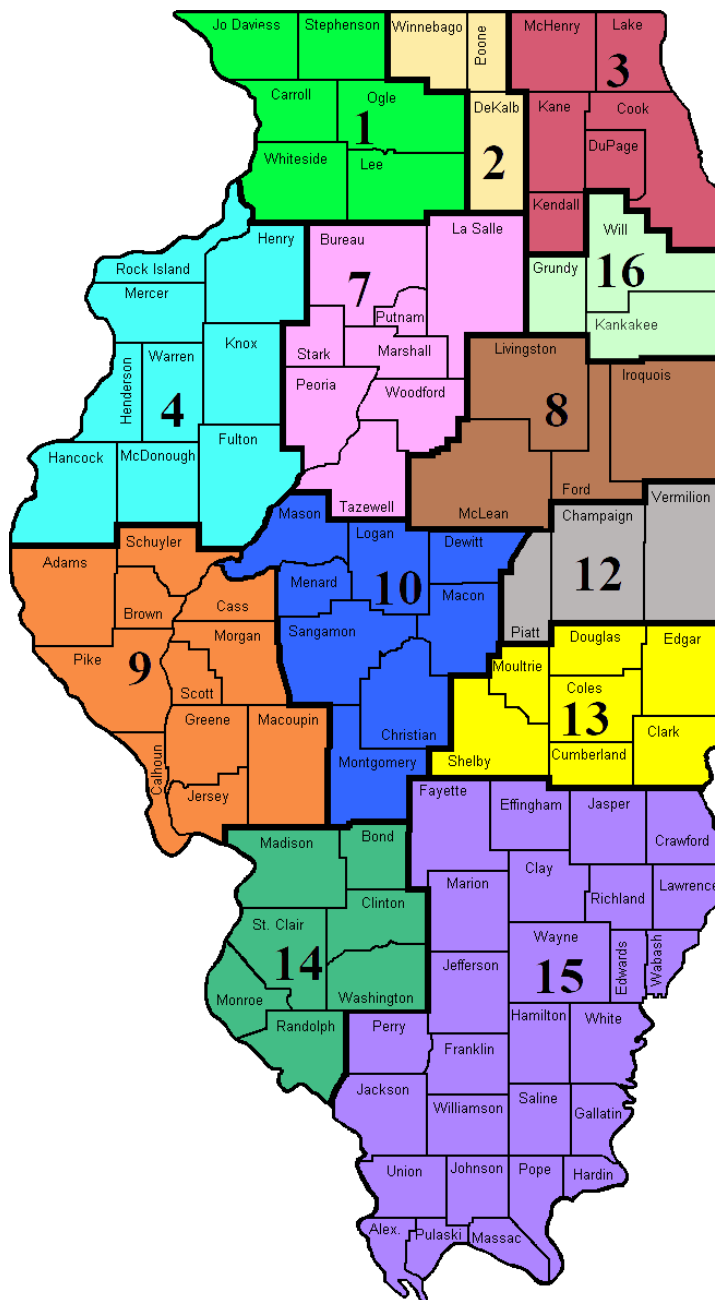

This report reflects the annual activity and representation of the Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) status in Illinois for FY25. In relationship with the National Highway Safety Administration (NHTSA), the DRE Programs primary functions are:

- Specialized Trainings for DRE Certification
- Drug Classifications
- Support for Investigations
- Data Collection for NHTSA

A DRE is a police officer trained to recognize impairment in drivers under the influence of drugs or other than, or in addition to, alcohol. Primary educational monitoring in the Mobile Training Units in areas of training include:

- DWI Detection and Standardized Field Sobriety (SFST) Instructor Course – 32/40 hour
- Standardized Field Sobriety Testing (SFST) Course – 24 hour
- Standardized Field Sobriety Testing (SFST) Refresher – 4 hour
- Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE) Course – 16 hour
- Standardized Field Sobriety Testing (SFST) Refresher w/ Drugged Driving – 8 Hour

APPENDIX A

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

(50 ILCS 720/) Intergovernmental Law Enforcement Officer's In-Service Training Act.

(50 ILCS 720/1) (from Ch. 85, par. 561)

Sec. 1. Short title. This Act shall be known and may be cited as the "Intergovernmental Law Enforcement Officer's In-Service Training Act".

(Source: P.A. 82-674.)

(50 ILCS 720/2) (from Ch. 85, par. 562)

Sec. 2. Definitions.

"Board" means the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board created by the Illinois Police Training Act.

"Director" means the Executive Director of the Board.

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Board.

"Appointed Member" means a member of the Board appointed by the Governor pursuant to the Illinois Police Training Act and designated by the Director to serve on an Advisory Board.

"Mobile Team In-Service Training Unit" or "Mobile Team" means an organization formed by a combination of units of local government and the Board and established under this Act to deliver in-service training at scheduled times and selected sites within a geographic region to (i) local and State law enforcement officers (whether employed on a full-time or part-time basis) and (ii) retired law enforcement officers qualified under federal law to carry a concealed weapon.

"Advisory Board" means a Board composed of a representative number of county board members, mayors, chiefs of police, and sheriffs of participating units of local government, and the Director, Chairman or appointed member of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board. The composition and number of each Advisory Board will be determined by the participants. Members of the Advisory Board shall serve without compensation but may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses incurred in carrying out their duties.

"Unit of local government" means a unit of local government as defined in Article VII, Section 1 of the Illinois Constitution of 1970 and includes both home rule units and units which are not home rule units.

Sec. 3. Powers and Duties.

(a) Powers and Duties of the Advisory Board.

(1) To incorporate as a general not-for-profit corporation or other appropriate structure under Illinois law.

(2) To adopt By-Laws and Operating Procedures.

(3) To designate a Financial Officer who is an elected local government official.

(4) To employ a coordinator and to approve the employment of such other full or part-time staff as may be required.

(5) To develop and approve the total budget for the Mobile Team annually.

(6) To determine equitable formulae for providing the local share of cost of the

Mobile Team, and to assure receipt of such funds from participating units of local government.

(7) To oversee the development of training programs, the delivery of training, and the proper expenditure of funds.

(8) To carry out such other actions or activities appropriate to the operation of the Mobile Team including but not limited to contracting for services and supplies, and purchase of furniture, fixtures, equipment and supplies.

(9) To exercise all other powers and duties as are reasonable to fulfill its functions in furtherance of the purposes of this Act.

(b) Powers and Duties of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board.

(1) To act as the State agency participant on each Mobile Team Advisory Board.

(2) To act as the State agency to coordinate the actions of Mobile Teams established in the State.

(3) To determine that the Mobile Team meets the criteria for the receipt of funds from the State in accordance with Section 4 of this Act.

(4) To budget for and authorize quarterly disbursement of State funds up to 50% of the total approved budget of the eligible Mobile Team.

(5) To establish such reasonable rules and regulations as the Director deems necessary to carry out the duties described in this Act, including those relating to the annual certification of retired law enforcement officers qualified under federal law to carry a concealed weapon.

(c) Powers and Duties of the Coordinator of an Advisory Board.

(1) To manage and coordinate the ongoing operations of the Mobile Team.

(2) To employ and supervise additional authorized full or part-time staff.

(3) To arrange for qualified instructors from among the employees of State, local or federal Departments or agencies wherever practical and to obtain other instructional services as required.

(50 ILCS 720/4) (from Ch. 85, par. 564)

Sec. 4. State Funding-Minimum Criteria. A Mobile Team In-Service Training Unit which meets the minimum criteria established in this Section is eligible to receive State funds to help defray the costs of operation. To be eligible a Mobile Team must:

(1) Be established and operating pursuant to the Intergovernmental Cooperation Section Article VII, Section 10, of the Illinois Constitution of 1970 and must involve two or more units of local government including at least one county and the Board.

(2) Establish an Advisory Board composed of elected local officials and chief law enforcement officers from participating units of local government and the Director, Chairman or appointed member of the Board to oversee the operations of the Mobile Team and make such reports to the Board as the Board may require.

(3) Designate an elected local official to act as the financial officer of the Mobile Team for all participating units of government, and to receive and expend funds for the operation of the Mobile Team.

(4) Limit its operations to in-service training of law enforcement personnel employed by the State, by units of local government or by the Federal government or their agencies and departments in the administration of justice or retired law enforcement officers qualified under federal law to carry a concealed weapon.

(5) Cooperate with the Board in order to assure compliance with this Act and to enable the Board to fulfill its duties under this Act, and to supply the Board with such information as the Board deems necessary therefor.

(6) Receive funding of up to 50% of the total approved budget of the Mobile Team from the participating units of local government.

(50 ILCS 720/5) (from Ch. 85, par. 565)

Sec. 5. Determination of eligibility - Amount. The Board shall monitor the operation of all Mobile Teams and determine their eligibility to receive State funds under this Act. From monies appropriated annually by the General Assembly for this purpose, the Director shall determine and certify to the Comptroller the amount of funds to be disbursed to each designated Mobile Team financial officer. The amount of the State funds which a Mobile Team receives hereunder shall equal up to 50% of the total approved budget of that Mobile Team.

Sec. 6. The Director shall report annually, no later than February 1st, to the Governor and the General Assembly on the operations of the Mobile Teams. The report will also include a breakdown of the appropriation for the current fiscal year and the budget for the next fiscal year indicating the amount each Mobile Team received and will receive in the next year.

CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM TRAINING (CIT)

MARCH 2026 QUARTERLY REPORT

This report provides an update on the administration of the Board's Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training programs, therapy dog initiative and various related mental health and de-escalation trainings.

CIT Training Courses/Series:

The CIT training programs, related mental health related training programs, conflict resolution courses and the like are all progressing quite well. In follow-up to my last report in December, I'd like to share that the newly certified two-day Collaborative Crisis Co-Response Course is under development and will start being offered later this spring through the MTU's. Please keep an eye on our CIT webpage for dates and locations as they become available.

As mentioned to this body previously, every other year, we like to host a training retreat for our core statewide CIT instructors, evaluators and actors. This training retreat is designed to strengthen statewide consistency and ensure our team remain aligned with current best practices, curriculum standardization and quality assurance. It's also a fantastic way to collaborate, share successes, challenges and look to innovative approaches to strengthen the overall program. I'm happy to share that we are set to provide this training next month at our Chicago office to a full house of our statewide team members.

I'd also like to share that we are also set to host another CIT Concepts Train the Trainer course. This one-day offering is available to CIT officers who meet the minimum qualifications, including three years as an active CIT officer as well as approved to evaluate the role play scenarios in the certified 40-hour CIT training program. This train the trainer course is also being offered at our Chicago facility next month.

Along the same lines, attached to my report is the previously approved CIT Concepts student performance objectives. While this course has already been submitted and approved by this body, we wanted to resubmit in a format similar to our other courses as well as make a minor update (less than ten percent and *not* affecting the core objectives) including: adding that the CIT instructor must have evaluated in the basic certified 40 hour course *within the last year*.

CIT K-9 Therapy Dog Initiative:

Since the December Board meeting, the CIT crisis response therapy canine initiative has continued to grow, expanding its positive impact not only across Illinois but beyond. Our law enforcement therapy dog teams remain a steady and visible presence in the communities we serve, providing consistent outreach and support at both the celebratory and challenging events. This quarter included visits to the Brookfield Zoo during their holiday festivities and participation in the 2026 Chicago Auto Show, where our teams welcomed and engaged with fellow law enforcement officers and visitors alike. At the same time, we responded to more somber occasions, offering comfort and compassion to school communities navigating tragedy. On these difficult days, our handlers and therapy dogs provided a calming, reassuring presence for students, faculty and SRO's. By being a constant – on good days and bad – we continue to strengthen trust organically, serving as a meaningful bridge between public safety and the communities we are honored to support.

Here are some other highlights of the therapy dog initiative since last reported in December:

* Continuing Training and Community Events:

Trooper and I have attended not only CIT trainings around the state, but also TOR sponsored continuing skills training for K-9 therapy dogs and their handlers (meet at least once monthly). These trainings reinforce basic skills, provides tricks to acquiring more advanced techniques/approaches, and allows for team interacting events and site visits. Here's some highlights since last reported in December:

- Brookfield Zoo (December 2025)
- Worth Middle School – visit with district administrative staff/teachers (January 2026)
- Cicero High School - following a school/student tragedy (January 2026)
- CIT De-escalation/Conflict Resolution training (participant February 2026)
- 2026 Chicago Auto Show - (February 2026)
- Rochester High School – following a school/student tragedy (February 2026)
- Southern Illinois Criminal Justice Conference – promoting crisis response therapy dog initiative (February 2026)

I'm happy to share some updates to the implementation of the CIT crisis response therapy canine program. Since the Board formally adopted the parameters of the certification program this past December, Board staff, alongside our Cook County Sheriff's Office/Tails of Redemption partners have been making great strides. Here are just some of the major highlights:

- CIT Crisis Response Therapy Canine applications are now available on our webpage.
- The Ohio Attorney General's office saw we were successful in implementing a statewide therapy dog certification program and reached out for assistance/guidance as they are looking to do something similar.
- We have created a dedicated phone number and email address for law enforcement and their communities to reach out should they have a need for our statewide team to respond or visit their respective areas. The phone number will go to the Tails of Redemption staff, the email is monitored by ILETSB. This information, along with a

QR code and joint emblems will be put on a magnet and available to disseminate statewide by this summer.

- The first CIT Crisis Response Therapy Canine certification class is scheduled for April 20-22, 2026 in Cook County. We are using this initial class for our core group to ensure no adjustments in the training/curriculum need to be made. Our second round is scheduled for July 7-9, 2026.
- Discussions with Cook County Sheriff's office regarding the MOU have been initiated.

Girls – We Lead Initiative:

I'm happy to report that Deputy Director Williams and I have again been selected to participate as mentors in the Lieutenant Governor's Office: Girls – We Lead Initiative. Cheryllynn and I will host a high school student interested in leadership roles women hold in state government and the impact they have on Illinois. Participants will shadow their mentors for three days to learn about the policy issues that their respective office is working on and be as immersed as possible so that they can complete their required research paper. We are looking forward to meeting and assisting our mentee in the very near future. We will keep the Board apprised of this initiative.

CESSA:

Just a quick update to let you know that the CESSA statewide group continues to meet as well as the subcommittees. Progress is being made for implementation around the state; however, because of the enormous task at hand, a new legislative extension (via bill) has been submitted was approved to extend the deadline until July 2027. I will keep the Board apprised of substantive updates.

Along the same lines, the CESSA Training Subcommittee has approached the Board for assistance in creating an 8 hour in-person de-escalation course (including scenarios) for all PSAP's (public safety answering point). We are currently working on an Intergovernmental Agreement with the Department of Human Services to accomplish this task.

CIT and Mental Health Awareness Training and Resource Institute:

As the Board has been offering the basic CIT training since 2003 and various off-shoots of mental health training including the CIT series, Mental Health Awareness and Response – and Intro to CIT, peer support pilot programs, officer wellness, etc. we are looking to the future to the possibility of creating a CIT and Mental Health Awareness Training & Resource Institute – perhaps in conjunction with the 988/CESSA roll out. It is really just a larger defined umbrella to the works we are already doing including but not limited to:

- CIT training series for in-service

- Intro to CIT training in academies (CIT Concepts)
- CIT resources
- MHA and Response Training and Resources
- Peer support training and resources (model policies and best practices)
- Support pilot programs on peer support
- Officer wellness training and resources
- Resources for families of law enforcement officers
- Co-responder model policy and best practices
- Therapy/Comfort dog assistance – Tails of Redemption (TOR) through the Cook County Sheriff's Office and Operation TT through the PBPA
- Add on training for social workers, paramedics, fire and additional courses for dispatch (as allowed)
- De-escalation training by CIT Instructors
- Provide opportunities for ICAT training
- Summits/conferences (may also assist with training mandates)
- Increase awareness of resources via first responder app
- Become a repository for best practices statewide
- Create a reporting mechanism (to assist with getting federal funds)
- Ongoing research and curriculum updates/development

Although we have not yet begun on this initiative, as soon as the Board retains additional staff to help support such an extensive resource platform, we will move forward with this concept.

CIT Concepts for Academy:

Program Policies and One Day Curriculum

Approved: June 2022

Revised: March 2026

CIT Concepts for Academy:

Completed during the BLE academy training

This one-day training (6-7 hours) will be implemented at all Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board approved Academies.

This training is divided into 2 sections. The morning section consists of classroom instruction. The afternoon section involves group exercises and scenario training with the course instructor and a CIT Scenario Actor.

Instructor Requirements

The instructor for this section of the course should be CIT law enforcement personnel who has completed the state certified basic training and holds the required certification from the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board. This individual should have a minimum of 5 years' experience in law enforcement and a minimum of 3 years as an active CIT officer to instruct. This individual must also have instructed at the CIT Basic 40-hour course within the last year, and has been approved to evaluate the certified CIT role-play, and had done so for a minimum of one (1) year.

Student Performance Objectives

1. Introductions/House Keeping **(15 minutes)**
2. Define what CIT training is: **(15-30 minutes)**
 - a. Discuss the history of Illinois CIT building off the Memphis Model
 - i. ILETSB CIT Curriculum: Advanced/Refresher, Corrections, Juvenile, Dispatch, Veterans
 - ii. Number of ILETSB certified CIT Officers
 - iii. Same training throughout the state (makes Illinois unique)
 - iv. Requirements to be a CIT officer (Patrol requires 1 year as an officer)
 - v. Voluntary training- CIT officers have specific skill set
 - b. Overview of a CIT Program (training, community collaboration, system/agency partnerships, peer/family engagement)
 - c. Discuss the role of a CIT officer
3. Discuss collaboration of a CIT program/CIT officers **(45 minutes)**

 - i. Speaker is angry and frustrated by something
 - ii. Listener uses verbal and nonverbal communication to diffuse emotions

- iii. Exercise emphasizes power of nonverbal engaging communication (perception of time)
 - iv. Speaker talks about how it was hard to stay upset/frustrated
 - v. Listener talks about possibly feeling skills as being unnatural
 - d. Fourth exercise option using groups of 3
 - i. Two recruits begin talking about a mutually interested topic
 - ii. Third recruit uses a rolled-up piece of paper or posterboard to talk near the ear of one of the two recruits while they are talking
 - iii. Recruit with the rolled-up paper can make noise, respond to the conversation, or demand the recruit to do things
- 8. Scenario Role Play **(120-180 minutes)**
 - a. Instructor demonstrates nonverbal skills with a scenario actor
 - i. Discuss how these skills assist to “put out the fire” of the crisis
 - ii. Discuss distance
 - b. Instructor demonstrates verbal skills
 - i. Verbal skills of engagement and minimal encouragers
 - ii. Rapport building skills
 - 1. Open ended questions, tell me more statements, summary statements, emotional labeling
 - 2. Empathy Skills
 - a. Focus on what the message of the person’s story
 - b. Ability to align with the subject
 - 3. Influence/Partnering
 - c. Put the scenario all together in an example
 - i. Demonstrate a 5–7-minute scenario demonstrating the presented skills with discussion and feedback from the actor
 - d. Allow students to practice engagement skills
 - i. Use the improv style to rotate students in and out:
 - 1. Practice introduction
 - 2. Build on a scenario with start, stop, discussion and changing out students

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SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER (SRO) PROGRAM

March 2026 Quarterly Board Report

In the wake of multiple school tragedies, the Illinois General Assembly addressed the use of police personnel within the school setting by passing PA 100-984 in Spring of 2018. Beginning January 1, 2021, any officer serving in the role of School Resource Officer (SRO) must obtain a certificate by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board ("Board"). These SRO certificates are good for two (2) years before an officer/agency must reapply. Officers serving as SRO's must either complete specialized training developed through ILETSB and other stakeholders or attain a waiver by the Board.

To date since January 2021, the Board has provided a total of approximately 1793 new certificates to SROs throughout the state. Currently there are approximately 836 active SROs certified by ILETSB in the state. For this quarter the Board office processed approximately 45 new requests for certification and 60 requests for recertification.

As a new state fiscal year approaches, ILETSB and the SRO program are heading in a new path. Regionalized training for the 40-hour basic SRO course and the 16-hour SRO recertification course will be held regional throughout the state. Another new option will be that MTU 14 and SWIC Training Academy are going to host the 40-hour SRO basic course and the 16-hour SRO recertification course at SWIC and offer housing and food options, to aid in the cost of sending an officer for multiple days of training. These trainings are completely reimbursable by the MTU's from ILETSB, and there will be no fees charged to the department sending their officer to this training. The officer will have the option to stay onsite at SWIC and may chose a meal plan as well while there for training, again at no cost to the agency. If this seems to be a popular alternative for departments, ILETSB will expand this offering to the 40-hour Lead Homicide Investigator course and the 32-hour Juvenile Officer course as well.

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STATE CERTIFIED CRASH RECONSTRUCTION SPECIALIST PROGRAM

March 2026 Quarterly Board Report

In September 1986 the Illinois Law Enforcement Training & Standards Board adopted a formal Crash Reconstruction program, in order to validate the professional expertise of individuals engaging in crash reconstruction in Illinois.

This program requires that an applicant complete specific training programs from vendors that are certified by the Board. Upon completion of these courses an application is submitted to Board staff for review. If the application is approved, the applicant is required to take and pass all three parts of a state exam with a score of 70% or better. Finally, upon recommendation of the Manager of Specialized Programs the individuals will be approved for certification by the Board.

The following individuals have successfully completed all portions of the certification exam and Board staff recommends these 28 individuals be approved, as Board certified as Crash Reconstruction Specialist.

The Lead Homicide Investigator (LHI) program continues to grow. Since ILETSB began tracking LHI certification and recertification in January 2012 there have been 16,329 officers approved or waived for the LHI program. Currently there are 4,911 active LHI certified officers in the state of Illinois.

March 2026 Quarterly Board Report

Ryan Snow, Manager of Basic and Part-Time Training

This report provides an update on the basic and part-time training for the Basic Law Enforcement, Basic Corrections Officer, and Court Security Officer programs. The data presented was acquired in the second quarter of FY26 (Oct-Dec '25). Information was limited by the timeframe between the manager's start date and the availability of reports. More information is expected to be developed for the Board meetings scheduled for later this year.

Introduction

New Manager of Basic and Part-Time Training

It is my great pleasure to introduce myself as the newly hired Manager of Basic and Part-Time Training. I am coming to the ILETSB Training Division from the University of Illinois Police Department, where I served in a sworn capacity. I entered law enforcement in 2010 and served many assignments, including drug task force, detective, Field Training Officer, Drug Recognition Expert Instructor, and Strategies and Tactics Instructor. During my time serving the University, I also served as the primary instructor for Standardized Field Sobriety Testing and the co-instructor for Introduction to Drug Enforcement for all recruits attending the Police Training Institute in Champaign. Through my work as a Drug Recognition Expert Instructor, I had the opportunity to teach classes at many MTU locations and several academies. My passion for training and development has led me to pursue a Doctorate in Education, in the Education, Policy, and Organization Leadership program at the University of Illinois. My research focuses on the skills transferred to recruits as they progress through the academy setting. It is my goal to promote best training practices so we can provide the safest and most advanced training to all law enforcement officers in the state of Illinois. I am confident I will ensure that the Board's mission is carried out by everyone involved in the training process.

Updates

New Academy Director

The Suburban Law Enforcement Academy completed a search to fill the Director role and selected Chief Michael Zegadlo, who began his appointment on February 23. Director Zegadlo has years of diverse experience in law enforcement and most recently served as the Chief of Police for the Lewis University Police Department. Director Zegadlo completed the School of Police Staff and Command at the Northwestern Center for Public Safety. He also holds a Master's Degree in Leadership Studies

from Lewis University. We look forward to working with him to maintain the high level of education provided by SLEA.

Course Completion

A total of 10 Basic Law Enforcement (BLE) classes completed instruction during this reporting period. 576 recruits enrolled in the training; 523 completed the training in good standing and obtained certification. This describes a 90.8% success rate of officers seeking certification. In addition, 5 Basic Correctional Officer (BCO) classes were completed. 218 recruits enrolled in the training; 203 completed the training in good standing and obtained certification. This describes a 93.1% success rate of officers seeking certification.

Academy Audit Process

Work continues to ensure all law enforcement academies in the state of Illinois deliver training that meets statutory and curriculum requirements of the Board. This effort confirms all training is conducted in a manner that reflects the Board’s mission to deliver knowledge and skills that reflect the highest standards of professionalism, accountability, and operational readiness. Creating a more robust and transparent auditing framework enhances training consistency, reinforces best practices, and develops highly prepared and ethically grounded law enforcement officers throughout Illinois. It is the goal of the Board to implement a process that supports the academies' efforts and provides them with the resources necessary to develop professional law enforcement officers.

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Information Services Board Report – 1st Quarter – March-2026

ILETSB In-House Applications:

Development Steering Committee meetings are conducted on a regular basis with ILETSB Departmental & Affiliate Representation for opportunity to provide input of functional improvements, reporting provisions and legal requirements of the applications – With the expansion of Technical Services and the anticipation of new Board Applications, plans are being made to incorporate an additional programmer to the Development Team

PTB/LEDI:

PTB is utilized internally to provide records management to ILETSB Staff in the areas of basic training, specialized certification, Professional Conduct records, and data reports for officers and their agencies - LEDI serves as a document records submission portal, to assist agencies in reviewing and maintaining compliance with legal requirements to State of Illinois mandates – LEDI Mandate Reports have been updated to track when First Hourly Mandate Classes have past expiration - Development of the applications continue with regular improvements and feature enhancements

LETM:

Law Enforcement Training Management (LETM) development continues with weekly meetings and the incorporation of recommended modifications and enhancements – The application is near completion of a full re-write - Through the efforts of review and development, a restructure of the application will provide enhanced functionality and a more intuitive end-user experience – Targeted development includes Instructors/Classes, Active/Inactive Filters and an extensive analysis to ensure the inclusion of existing reporting and functional services – Testing with ILETSB Staff and MTU Personnel continues with favorable acceptance - The updated version of the application is anticipated to Go-Live the last week of February 2026

Officer Portal:

Provides Officers with the opportunity to review their own Law Enforcement Records and Training Requirements - The Portal now supports more than 34,000 registered accounts, which is more than 85% of Active Law Enforcement Officers throughout the State of Illinois - With the integration of the Professional Conduct Database, individuals are able to review and respond to Professional Conduct Reports Electronically – Mandate Expiration notices are sent weekly to Officers to provide advance notice of Mandates that will expire within 60-days - Hard Copy notifications regarding training, certification status and complaints are also provided to the officer's personal mailing address – The Officer Verification Process, which is required on a 3-year recurring mandate, has been implemented with notifications disseminated to applicable Law Enforcement Officers – To date, 9,000+ Officers have utilized the new Verification

Process - Review and development of the Portal is on-going in conjunction with the PTB-LEDI applications.

ILETSB In-House Applications: (Continued)

Legal Hearing System:

Developed for tracking and storing the documentation of hearings pertaining to Officer reactivation and decertification – With additional reporting needs identified, development and end-user testing continues – Go-Live and full utilization is slated for early 2026

CIT Therapy Dog Tracking:

Created to track the certification State of Illinois Therapy Dogs and their handlers – Mailings and Registration for the portal went Live on February 4 2026 – Regular Development discovery dialogues are on-going to identify application requirements and enhancements

InformaCast - Emergency Event Notification System:

Information Services Staff are working alongside DoIT and Vendor to incorporate an advanced Emergency Notification System to provide ILETSB Staff with real-time alerts regarding emergency events, safety concerns and weather-related issues - These notifications will be provided via Audible Broadcast, Cellular and eMail Services - The project is near completion and is anticipated to Go-Live in February 2026

On-Line Testing:

The first year of On-Line Testing for State of Illinois Law Enforcement Candidates and Officers has completed with over 3,500 Tests successfully conducted – Testing locations have expanded beyond the ILETSB Chicago and Springfield Facilities to include our Partner MTUs and Academy Facilities - Testing Site additions have provided Candidates with the opportunity to complete their testing based on proximity to convenient Training Locations – Review of testing services continues to identify potential enhancement, performance & security features

Network & Security Services:

New Production Servers for Web and Database upgrades have been established in anticipation of migrating to the new Server Environment – The initial stages of implementing Windows Server 2025 has been completed to accommodate future Server upgrades – The ILETSB Web-Site is undergoing Federally Mandated ADA Compliance Requirements – It is expected the Site will be fully compliant in advance of the April 27, 2026 due date - Incorporation of Microsoft's Enterprise Configuration Management (ECM) Services and Cisco's Identity Services Engine (ISE) Management Software have both improved infrastructure reliability and provided insight into the network's digital traffic and potential vulnerabilities –Upgrades to both Firewall and VPN Services are scheduled to improve security and performance - Additional Virtual Clusters and Distributed Switching have been created on internal and external environments, which will allow the transfer of servers between environments with minimal downtime – The Information Team is working to implement a remote assistance application to provide staff with virtual Helpdesk Services to minimize the need for in-person resolution and remote Server Administration

Data Services:

Additional Services are being identified and implemented to accommodate the changing operational needs of ILET SB's Technical provisions – Evidentiary Intake, Legal Hearing Proceedings and Digital Document Archiving will require significant capacity requirements for storage and backup purposes – Information Services continues to review, manage and implement the Data Storage Services based on priority and need - With the implementation of the Data Storage Expansion, future Back-Up Services will provide real-time synchronization and preservation of ILET SB Databanks - Active Directory Service restructuring has streamlined data collaboration and availability – Departmental Data Mapping is reviewed regularly to provide the most efficient back-up and restoration capabilities in the event of a catastrophic failure or compromised data

Chicago Office:

Several projects continue at the ILET SB Chicago Office

- ILET SB continues to work with CMS Property Services on implementation of Security Cameras & Door Badging - The process is currently with CMS Project Management with updated expectation that completion will occur prior to close of FY26
- AV Hardware for two Testing and Meeting Rooms are in process of procurement to accommodate the needs for Trainings, Testing & Legal Hearing Proceedings - ILET SB is working in conjunction with Vendor and DoIT Services for fulfillment by end of FY26
- Cellular Extenders are to be installed at the facility to enhance Telecom Services for Staff and Guests – To be completed FY27

Disaster Recovery/Contingency Planning:

Information Services is conducting a review and re-write of its current Disaster Recovery Plan (DRP) - In the event of Catastrophic Failure or Cyber-Compromised Events, future protocols will include the synchronous data integration of the Springfield and Chicago Offices for redundancy and Off-Site Storage of data preservation and restoration – Updated redundant Power Supply Services are slated to be implemented in the Chicago Office to offer a more reliable provision of power to essential Network and Data Services in the event of a power-loss
