Introduction

This 2025 Body Worn Camera Report contains a summary of departments that submitted body worn camera program reports to the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB). Each department overview includes narrative information and data provided by the department. Visual charts identify the ten (10) most frequent charges related to incidents; a single incident may have multiple charges. Departments reporting less than five (5) charges exclude visual charts. ILETSB is the repository for department reports.

Three hundred eleven (311) law enforcement departments submitted the Body Worn Camera Program reports for the period of January 1, 2025, to December 31, 2025, up from two hundred fifty-eight (258) last year. Categorically, Illinois Commerce Commission, Illinois Conservation, Illinois Department of Revenue, Illinois Office of the State Fire Marshal (OSFM) Division of Arson Investigation, Metropolitan Water Reclamation District, four (4) forest preserve district, twenty-three (23) campus law enforcement departments, thirty-two (32) sheriff's offices, and two hundred forty-seven (247) municipal law enforcement departments submitted reports.

In 2025, the Camera Grant Program continued its commitment to supporting community safety by providing \$3.2 million in grant awards to 125 agencies statewide. These funds helped local law enforcement partners build capacity, strengthen services, and advance innovative approaches that meet the needs of the communities they serve. The program provided reimbursement grants that supported the purchase or lease of officer-worn body cameras for law enforcement officers and data storage related to officer-worn cameras as well as training for officers in the operation of the cameras.

That year, the program also focused on improving access and support for potential applicants. To make the grant process more transparent and approachable, the ILETSB Grant's team introduced interactive technical assistance sessions, giving applicants the opportunity to ask questions, receive real-time guidance and better understand program requirements. These sessions helped applicants strengthen proposals and feel more confident navigating the process – which now includes advance funding options - resulting in nearly 200 applications requesting almost \$38 million in FY26 funding.

The continued growth and success of the Camera Grant Program reflect ILETSB's commitment to supporting law enforcement agencies with the resources they need to enhance transparency, strengthen public trust, and improve officer and community safety throughout Illinois.

Executive Summary

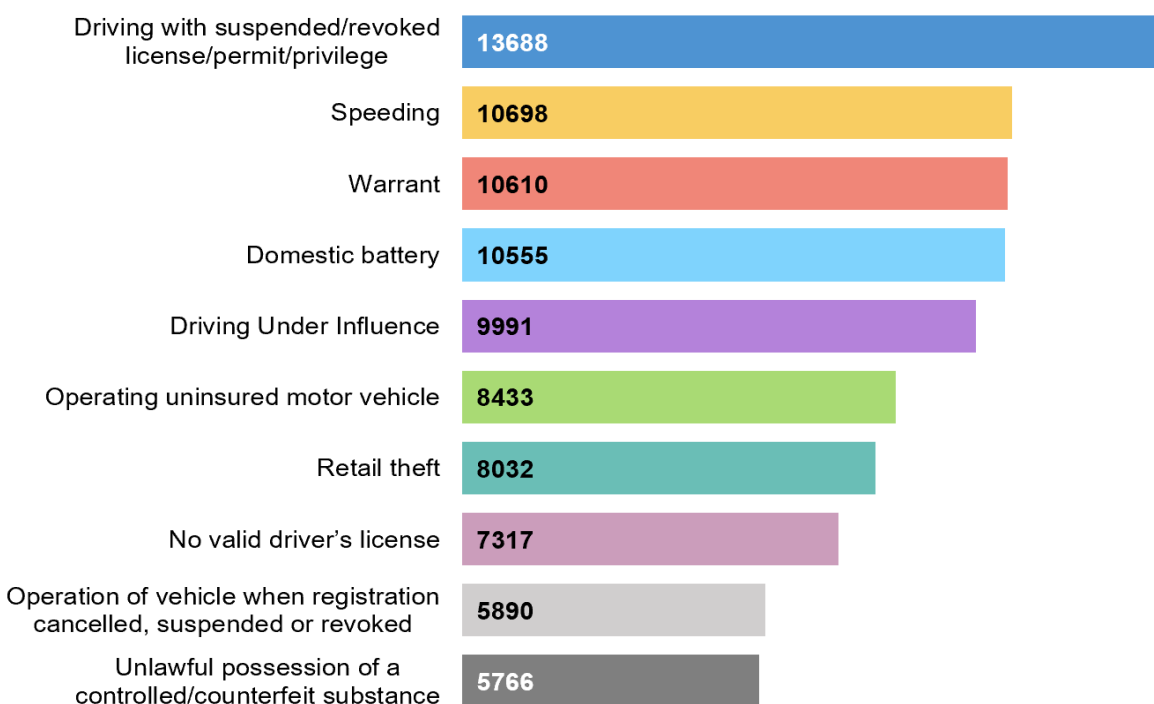
Section 10-25 of the Illinois Law Enforcement Officer-Worn Body Camera Act requires all law enforcement agencies utilizing body worn cameras are required to submit annual reports. Departments must provide a brief overview of their agency, including the number of officers in the department, the number of body worn cameras in use, and the number of officers who use those cameras. Agencies must also report any technical issues with the equipment and how those issues were remedied, a brief description of the review process used by supervisors within the law enforcement agency, and any other information relevant to the administration of the program. 50 ICLS 706/10-25.

Common technical issues include battery failures, charging and docking issues, connectivity and synchronization problems, video and audio quality issues, recording failures, incorrect retention or labeling of recordings, and general equipment malfunctions. Departments may list remedies for the issues. Departments report their review policies on body worn camera footage. Some agencies periodically review recorded footage for equipment performance analysis and others incorporate these recordings into officer evaluations.

Agencies that receive ILETSB Camera Grant Funds must also report all incidents in which camera recordings were used in the prosecution of an offense. 50 ICLS 707/20.

When applicable, this comprehensive report counts and lists incidents and offenses charged as reflected in the agency submissions. Please note, one (1) incident may contain multiple offenses charged. Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, two hundred (200) departments submitted incident and offense data, reporting one hundred thirty-five thousand three hundred ten (135,310) incidents that resulted in one hundred seventy-four thousand nine hundred sixty (174,960) offenses being charged. (Incident data were not submitted by one hundred eleven (111) departments.) Fifty-two percent (52%) of the offenses charged were the following ten (10) offenses:

Department Overview – Addison Police Department

Addison Police Department consists of sixty-seven (67) officers who utilize sixty-seven (67) Axon body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Addison Police Department reports that the body worn cameras with issues were replaced by Axon. The department does not provide specific details of the issues.

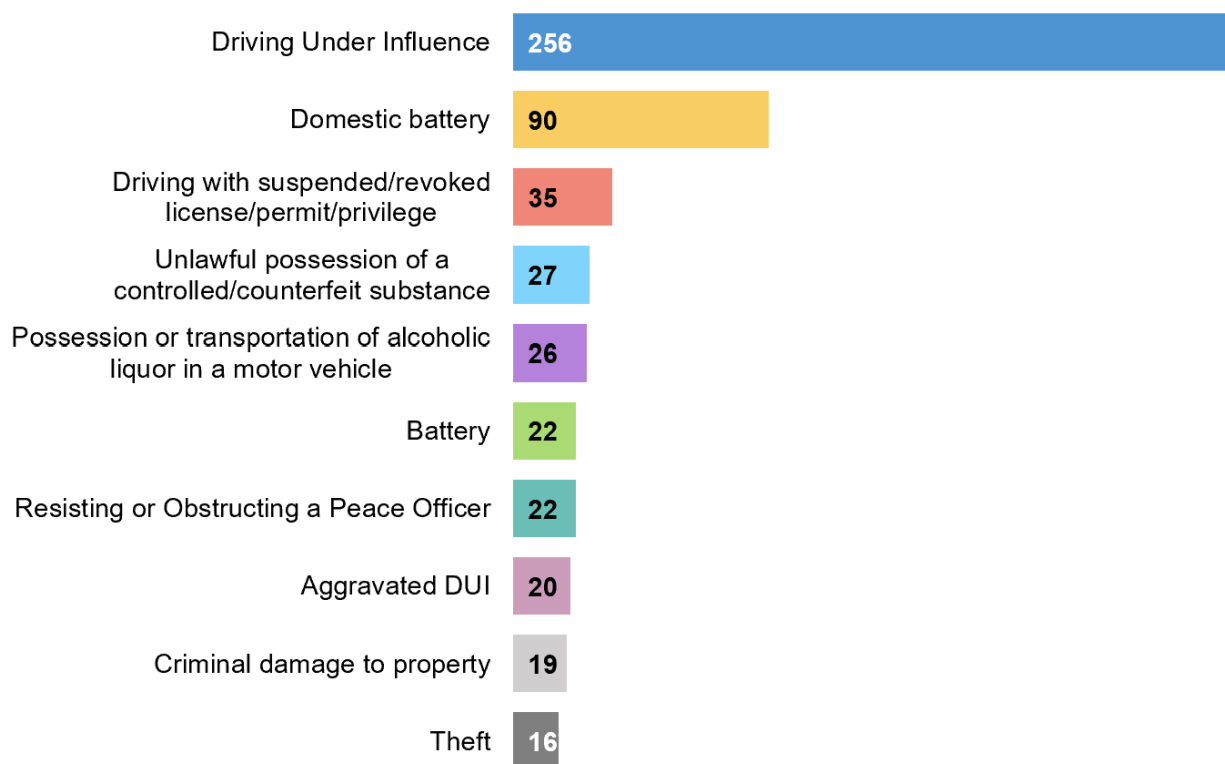
Review Process

Addison Police Department's every sergeant conduct, at a minimum, one (1) documented review of the body worn camera for each officer under his/her command at least twice a year and record their observations using the body worn camera software. If additional action is taken, the supervisor makes the appropriate notification through the chain of command. The review of an incident is added to the officer's evaluation/training file for his/her annual evaluation.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Addison Police Department reports five hundred thirteen (513) incidents leading to seven hundred forty (740) offenses charged. Below is a snapshot of the greatest frequency of offenses charged.

Department Overview – Aledo Police Department

Aledo Police Department consists of nine (9) full-time officers who utilize an Axon Body 4 body worn camera each.

Aledo Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

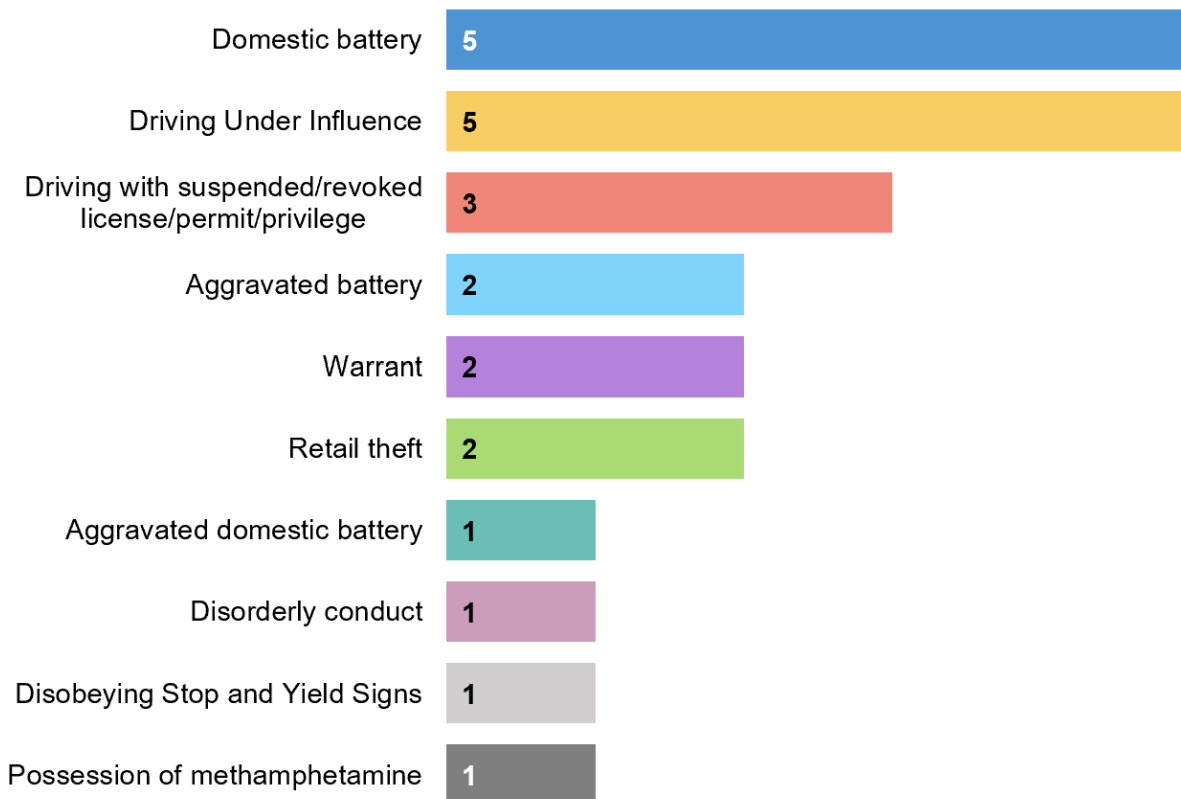
Review Process

Aledo Police Department's supervisors are authorized to review relevant recordings any time they are investigating alleged misconduct or reports of meritorious conduct, or whenever such recordings would be beneficial in reviewing a member's performance.

Algonquin Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

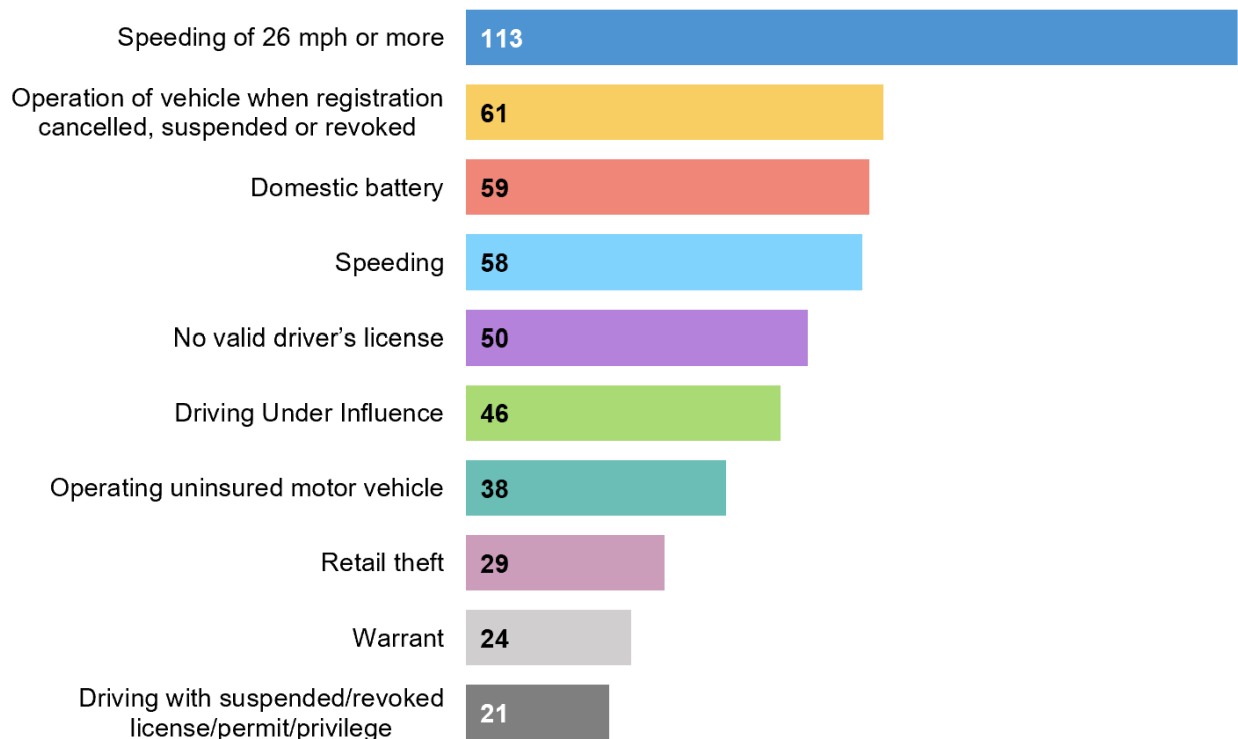
Review Process

Algonquin Police Department's supervisors are authorized to review relevant recordings any time they are investigating alleged misconduct or reports of meritorious conduct or whenever such recordings would be beneficial in reviewing a member's performance. The supervisor of the recording member document in the report or other documentation, if the supervisor or the recording member reviewed body worn camera recordings prior to completing the report or other documentation.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Algonquin Police Department reports four hundred twenty-four (424) incidents leading to seven hundred fifty-one (751) offenses charged. Below is a snapshot of the greatest frequency of offenses charged.

Department Overview – Alsip Police Department

Alsip Police Department consists of forty-four (44) sworn officers who utilize forty-four (44) Axon Body 3 body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Alsip Police Department reports minor issues with body worn cameras. The issues encountered were the replacement of a body camera due to a cracked screen. The issue was quickly resolved and replaced by Axon.

Review Process

Alsip Police Department's supervisors are authorized to review relevant recordings where they are investigating alleged misconduct or reports of meritorious service that would require the review of said footage. Supervisors review at least one (1) body worn camera video from each officer on their shift each month for a traffic stop or a call for service. The reviews are completed to ensure proper functioning of the body worn camera and proper recording per the department's policy.

Incidents

Alsip Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Alton Police Department

Alton Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

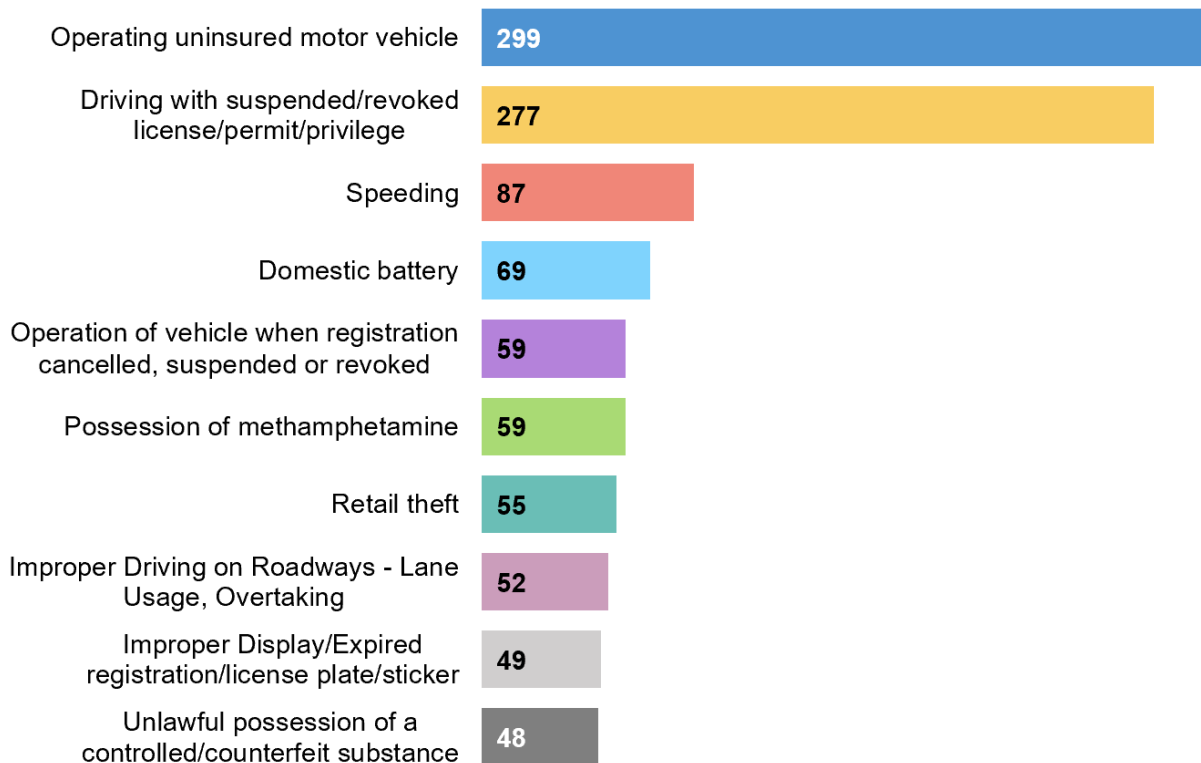
Review Process

Anna Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

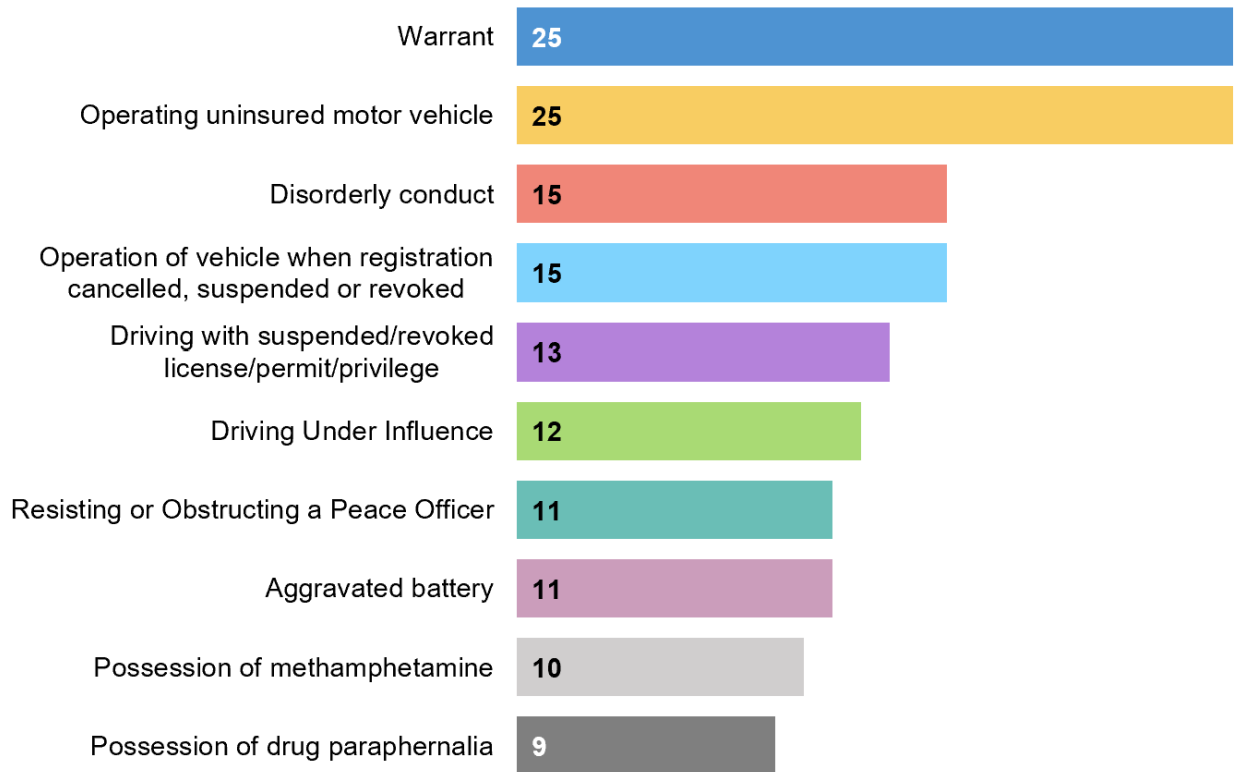
Review Process

Anna Police Department's command staff or a designee reviews all body worn camera videos that contain any use of force to ensure adherence to laws and policy. Other videos are reviewed at random or when complaints arise.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Anna Police Department reports one hundred forty-nine (149) incidents leading to two hundred eighty-eight (288) offenses charged. Below is a snapshot of the greatest frequency of offenses charged.

Department Overview – Antioch Police Department

Antioch Police Department consists of twenty-eight (28) sworn members who utilize twenty-four (24) Axon body worn cameras. The department maintains four (4) body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Antioch Police Department reports one (1) technical issue related to saved Panasonic body worn camera videos not being able to be viewed. It was found to be an SSL certificate error, which was fixed by technical support.

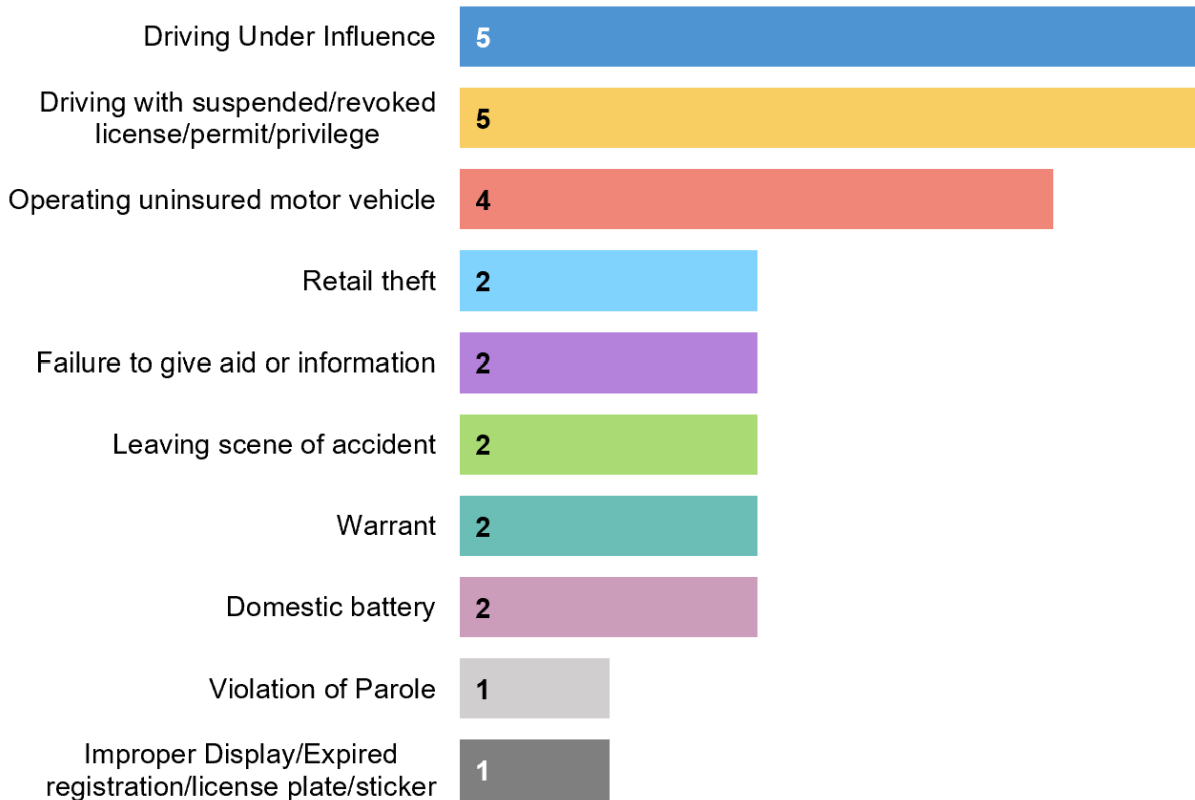
Review Process

Antioch Police Department's shift supervisors quarterly review random body worn camera videos from each officer under their command to ensure proper activation and tagging, for clarification purposes, in case of citizen complaints, field training etc.

Incidents

Between November 4, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Antioch Police Department reports thirty (30) incidents leading to thirty-one (31) offenses charged. Below is a snapshot of the greatest frequency of offenses charged.

Department Overview – Arcola Police Department

Arcola Police Department consists of seven (7) full-time police officer and two (2) part-time police officers who utilize ten (10) body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Arcola Police Department reports minor software technical issues with body worn cameras. These software issues were resolved by calling support over the phone and having installers of the system work on the system themselves.

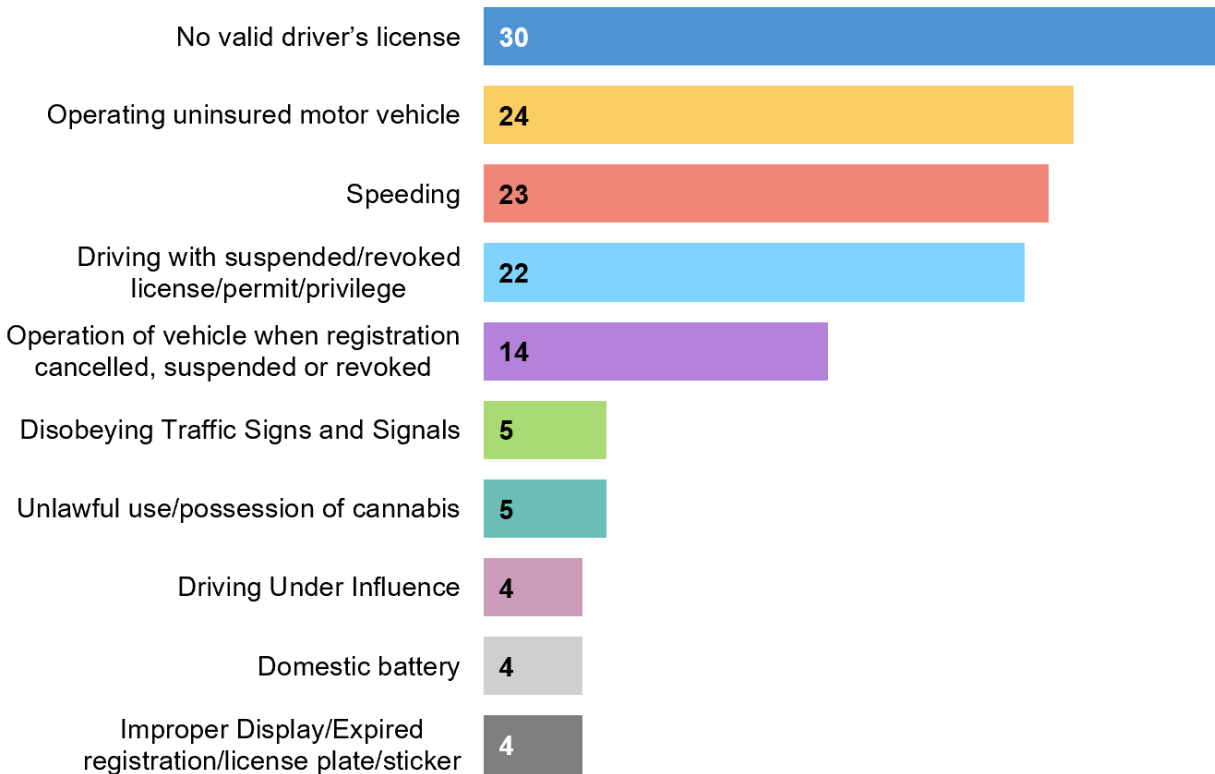
Review Process

Arcola Police Department's supervisors review relevant body worn camera recordings through Video Manager Software any time such recordings would be beneficial in reviewing an officer's performance.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Arcola Police Department reports one hundred sixty-five (165) incidents leading to one hundred sixty-eight (168) offenses charged. Below is a snapshot of the greatest frequency of offenses charged.

Arlington Heights Police Department consists of one hundred forty (140) full-time employees, including one hundred ten (110) sworn police officers and thirty (30) civilian personnel. All sworn officers are issued a body worn camera each.

Technical Issues

Arlington Heights Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

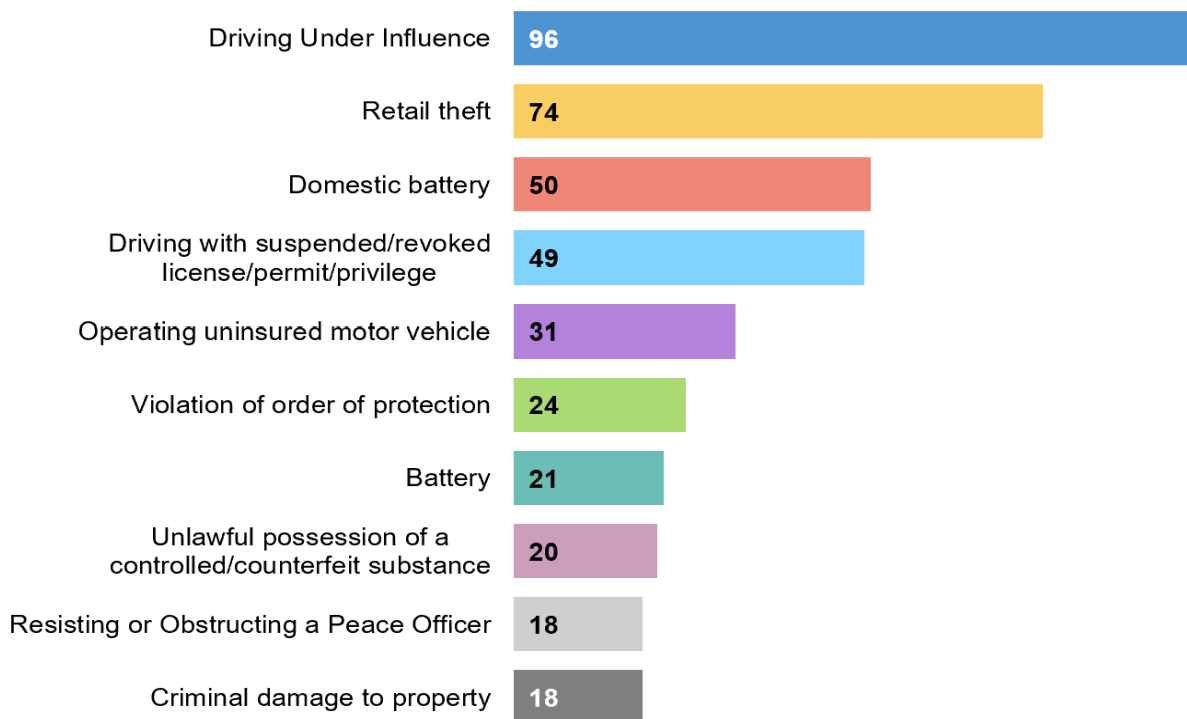
Review Process

Arlington Heights Police Department's supervisors randomly review at least one (1) body worn camera recording per officer assigned under their command monthly to ensure that the equipment is operating properly and that officers are using the cameras appropriately and in accordance with policy and training. The selection of recordings is conducted in an impartial manner that promotes an equitable review of recordings from all officers under the supervisor's chain of command. Supervisors review relevant body cameras recordings at any time to include when investigating alleged misconduct, reports of meritorious conduct or whenever such recordings would be beneficial in reviewing an officer's performance.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Arlington Heights Police Department reports four hundred eight (408) incidents leading to six hundred thirty-nine (639) offenses charged. Below is a snapshot of the greatest frequency of offenses charged.

Department Overview – Athens Police Department

Athens Police Department consists of the Chief of Police, one (1) Patrol Sergeant, three (3) patrol officers, one (1) full-time School Resource Officer, two (2) part-time School Resource Officers, and five (5) part-time officers who utilize nine (9) Axon body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Athens Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

Review Process

Athens Police Department's Patrol Sergeant and Chief of Police review a taped event of each officer at least once every sixty-day (60) period. Thus, each officer should have at least one review in any given sixty-day (60) period, commencing with the full implementation of the policy. Supervisors use these reviews as a quality control measure. Following such a review, the supervisor holds a meeting with the officer and provides the officer with either positive reinforcement or constructive criticism with respect to the stop reviewed. Constructive criticism may relate to officer safety issues, demeanor, policy issues or legal issues related to the stop as well as any other supervisory observation related to performance.

Incidents

Athens Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Aurora Police Department

Aurora Police Department consists of three hundred thirty-eight (338) sworn officers who utilize an Axon body worn camera each.

Technical Issues

Aurora Police Department reports few technical issues, with only a handful of cameras needing to be sent back for repairs/replacement. Additionally, several fleet cameras and a couple of hubs required return and replacement due to equipment issues.

Review Process

Aurora Police Department utilizes built-in software in Axon's evidence.com, called Axon Performance, to review body worn camera footage of officers and supervisors to ensure their proper use and performance. The software is set to automatically select one (1) random video for each officer in a squad for monthly review. A supervisor above the officer/supervisor creating the video is responsible for these reviews. Any deficiencies in how the camera is utilized, worn, and functions, are documented and then an email is directed to the officer or supervisor for correction.

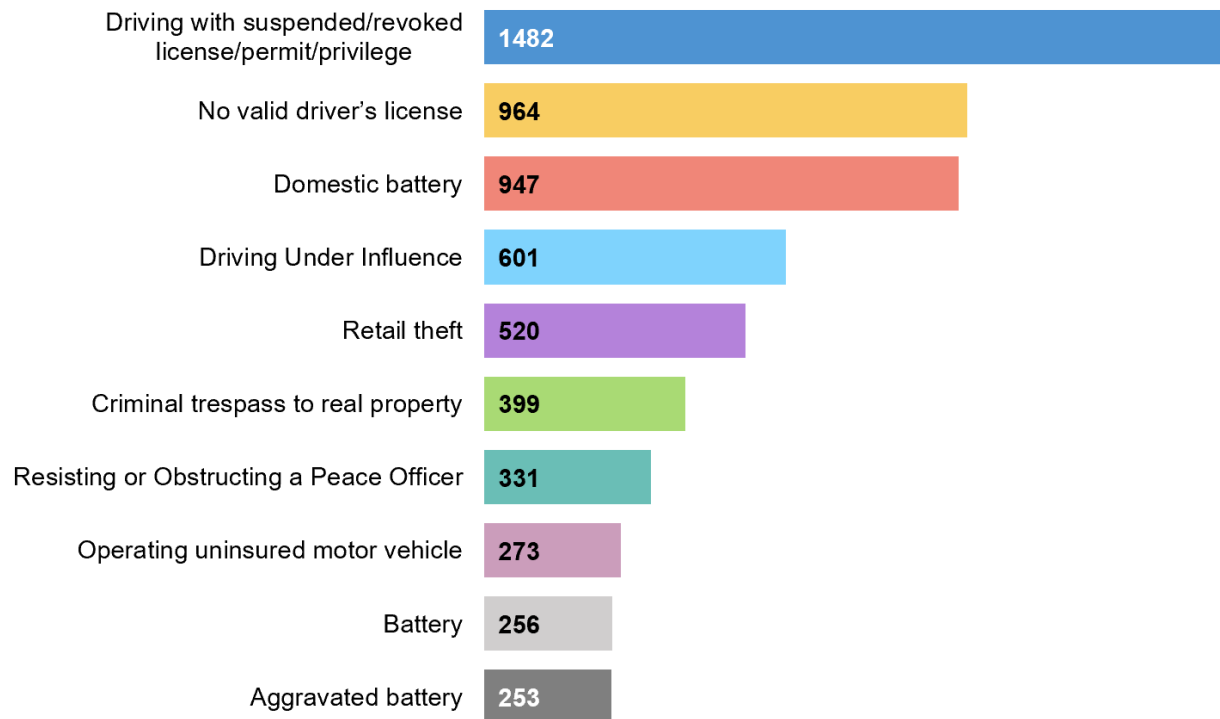
Supervisors do not review recordings to search for violations of policy or law not related to a specific complaint or incident. Supervisors may, per policy, review body worn camera footage for the following: formal or informal complaint, or encounter could result in a complaint, use of force encounters, as corroboration of evidence of misconduct, or viewed to correct substandard performance or highlight commendatory performance.

Incidents

The Chief of Police reviews the Deputy Chief's body worn camera data in the same manner, with monthly audit reporting.

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Aurora University Police Department reports two (2) incidents leading to two (2) offenses charged including Criminal trespass to real property and Warrant arrest.

Department Overview – Barrington Hills Police Department

Barrington Hills Police Department utilizes nineteen (19) Axon body worn cameras. The department does not provide details of the number of officers.

Technical Issues

Barrington Hills Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

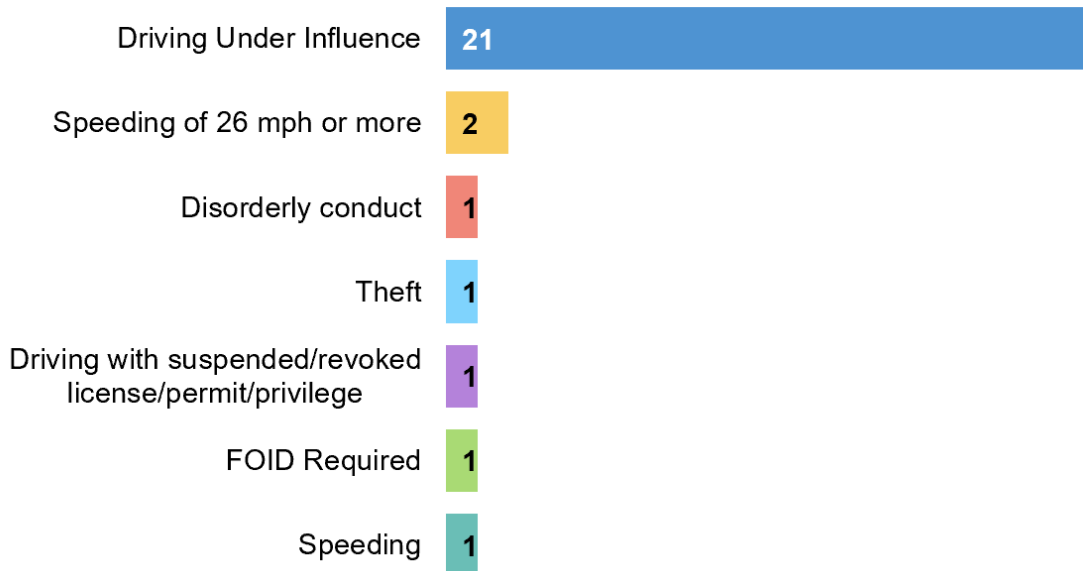
Review Process

Barrington Hills Police Department's supervisor reviews randomly selected body worn camera videos of each person by the performance module of Evidence.com monthly.

Incidents

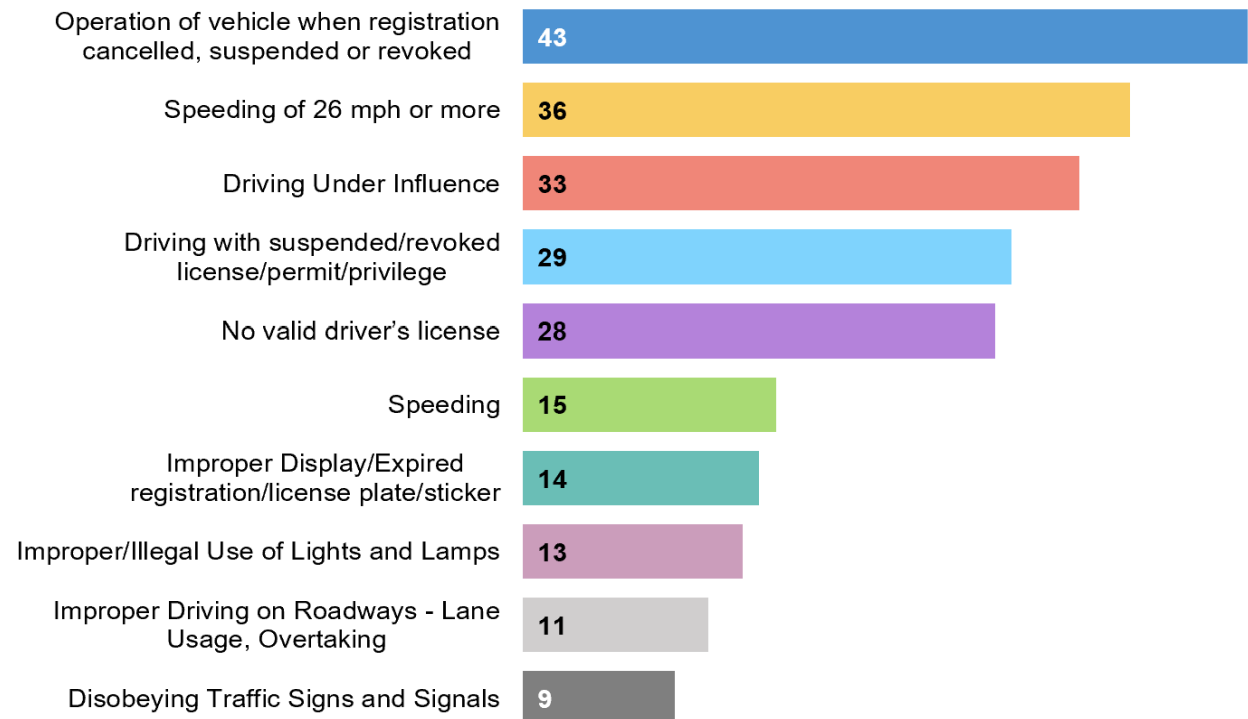

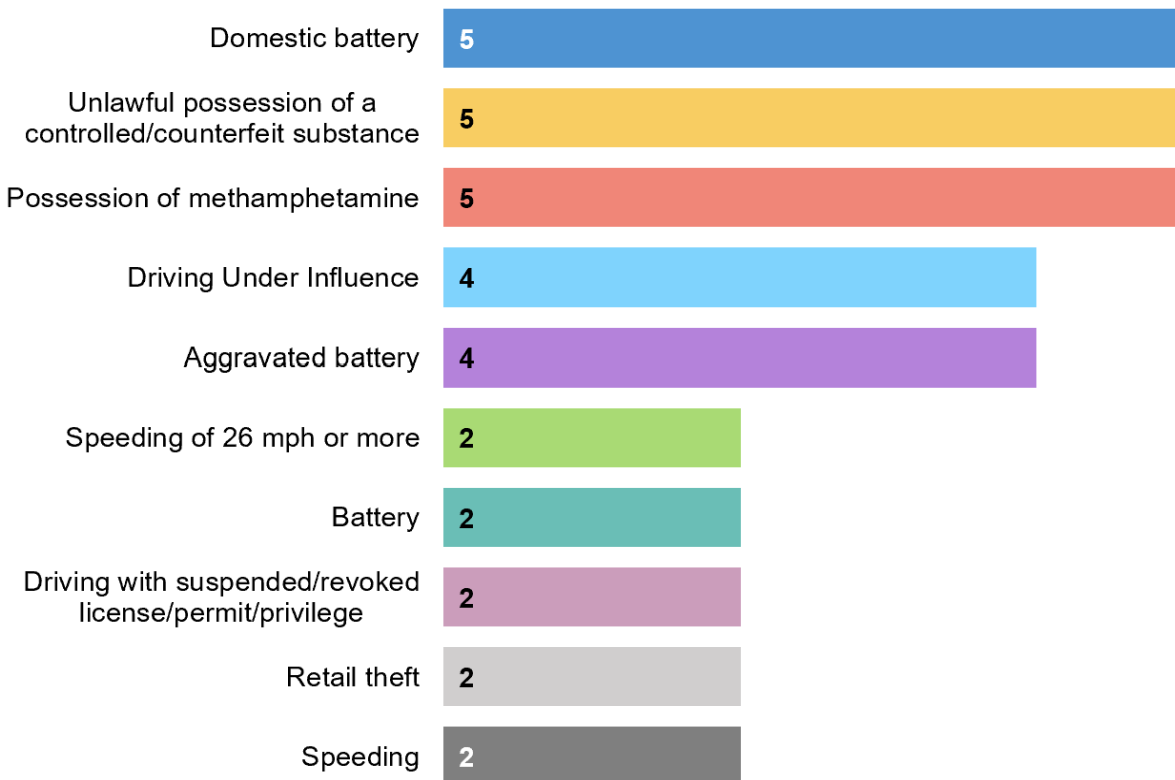

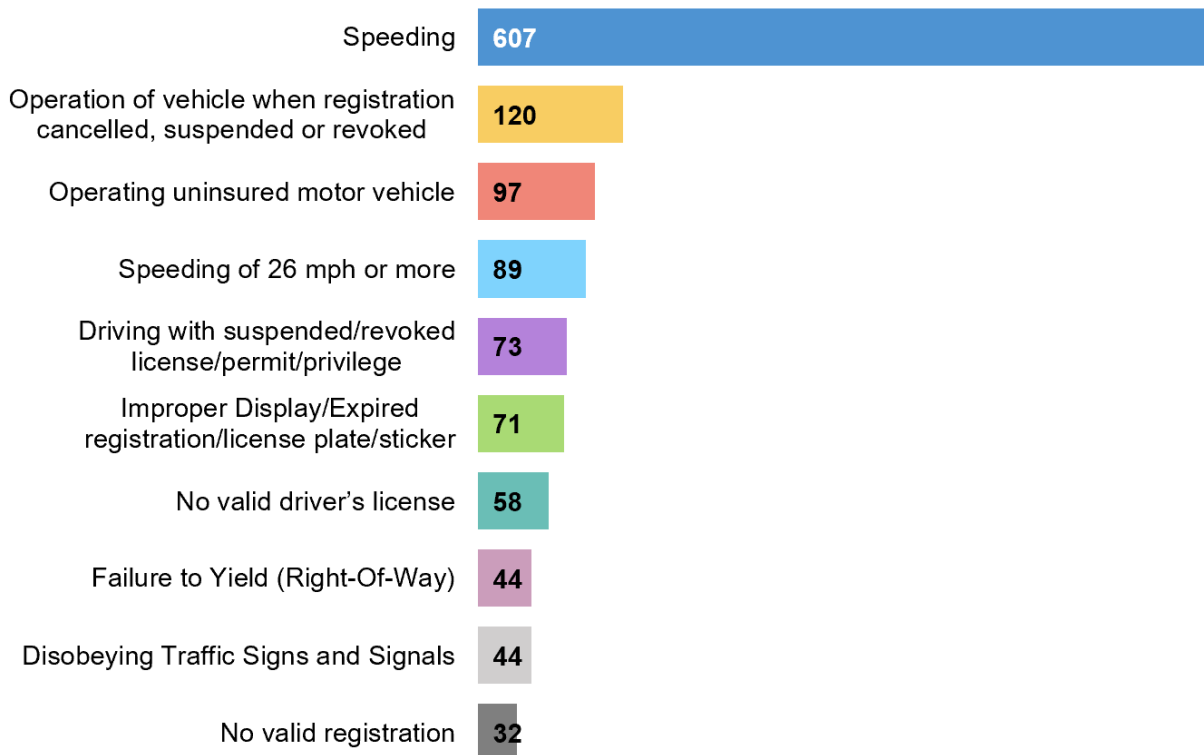

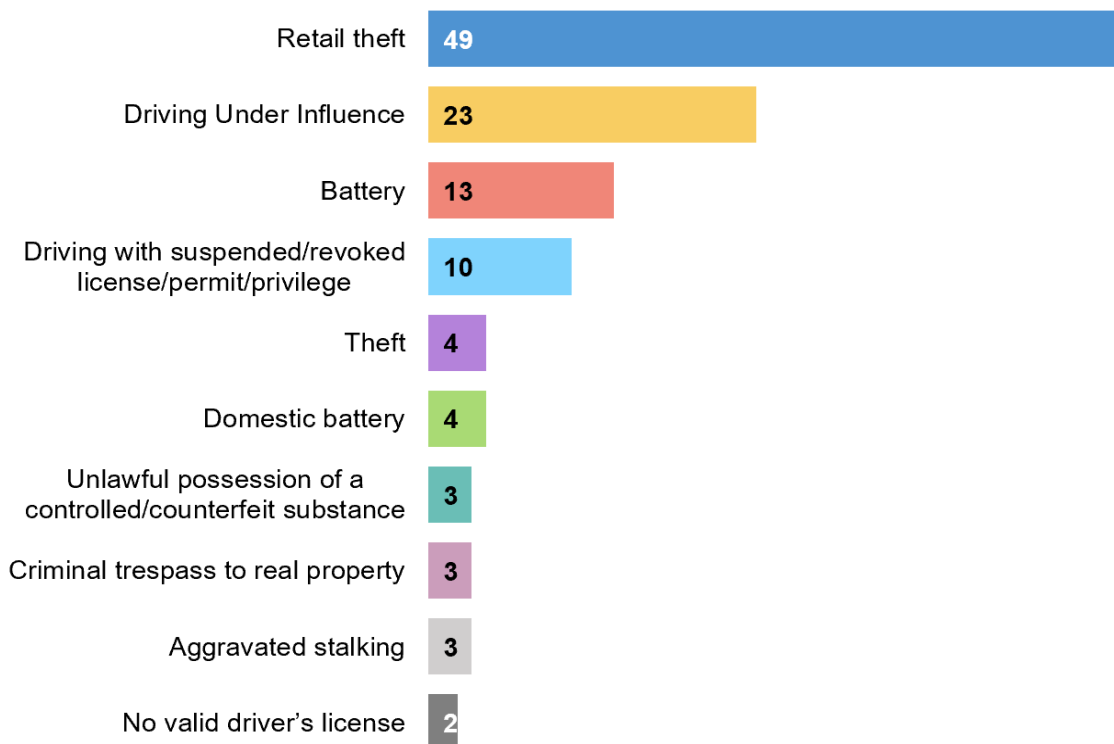

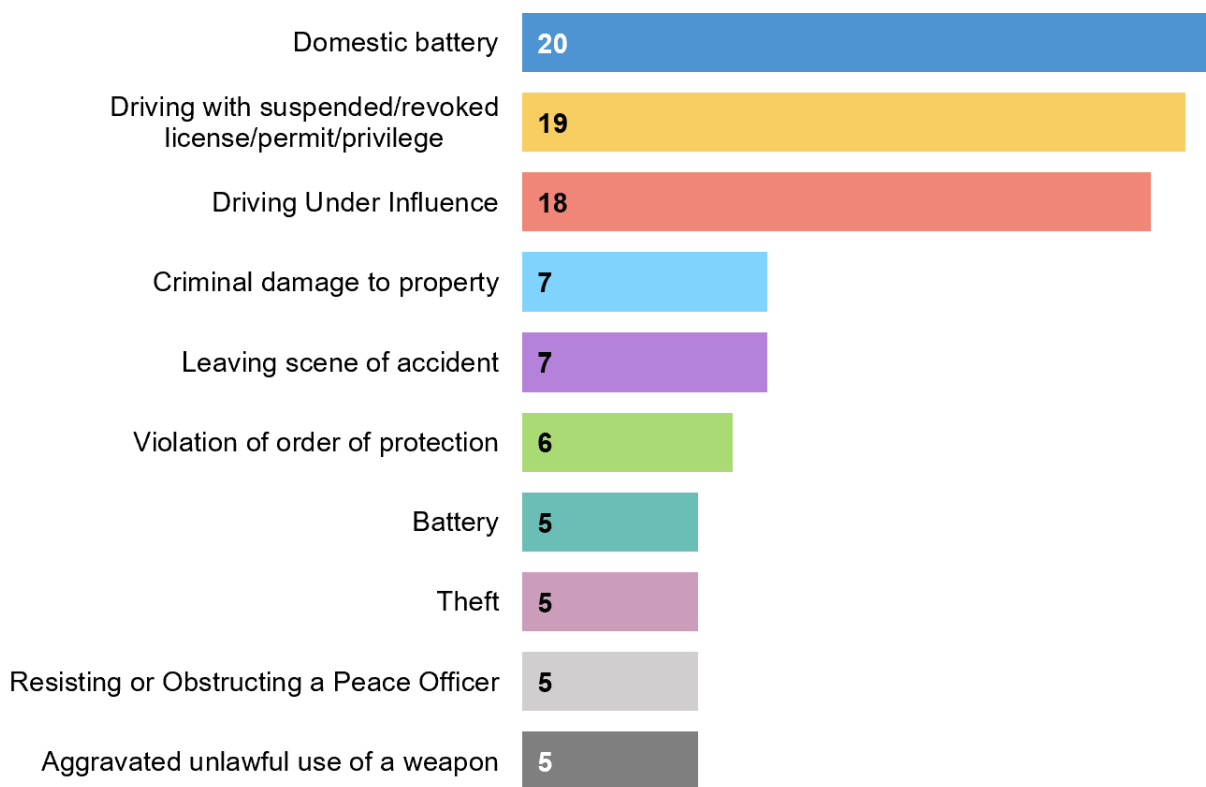

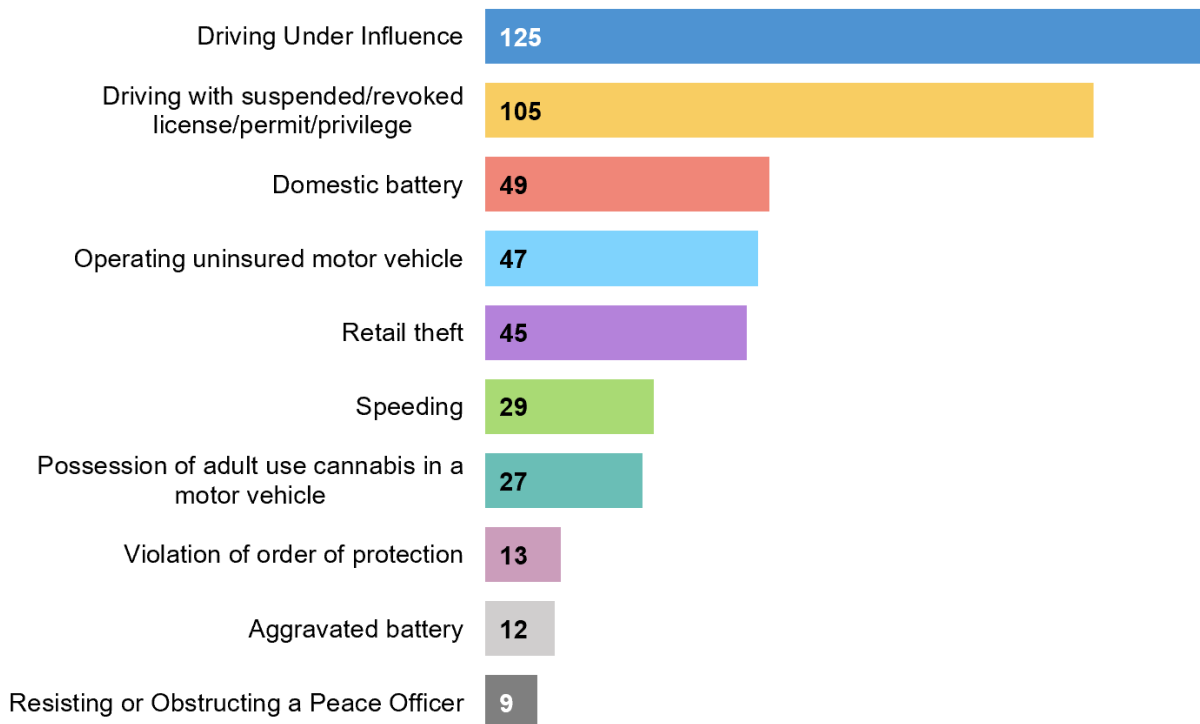

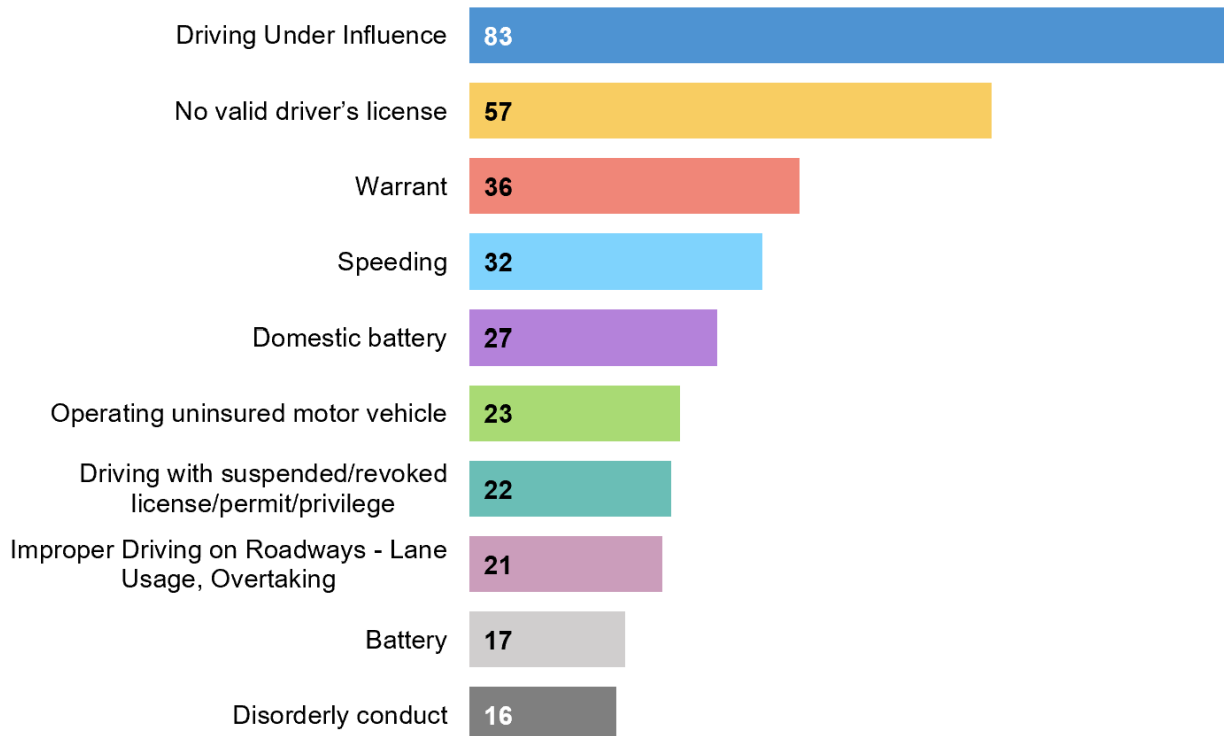

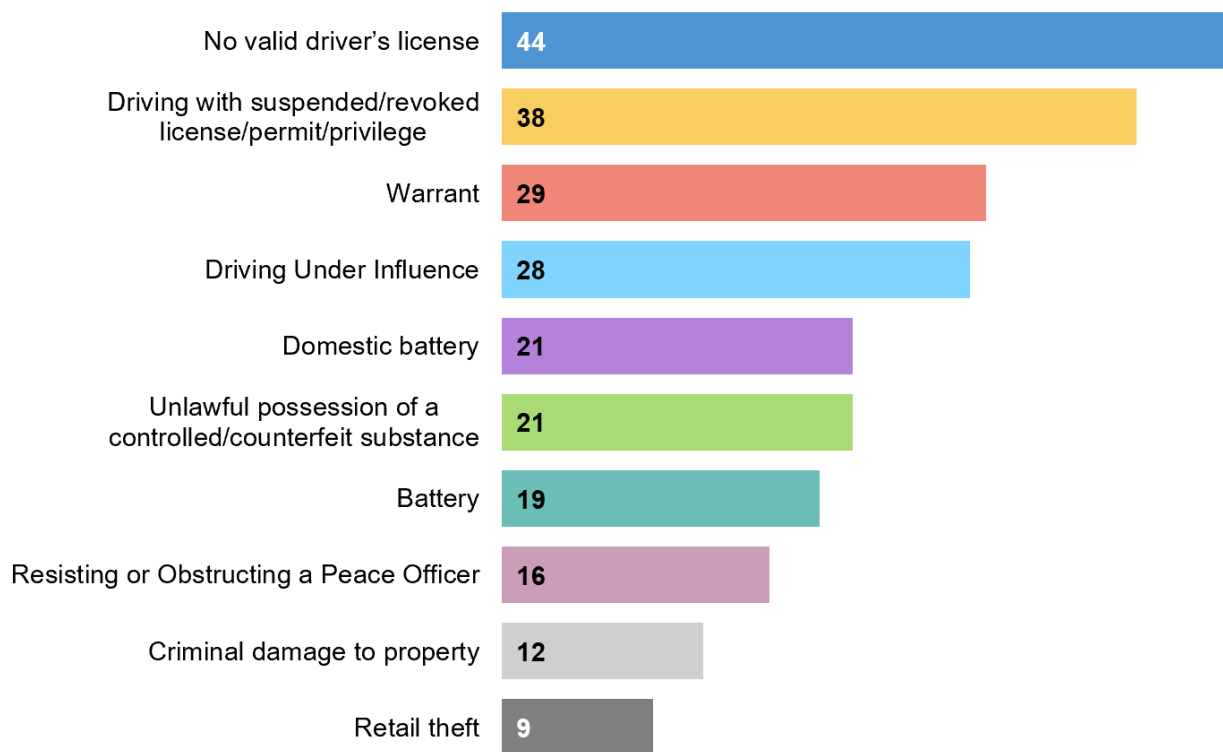

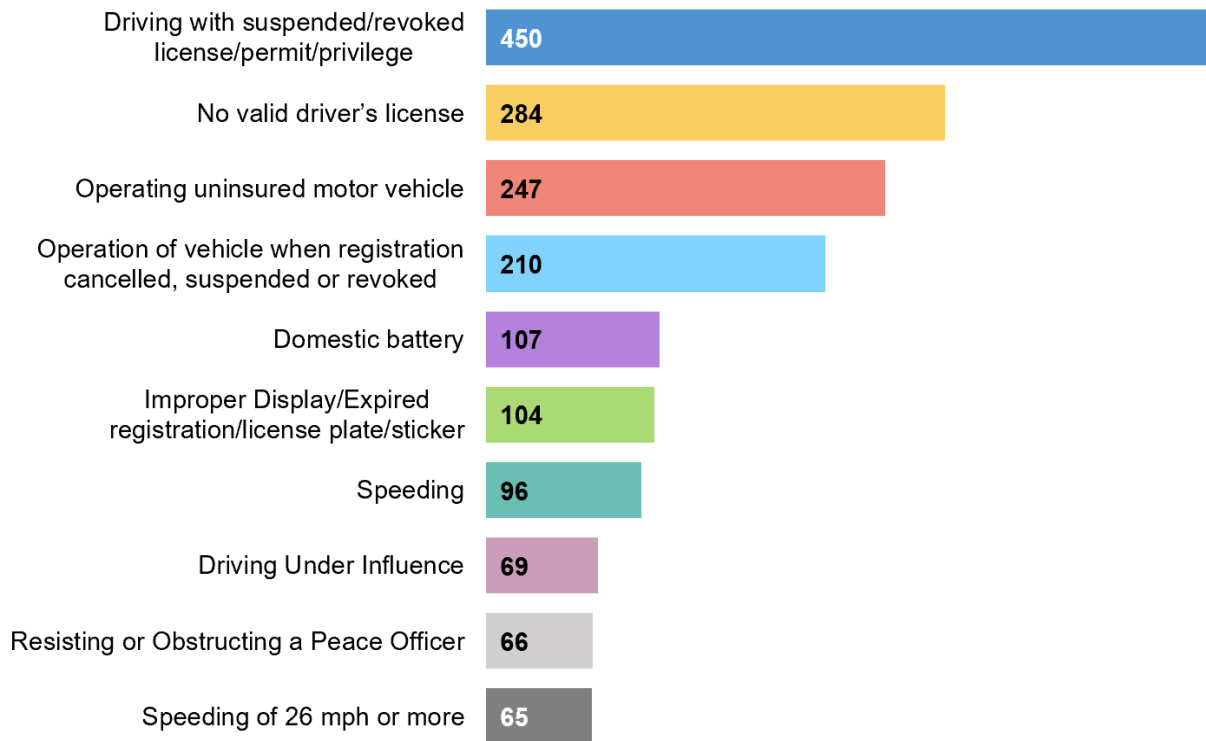

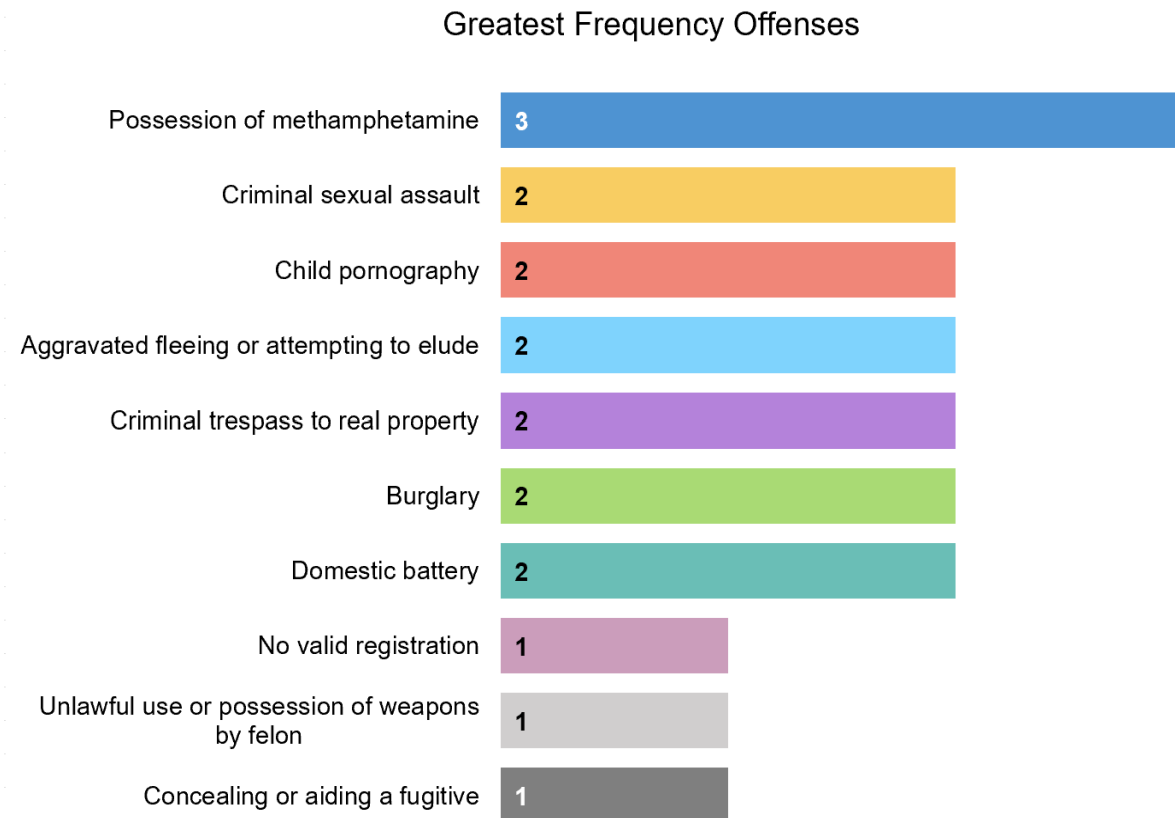

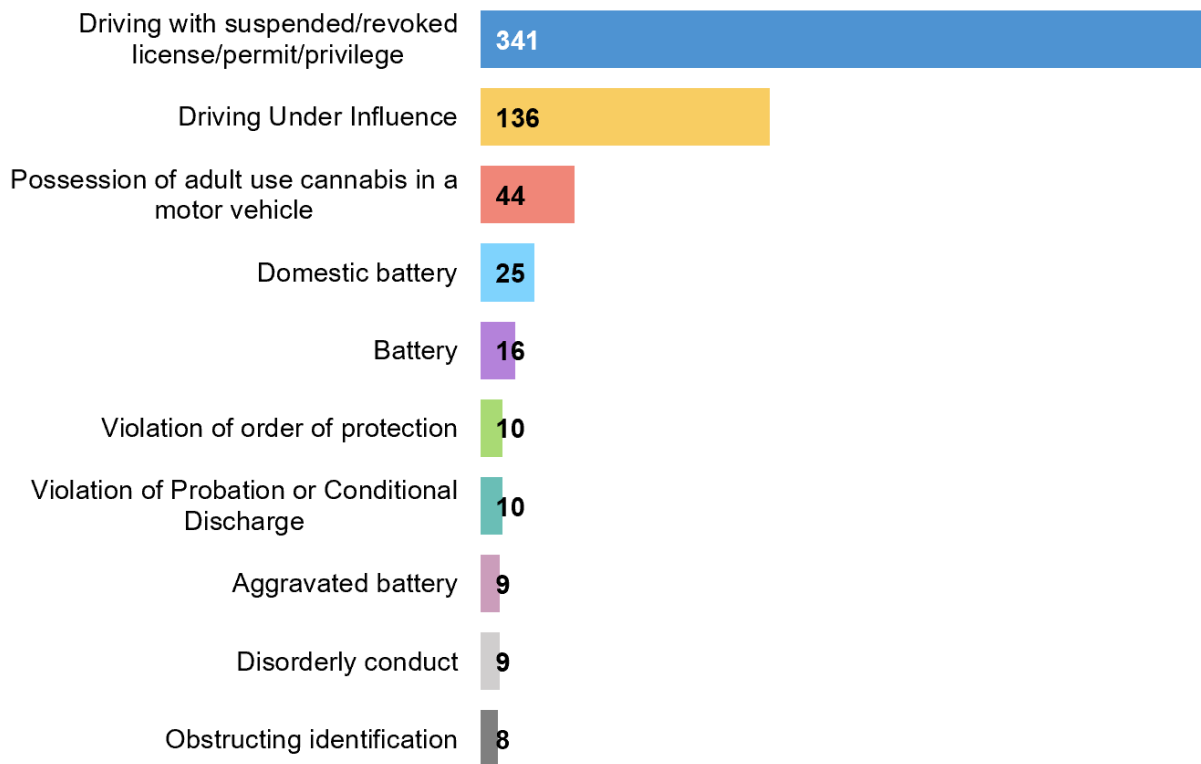

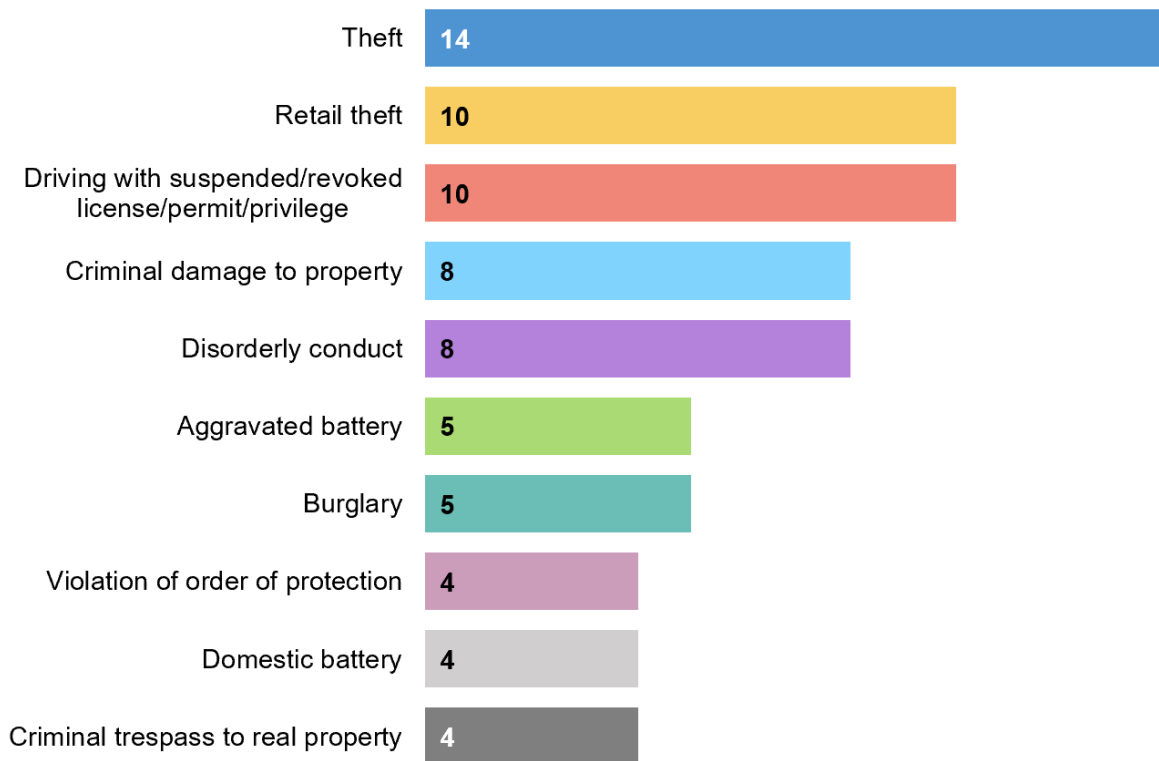

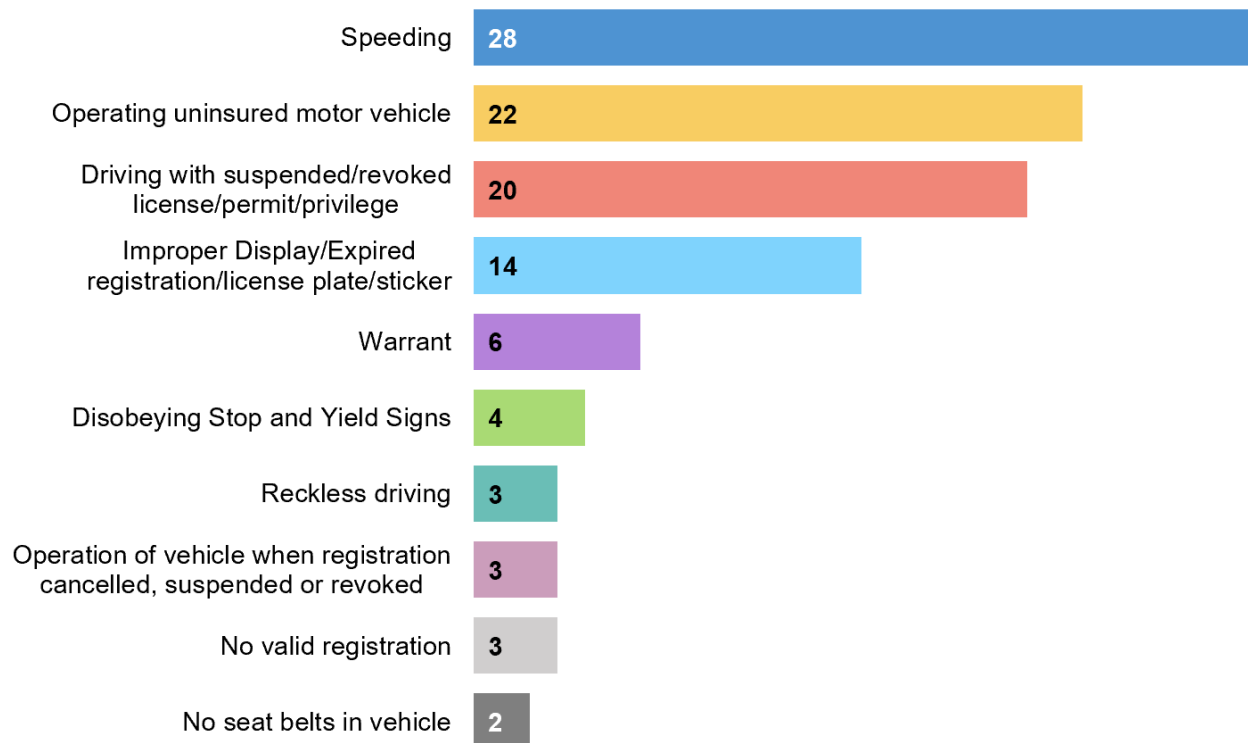

Review Process

Brown County Sheriff's Office's Chief Deputy reviews body worn camera footage every ninety (90) days of duty. Body worn camera reviews are conducted randomly, with supervisors reviewing a sample of recordings on an ongoing basis. Recommendations and corrective actions are implemented when necessary to address unprofessional conduct or improve performance. The observations are documented, and the deputies are counseled regarding future actions. The camera footage are also used to investigate complaints made against deputies, provide positive feedback when the officers are professional and performing at a high level in their job duties.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Brown County Sheriff's Office reports eight (8) incidents leading to eight (8) offenses charged including five (5) instances of Speeding of 26 mph or more, two (2) instances of Driving with suspended/revoked license/permit/privilege and one (1) instance of Fleeing or attempting to elude police officer.

Department Overview – Burbank Police Department

Burbank Police Department consists of forty-six (46) full-time police officers who utilize twenty (20) body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Burbank Police Department reports that two (2) body worn cameras were removed from service and returned after failing to boot and becoming stuck in system recovery mode. One (1) body worn camera was also removed from service and returned after video recordings displayed a green screen with purple lines. Additionally, three (3) body worn camera batteries were removed from service and returned due to the back panels separating from the battery housing.

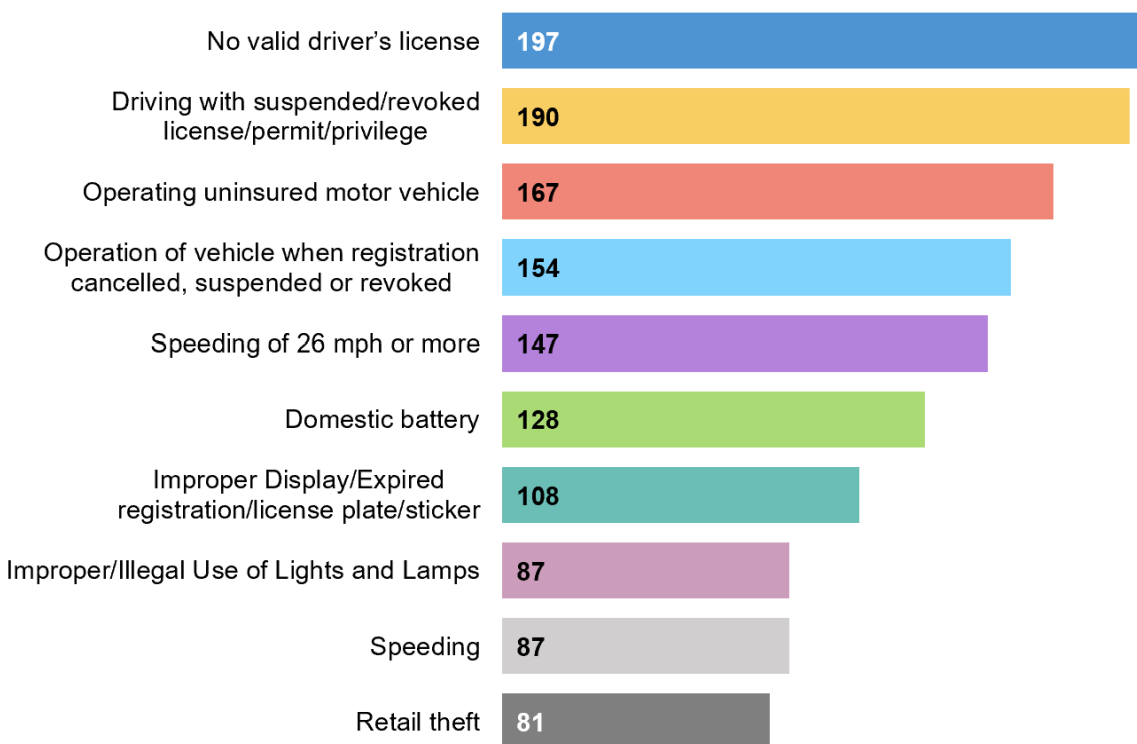

Department Overview – Byron Police Department

Byron Police Department consists of eight (8) sworn personnel including six (6) officers, one (1) Sergeant, and one (1) Chief of Police who utilize nine (9) Watchguard V700 body worn cameras, which includes one (1) spare camera.

Technical Issues

Byron Police Department reported body worn camera video retention issues. The department determined that these issues resulted from incorrect retention settings and improper video coding or labeling by officers. In response the retention policies were updated, and training was conducted on how to code/label the video for retention as well as entering videos into evidence to be properly retained.

Review Process

Byron Police Department's supervisors' access and review at minimum one (1) random body worn camera recording for each officer monthly. The purpose of this review is to ensure that equipment is operating properly and that officers are using the cameras appropriately and in accordance with this policy and training and as required by both law and Byron Police Department Policy. Additionally, supervisors review if officers are properly documenting body worn camera use in police reports.

Incidents

Byron Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Cambria Police Department

Cambria Police Department consists of two (2) full-time officers and three (3) part-time officers who utilize a body worn camera each.

Technical Issues

Cambria Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

Review Process

Cambria Police Department's Sergeant and Police Chief review all the body worn camera videos that would contain use of force and complaints regarding officers' conduct and forwarded on to investigating agency.

Cambria Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

- Recognize exemplary officer performance
- Complete citizen complaint investigations
- Fulfill FOIA requests

Canton Police Department's supervisors regularly review body worn camera footage, focusing on significant events or complaints. Periodic random reviews are also conducted by supervisors to evaluate overall effectiveness and guide training improvements.

Canton Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Carol Stream Police Department

Carol Stream Police Department consists of sixty-two (62) sworn officers who utilize seventy (70) Axon Body 4 body worn cameras, which include eight (8) spares.

Technical Issues

Carol Stream Police Department reports a few technical issues with the body worn cameras where the docked camera's display screen indicated a network connection error. The error was resolved by powering off the camera, restarting the camera and re-docking it.

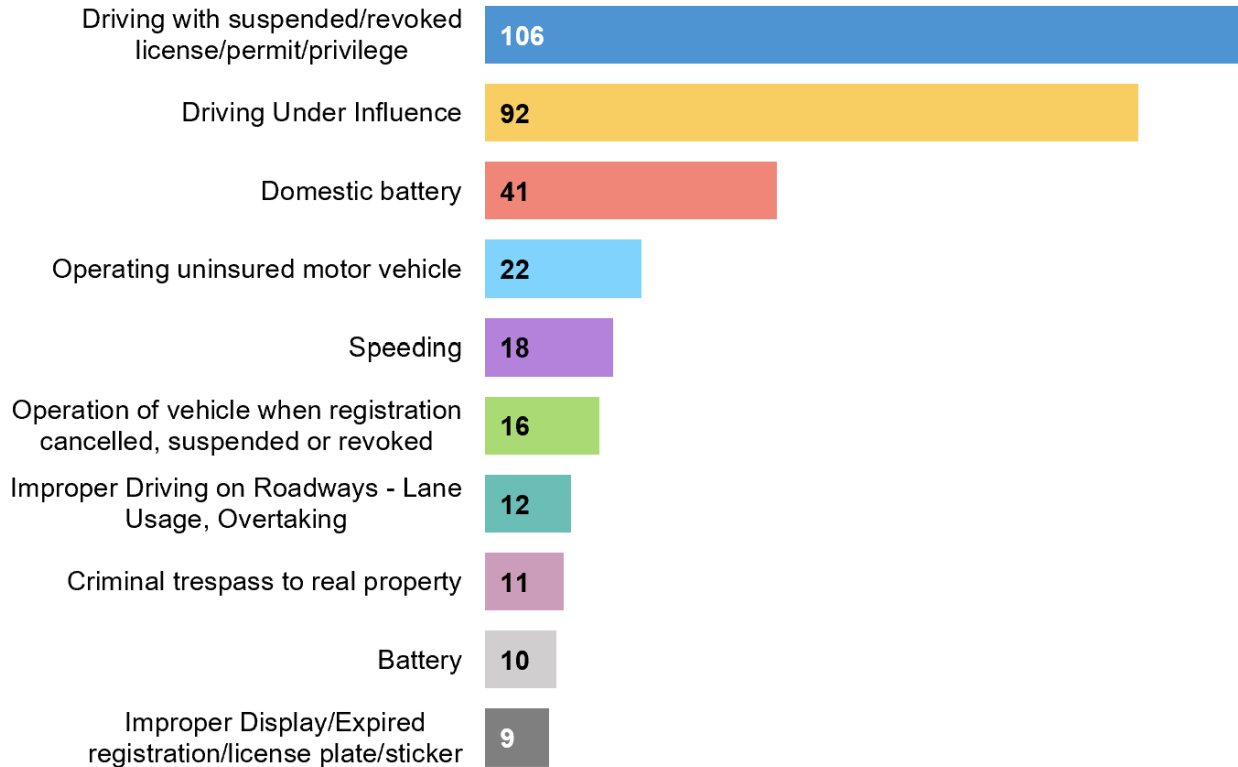

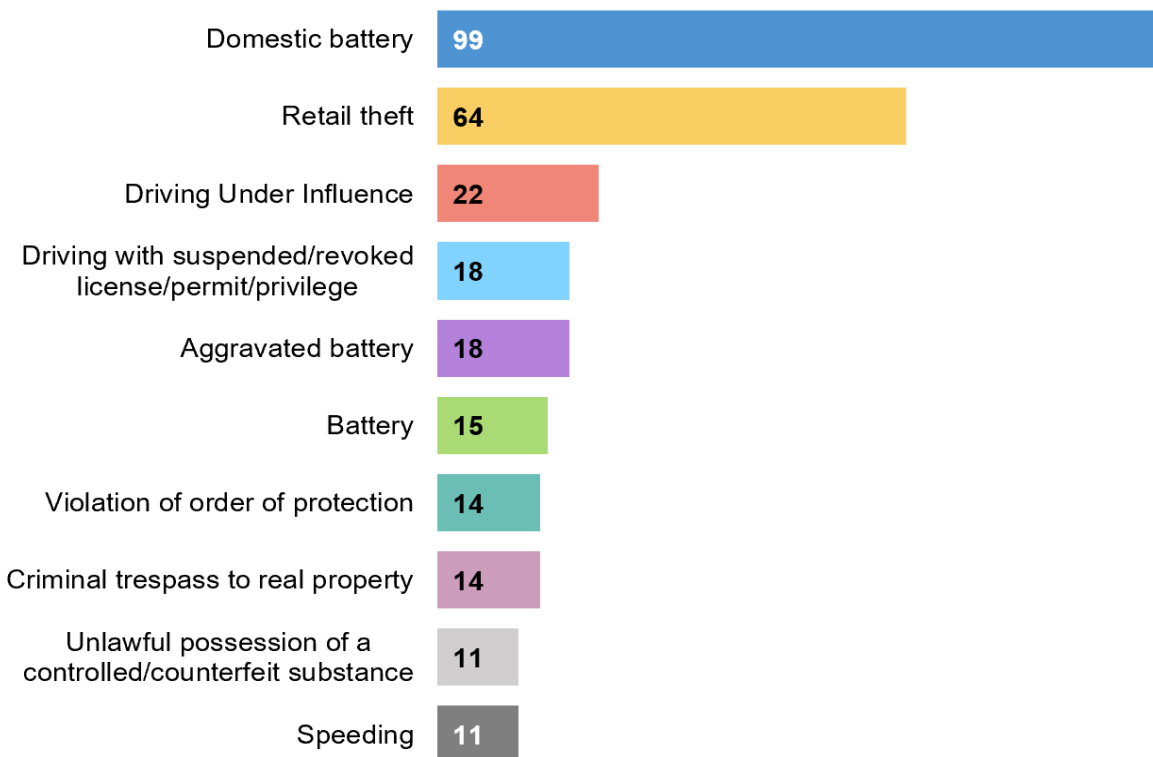

Supervisors do not review recordings for the sole purpose of searching for violations of department policy or law not related to a specific complaint or incident. If policy violations are observed by a supervisor, such policy violations are treated on a basis which neither enhances nor diminishes any potential discipline.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Carpentersville Police Department reports four hundred forty-five (445) incidents leading to four hundred forty-eight (448) offenses charged. Below is a snapshot of the greatest frequency of offenses charged.

Carthage Police Department consists of four (4) full-time officers and one (1) part-time police officer who utilize four (4) Motorola V700 body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Carthage Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

Review Process

Carthage Police Department's Chief of Police or Sergeant reviews the body worn camera videos every month. The review mainly consists of ensuring correct labeling of incidents, correct retention settings, review of videos as needed to ensure officer conduct is within policy/ laws, and to ensure the best service to the community.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Carthage Police Department reports seven (7) incidents leading to eleven (11) offenses charged which include two (2) instances each of Aggravated battery and Driving Under Influence, and one (1) instance each of Resisting or Obstructing Justice, Driving with suspended/revoked license/permit/privilege, Speeding, Fleeing or attempting to elude police officer, Domestic battery, Battery and Resisting or Obstructing a Peace Officer.

Department Overview – Casey Police Department

Casey Police Department consists of eight (8) sworn officers who utilize eight (8) Motorola V700 body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Casey Police Department reports minor wear and tear issues with the body worn cameras.

Review Process

Casey Police Department's officers review body worn camera footage periodically to ensure the video and audio quality meet expectations. The Chief of Police periodically reviews body worn camera footages to ensure appropriate dialog and techniques are being utilized by all officers. If any issues are discovered the Chief uses the best course of action to remedy the situation. Videos are also reviewed during the FOIA and redaction processing.

Incidents

Casey Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Catlin Police Department

Catlin Police Department consists of sixteen (16) part-time sworn members who utilize eleven (11) body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Catlin Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

Review Process

Catlin Police Department's supervisors review body worn camera videos in the following instances:

- Audits - On a random basis, a supervisor review videos from each officer under their command to ensure proper activation and tagging.
- Use of Force Reviews - If an officer uses force, the applicable video is reviewed.
- Citizen Complaints - If a complaint is made against a member of the department the associated video is reviewed.
- Field Training - Trainee videos are reviewed to gauge the development of the recruit during the field training program.
- Other - Videos may be reviewed if supervisors are made aware of exceptional performance, live saving measures or other actions resulting in receiving recognition.

Incidents

Casey Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Champaign County Sheriff's Office

Champaign County Sheriff's Office utilizes fifty-six (56) Axon body worn cameras. The report does not provide details of the number of officers.

Technical Issues

Champaign County Sheriff's Office reports minor wear and tear issues with the body worn cameras.

Review Process

Champaign County Sheriff's Office's Patrol Division Lieutenant, the Investigations Division Lieutenant, and the Administrative Support Lieutenant view at least four (4) body worn camera videos, one (1) from each shift, and review them from a management standpoint of quality control. If an issue is discovered, the captain of the law enforcement division is contacted, and determination is made for the best course of action to remedy the problem. Each week, the Shift Supervisors choose at least six (6) videos from their shift and review the videos from a supervisory standpoint for quality control. If an issue is discovered, which cannot be addressed at their level, they are advised to contact the Patrol Division Lieutenant to determine the best course of action to remedy the problem.

Incidents

Champaign County Sheriff's Office's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Champaign Police Department

Champaign Police Department consists of one hundred twenty-seven (127) sworn officers who utilize an Axon Body 3 body worn camera each.

Technical Issues

Champaign Police Department reports several issues with the body worn cameras including cameras losing power, failing to connect, and offloading videos, connectivity and video transfer issues, LED screen failure and officers' errors of classifying the videos. The cameras were replaced by the manufacturer.

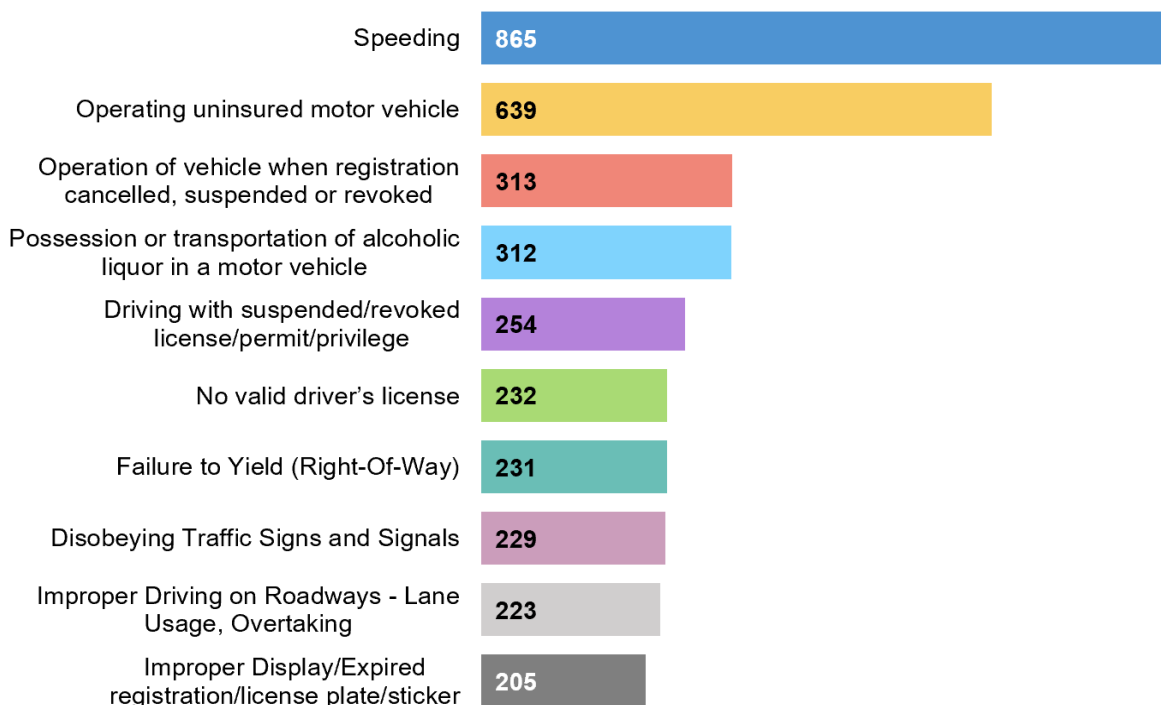
Review Process

Champaign Police Department's staff involved in implementing the body worn camera program randomly viewed videos to ensure the programmed settings and video and audio quality were configured to meet expectations. All reports and accompanying body worn camera videos for encounters involving the use of force above normal handcuffing procedures are reviewed by multiple supervisors. The videos and associated reports are typically viewed by a Sergeant, a Lieutenant, and a Deputy Chief and/or Chief of Police. The Department's Use of Force Review Committee, composed of a Chief-approved pool of department members and appointed citizen representatives, also reviews the use of force, as required by department policy.

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Champaign Police Department reports three thousand ninety-two (3,092) incidents leading to four thousand seven hundred seventy-one (4,771) offenses charged. Below is a snapshot of the greatest frequency of offenses charged.

Department Overview – Channahon Police Department

Channahon Police Department consists of twenty-nine (29) sworn officers who utilize twenty-five (25) Motorola body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Channahon Police Department reports seven (7) technical issues with body worn cameras. These issues included a recording did not initiate when the activation button was pressed (due to cold temperatures), several connection issues between body worn cameras and vehicle-initiated recordings, and a body worn camera shutting down while placed in a vehicle docking station. Each issue was assessed by the BWC Coordinator (CPD Policy 436.3.1). Five (5) technical issues were resolved by restarting the device or returning it to the charging dock. Other corrections included allowing the device to warm and modify program settings to avoid body worn cameras turning off when docked in a squad vehicle.

Review Process

Channahon Police Department's supervisors at every level review five (5) body worn camera recordings monthly. These videos are randomly selected from all employees assigned to a specific supervisor or unit.

Incidents

Channahon Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Charleston Police Department

Charleston Police Department consists of thirty-four (34) sworn officers, including twenty-six (26) patrol officers, six (6) investigators and two (2) administrative officers, who utilize thirty-five (35) body worn cameras. The department has a spare body worn camera too.

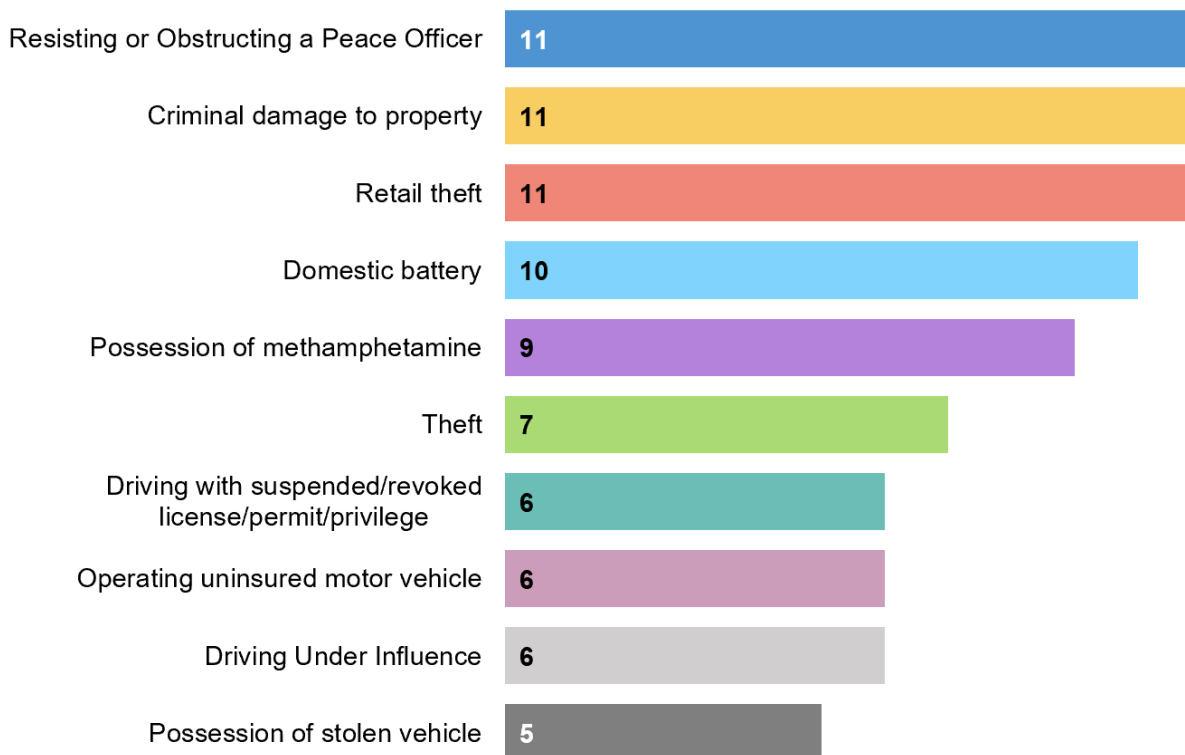

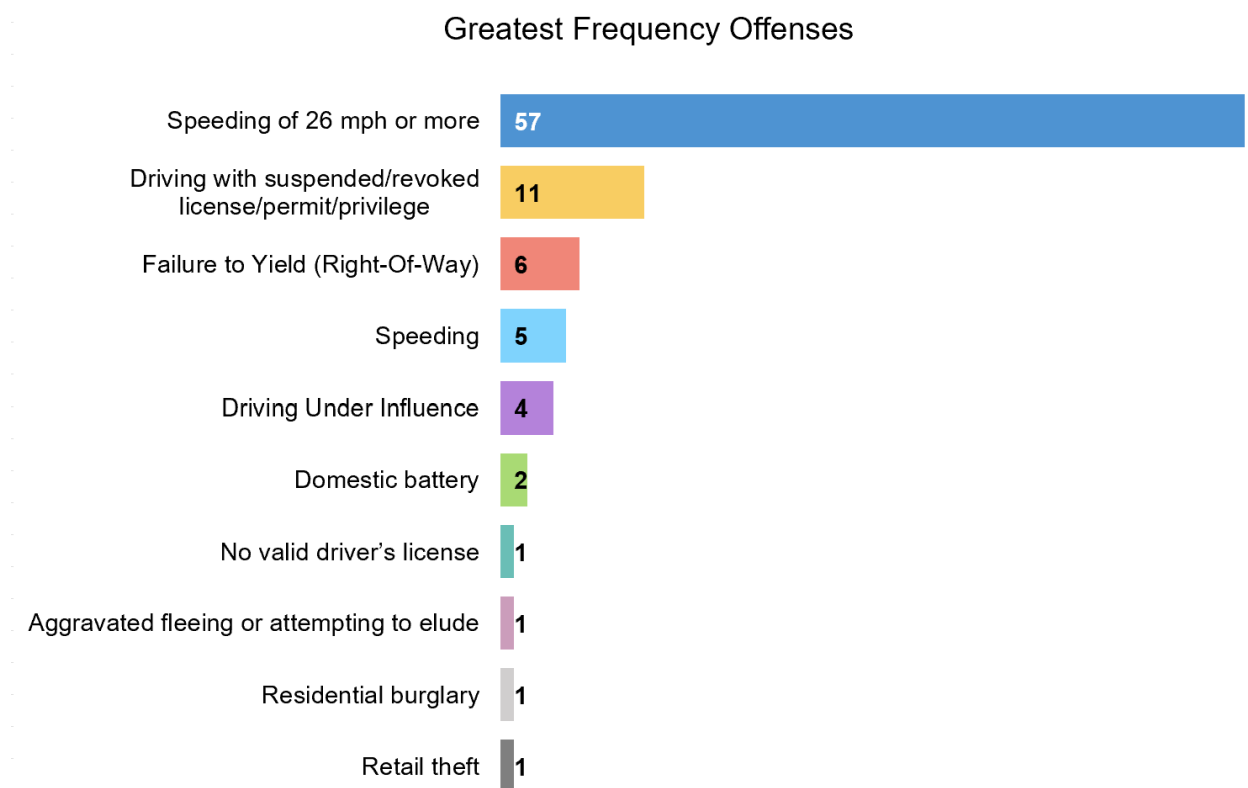

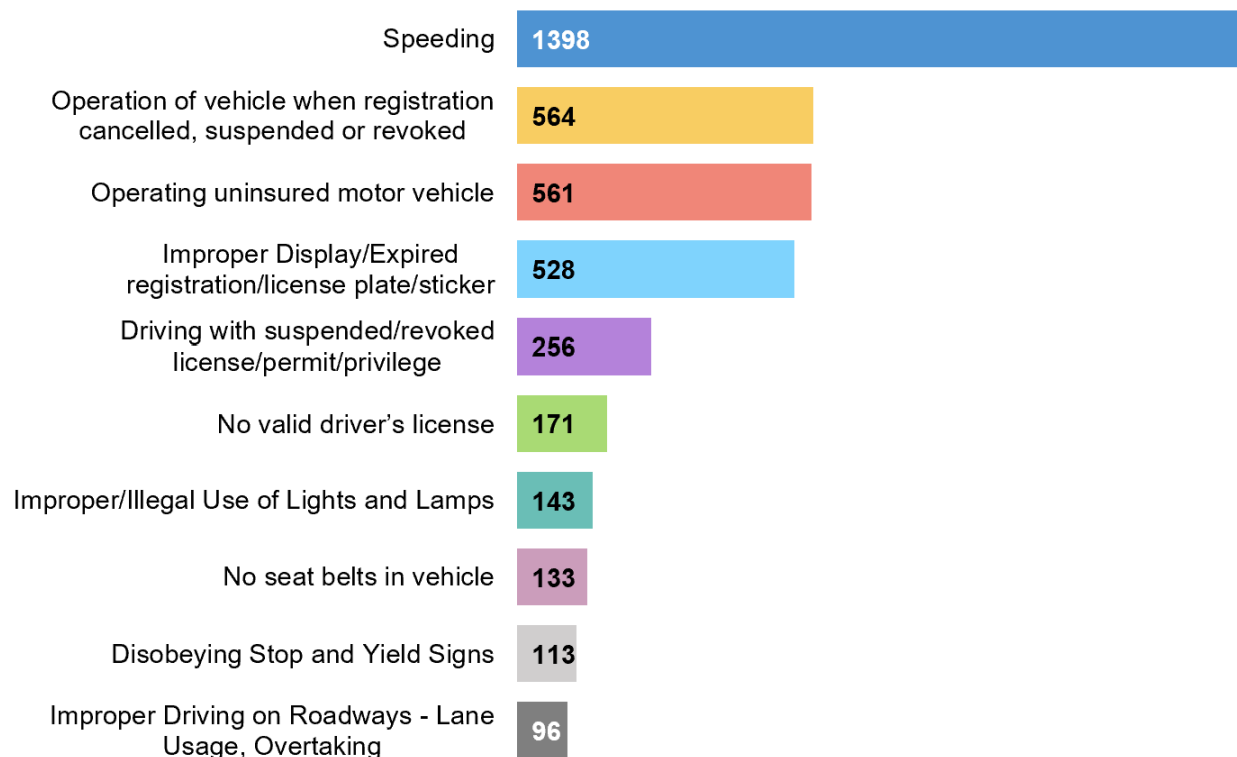

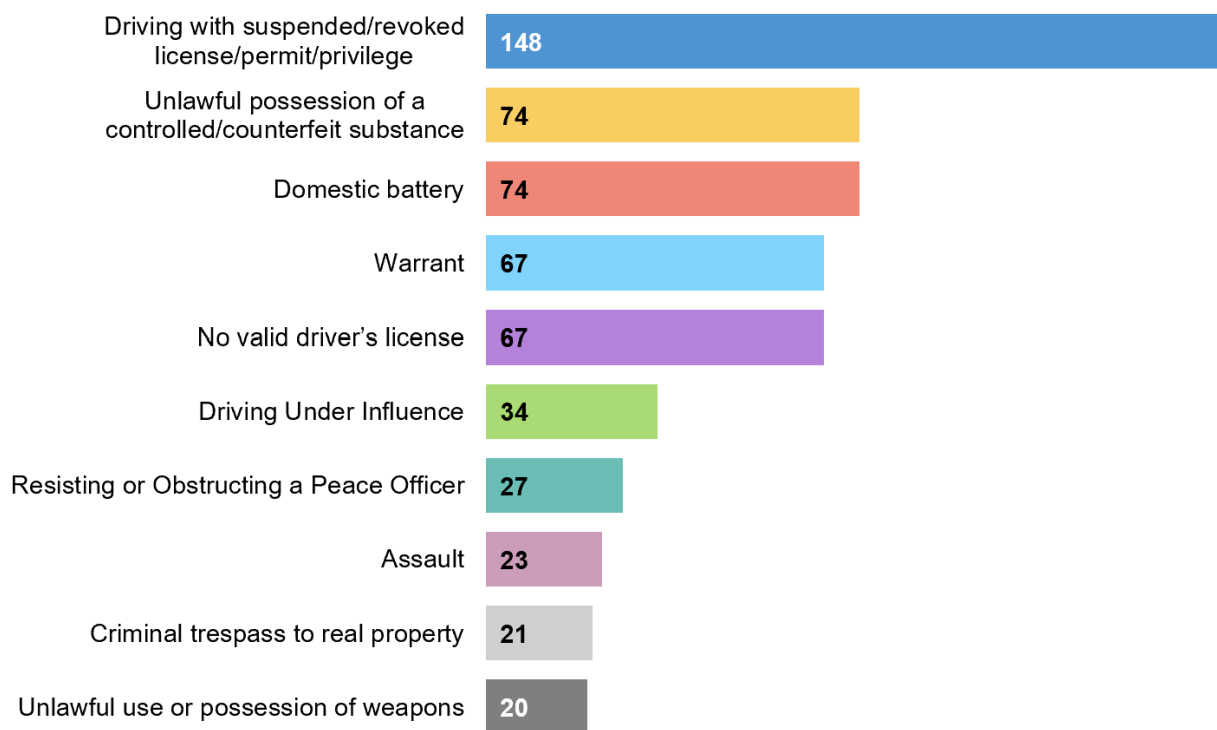

Department Overview – Chicago Police Department

Chicago Police Department (CPD) is the largest Municipal Police Agency in Illinois with approximately eleven thousand five hundred (11,500) sworn officers. The department is divided into two (2) Offices: The Office of Operations and The Office of Constitutional Policing & Reform. CPD maintains a pool of one thousand eight hundred (1,800) additional cameras to be assigned to sworn officers during deployments, special events, and temporary field duty.

CPD has twenty-two (22) Patrol Districts as well as Area Community Safety Teams. These Districts and Teams are staffed by approximately seven thousand five hundred (7,500) sworn officers. There are another approximately eight hundred (800) officers assigned to the Mass Transit Unit, SWAT, Traffic, Detail Unit, Fugitive Apprehension, and Investigative Response Teams. All these officers are equipped with permanently assigned body worn cameras.

There are approximately ten thousand (10,000) officer worn cameras utilized by the department. Eight thousand two hundred (8,200) permanently assigned and one thousand eight hundred (1,800) utilized for temporary field deployments.

Technical Issues

Chicago Police Department reports no major technical issues with the body worn cameras and recently replaced the older body worn cameras with new ones of the same model.

Review Process

Chicago Police Department's supervisors assigned to oversee department members using a department-issued body worn camera ensures:

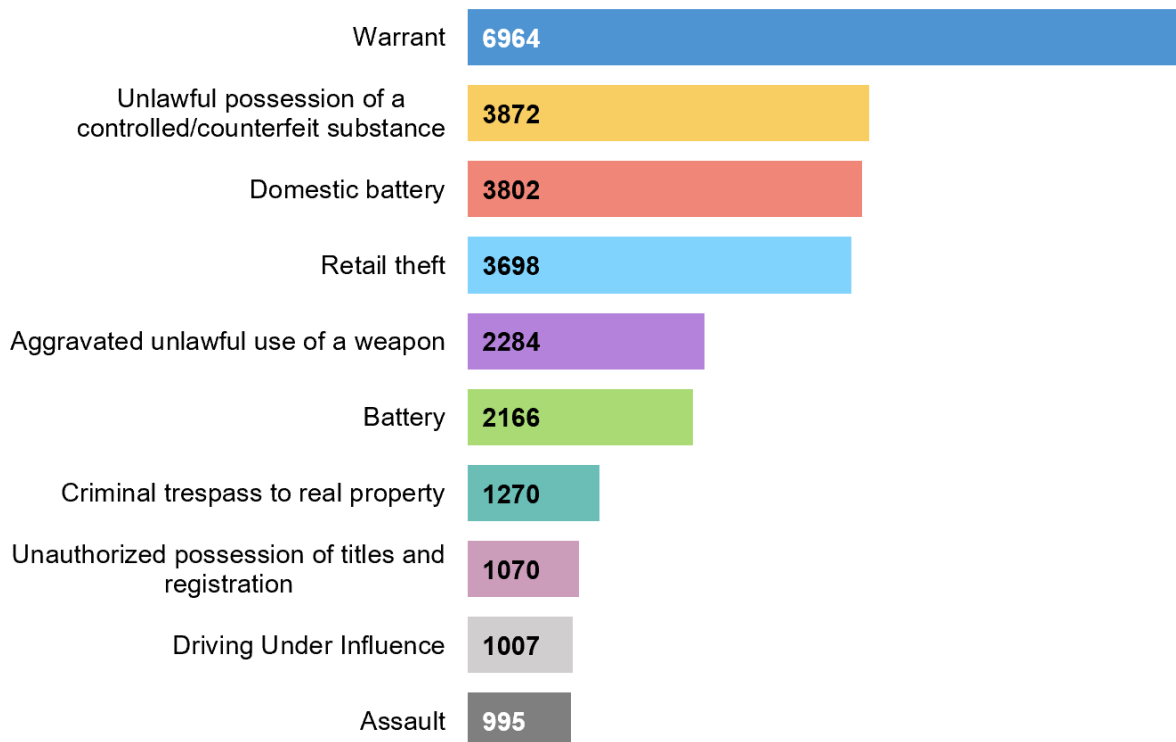
- A. Department members are utilizing the body worn camera consistent with CPD directives.
- B. A report is entered into a CPD application whenever any member is unable to use the body worn camera or download digitally recorded data due to technical problems. This application is monitored by trained field technicians who respond to repair or replace any defective equipment as soon as possible. There are also a small number of cameras at each location that can be assigned to an officer on a temporary basis.
- C. An investigation is initiated when notified of a missing, lost, or damaged body worn camera.
- D. The distribution, charging, and uploading of the body worn cameras are consistent with CPD directives.
- E. Officers reviewed an body worn camera recording prior to writing an arrest report document this fact in the narrative portion of the arrest report prior to submitting the report for approval.
- F. The watch operations lieutenant (WOL) must review at least one (1) random recording per watch to ensure CPD policy is properly adhered to.
- G. For Use of Force incidents, all pertinent BWC Videos are reviewed by the WOL and separately by the Tactical Review and Evaluation Division.
- H. District commanders/unit commanding officers or their designee receive weekly reports on Officer BWC usage and the number of unmatched videos to ensure compliance with CPD policy.

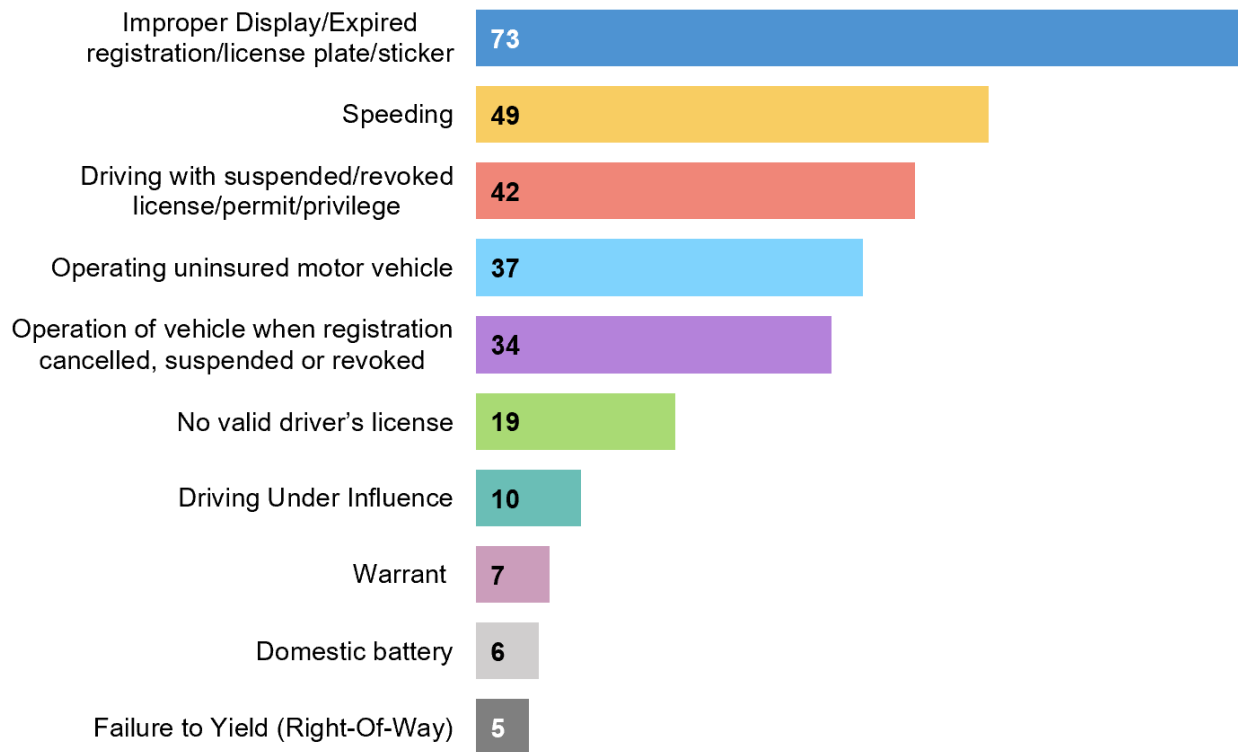

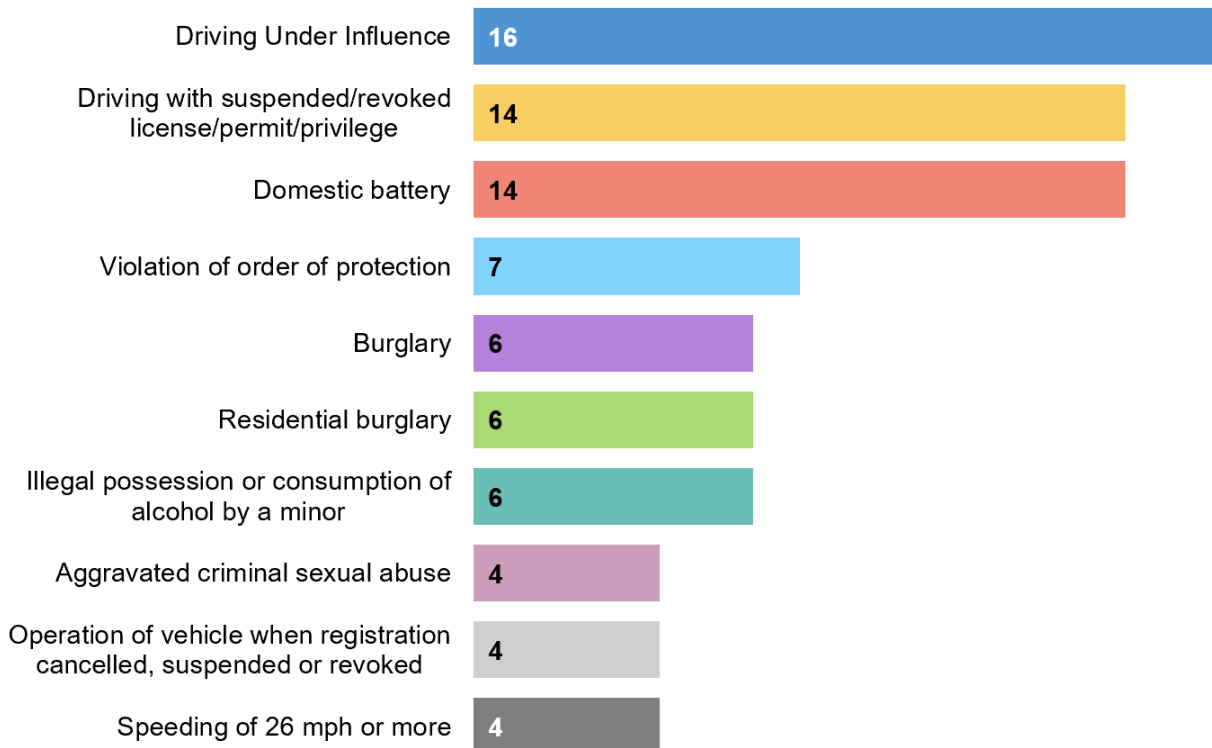

College of Lake County Police Department's supervisors ensure that the officers utilize the body worn cameras in accordance with the policy and the training they receive. In cases where footage has the propensity to generate community interest, the supervisors review the footage in their investigative scope and conduct further investigation as they deem appropriate. The result of this investigation is forwarded via the chain of command to ensure it is within policy or if additional training is required. In use of force incidents, the direct supervisor reviews the body worn camera footage to ensure policy and legal compliance. Any deviations noted or training recommendations are forwarded up the chain of command.

College of Lake County Police Department's report does not include individual incidents data.

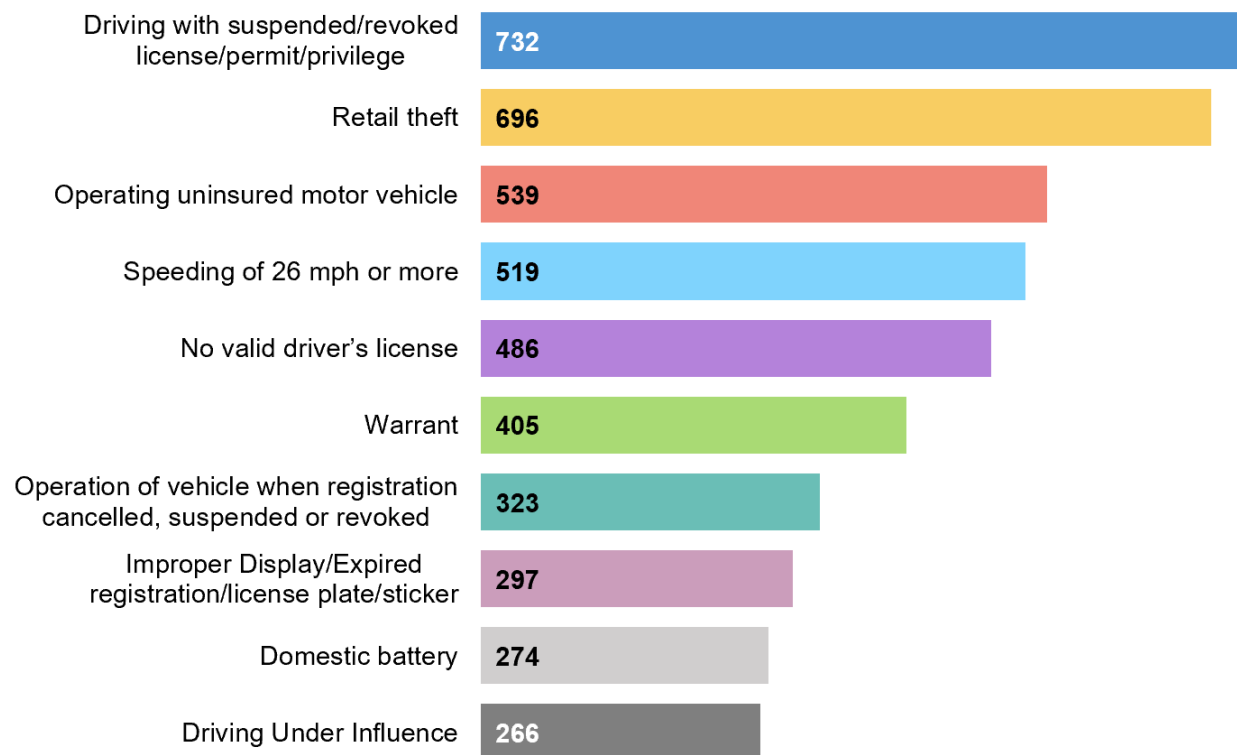

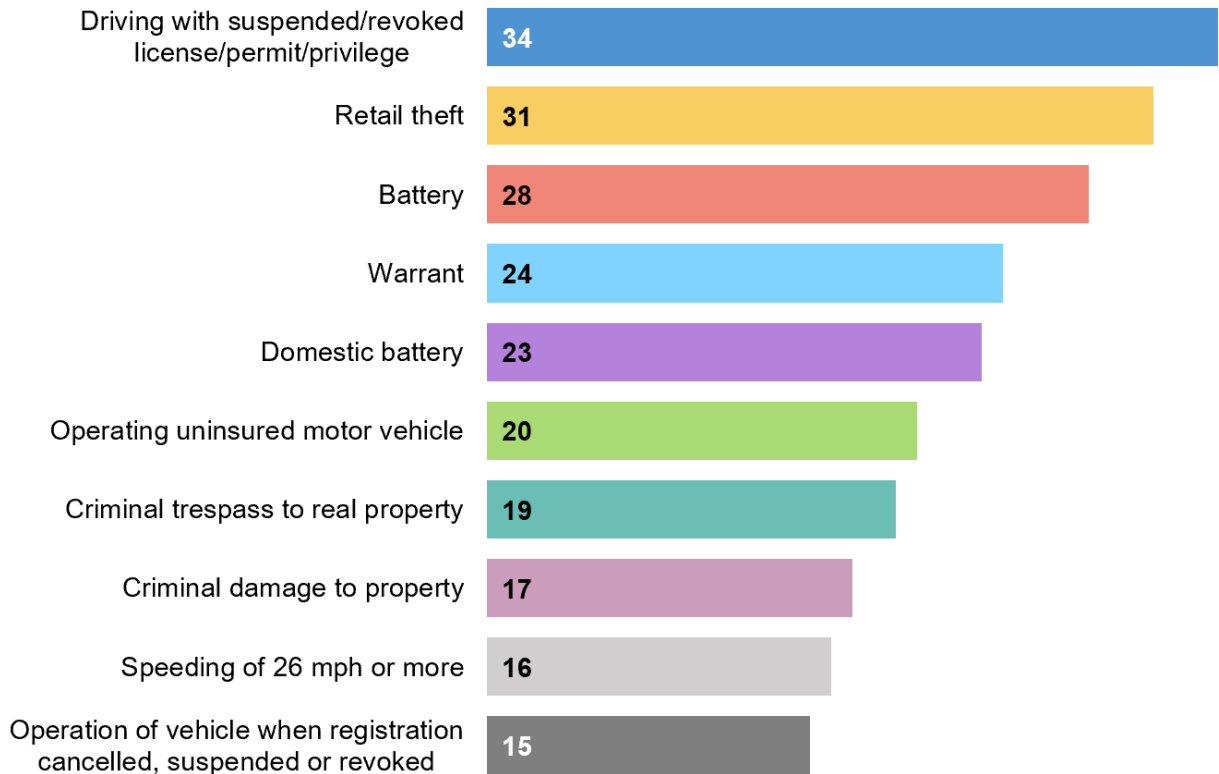

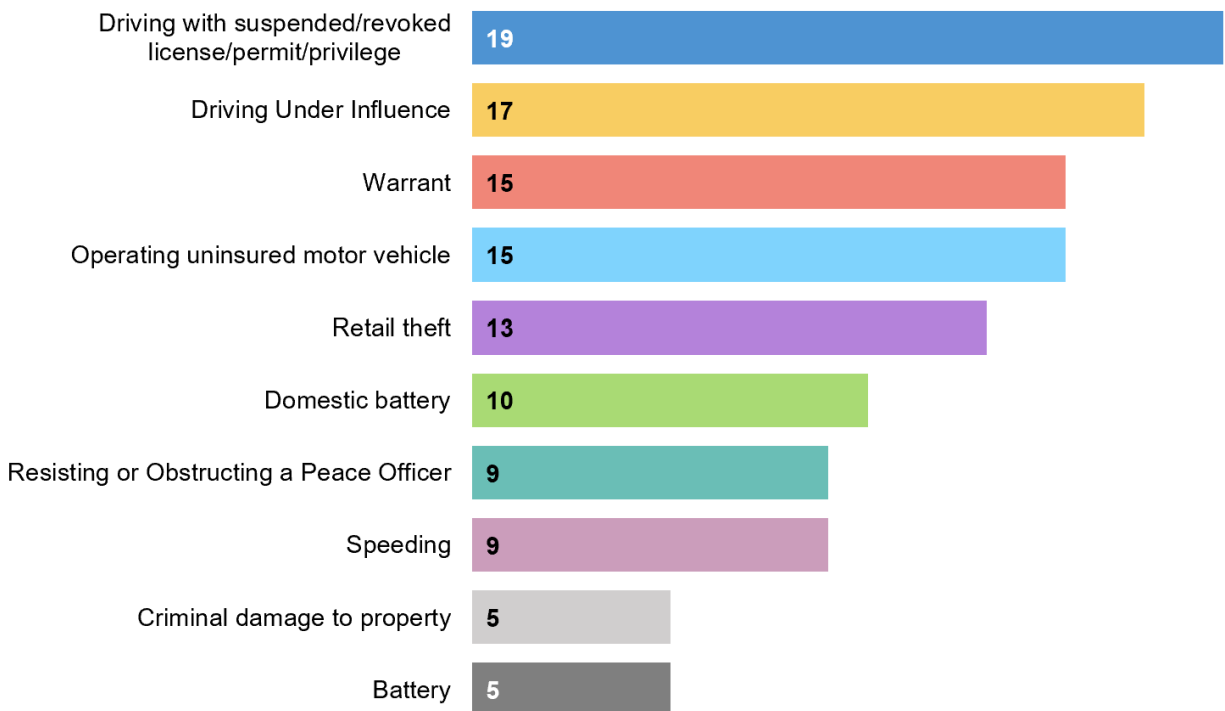

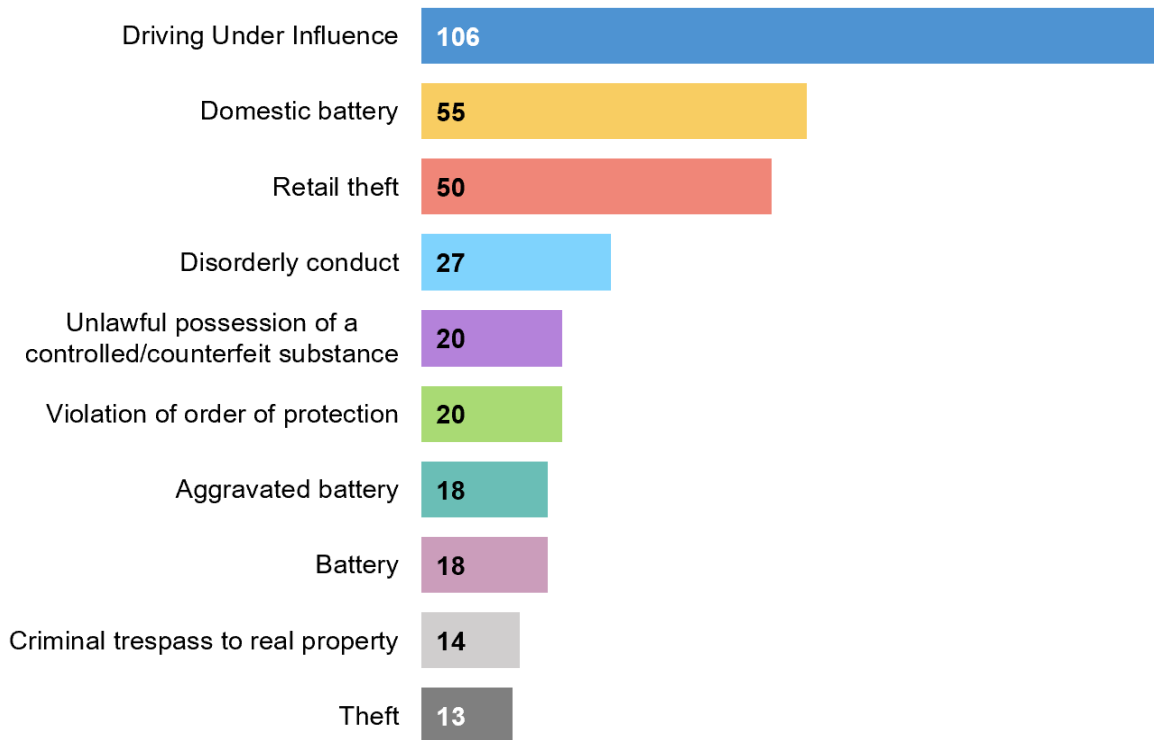

Department Overview – Darien Police Department

Darien Police Department consists of thirty-six (36) sworn officers who utilize thirty-six (36) Axon body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Darien Police Department reports one (1) problem with the activation button on one body worn camera. The camera was sent back to the vendor, and it was fixed.

Review Process

Darien Police Department's supervisors (patrol and investigations) periodically review their personnel's body worn camera footage. Axon Performance randomly pulls a set number of videos to be reviewed by each supervisor for their assigned subordinates. In addition, the Deputy Chief of Operations conducts randomly selected supervisor reviews utilizing the same program. This process ensures that every officer using a body worn camera has at least a monthly review completed. The program (Axon Performance) tracks the date reviewed, type of recording, time of the incident, officer involved, event category and comments amongst other items.

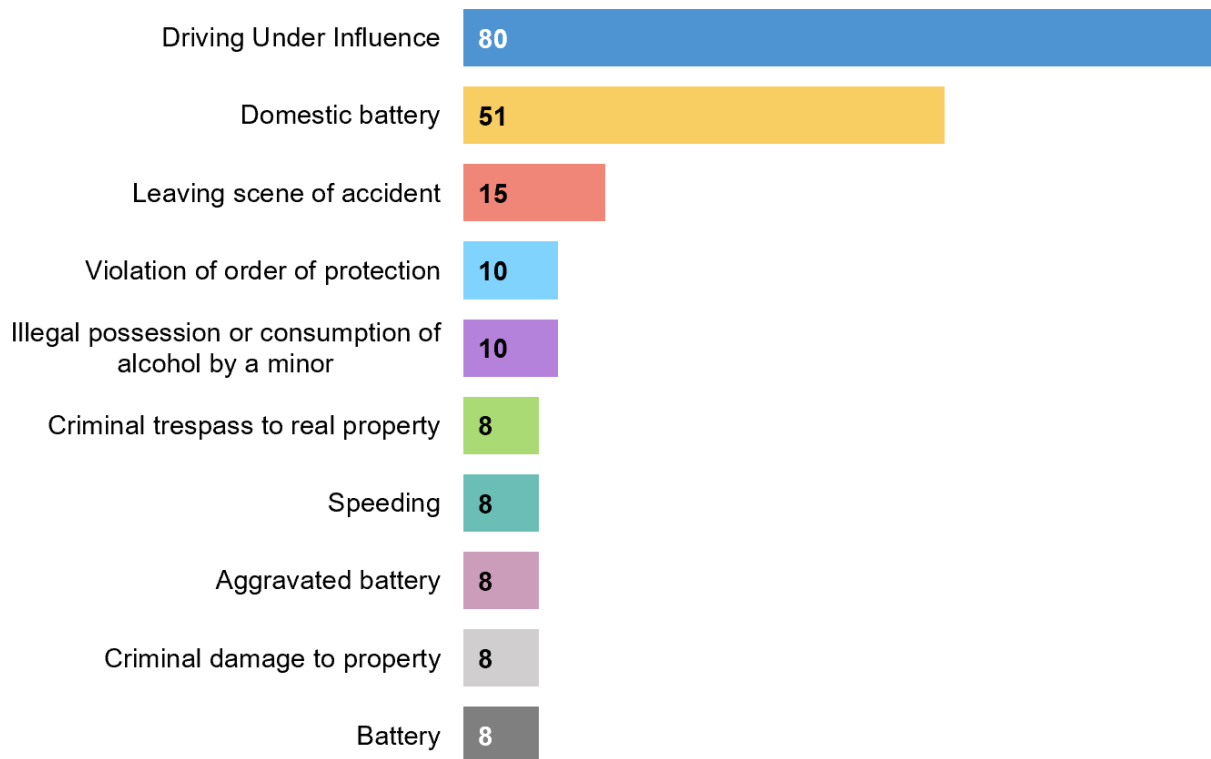

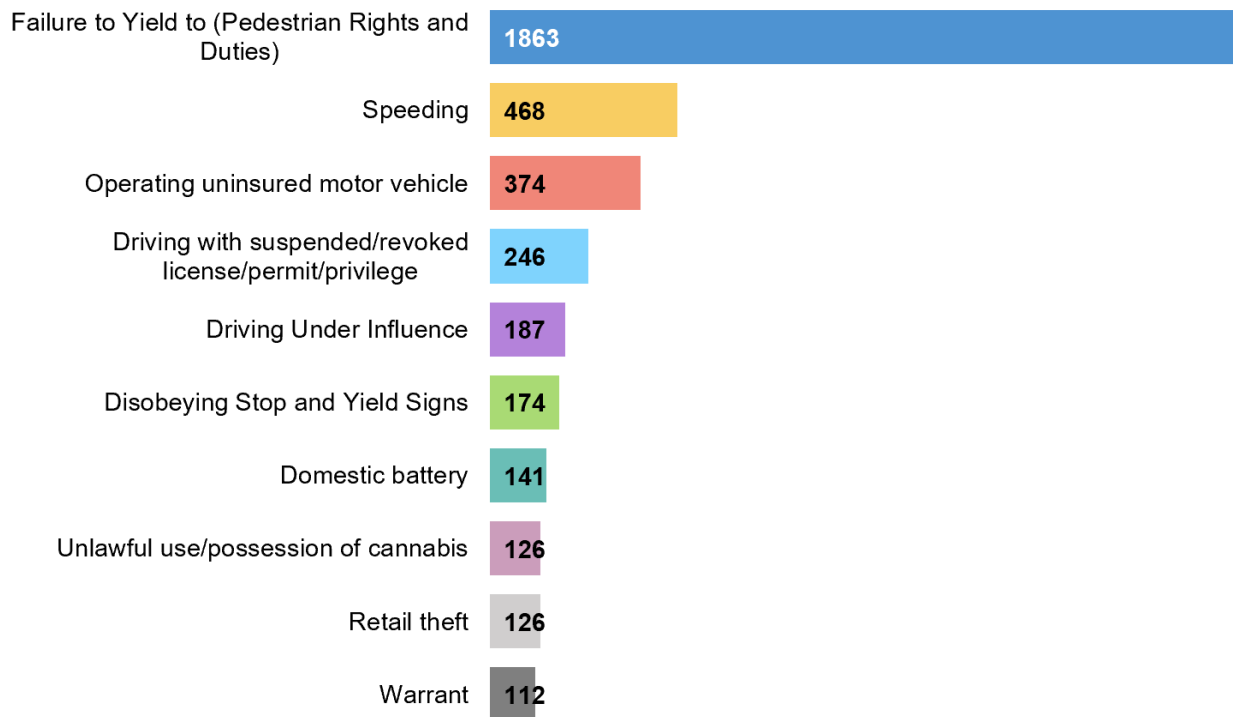

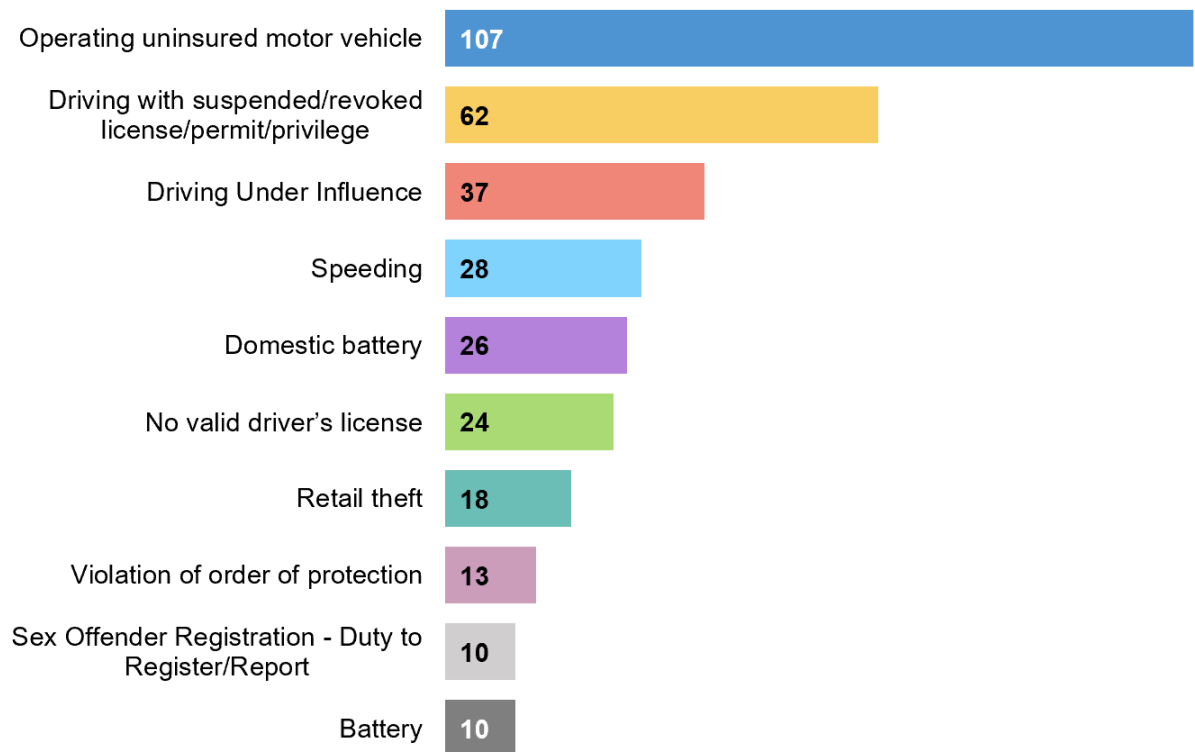

Department Overview – Downers Grove Police Department

Downers Grove Police Department consists of seventy-one (71) sworn officers and maintains seventy-seven (77) Axon Body 4 body worn cameras, seventy-five (75) of which are assigned to officers.

Technical Issue

Downers Grove Police Department reports one (1) technical issue with the body worn camera where the camera would not charge or turn on. The camera was sent back to the manufacturer for repair or replacement.

Review Process

Downers Grove Police Department's report includes a body worn camera review process as follows:

- Department members utilize the officer-worn body camera consistent with police department directives.
- Recordings are assigned in Evidence.com to the member who created the recordings.
- A civilian staff member is assigned to monitor and review all the digital files within Evidence.com to ensure they are properly identified and categorized. When a digital file is not in compliance, the officer and their supervisor are made aware of the situation so that it can be remedied.
- An investigation is initiated when a staff member determines that an officer-worn body camera is missing, lost, or damaged.
- The distribution, charging, and uploading of the officer-worn body cameras and their digital files are consistent with police department directives.
- Officers who reviewed an officer-worn body camera recording prior to writing a report document this information in the narrative portion of the police report.
- Quarterly, supervisors review both officer-worn body camera and in-car camera recordings, if applicable. Supervisors review four (4) incidents per officer per quarter. The reviews are performed to ensure officers utilize the body worn cameras in compliance with police department policy and procedures. This review process is documented in a computer program designed to conduct random body worn camera video review and provide feedback to the officer.

Downers Grove Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – DuPage County Forest Preserve District Police Department

DuPage County Forest Preserve District Police Department consists of twenty-five (25) sworn officers who utilize twenty-six (26) Axon body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

DuPage County Forest Preserve District Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

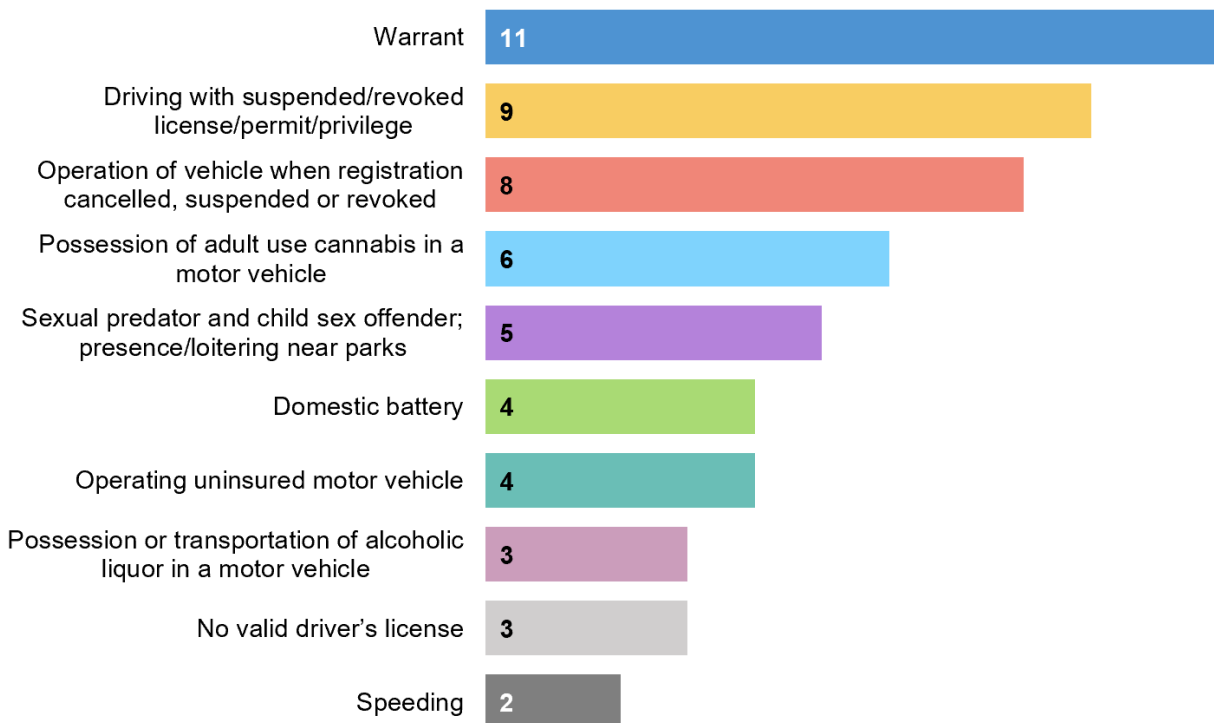
Review Process

DuPage County Forest Preserve District Police Department's supervisors randomly review body worn camera recordings monthly via the Axon Performance random review system. One (1) video from each officer is selected for a random review. The review is logged within the Axon system.

Incidents

Department Overview – DuPage County Sheriff's Office

DuPage County Sheriff's Office consists of one hundred seventeen (117) sworn law enforcement deputies who utilize an Axon body worn camera each.

Technical Issues

DuPage County Sheriff's Office reports a few technical issues including normal equipment wear and tears, and occasional Bluetooth connectivity issues with the Axon Fleet Dashboard application. These issues typically resolved themselves or required intervention from the Sheriff's Office IT team to update applications. When problems could not be resolved internally, spare body cameras were issued, and a Return Merchandise Authorization (RMA) was initiated with Axon for replacement.

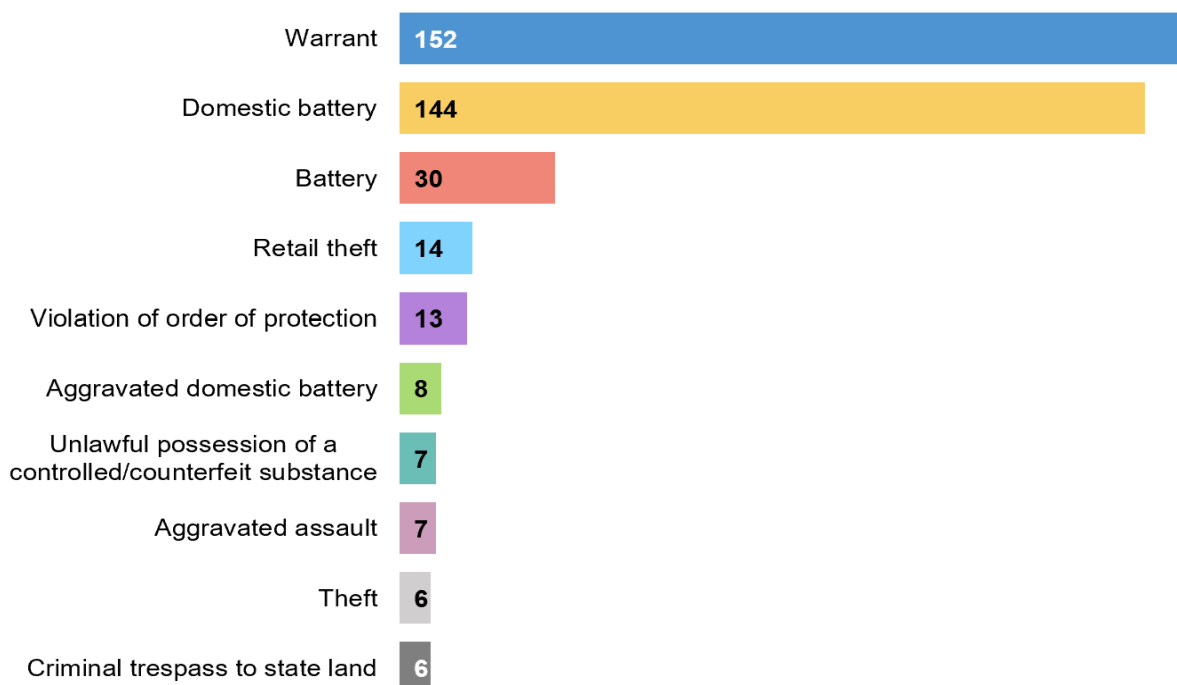
Review Process

DuPage County Sheriff's Office's Body Worn Camera Program is managed by Sergeant and civilian personnel. Both individuals organize and manage the Evidence.com data, the labeling of videos, citizen shared evidence, sharing videos with the state attorney's office, and conducting FOIA and subpoena requests. In addition, team or assignment supervisors conduct random reviews of body worn camera footage using Axon Performance, which organizes videos by team/assignment. Performance metrics are set to ensure that each team supervisor completes at least four (4) random video reviews per month.

East Dundee Police Department's eighteen (18) officers utilize body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

East Dundee Police Department reports zero (0) technical Issues.

Review Process

East Dundee Police Department's supervisors monthly review three (3) body worn camera videos for each officer they supervise. The body worn camera reviews are conducted and tracked in dedicated and specific software.

Incidents

East Dundee Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

East Moline Police Department utilizes thirty-nine (39) Axon body worn cameras issued to the officers. The department does not provide details of the number of officers.

Technical Issues

East Moline Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

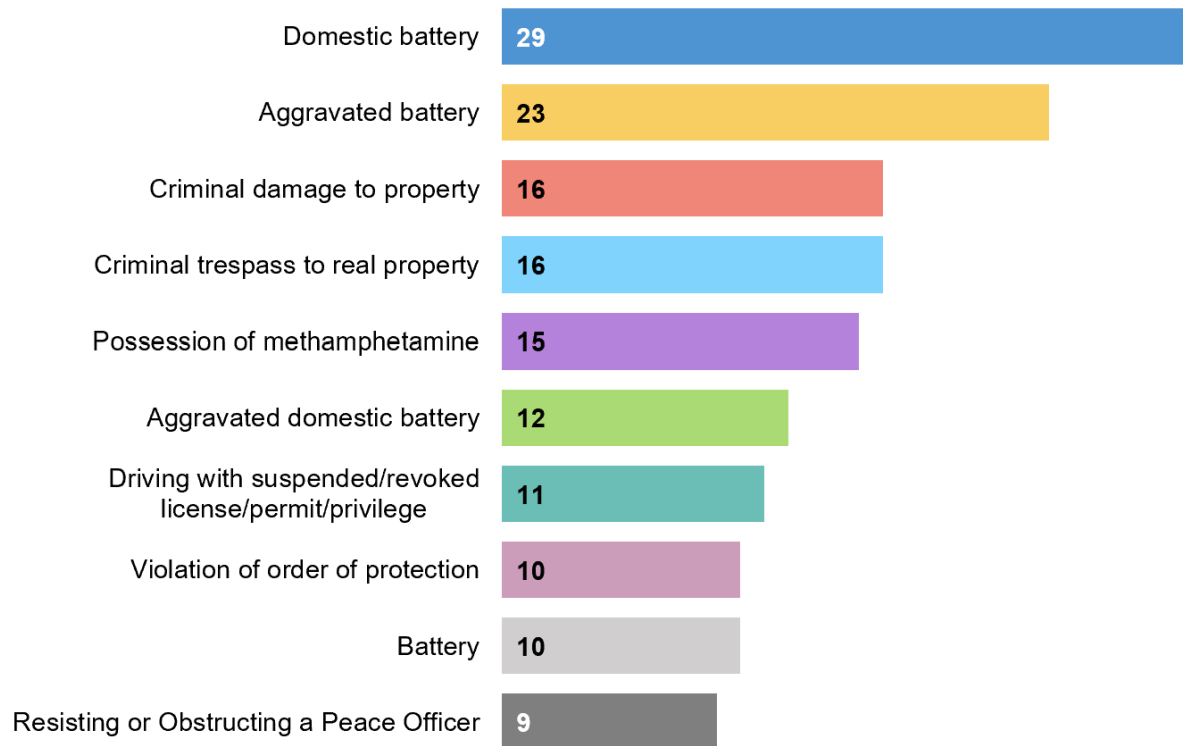
Review Process

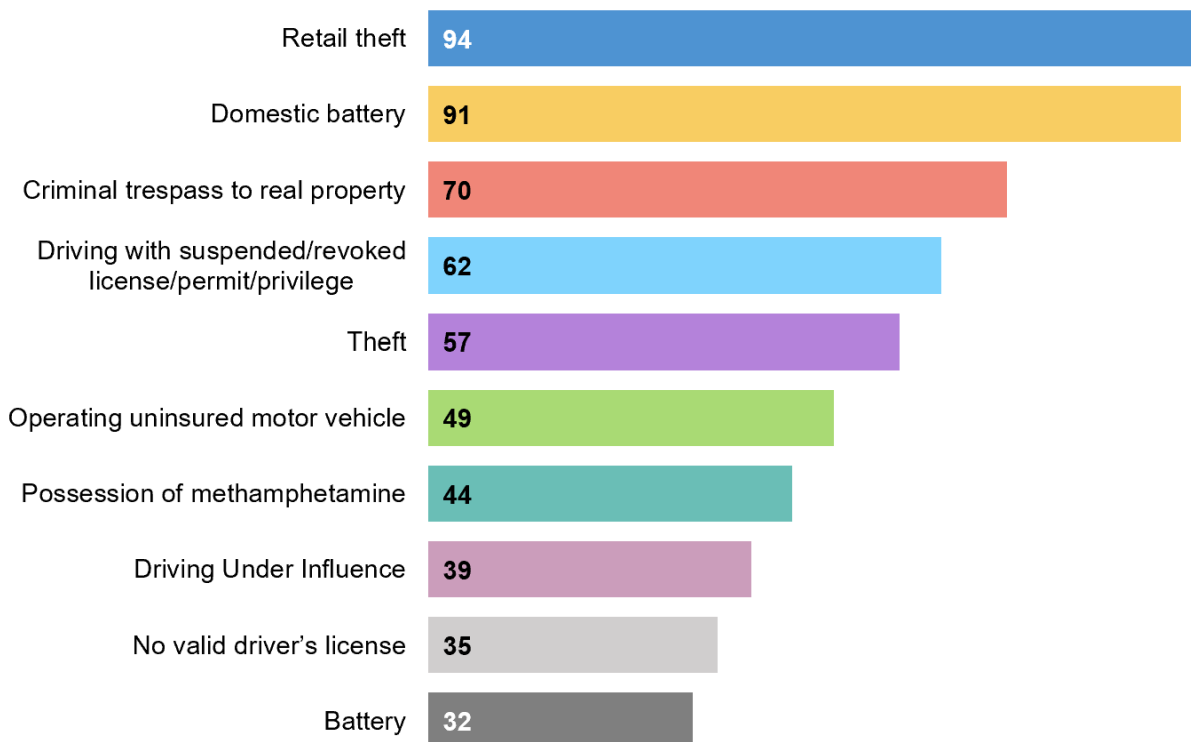

Department Overview – Elk Grove Village Police Department

Elk Grove Village Police Department consists of ninety-one (91) sworn police officers, including one (1) Chief of Police, two (2) Deputy Chiefs, four (4) Commanders, thirteen (13) Sergeants, fifty-five (55) Patrol Officers, seven (7) Investigators, three (3) Traffic Officers, one (1) Identification Officer, one (1) Crime Prevention Officer, and four (4) School Resource Officers. 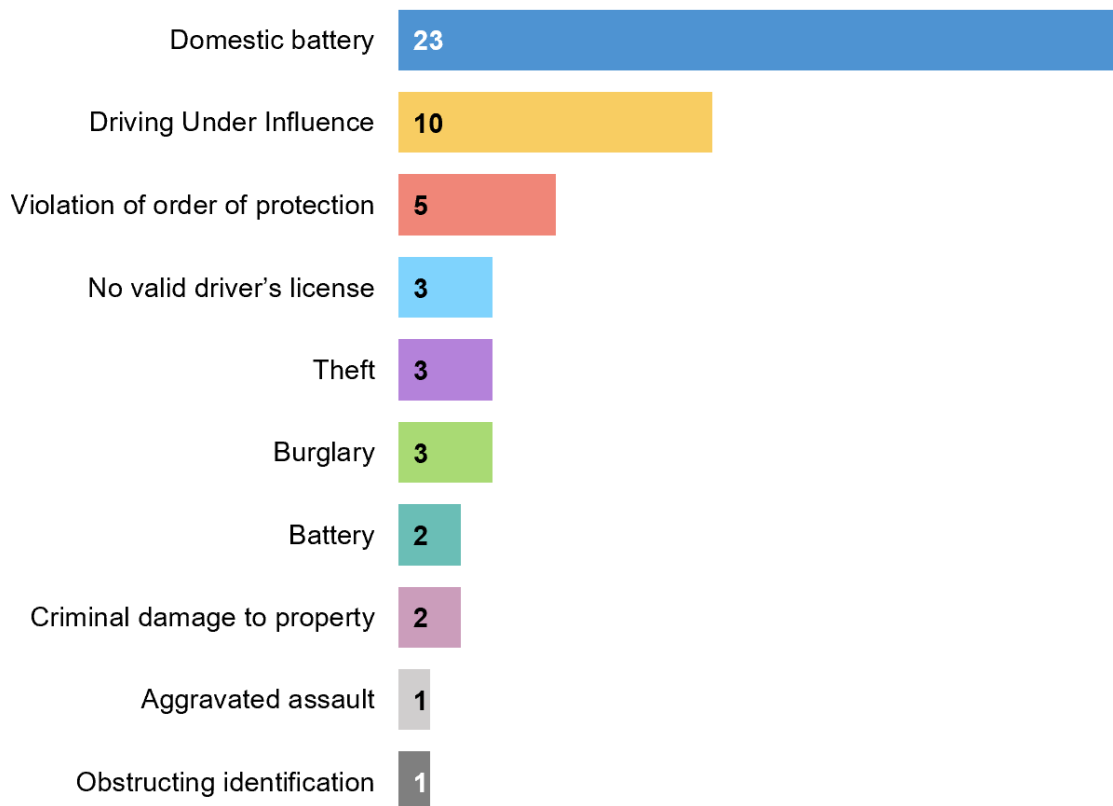

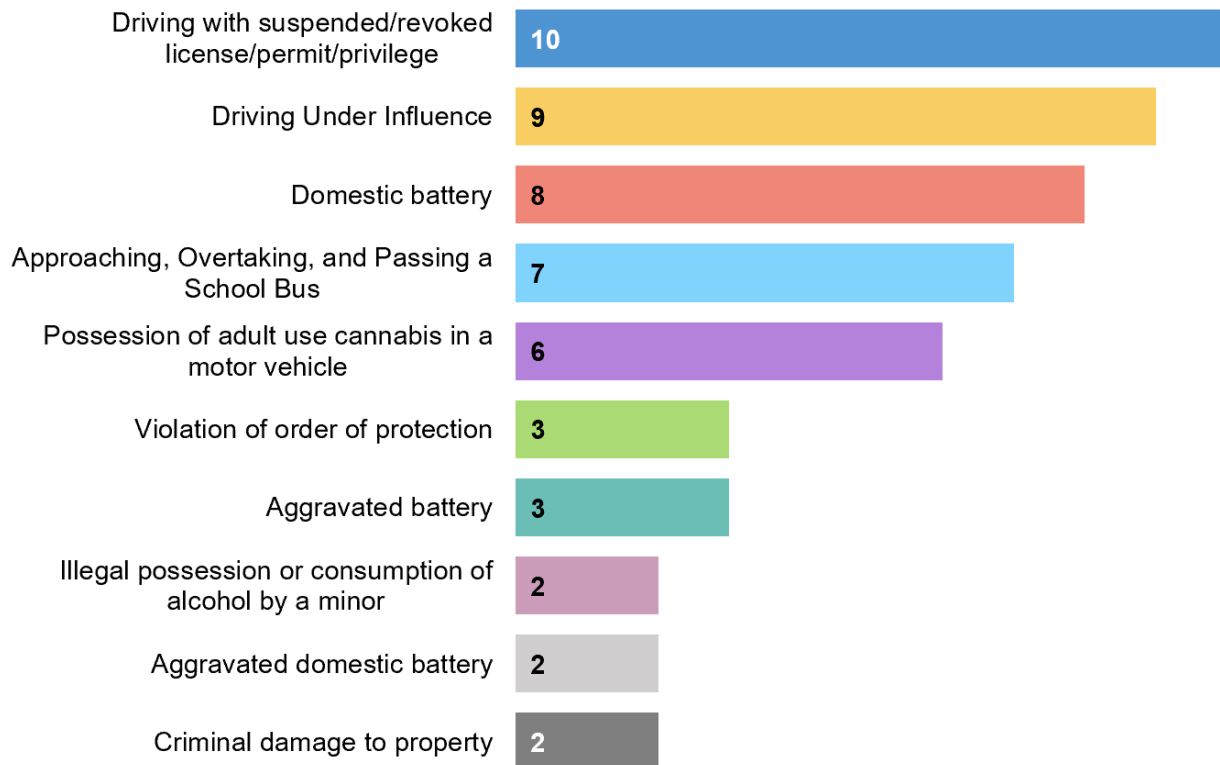

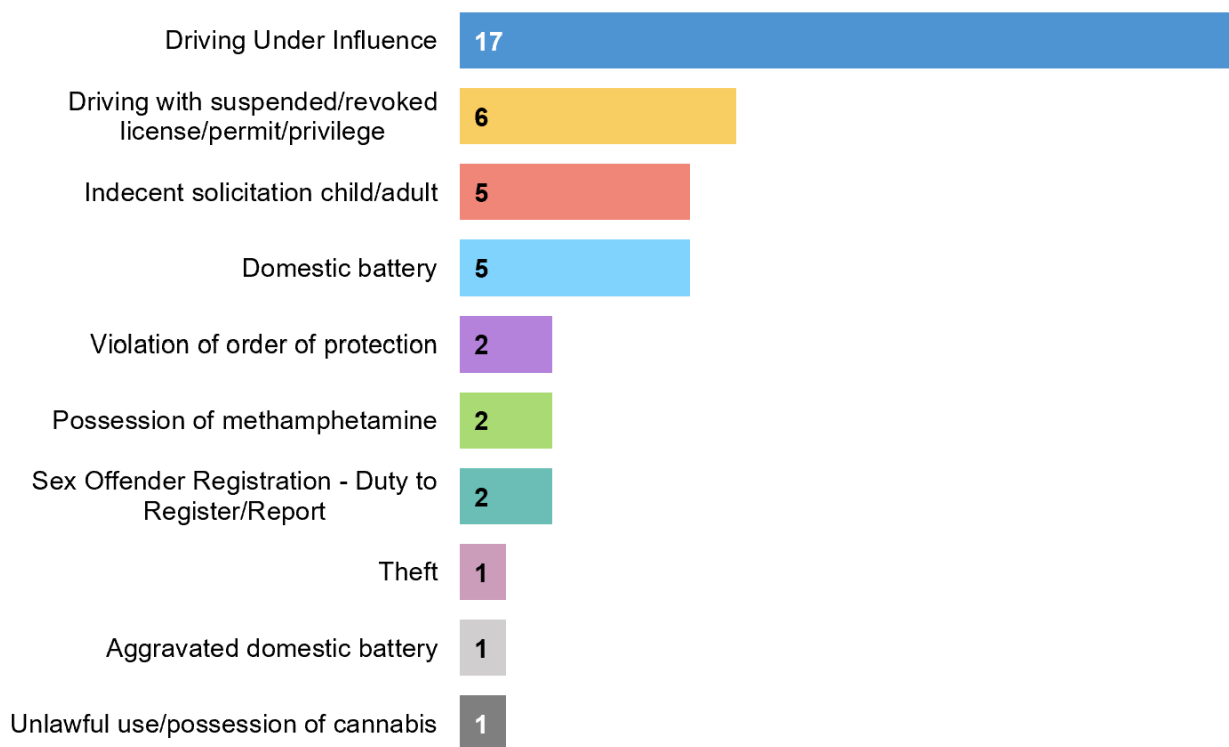

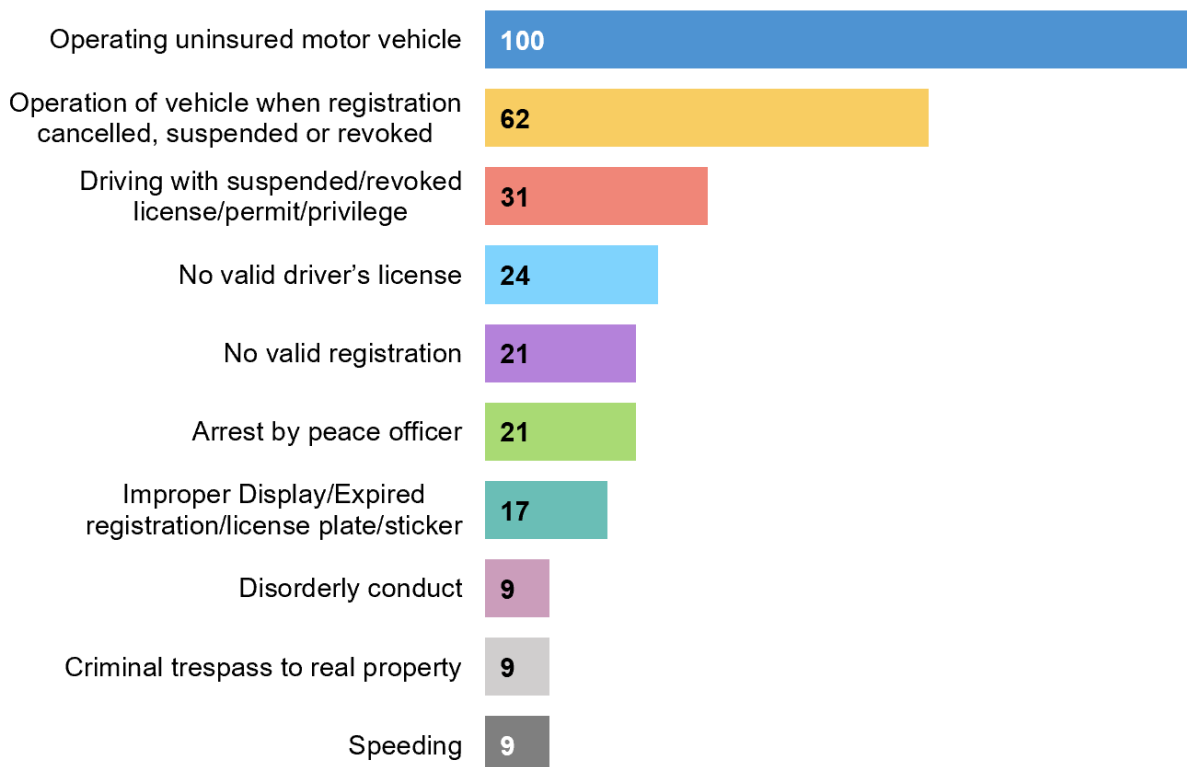

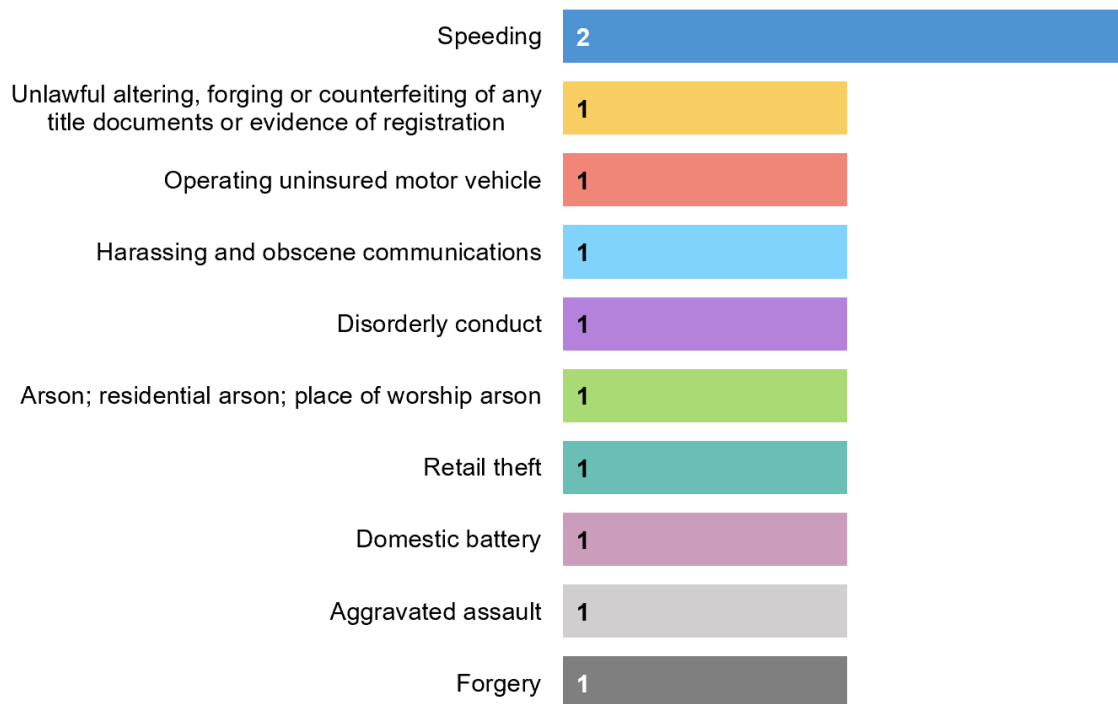

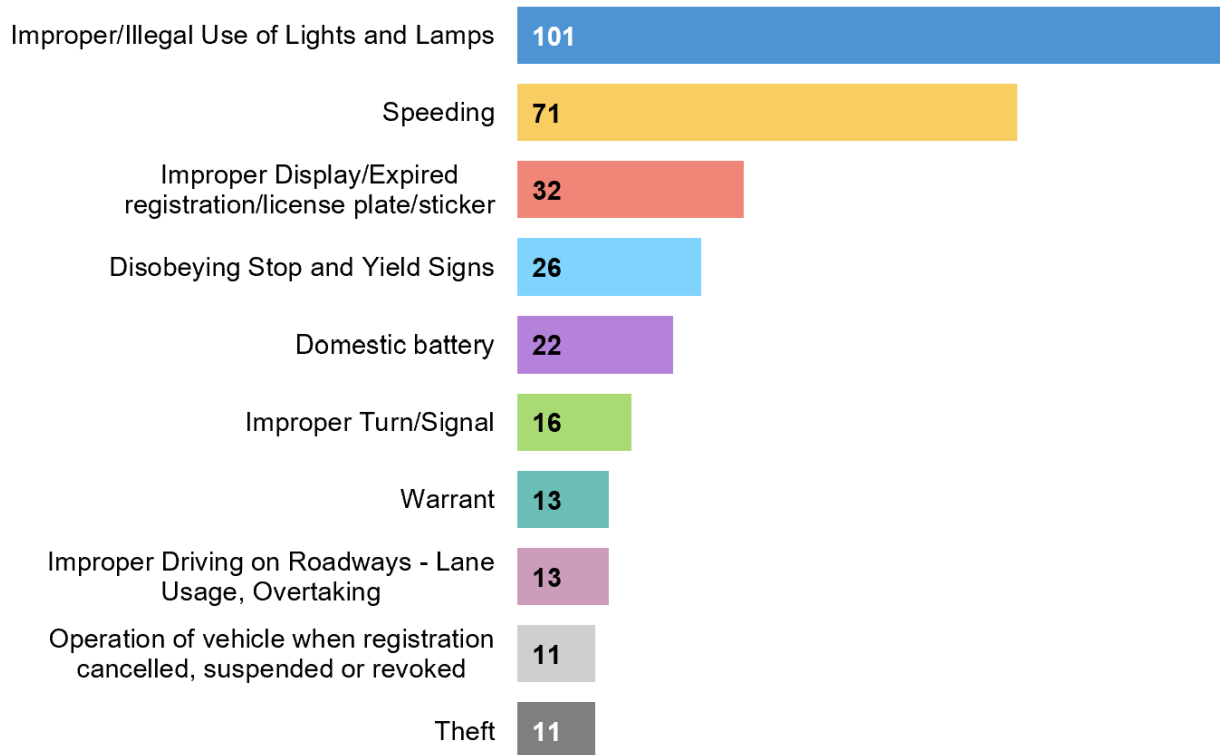

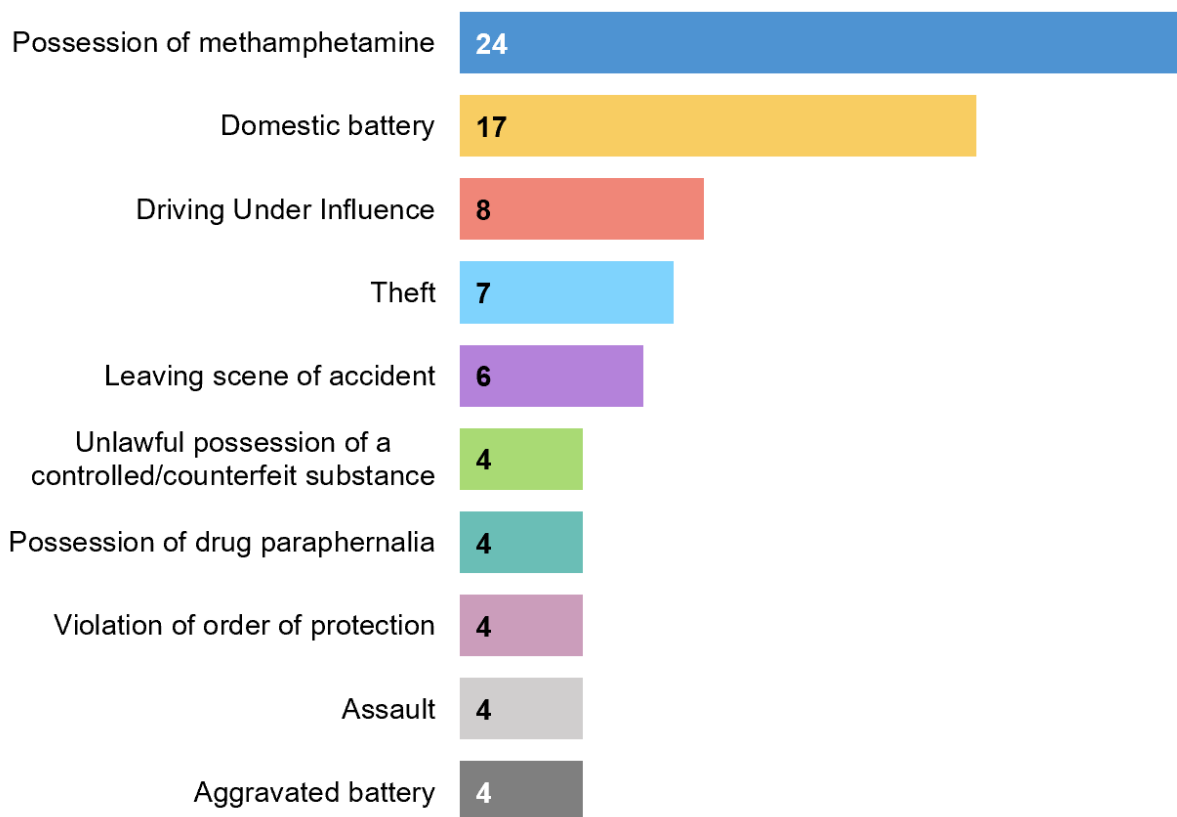

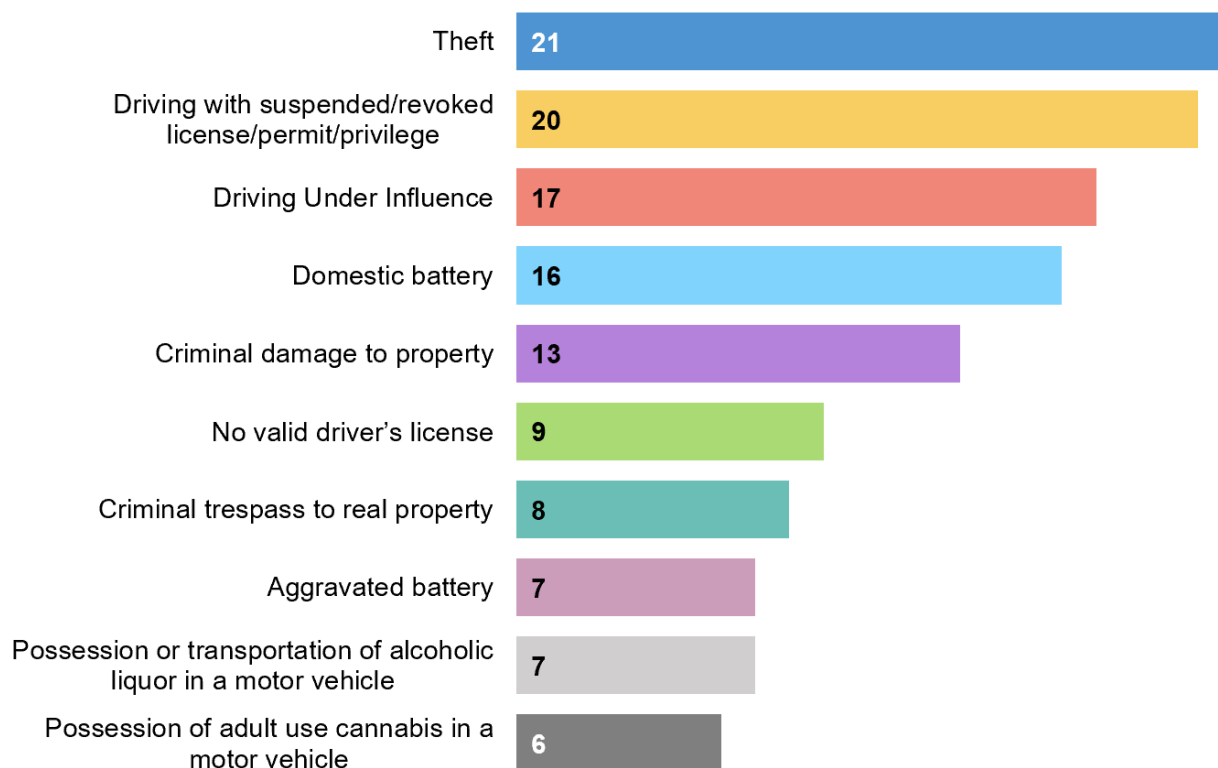

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Forest Park Police Department reports responding to nineteen thousand eight hundred ninety-two (19,892) calls for service leading to four thousand two hundred forty-five (4,245) incidents but does not include individual incident data.

Department Overview – Forest Preserve District of Kane County Public Safety Department

Forest Preserve District of Kane County Public Safety Department consists of one (1) Sergeant, and five (5) full-time officers, and a variable number of part-time officers who utilize ten (10) Getac body worn cameras.

Department Overview – Forest Preserve District of Will County Police Department

Forest Preserve District of Will County Police Department consists of twenty-eight (28) sworn officers who utilize nineteen (19) Axon body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Forest Preserve District of Will County Police Department reports two (2) issues with the body worn cameras including network error and display screen not working. The body worn cameras were replaced by Axon.

Review Process

Forest Preserve District of Will County Police Department's supervisors perform quarterly random reviews of body worn camera recordings which consist of three (3) incidents' footage of each officer. Supervisors coordinate the selection of their reviews with one another to ensure there are no duplicate reviews. The reviews are documented on the Body Worn Camera Video Review Form. The reviews are intended to assess officer performance, determine whether body worn camera equipment is functioning and being properly used and identify material that may be appropriate for training.

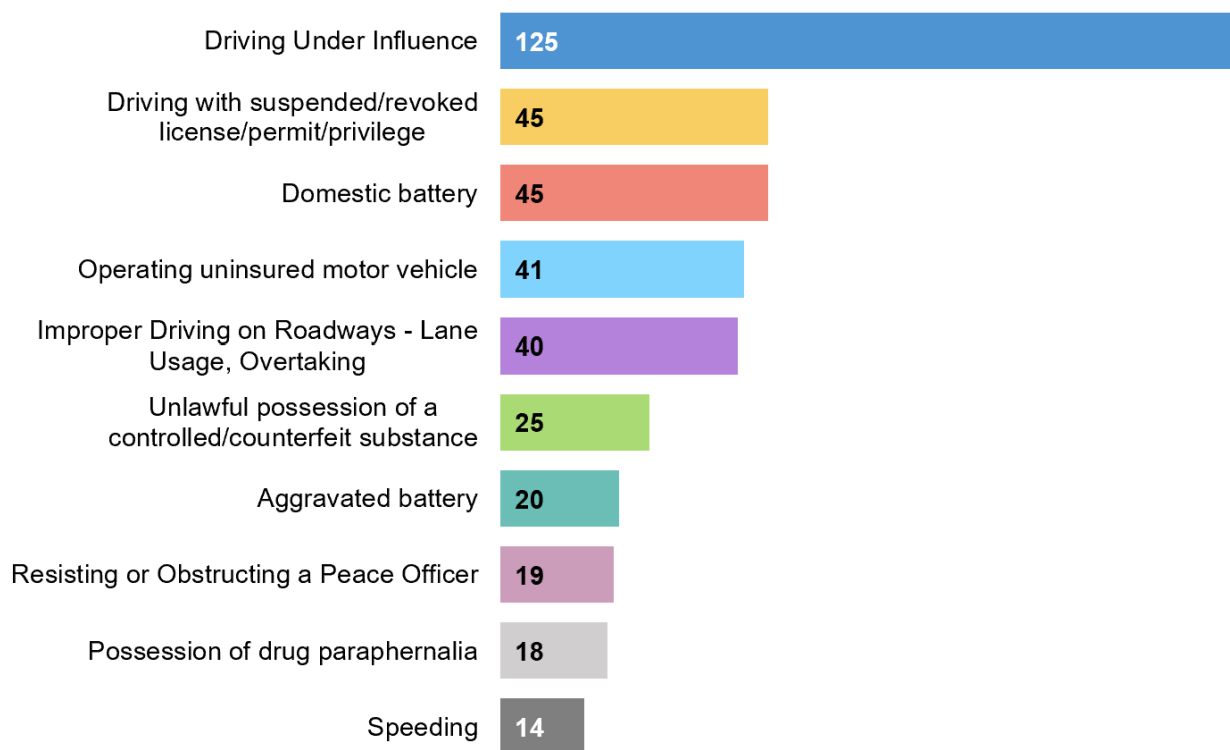

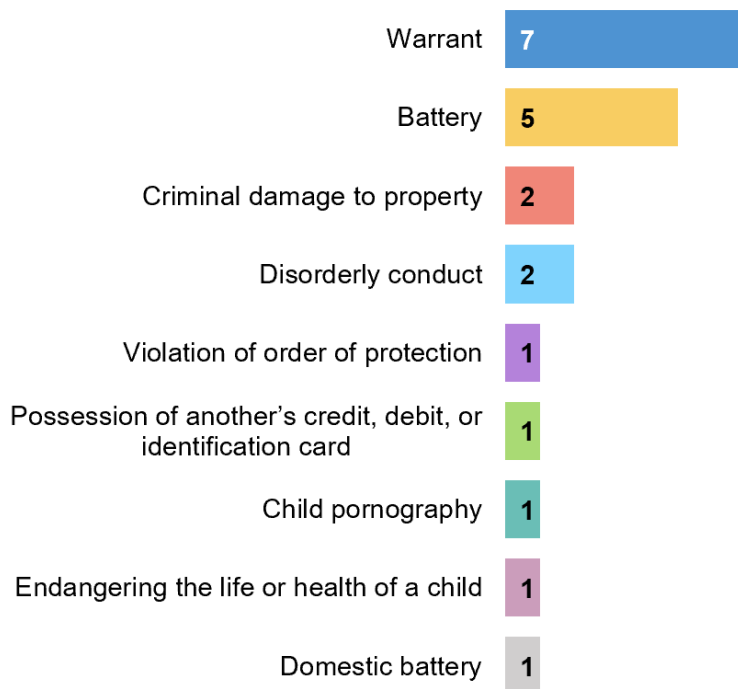

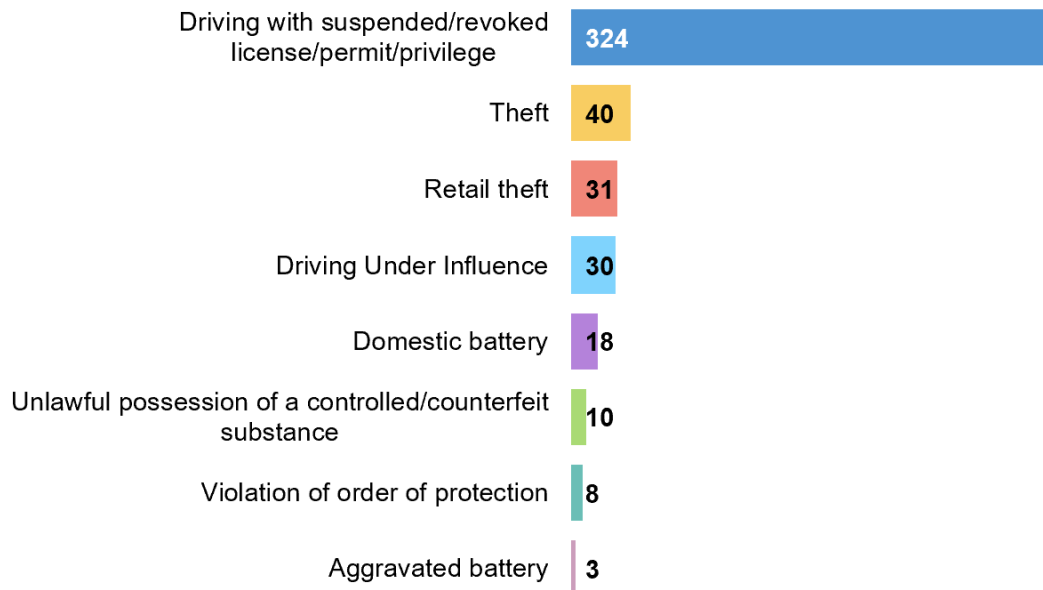

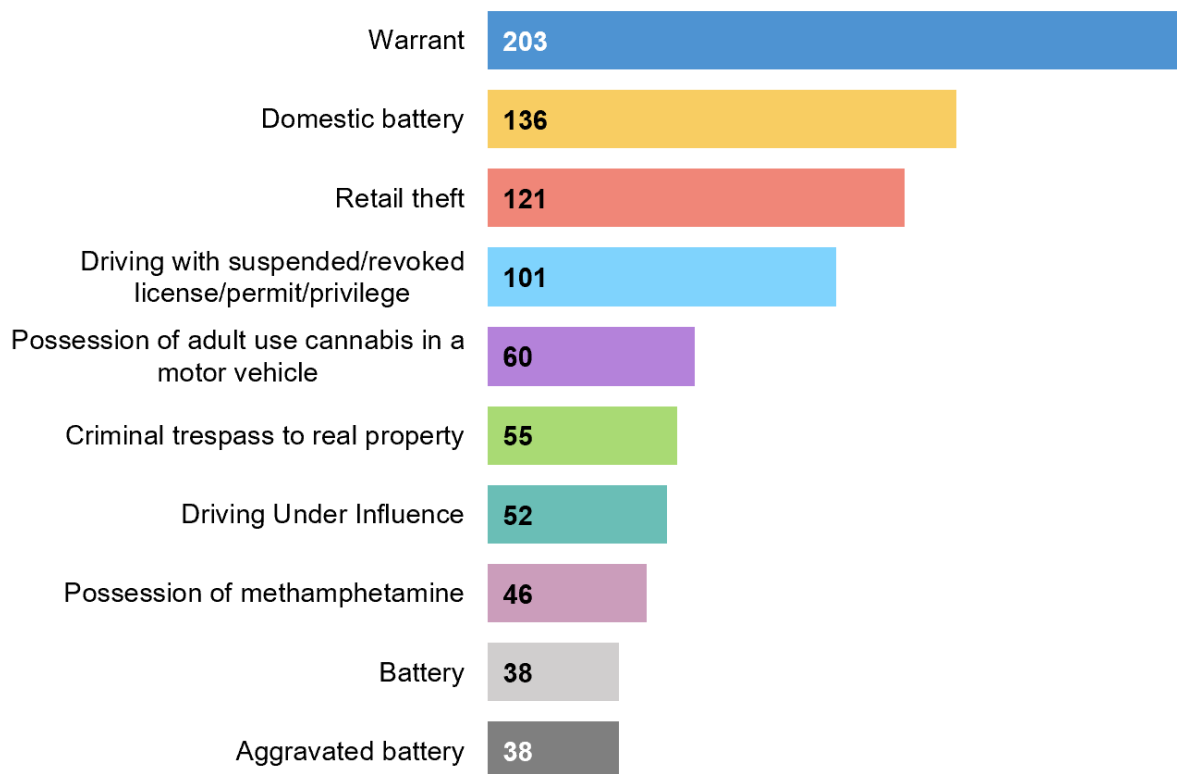

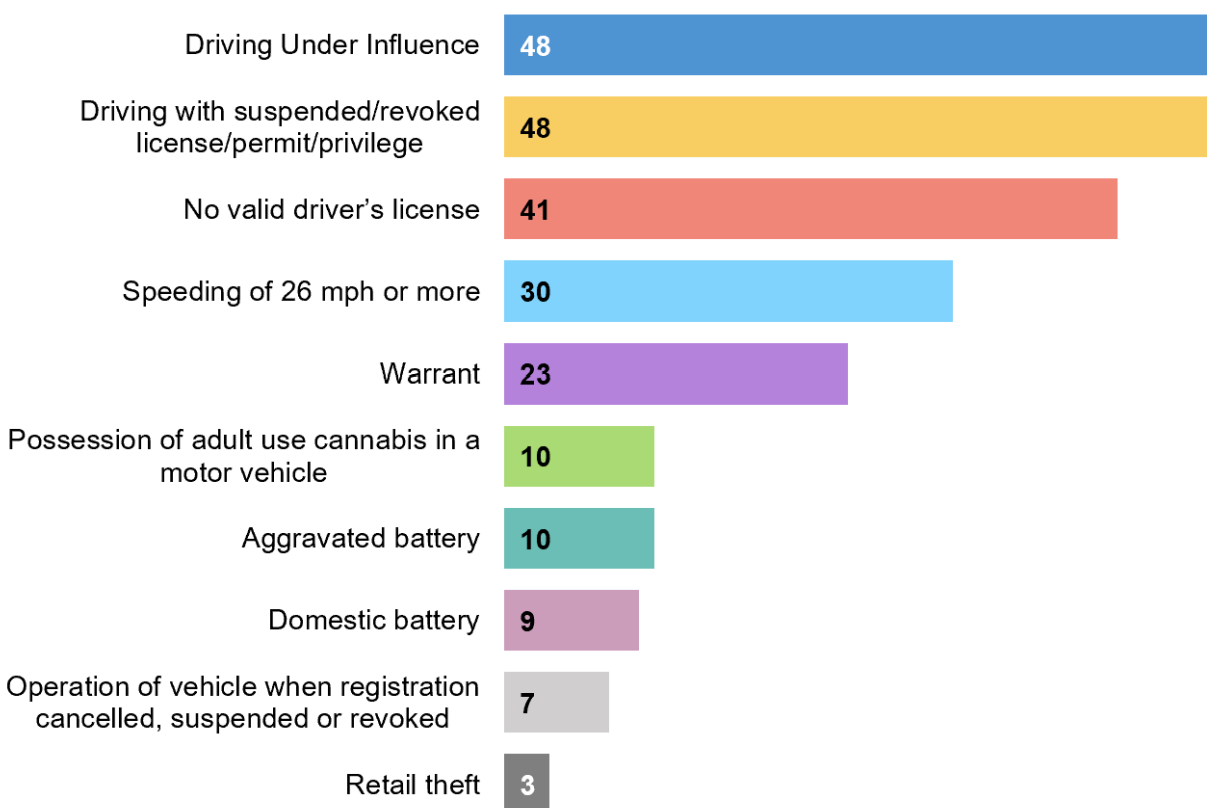

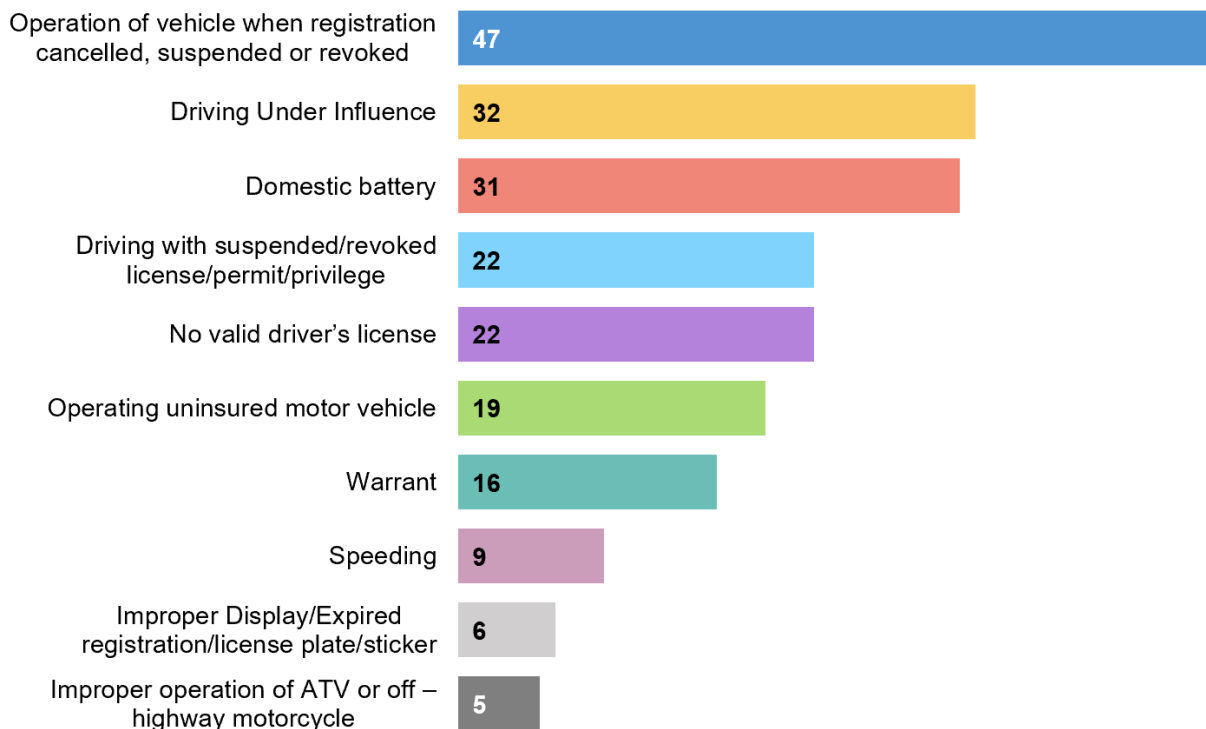

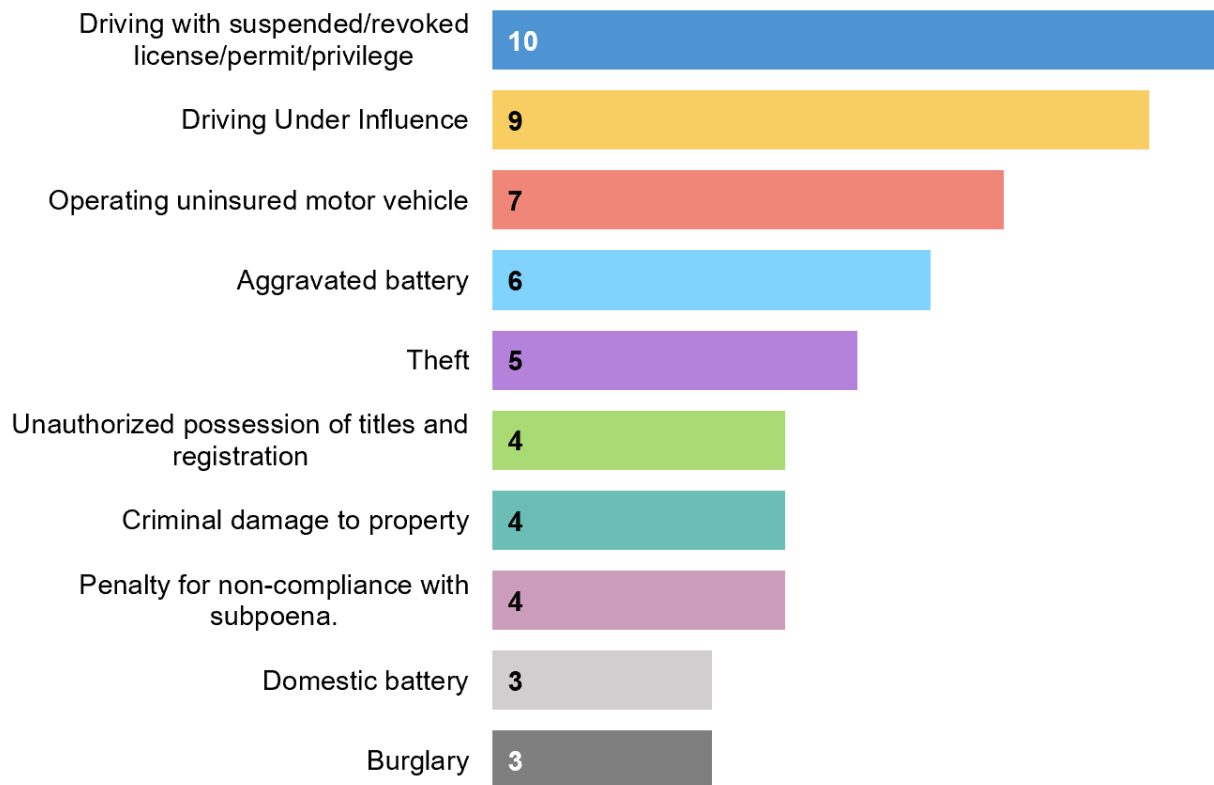

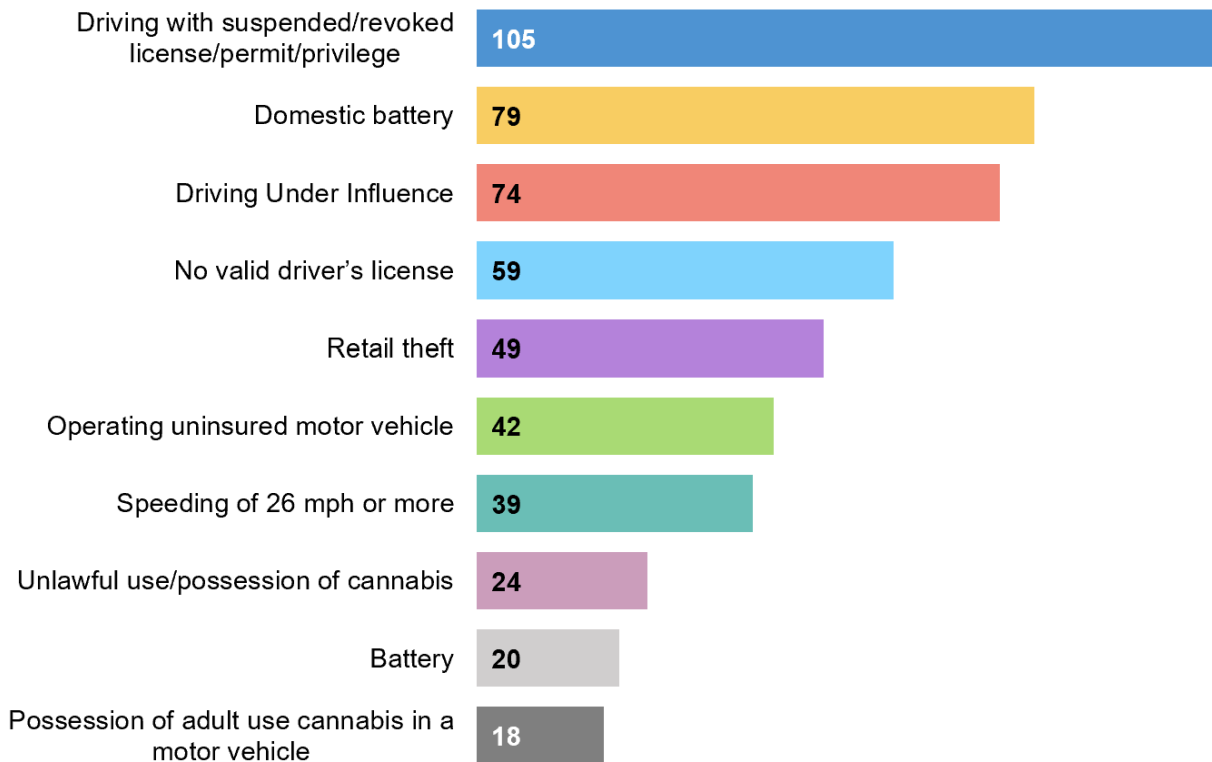

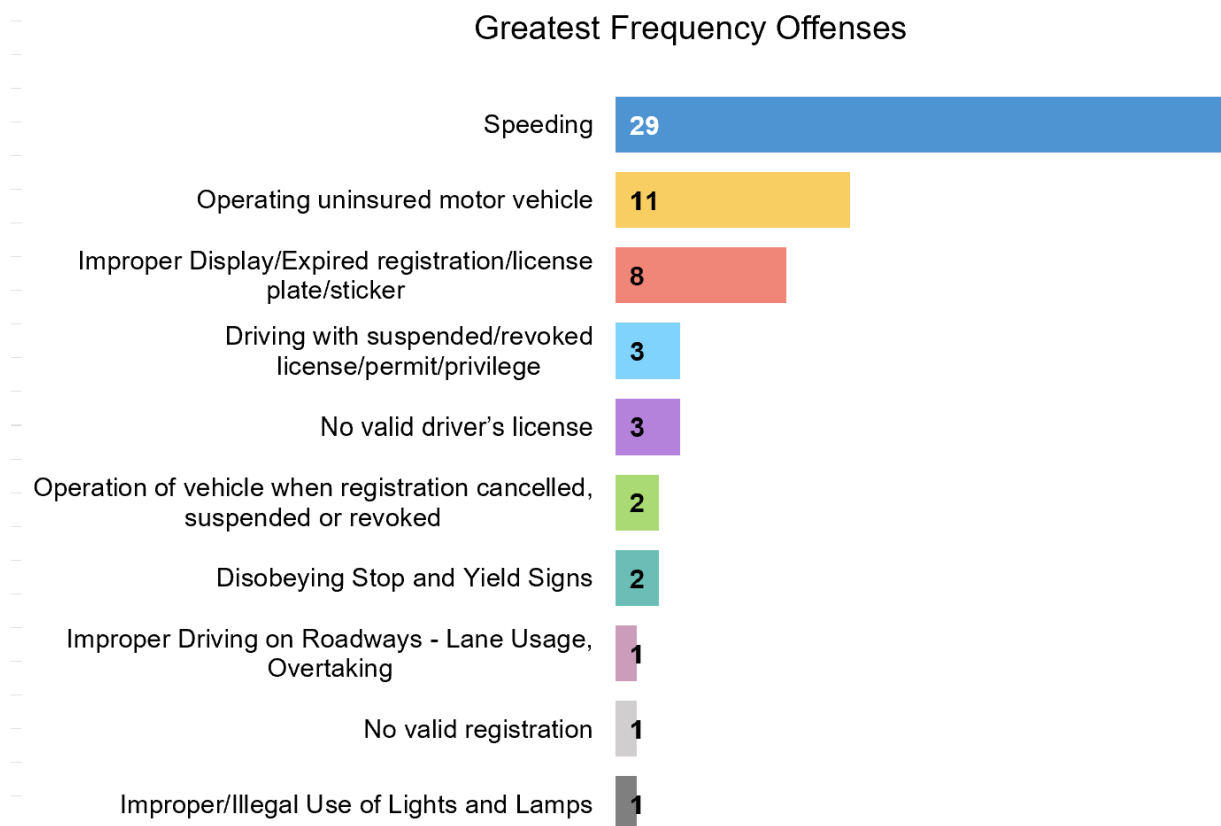

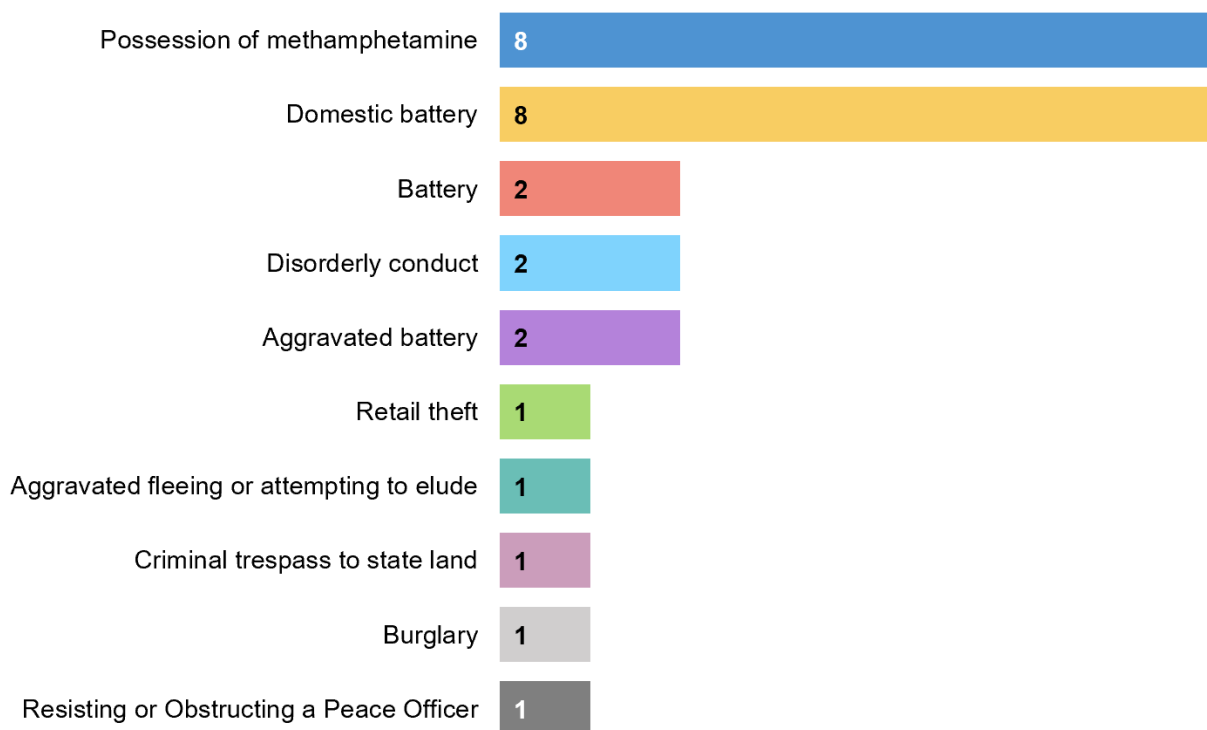

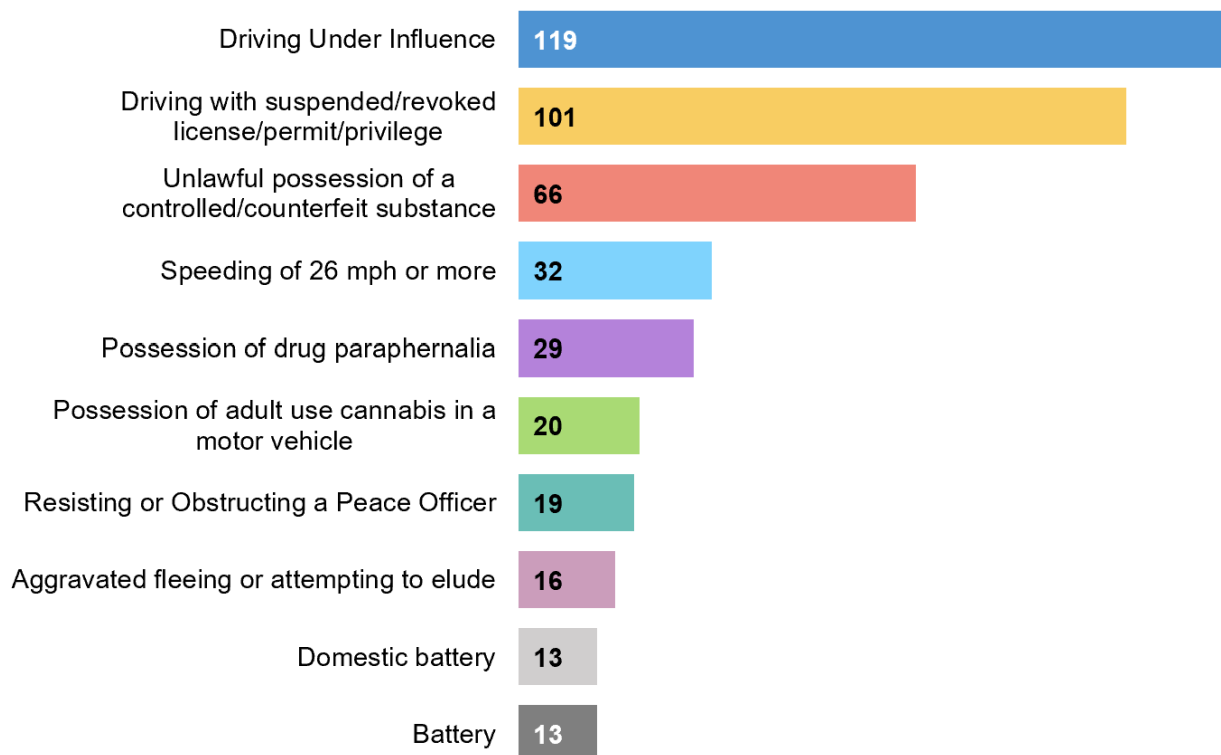

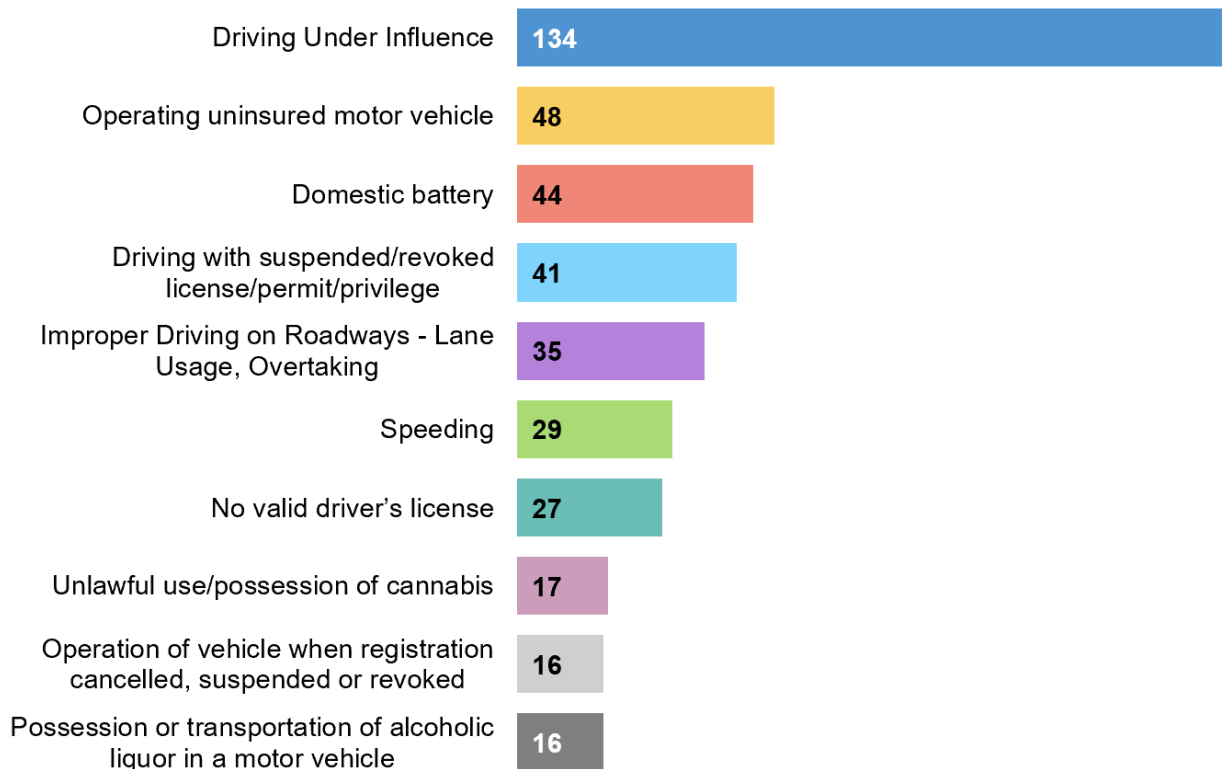

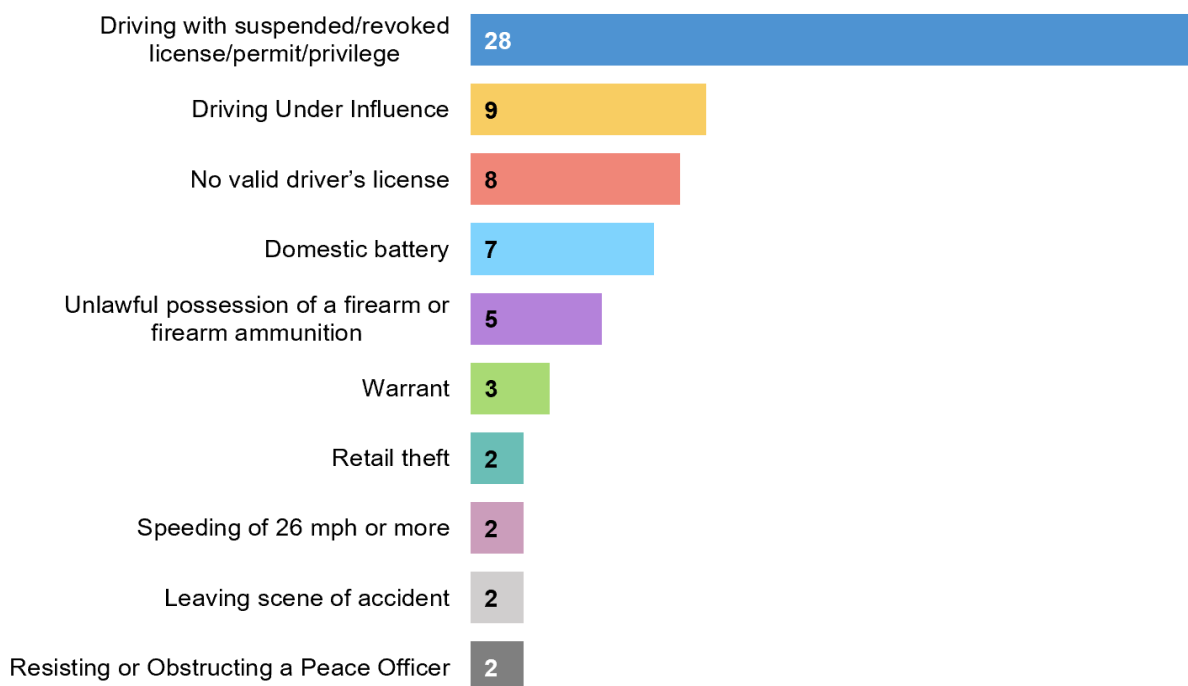

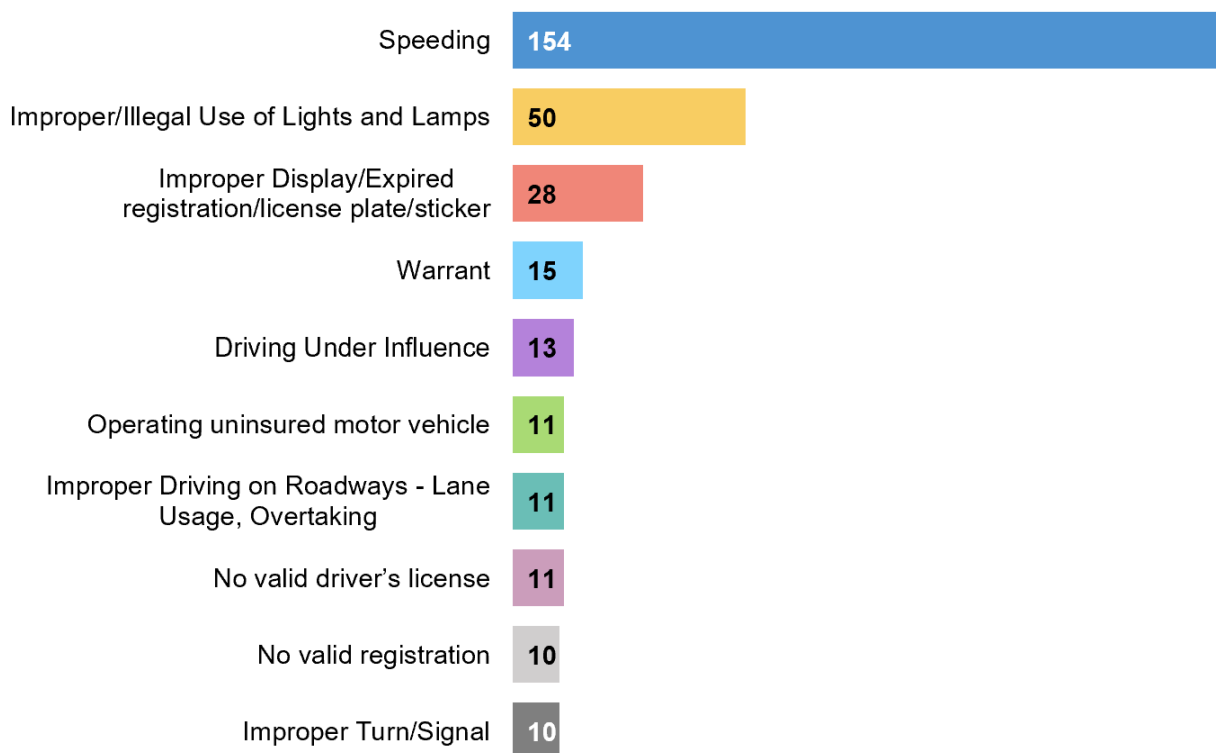

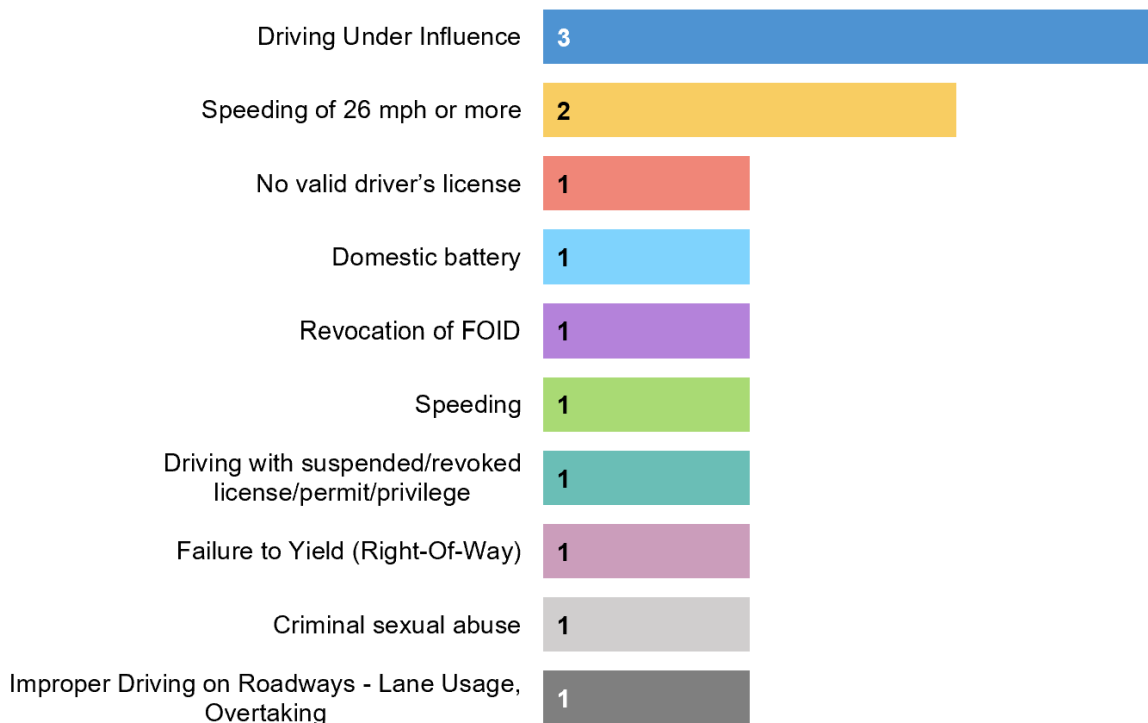

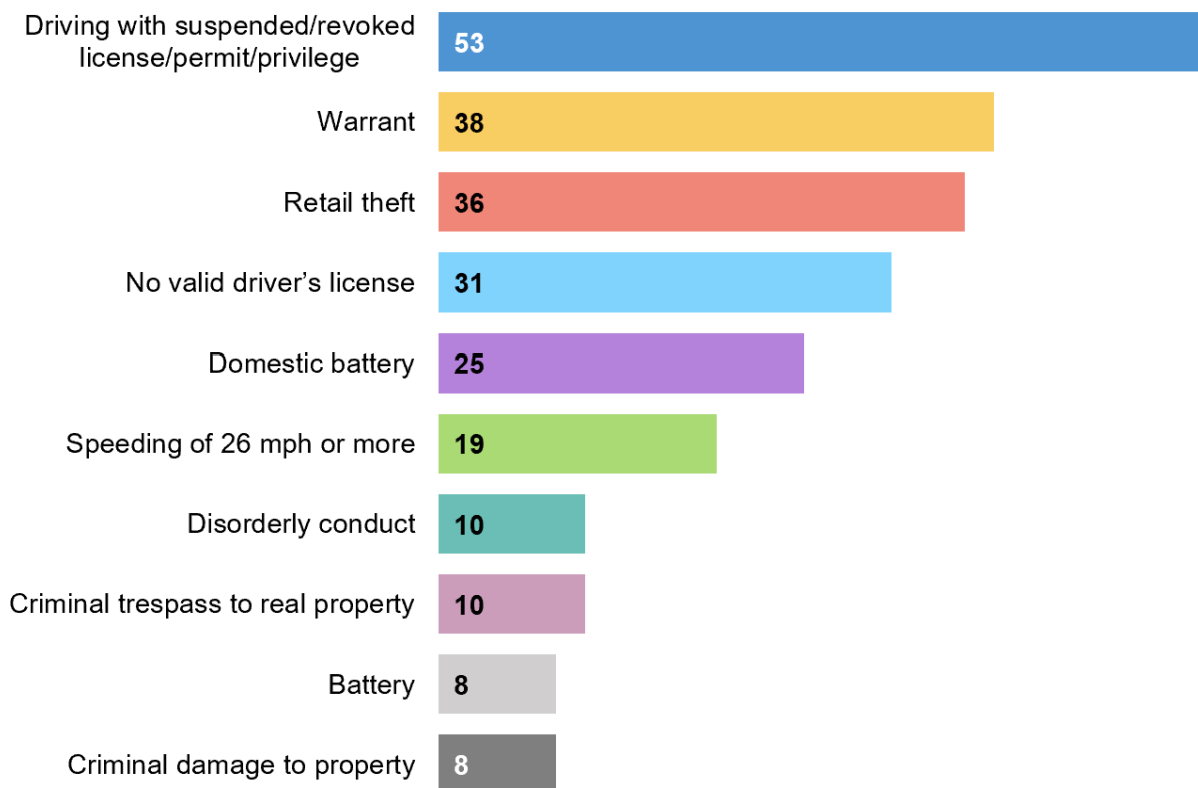

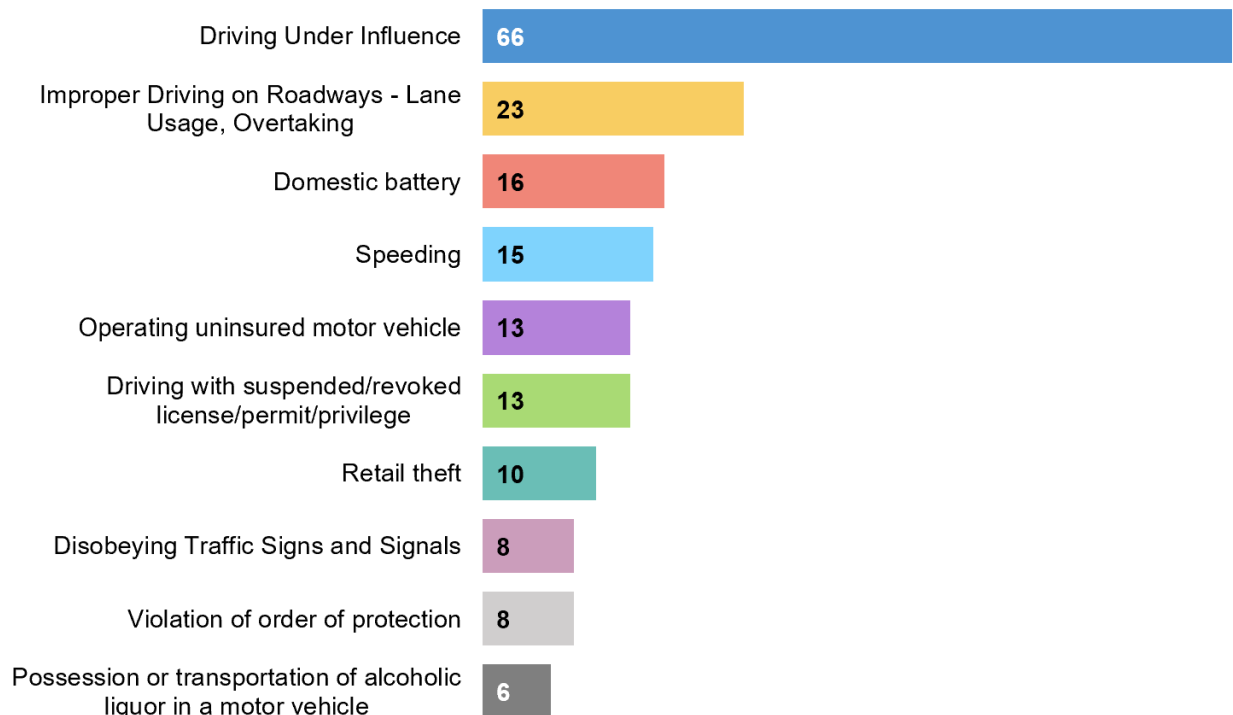

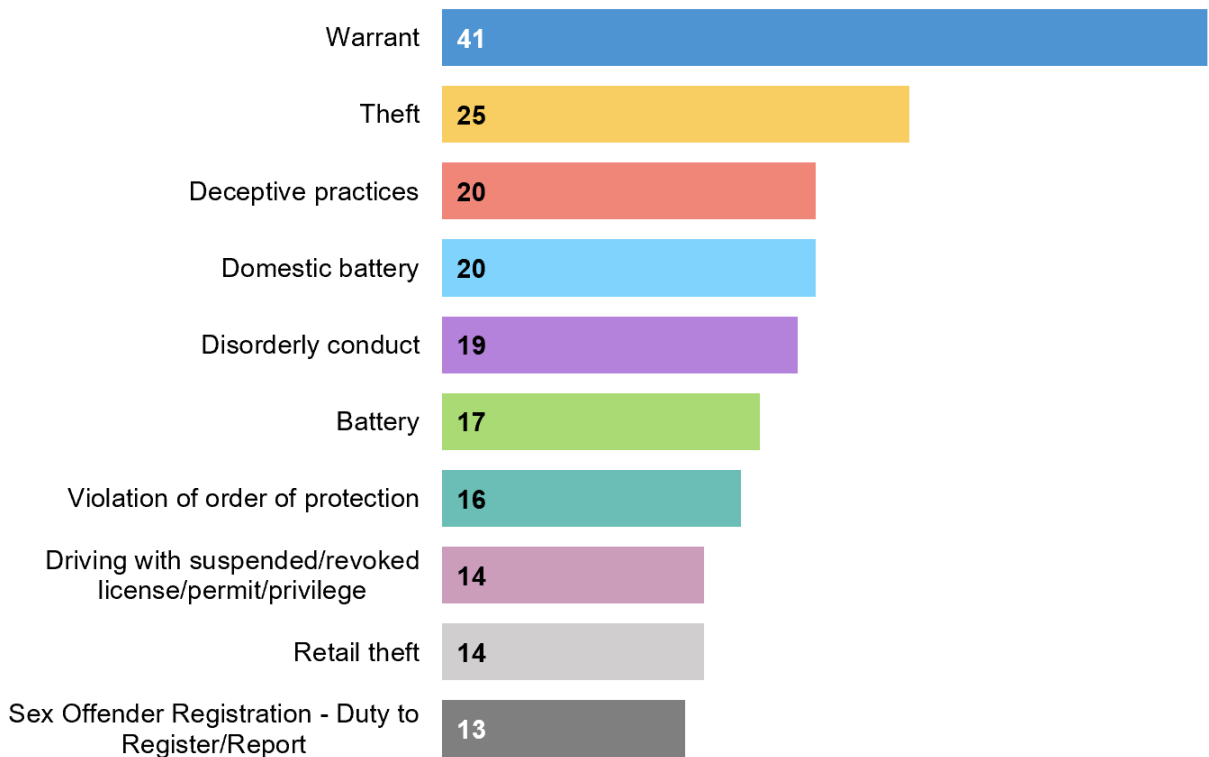

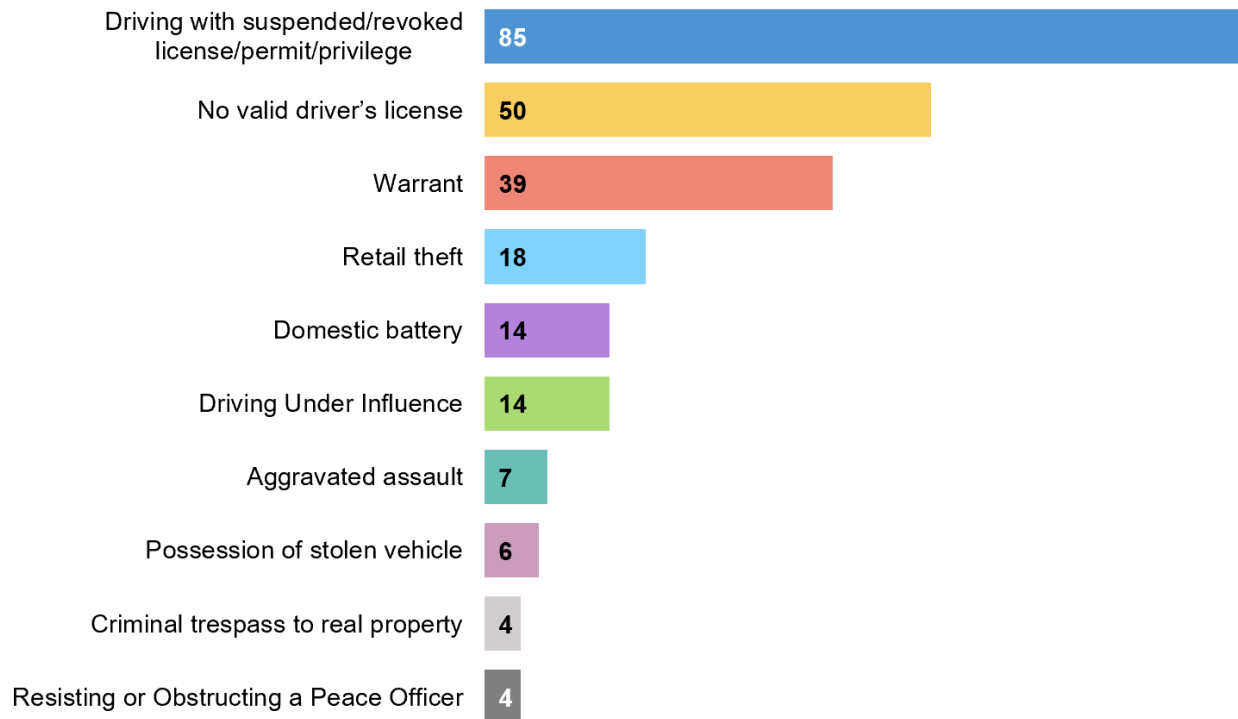

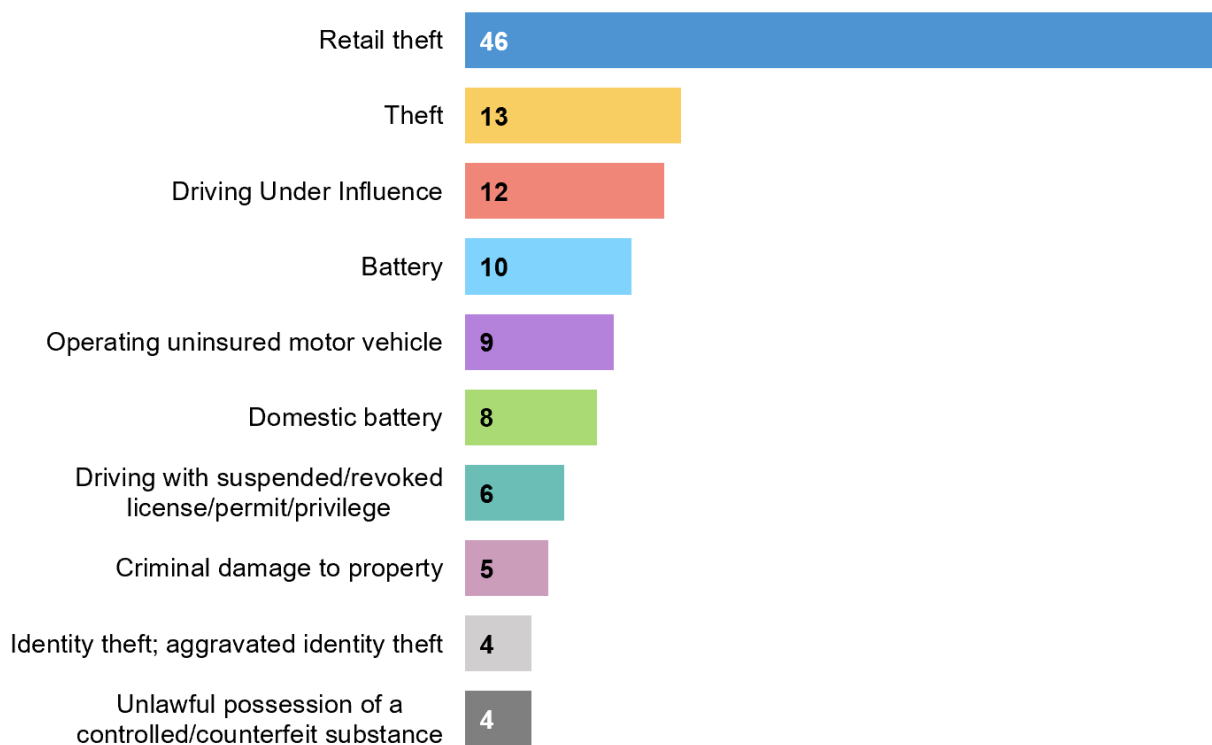

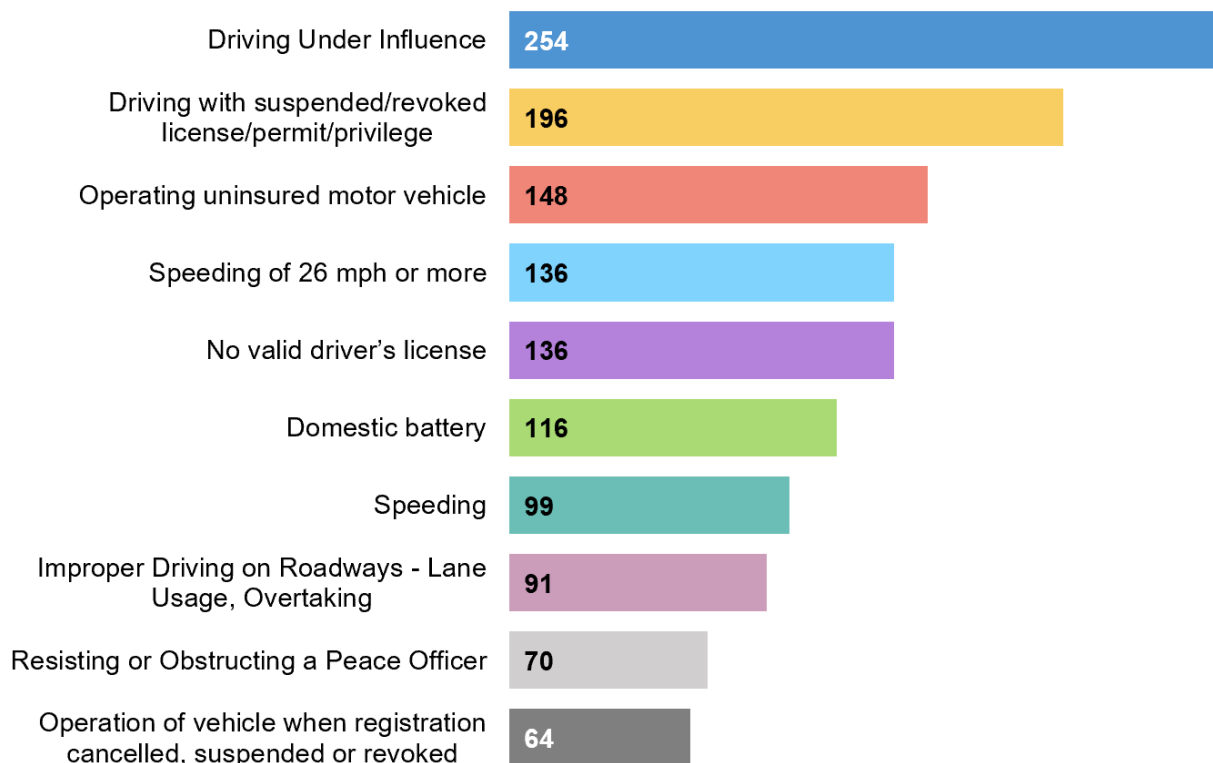

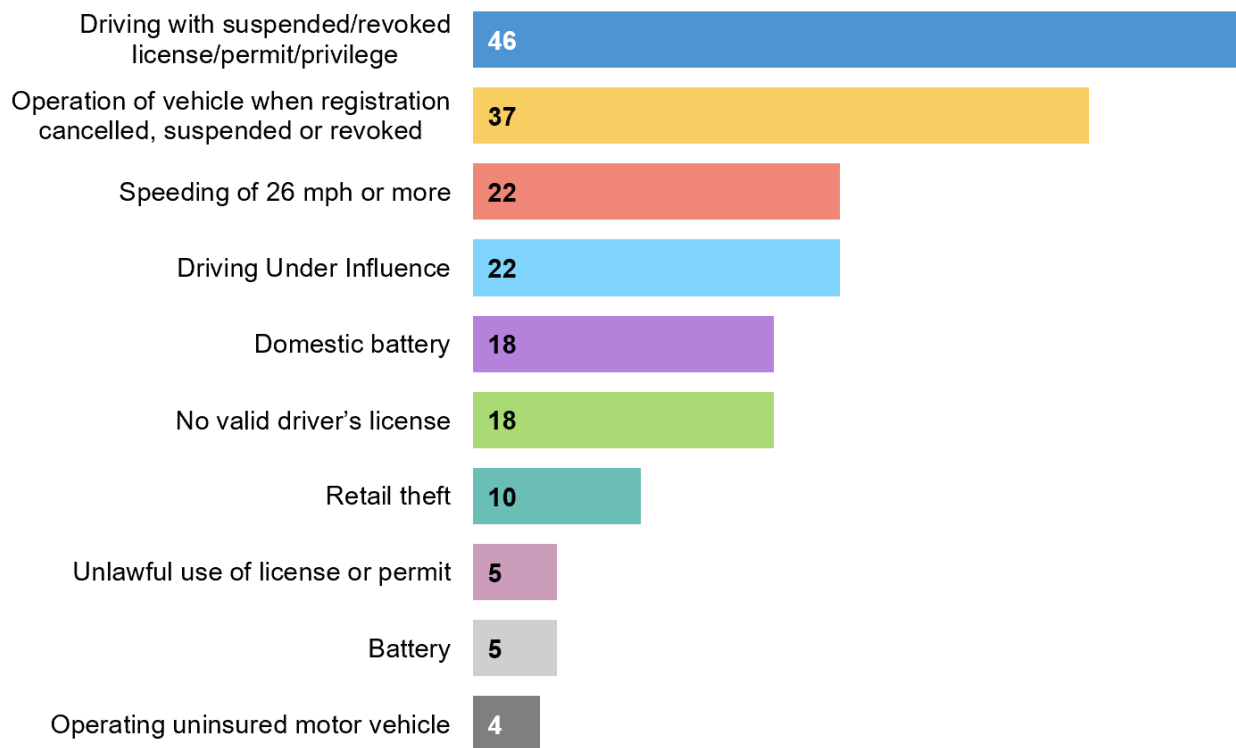

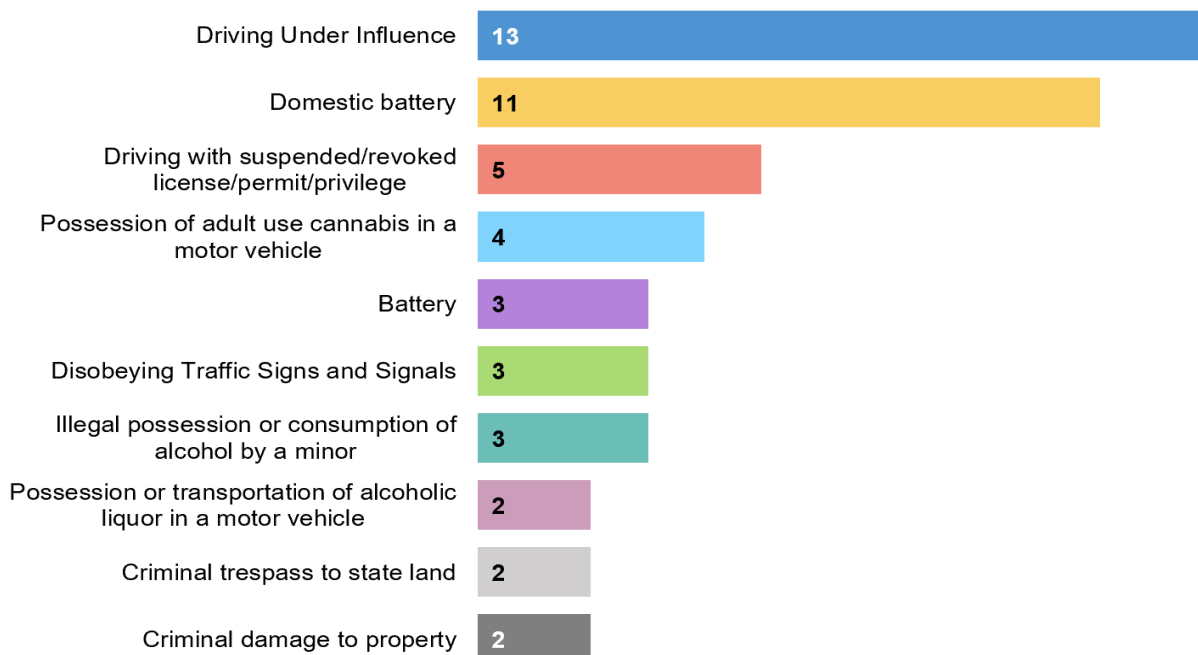

Technical Issues

Inverness Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

Review Process

Inverness Police Department's Chief and two (2) assigned officers randomly review body worn camera videos weekly. The purpose of this review is to ensure that the equipment is operating properly and that officers are using the cameras appropriately and in accordance with this policy and training. They further ensure that videos are categorized properly.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Inverness Police Department reports zero (0) incidents.

Department Overview – Island Lake Police Department

Island Lake Police Department consists of fifteen (15) full-time officers who utilize sixteen (16) body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Island Lake Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

Review Process

Island Lake Police Department's supervisors are authorized to conduct periodic reviews of a sample of each subordinate's body worn camera media to evaluate body worn camera use and ensure compliance with this policy. Supervisors review body worn camera media that is tagged as a significant event or that the supervisor is aware pertains to a significant event.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Island Lake Police Department reports eight (8) incidents leading to fifteen (15) offenses which include two (2) instances each of Operating uninsured motor vehicle, Driving Under Influence, Disorderly conduct and Driving with suspended/revoked license/permit/privilege and one (1) instance each of Resisting or Obstructing a Peace Officer, Unlawful visitation interference, Speeding, Criminal trespass to real property, Improper Driving on Roadways - Lane Usage, Overtaking and Leaving scene of accident.

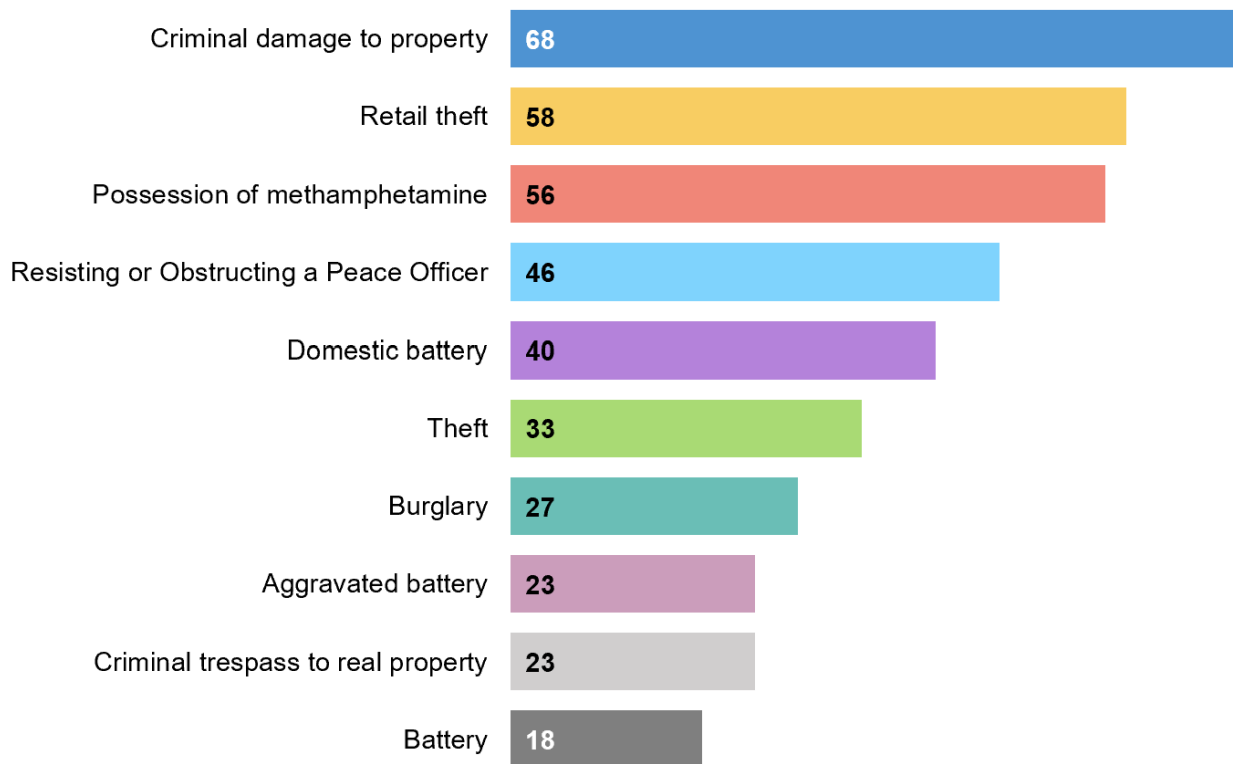

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Joliet Junior College Police Department reports six (6) incidents leading to fourteen (14) offenses charged including four (4) instances each of Driving with suspended/revoked license/permit/privilege and Operating uninsured motor vehicle each, two (2) instances of Improper Display/Expired registration/license plate/sticker and one (1) instance each of Operation of vehicle when registration cancelled, suspended or revoked, Improper Driving on Roadways - Lane Usage, Overtaking, Criminal trespass to state land and Warrant each.

Department Overview – Joliet Police Department

Technical Issues

Joliet Police Department reports multiple technical issues including cameras not uploading videos to the cloud, translation features not functioning properly and audio distortion. These body worn cameras were replaced by Axon.

Review Process

Joliet Police Department utilizes a structured supervisor review process to ensure compliance with department policy and state law. The department utilizes built-in software in Axon's evidence.com, called Axon Performance. This program randomly selects body worn camera footage of officers and supervisors. The pre-designated parameters ensure that three (3) videos are generated for review every month. The supervisor one rank above the rank of the officer, is responsible for these reviews. Any deficiencies in how the camera is utilized, worn, and functions are documented and then an email is directed to the officer or supervisor for correction.

Joliet Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Justice Police Department

Justice Police Department consists of twenty-five (25) officers out of whom twenty-one (21) are issued Axon body worn cameras.

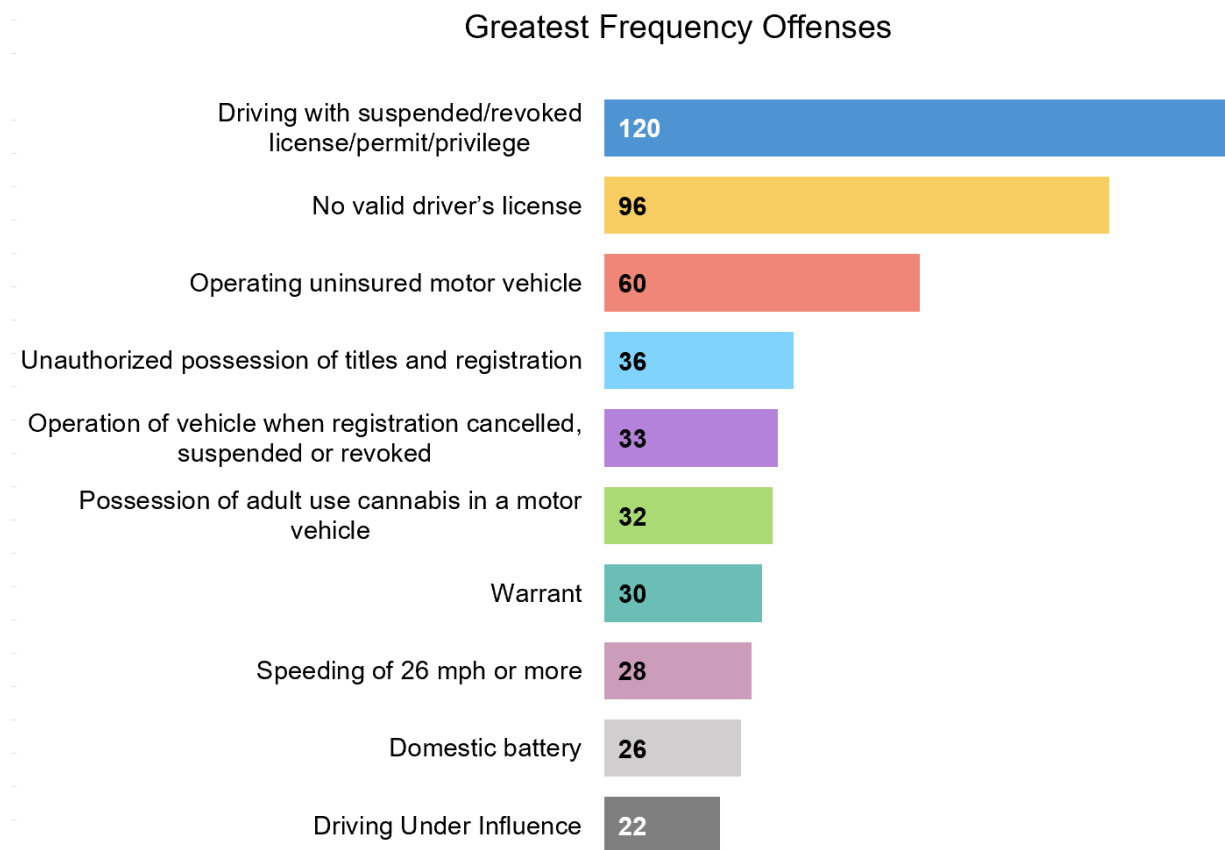

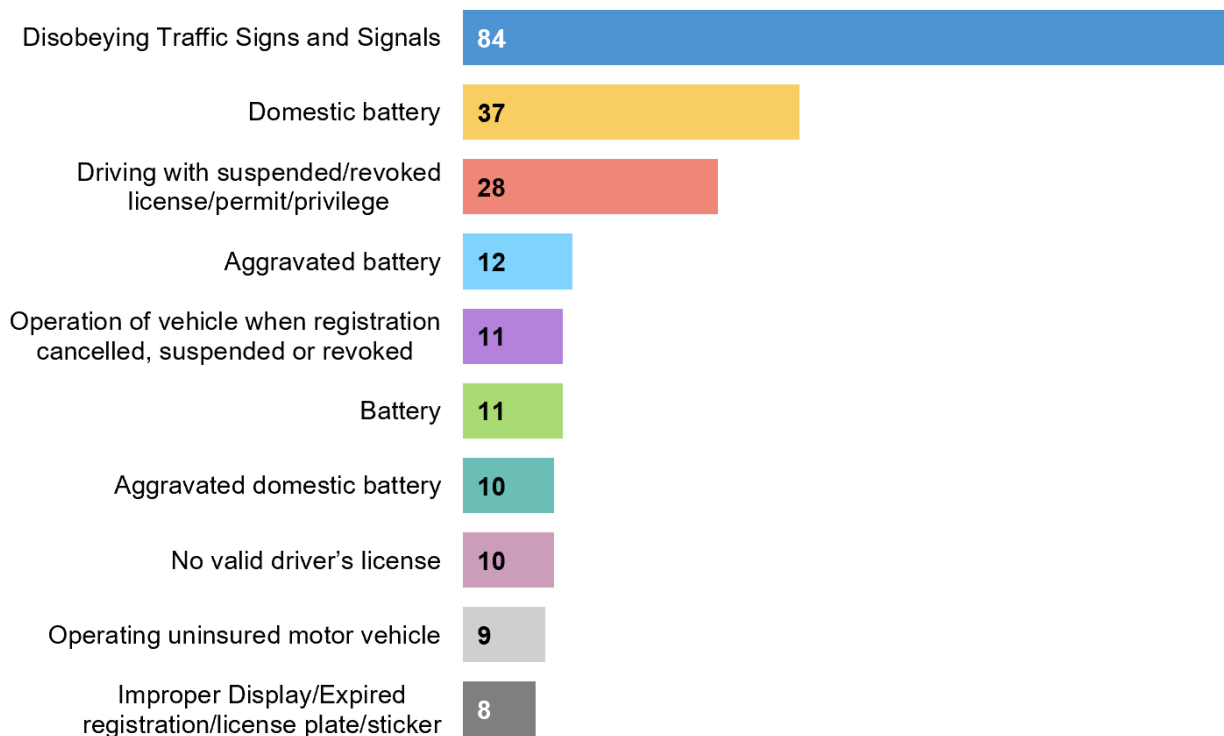

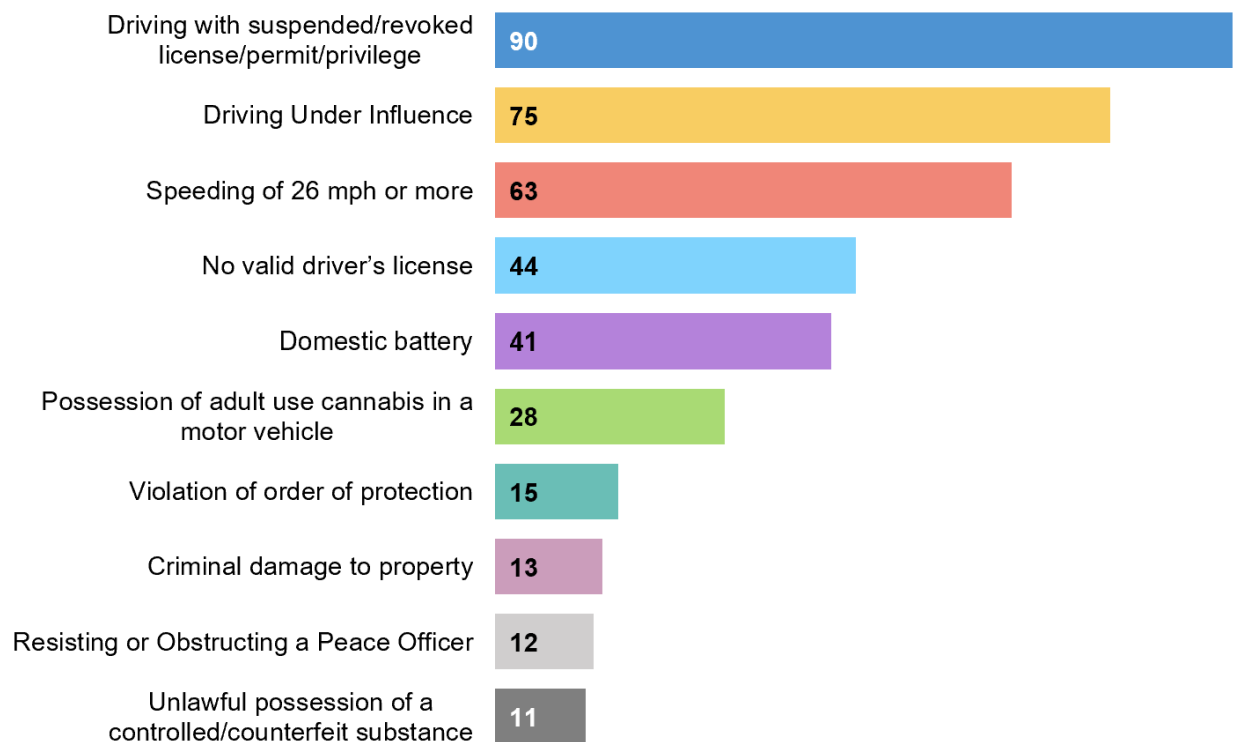

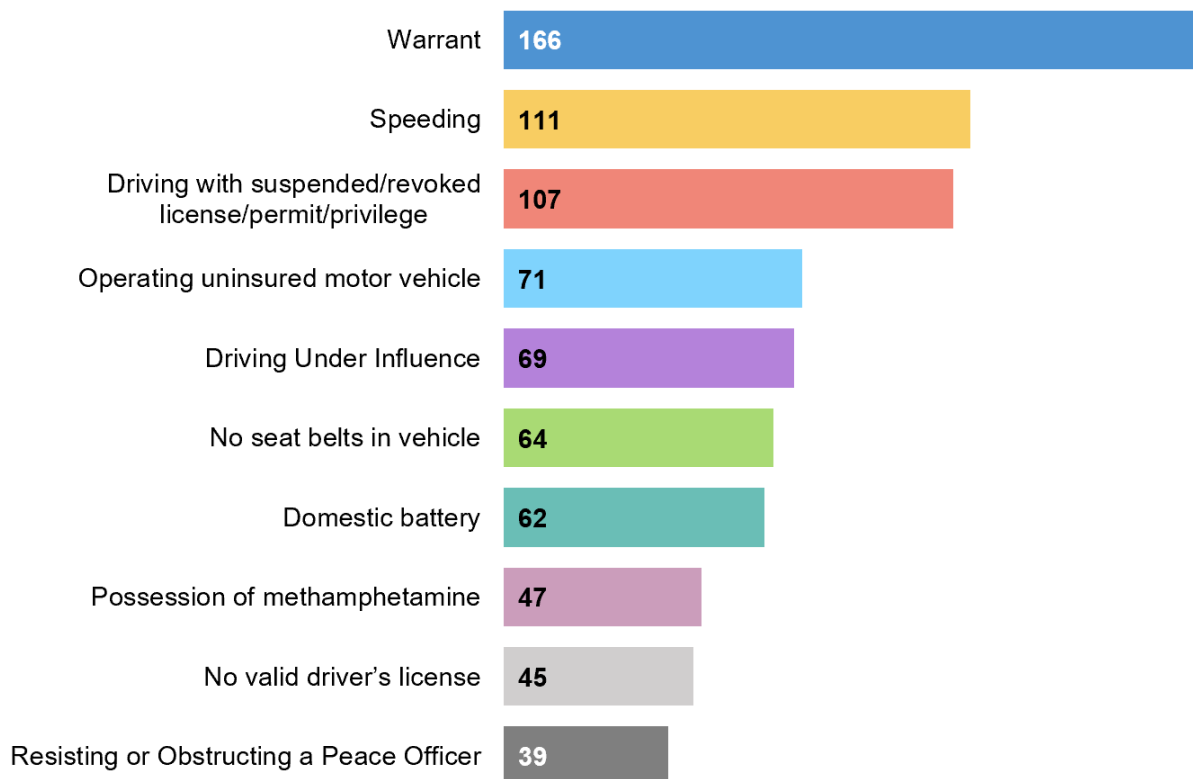

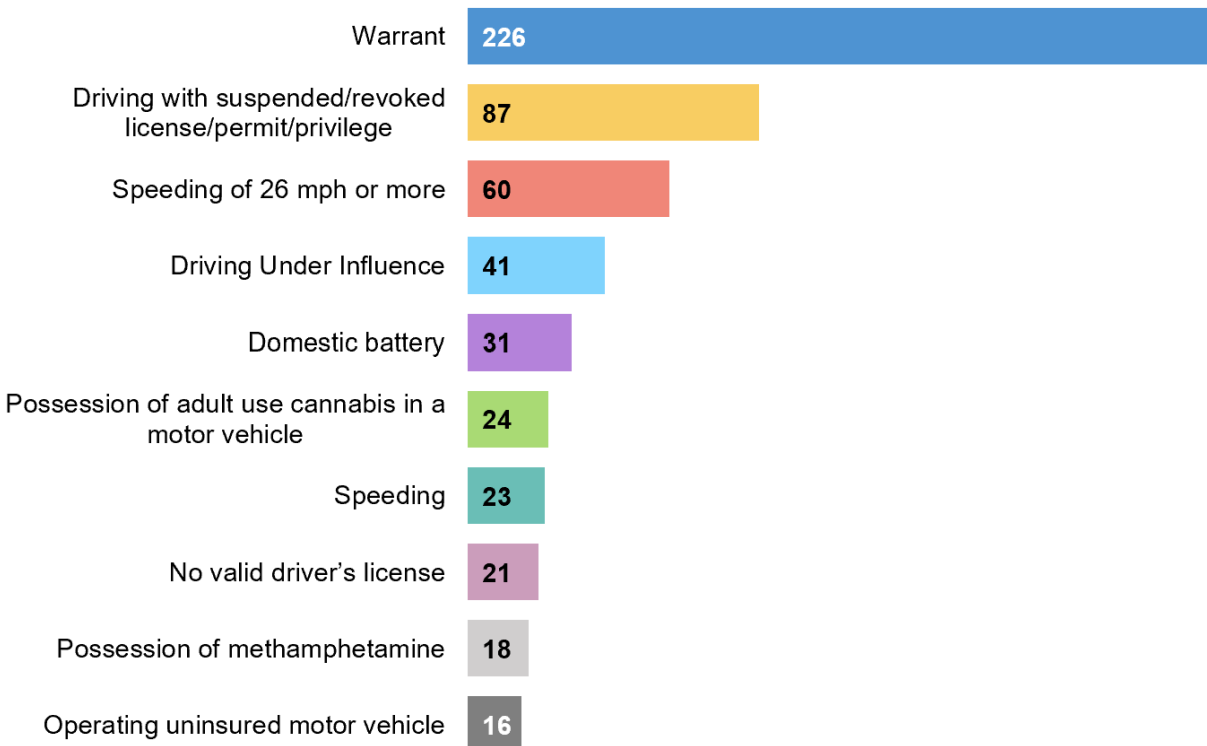

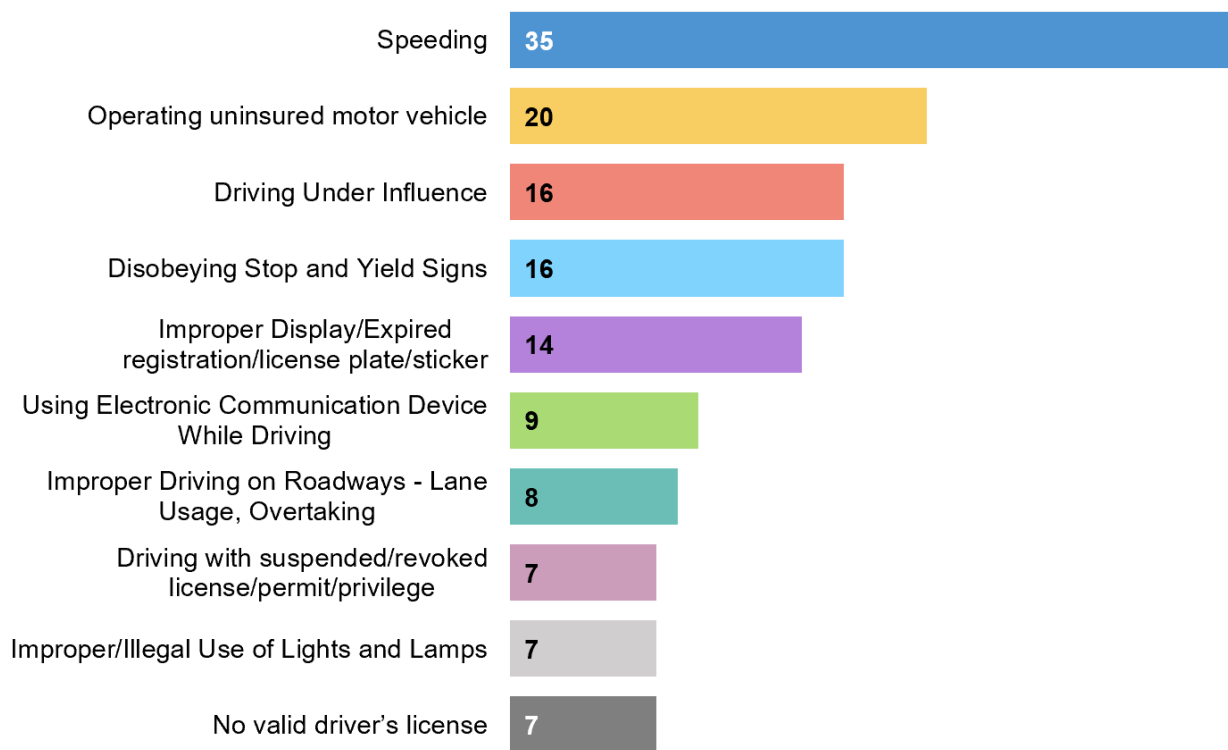

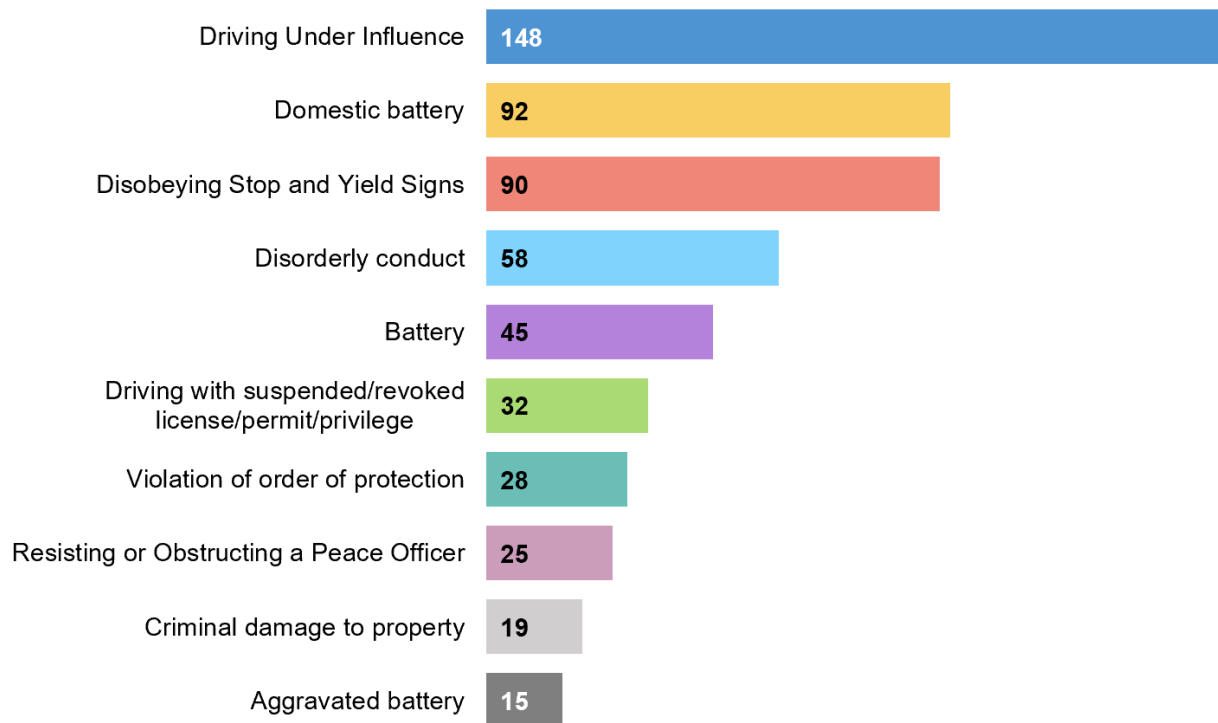

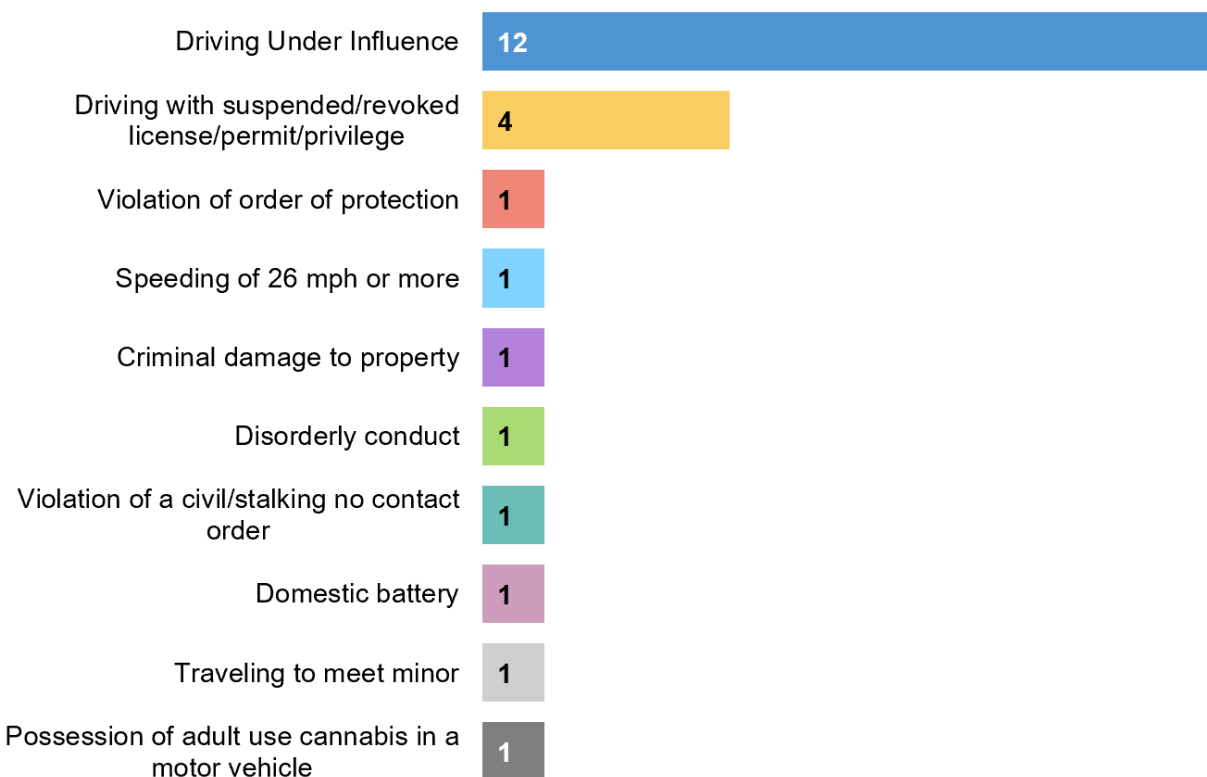

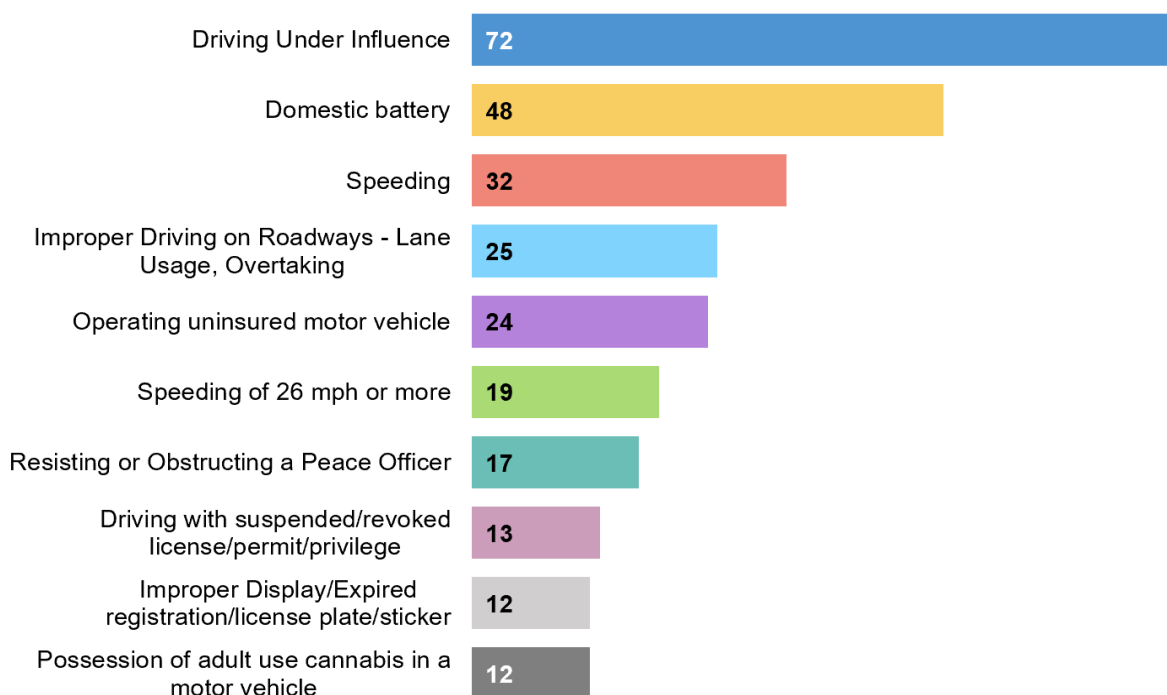

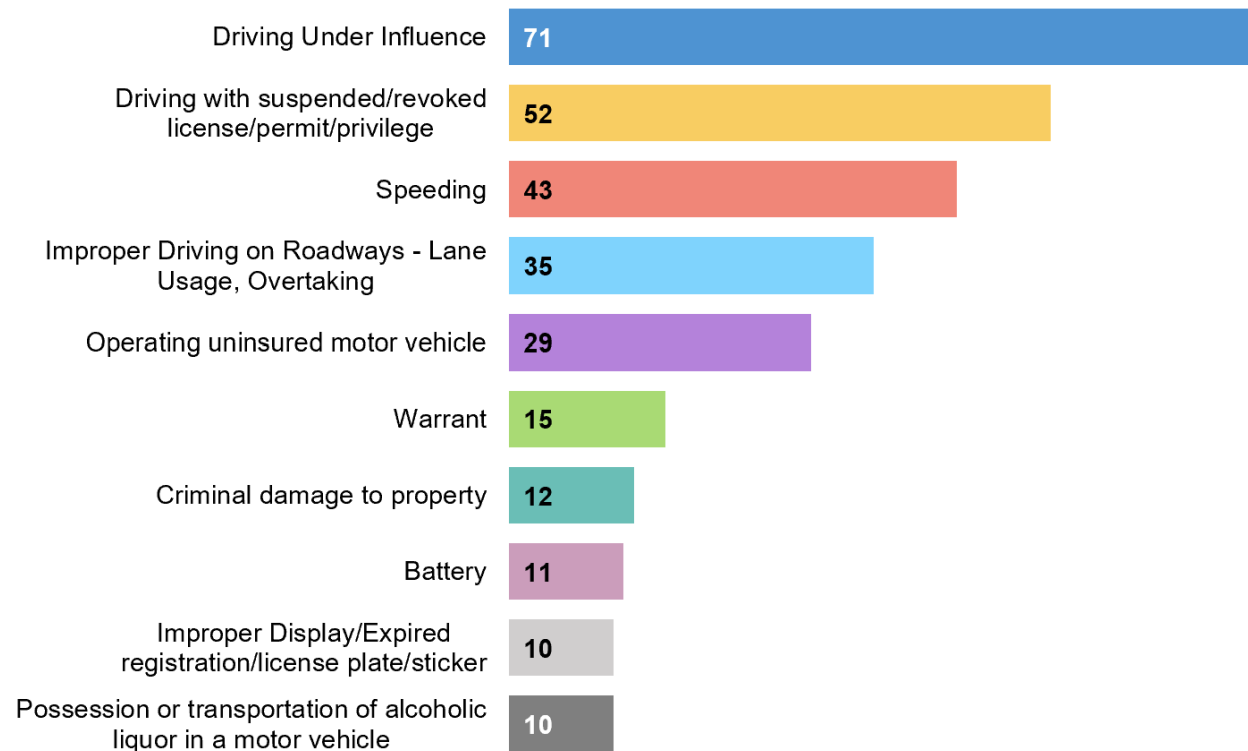

Reviews are documented on the Monthly Body worn Camera Video Review Form. The training sergeant reviews body worn camera video recordings flagged for potential training use. The training sergeant and assigned field training officers (FTOs) review body worn camera video recordings to evaluate the progress of probationary police officers and to assist in their training.

Lakemoor Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Lansing Police Department

Lansing Police Department consists of sixty-three (63) full-time sworn officers who utilize thirty-two (32) I-Pro 4000 and six (6) I-Pro MK3 body worn cameras.

- Failure to upload: The manufacturer software caused issues where cameras did not upload when placed into the docks. Cameras had to be manually downloaded.
- Battery Issues / Longevity: Some officers did not receive full operational coverage for the duration of their shifts. Some of these batteries only lasted 4-5 hours (new batteries). This issue was addressed through camera setting adjustments and the replacement of batteries on multiple units. Officers would carry extra batteries with them for their shifts or place the cameras in the docks to charge during the shift.

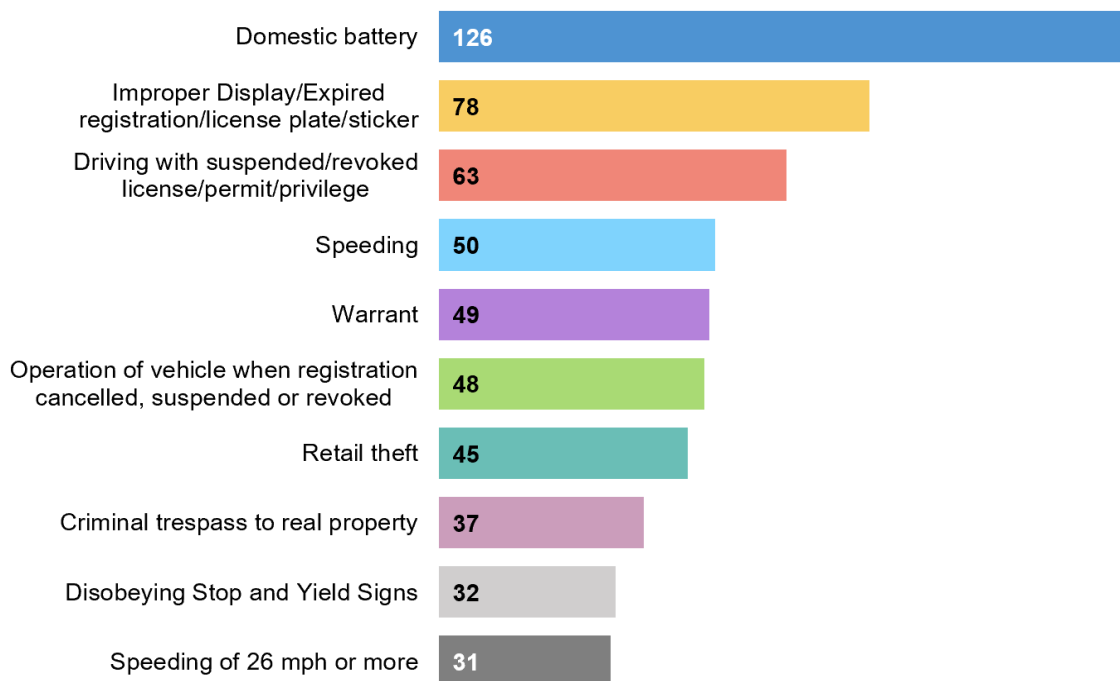

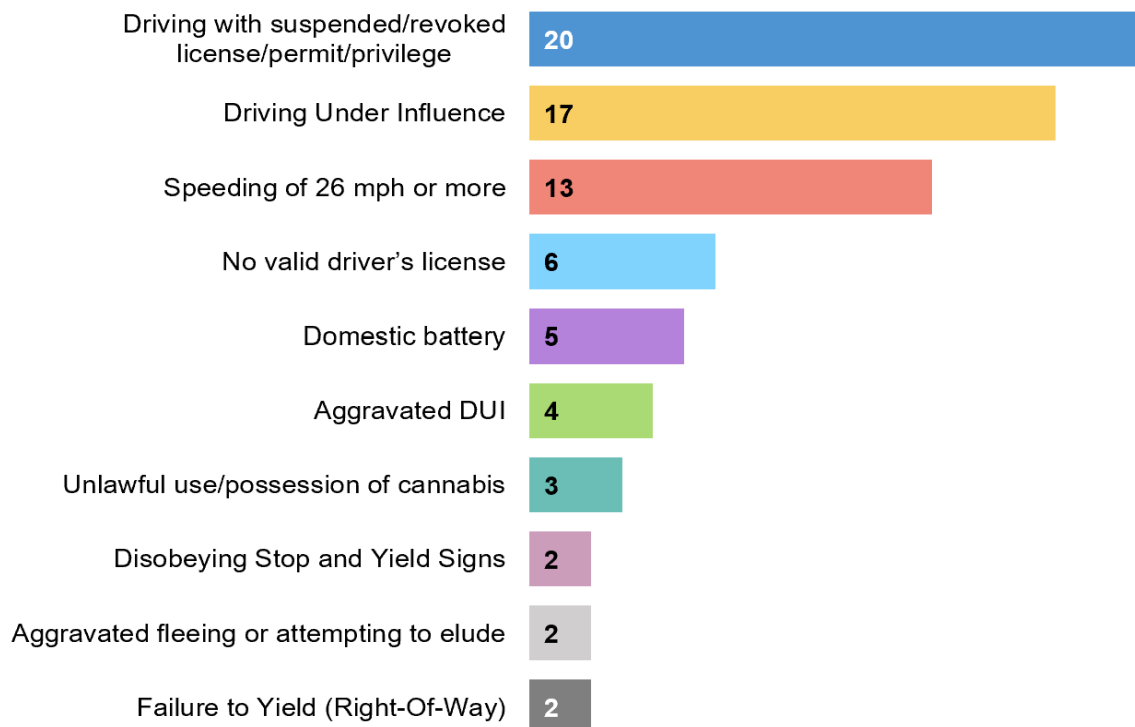

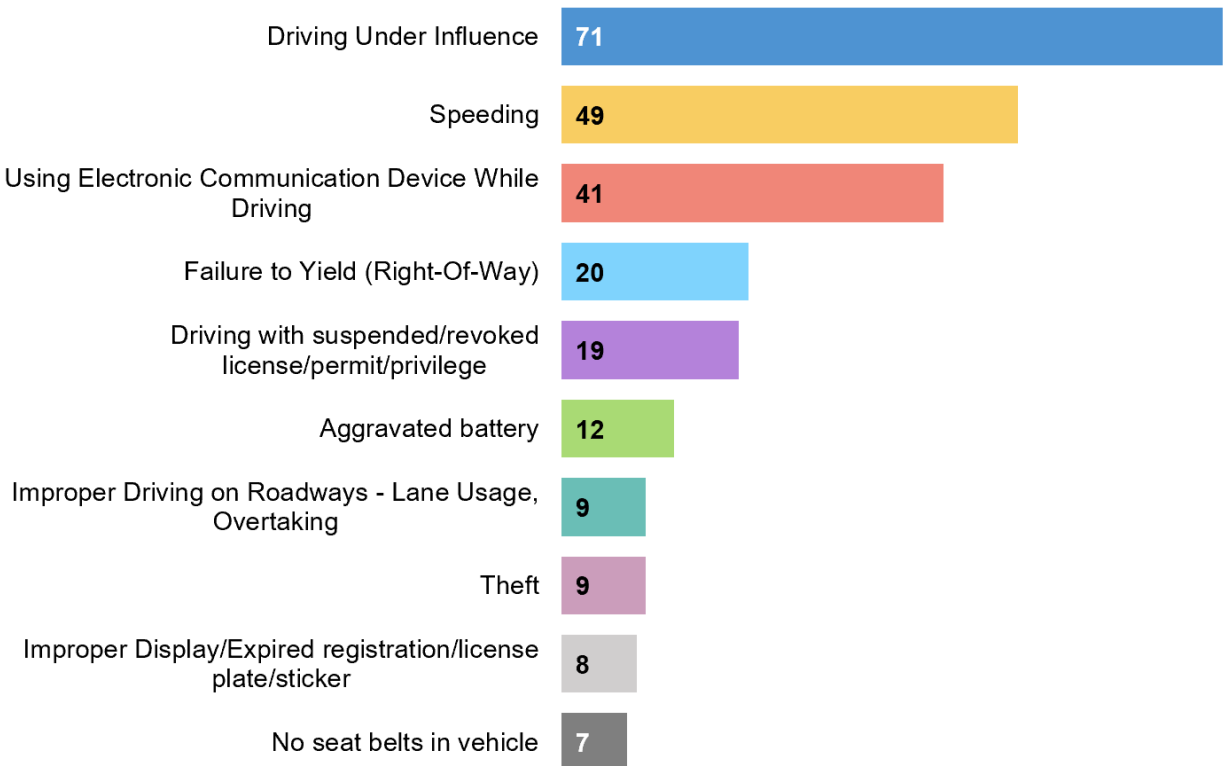

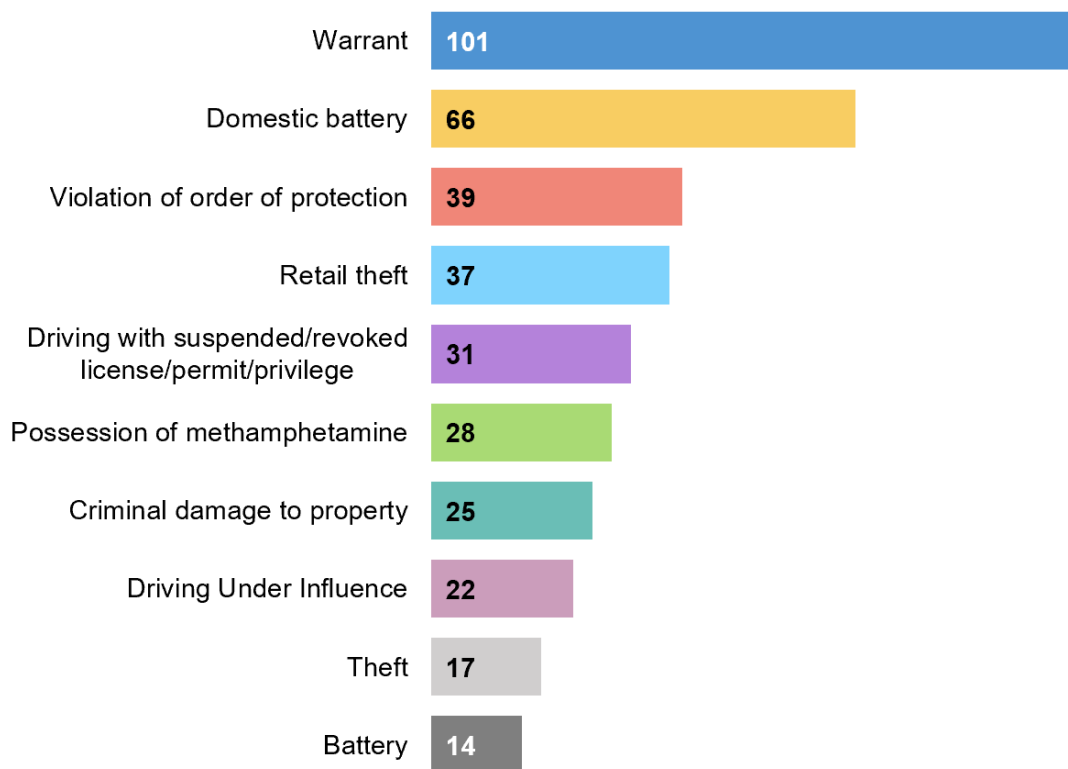

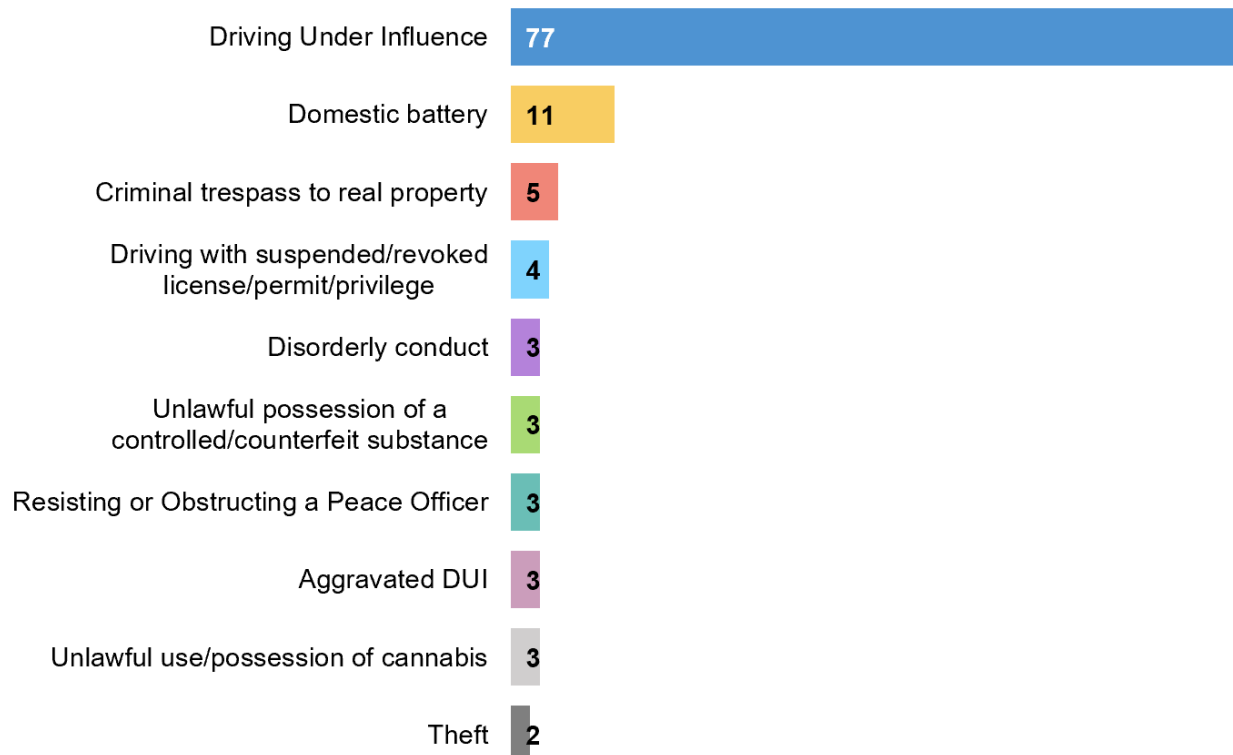

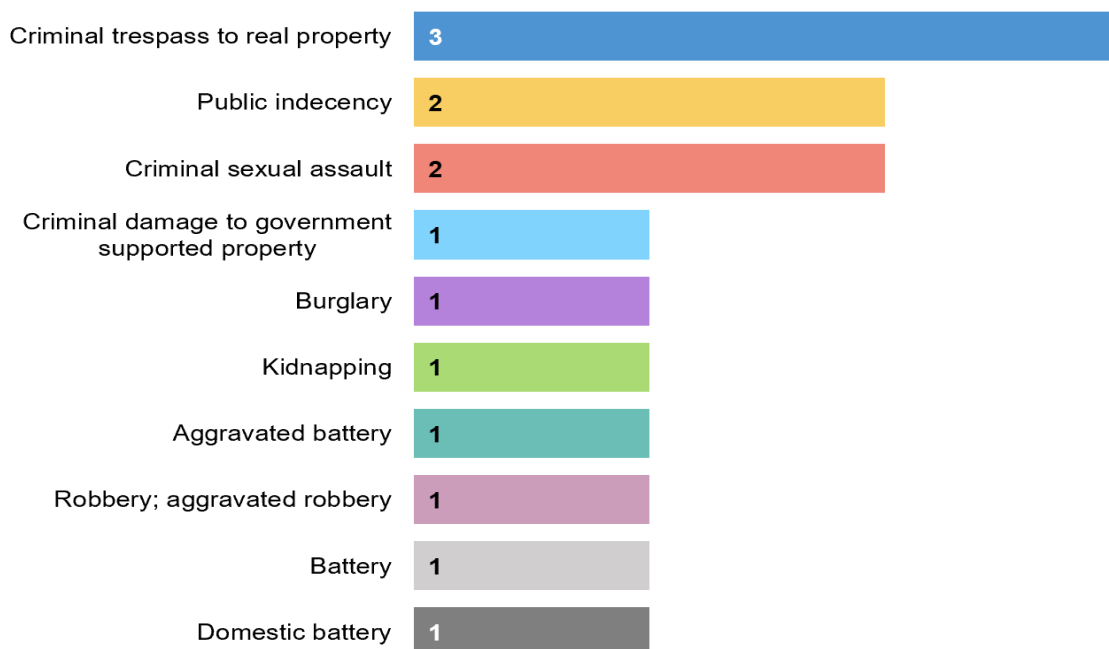
Review Process

Loyola University Chicago Department of Campus Safety's supervisors ensure officers are equipped with officer-worn body cameras and utilize them in accordance with department policies and training. At least monthly, each department lieutenant randomly reviews three (3) recordings of law enforcement-related encounters or activities pertaining to officers under the lieutenant's purview to ensure that equipment is operating properly, that officers are using the cameras appropriately and in accordance with department policies and training, and identify any areas in which additional training or guidance may be required.

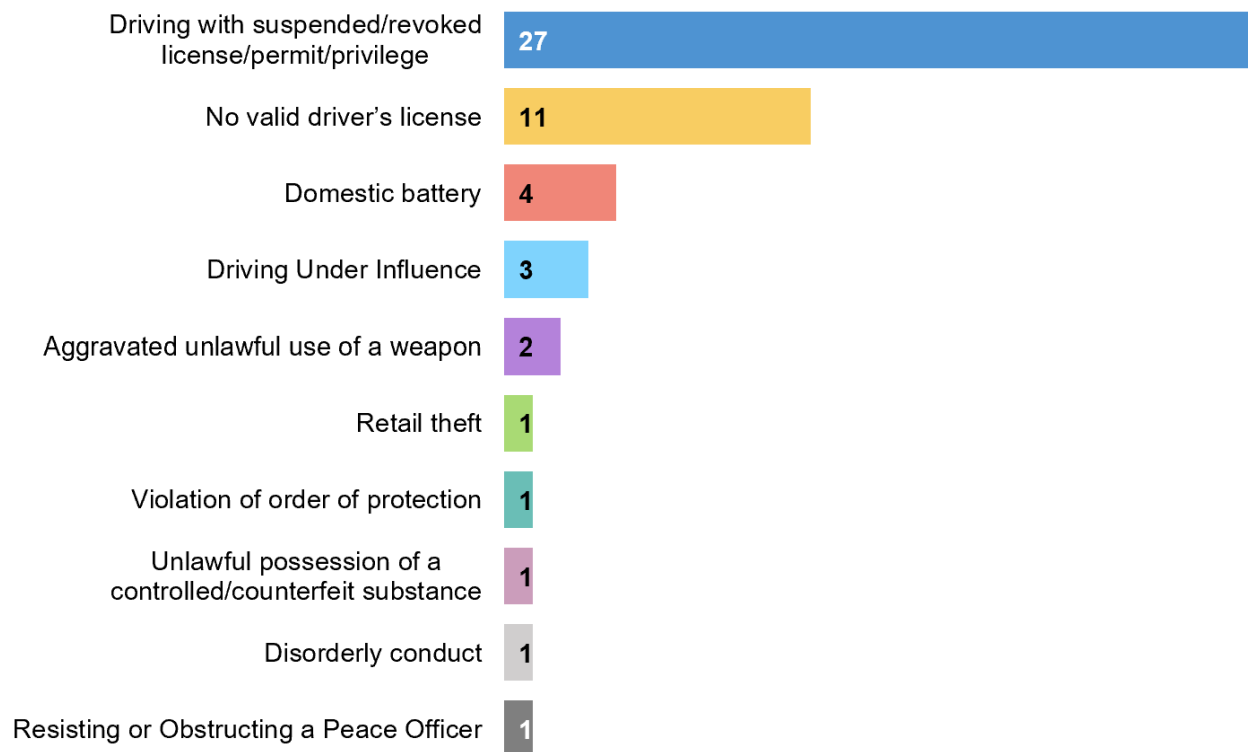

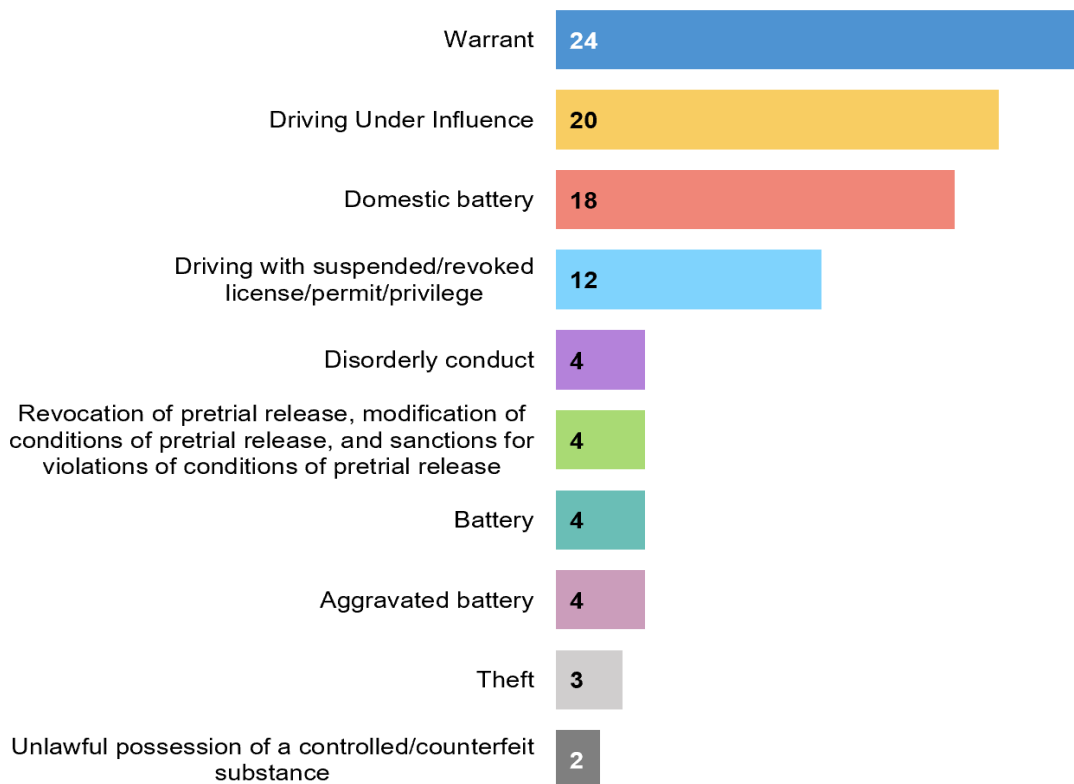

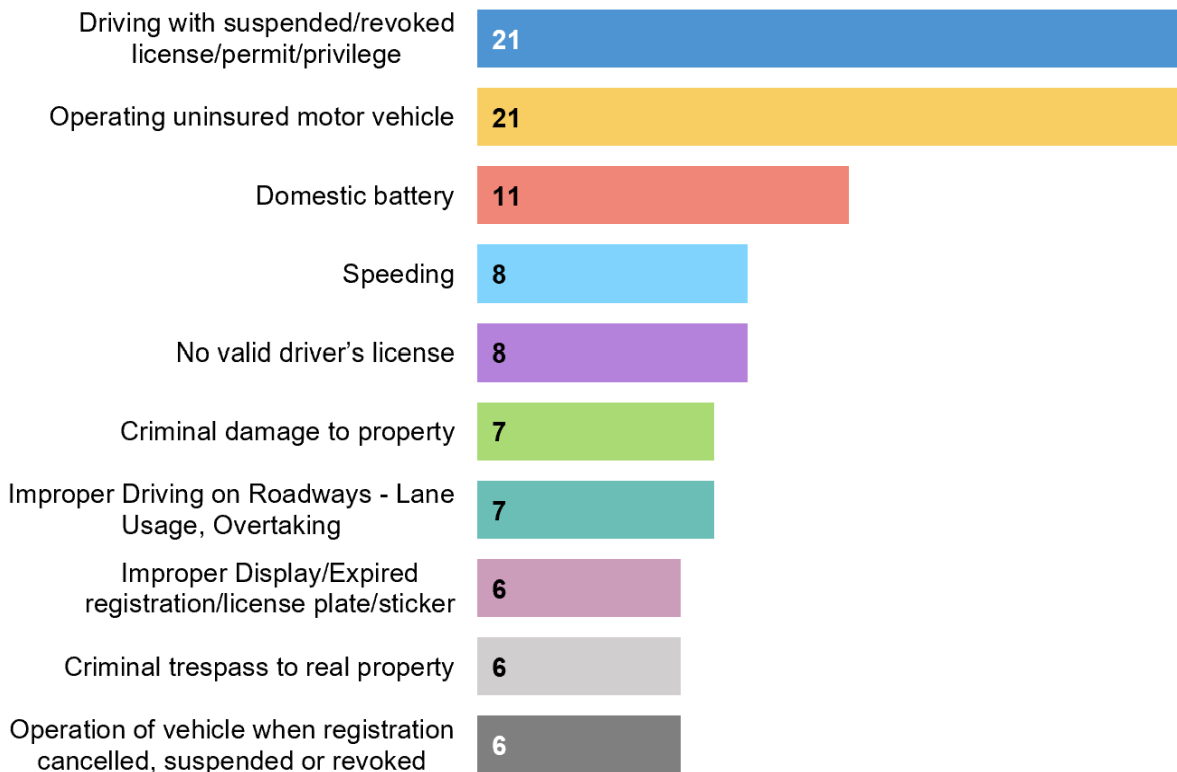

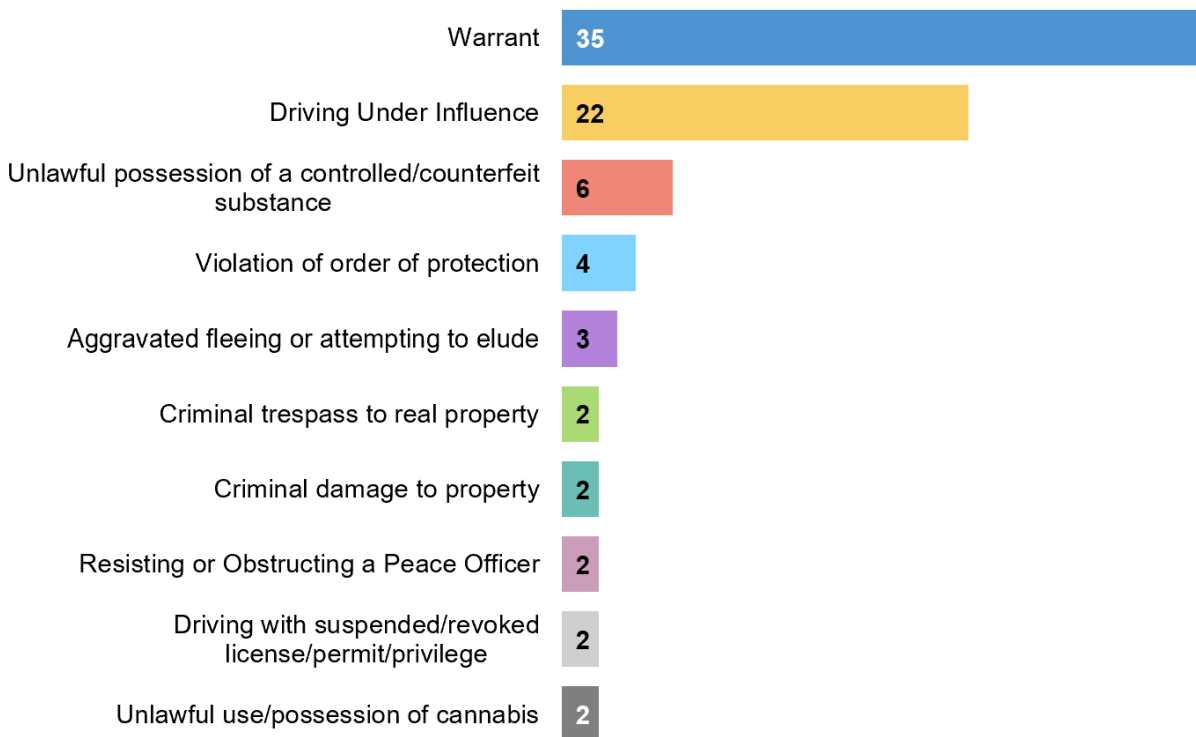

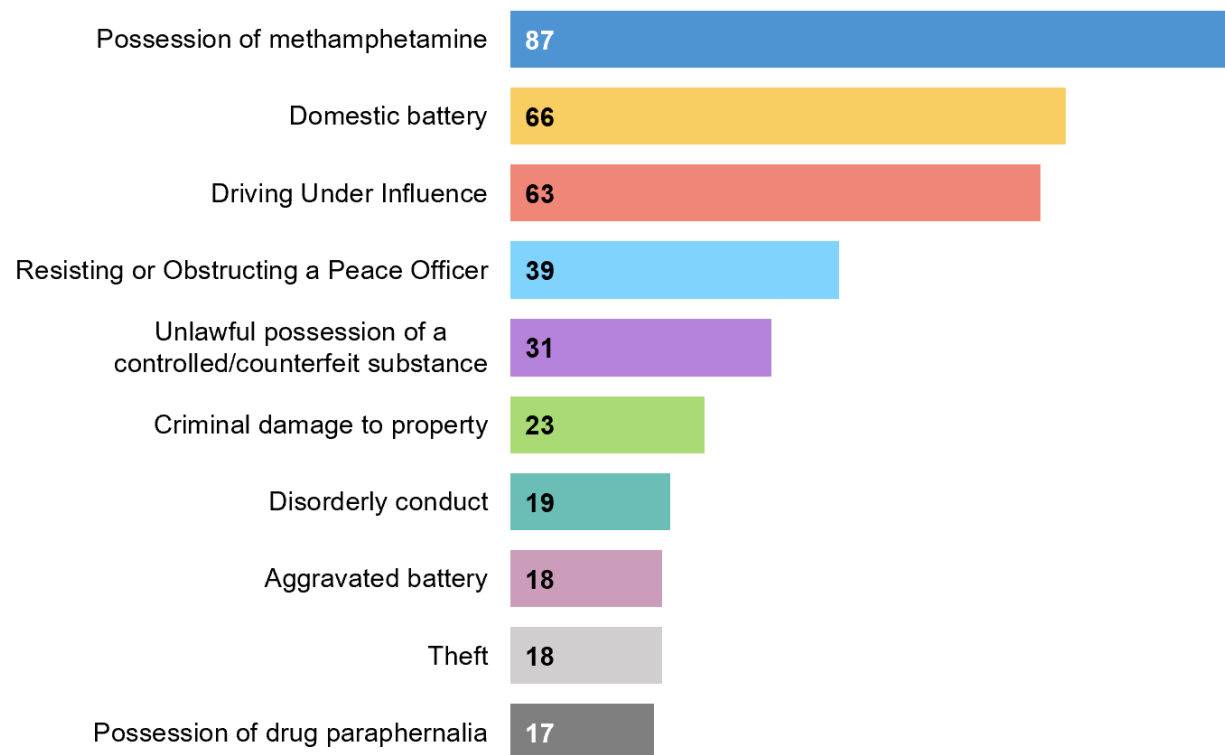

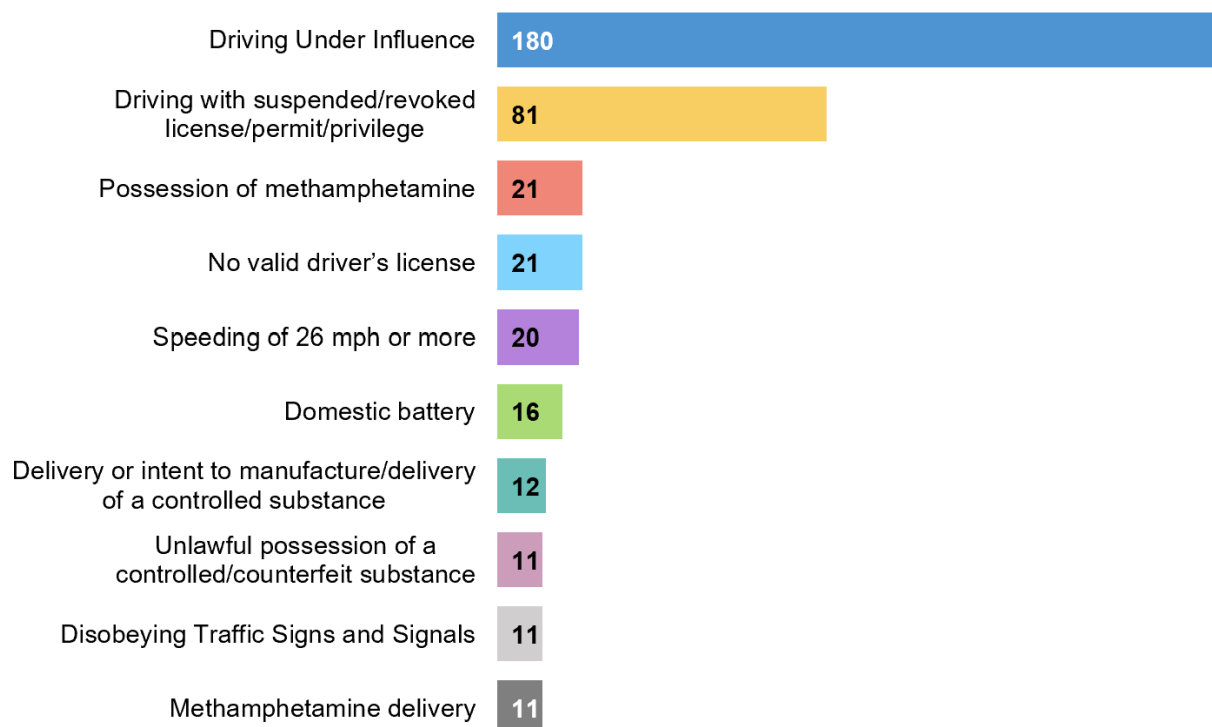

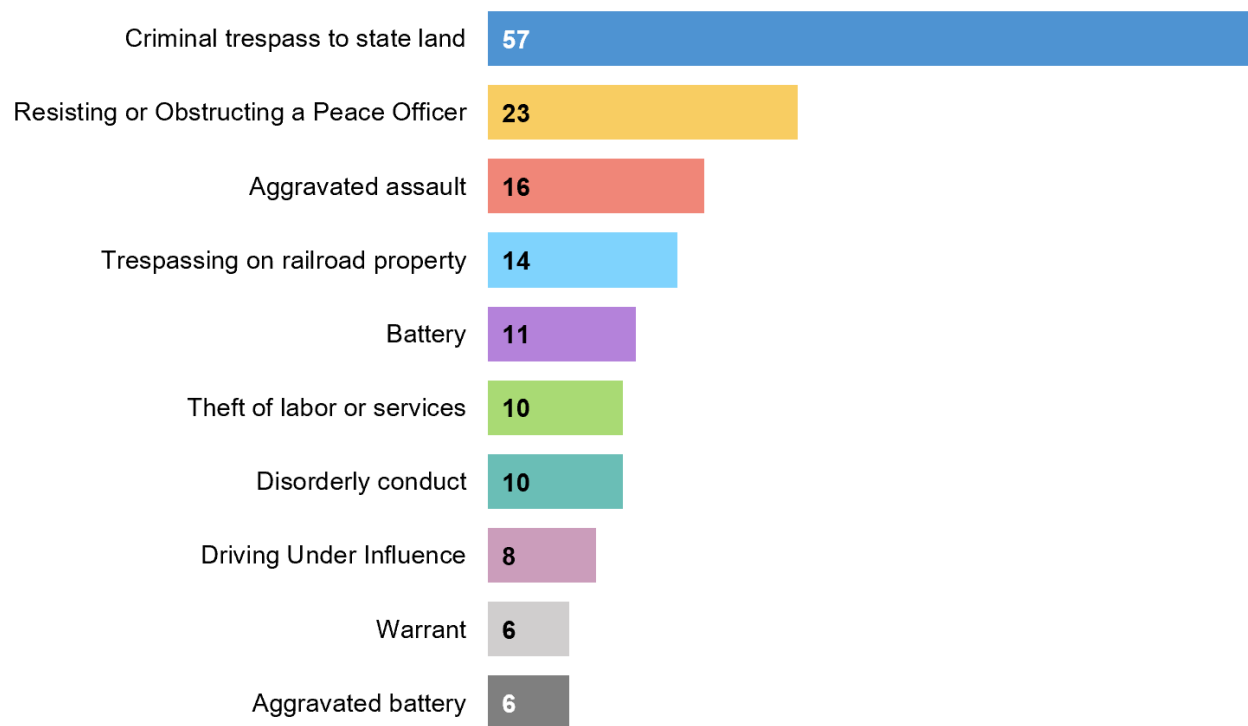

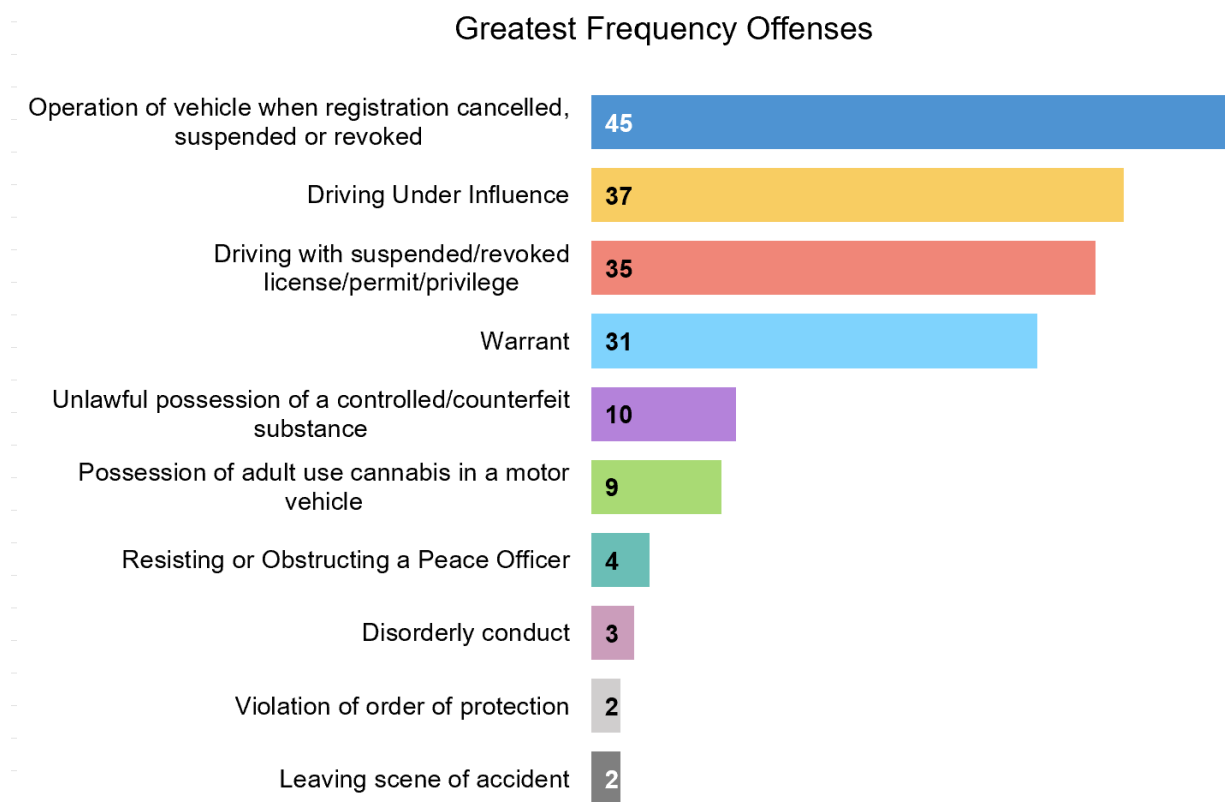

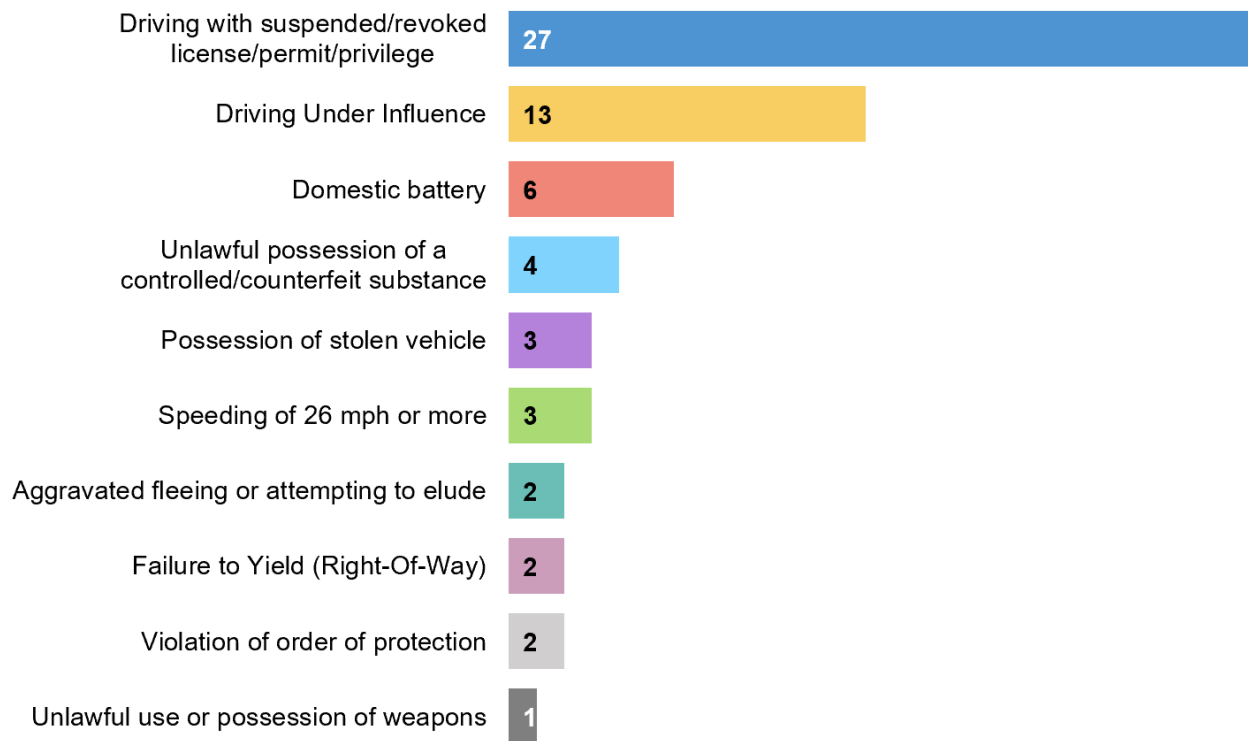

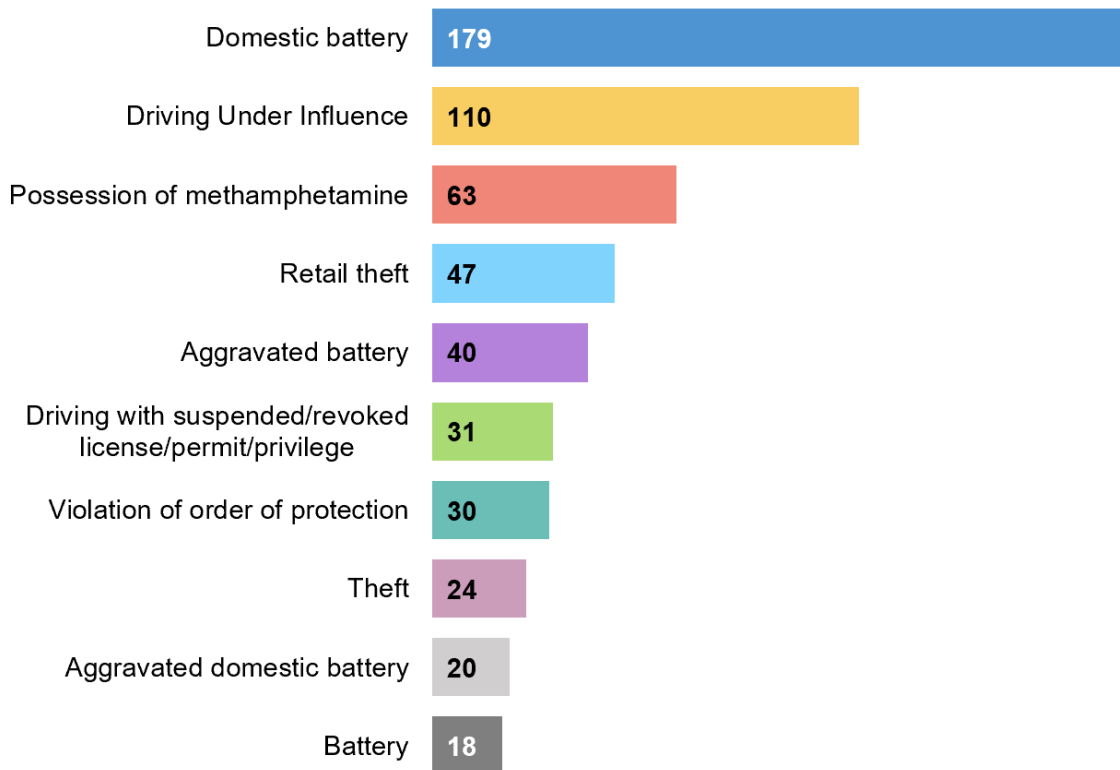

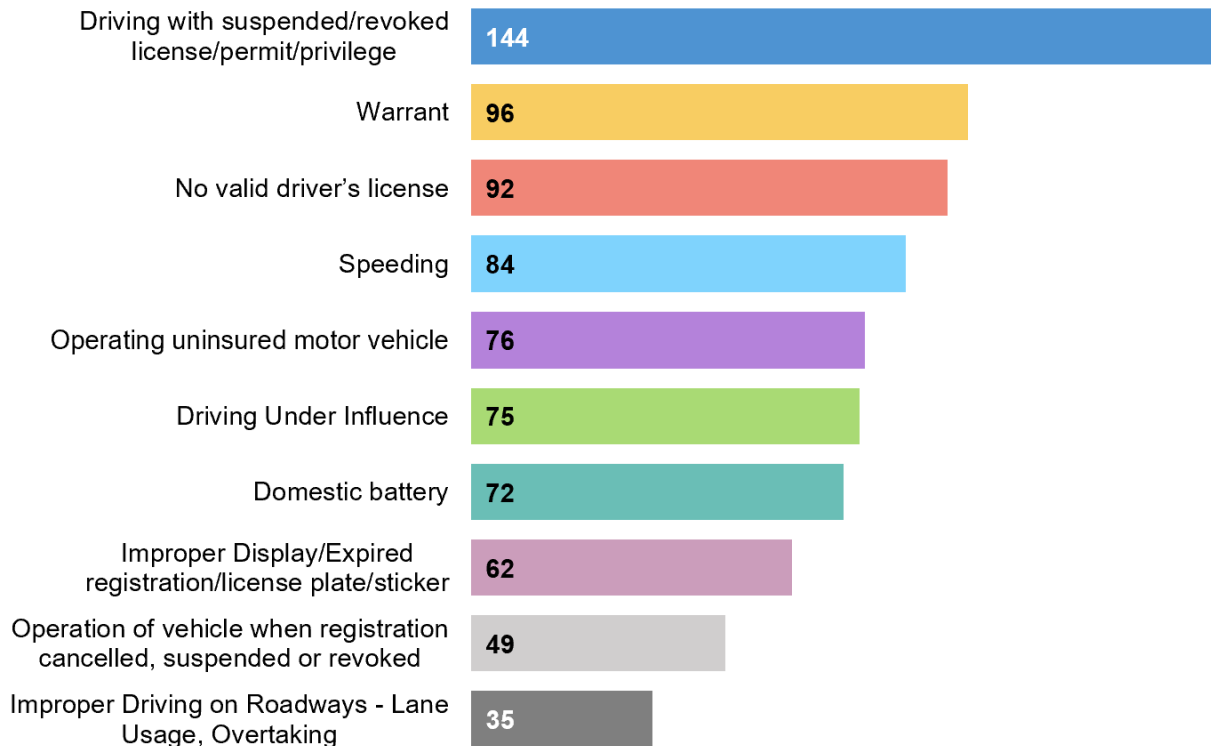

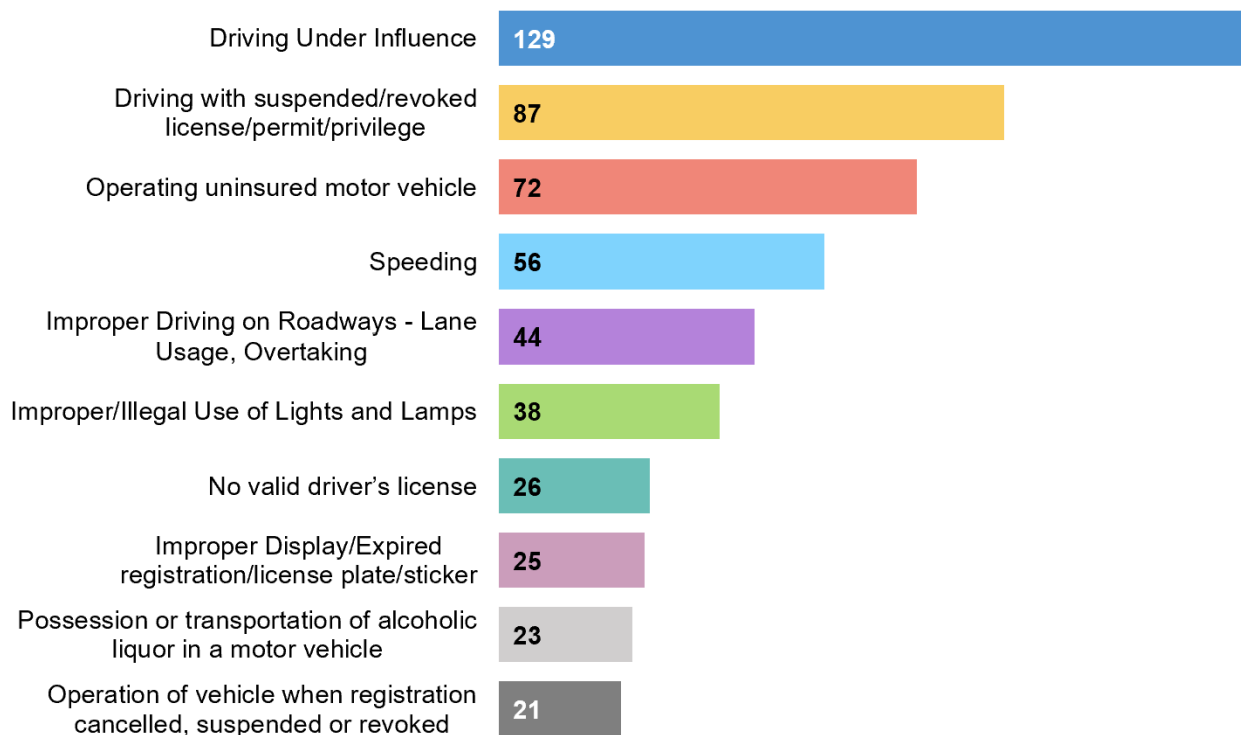

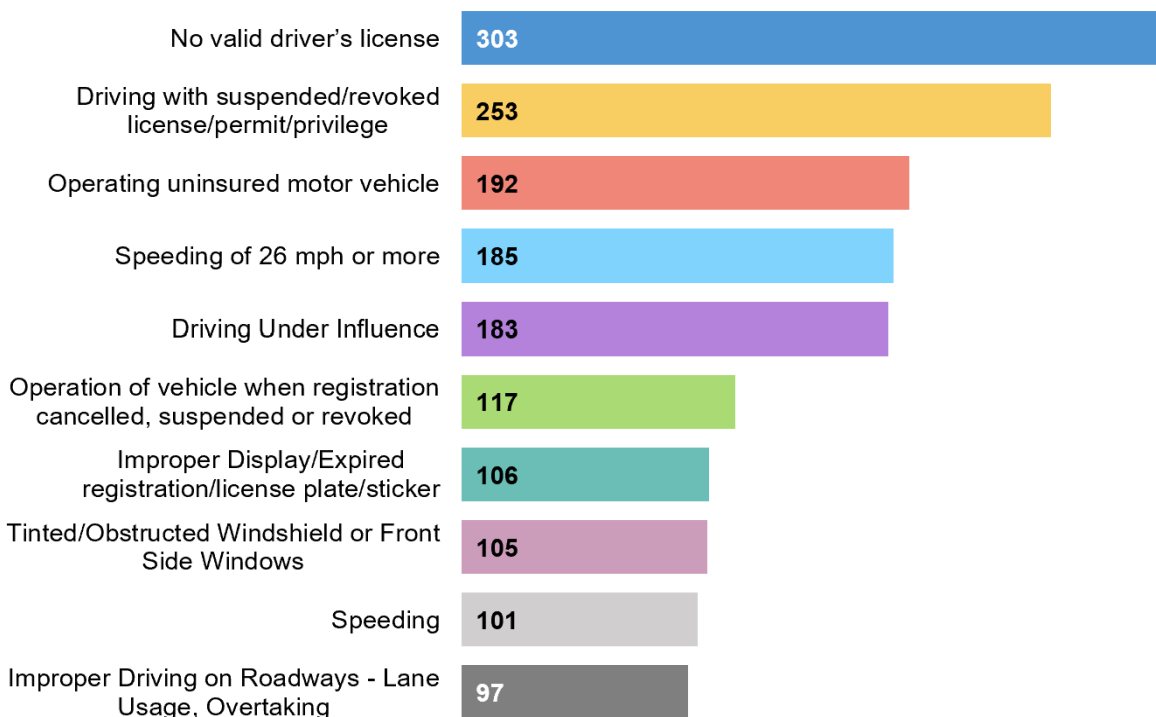

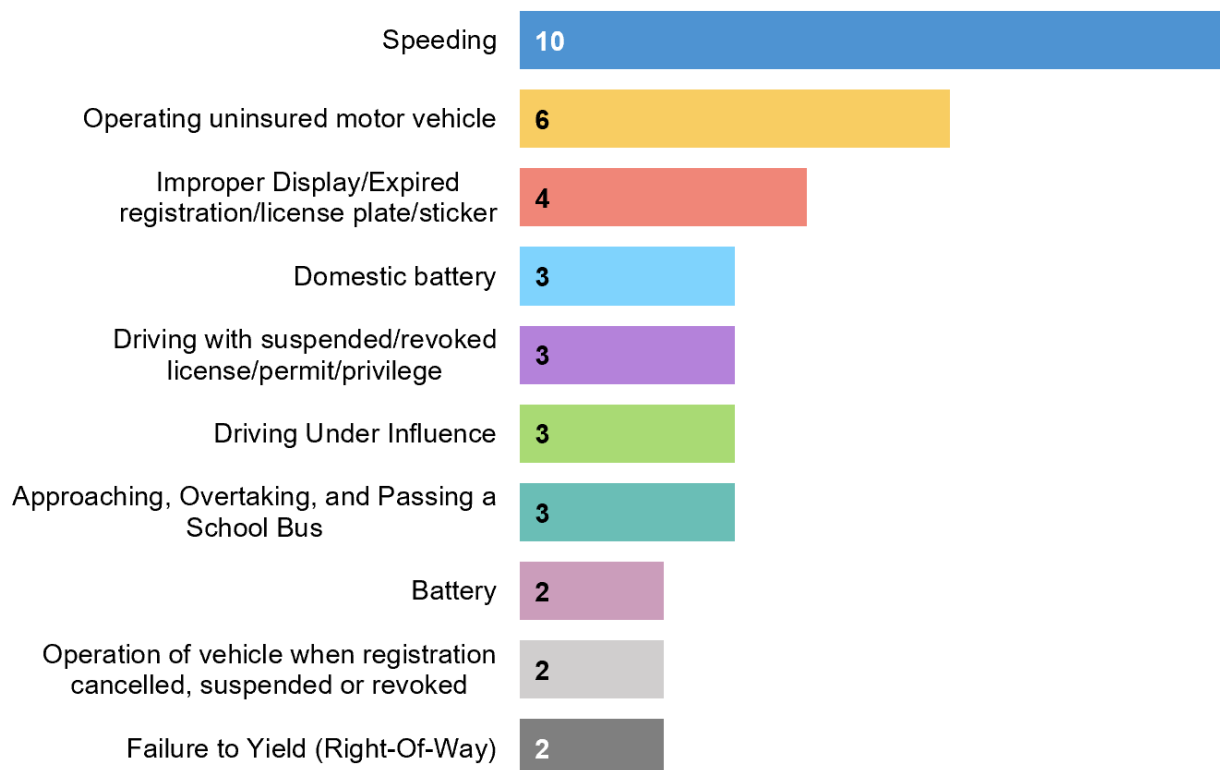

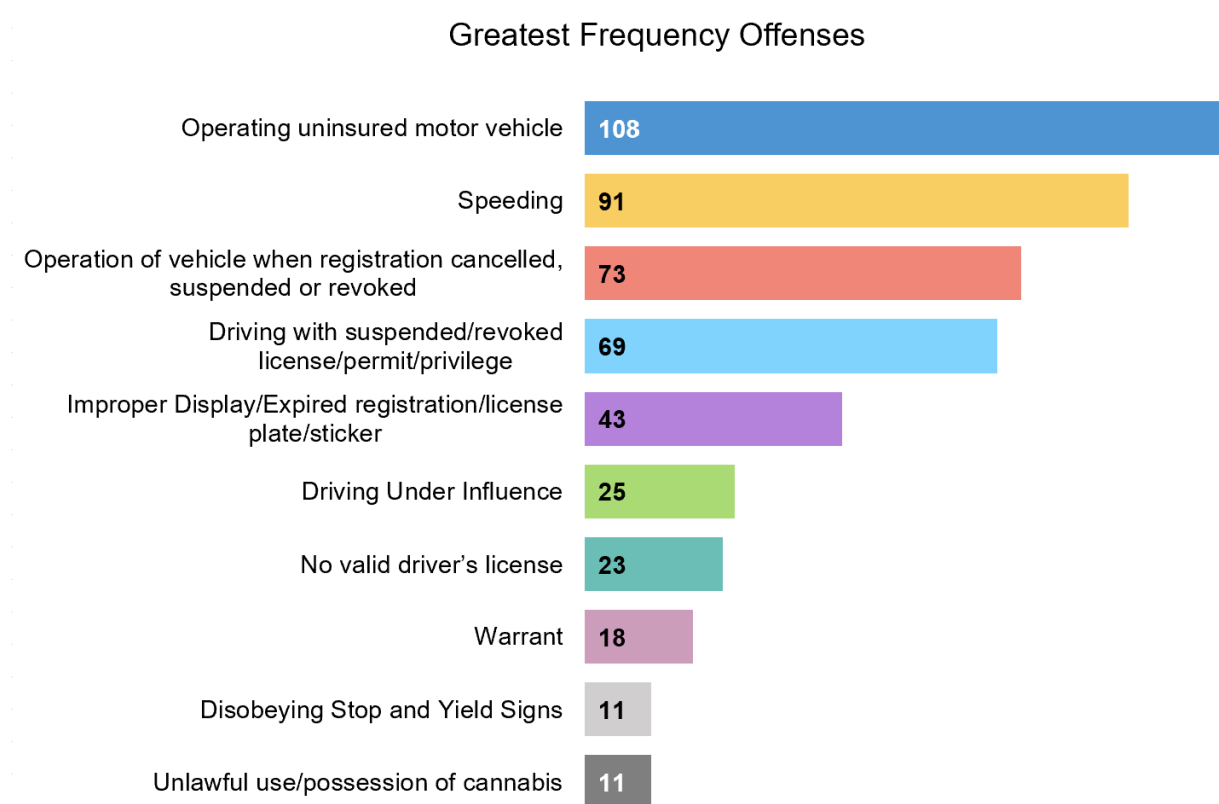

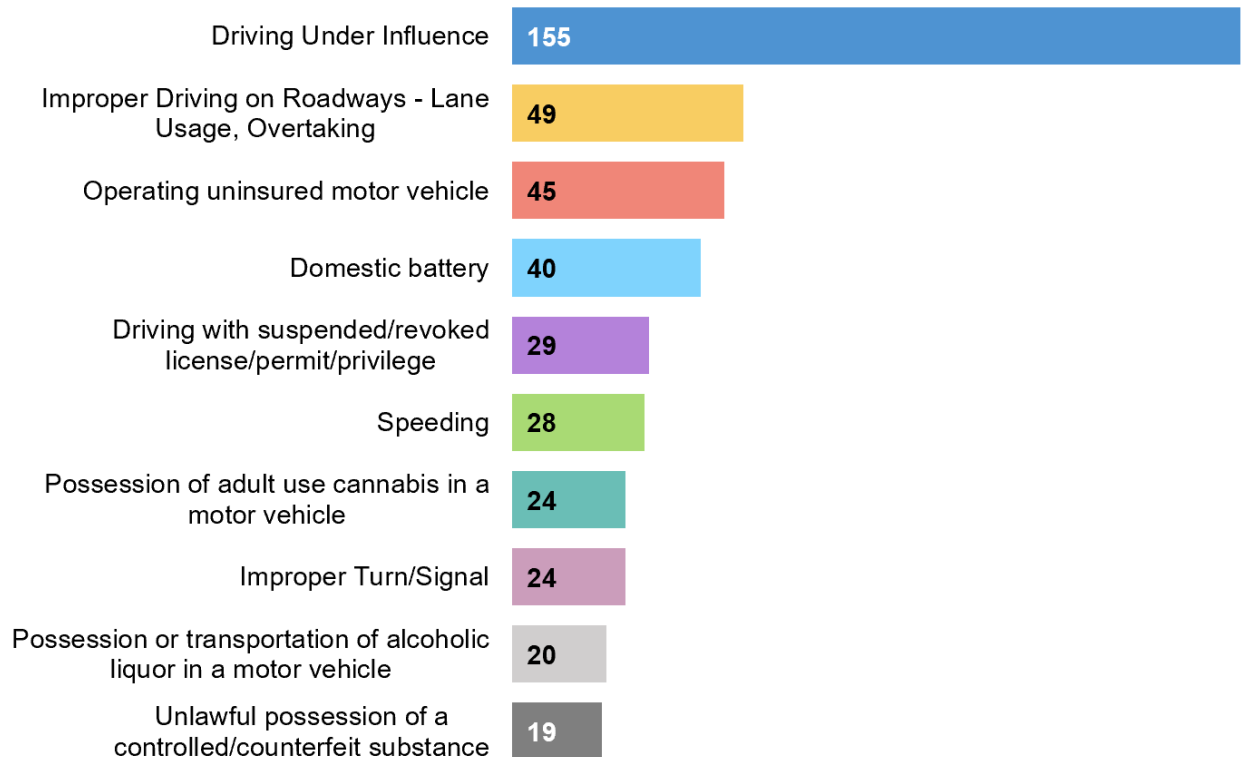

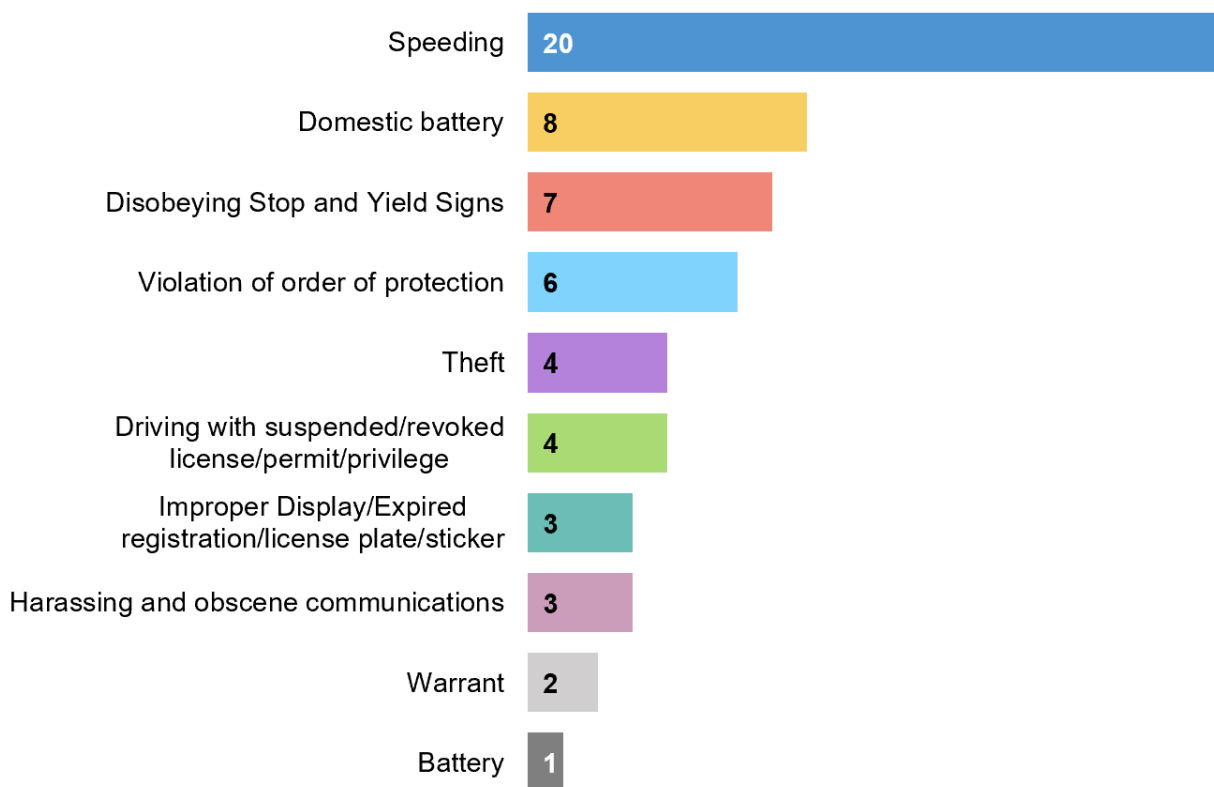

All issues are first addressed by the shift supervisory staff and then reviewed by a technician if malfunctions are reported. 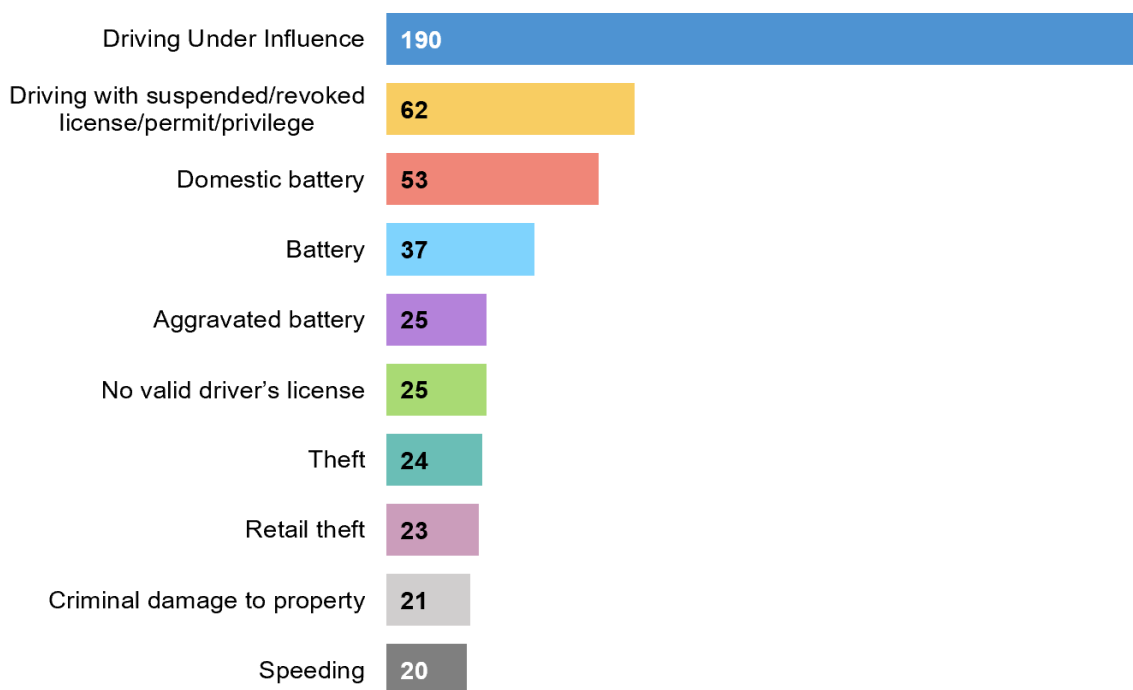

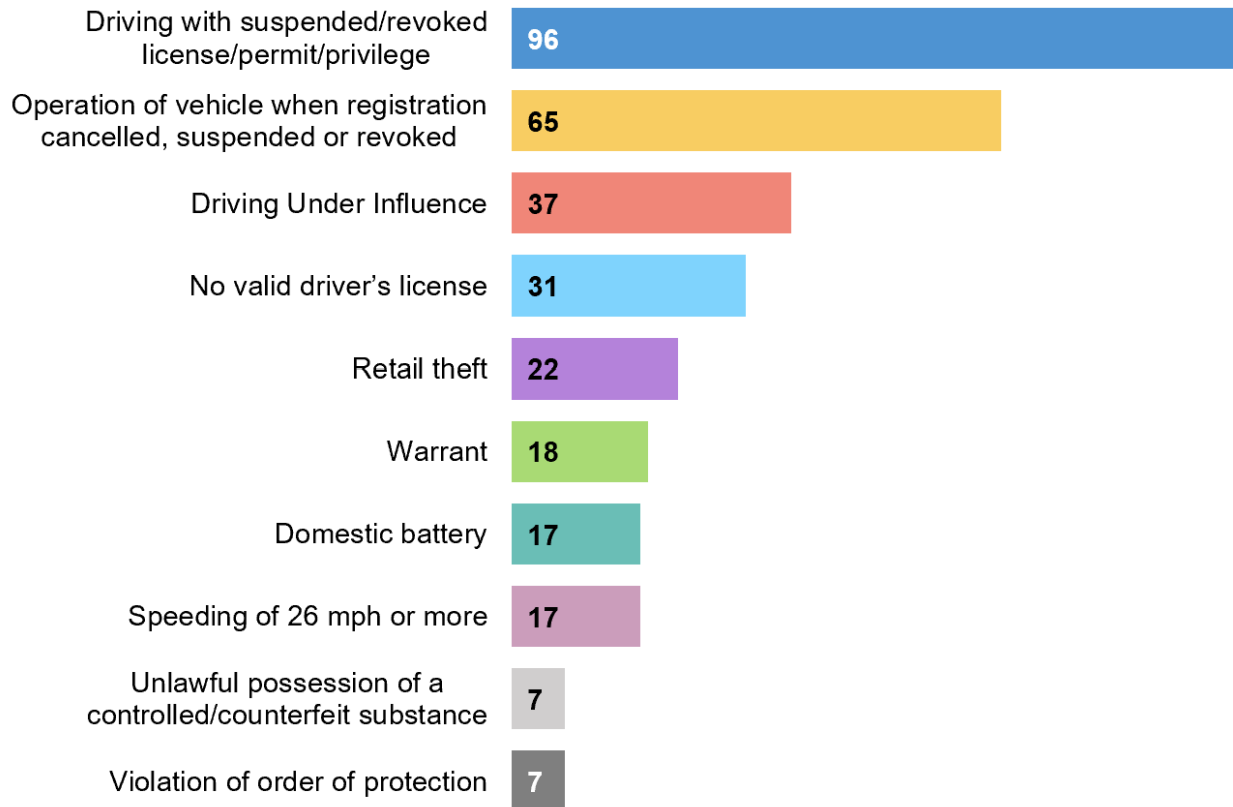

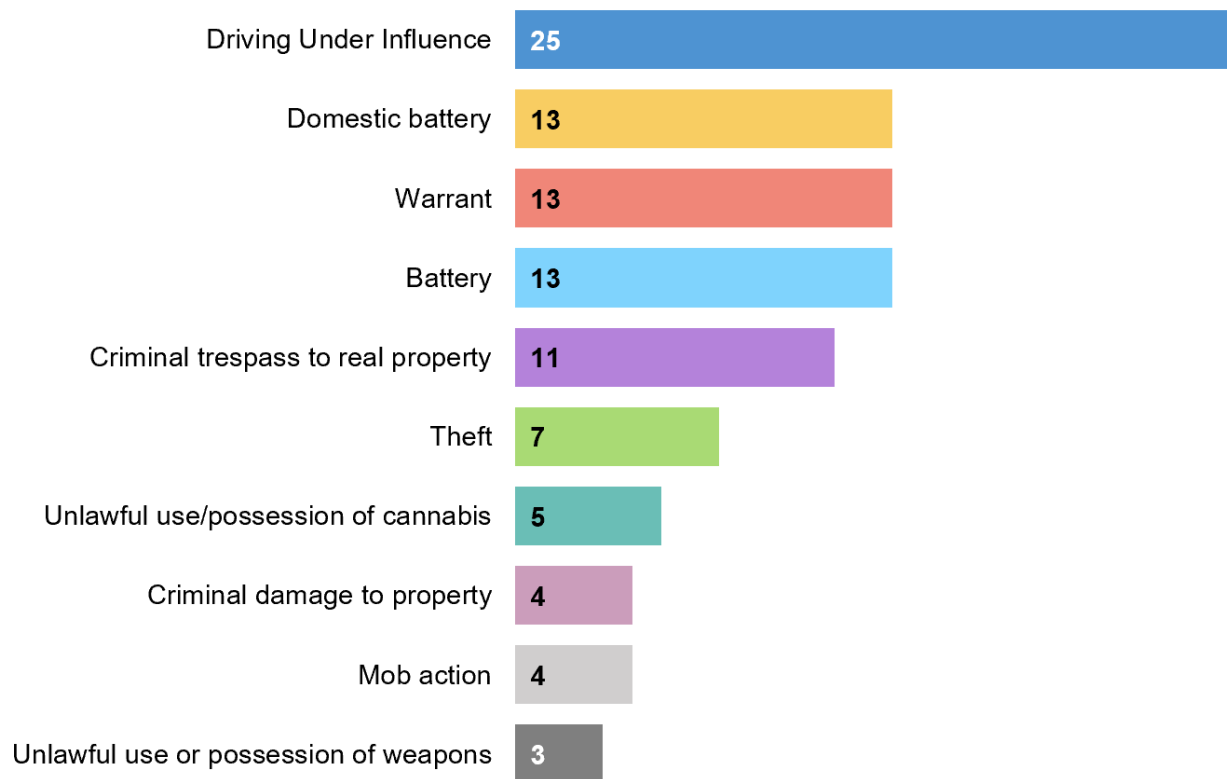

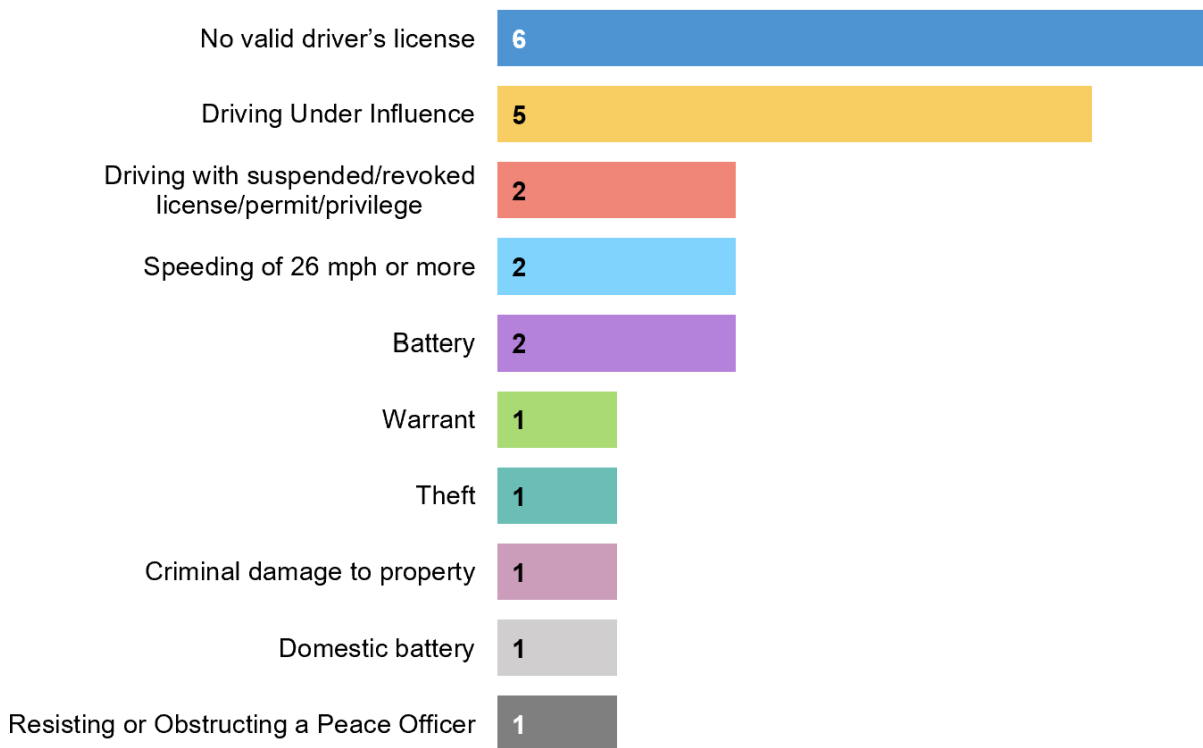

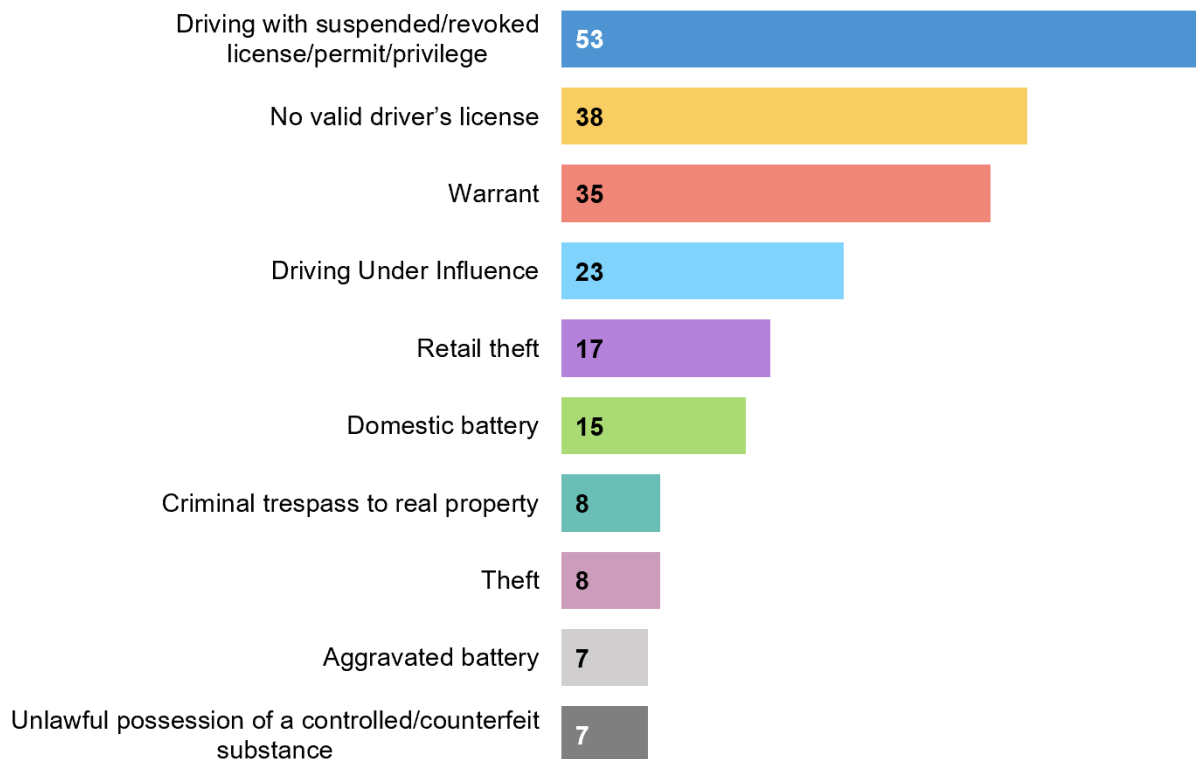

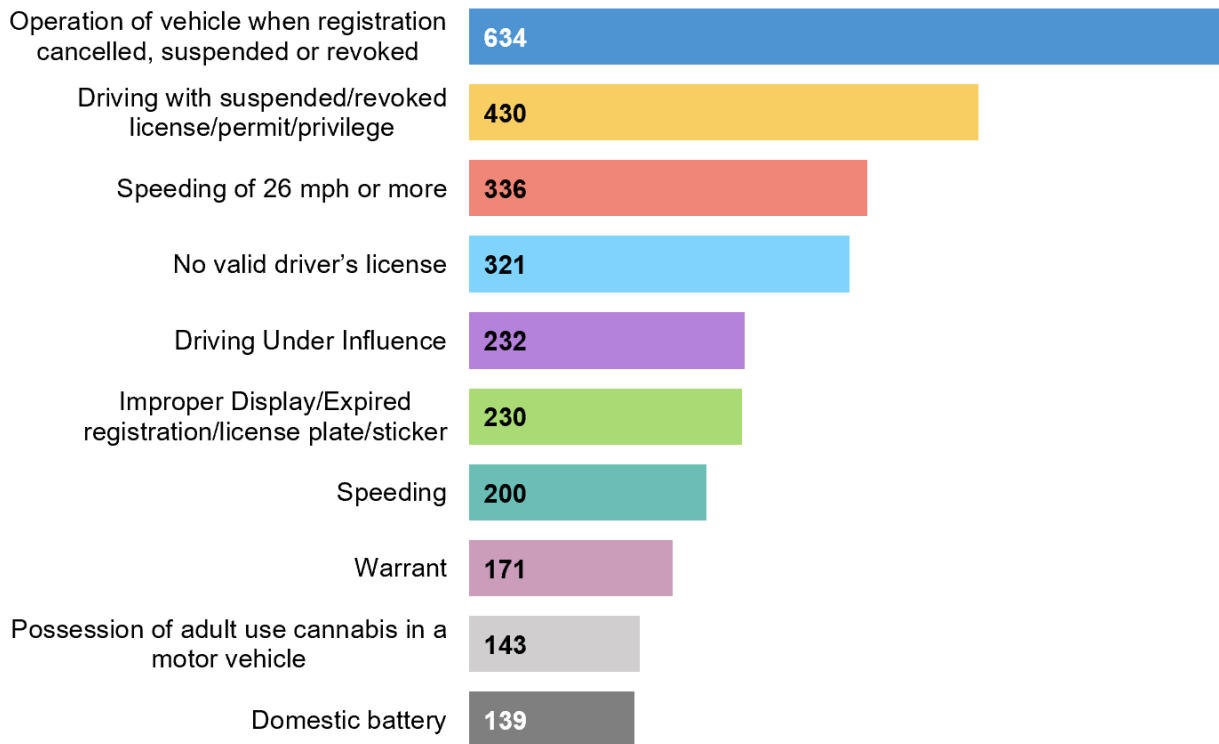

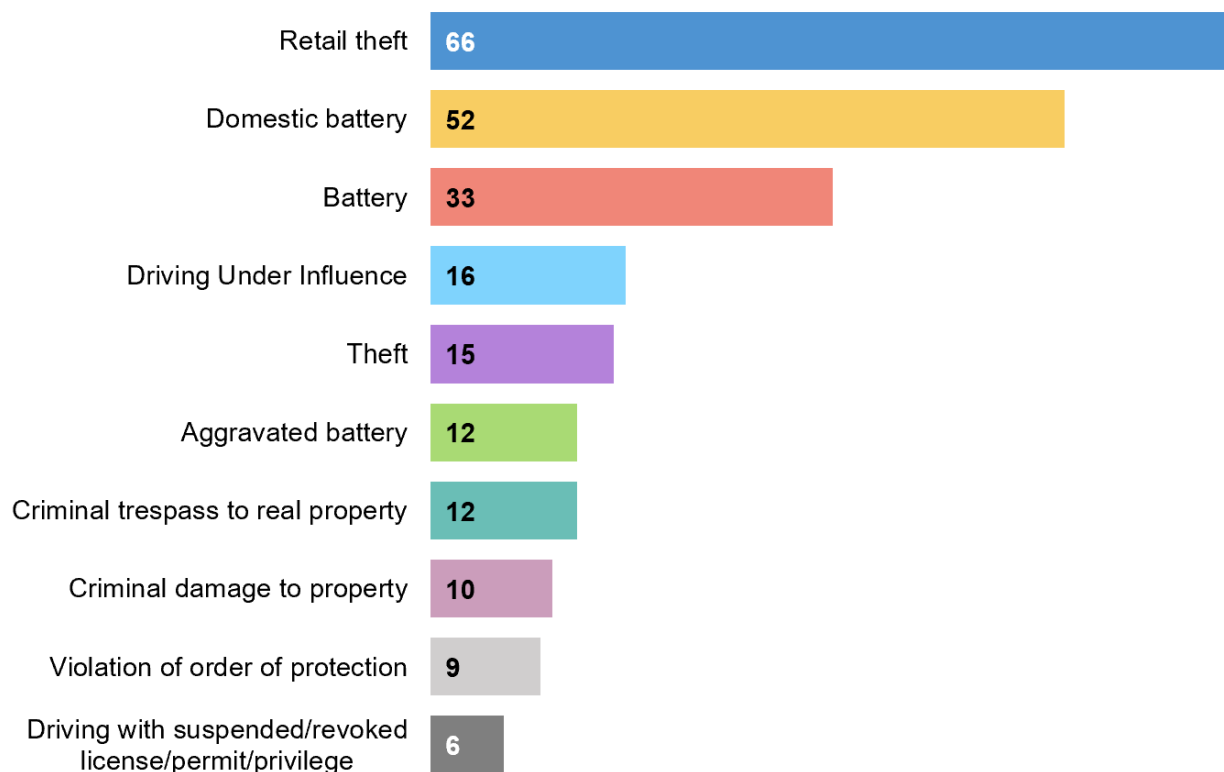

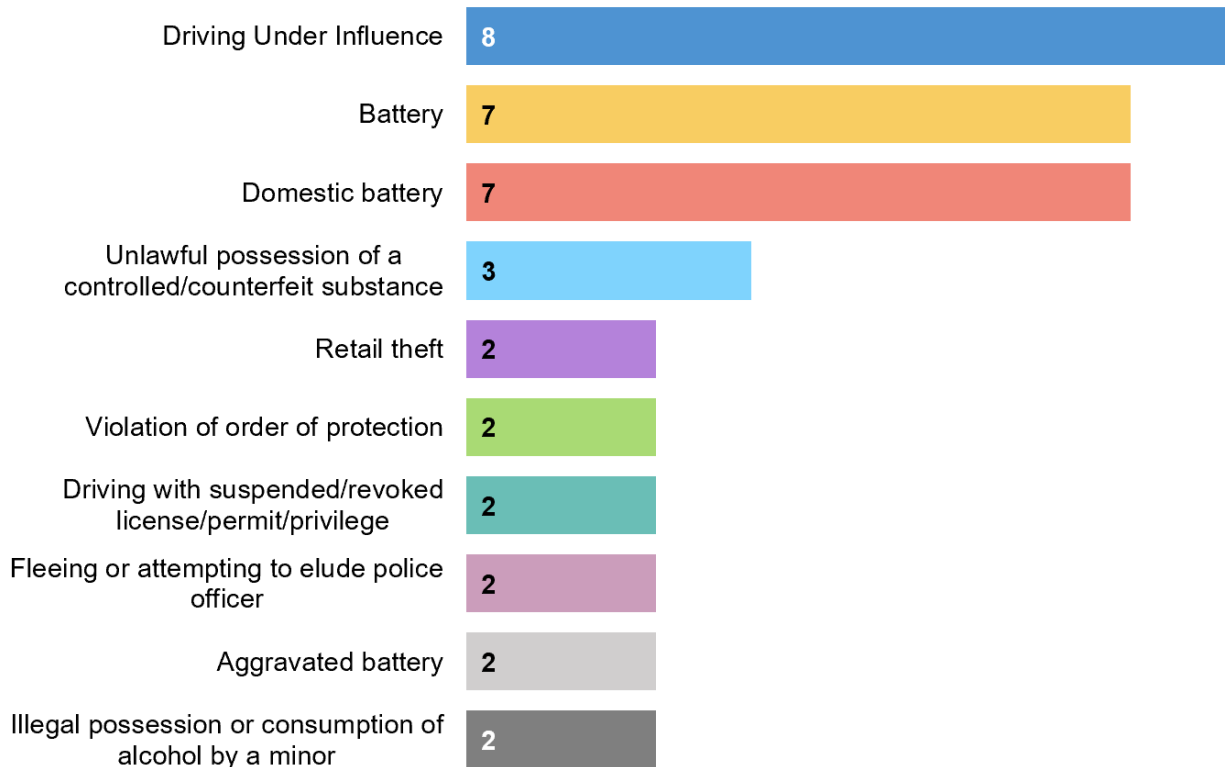

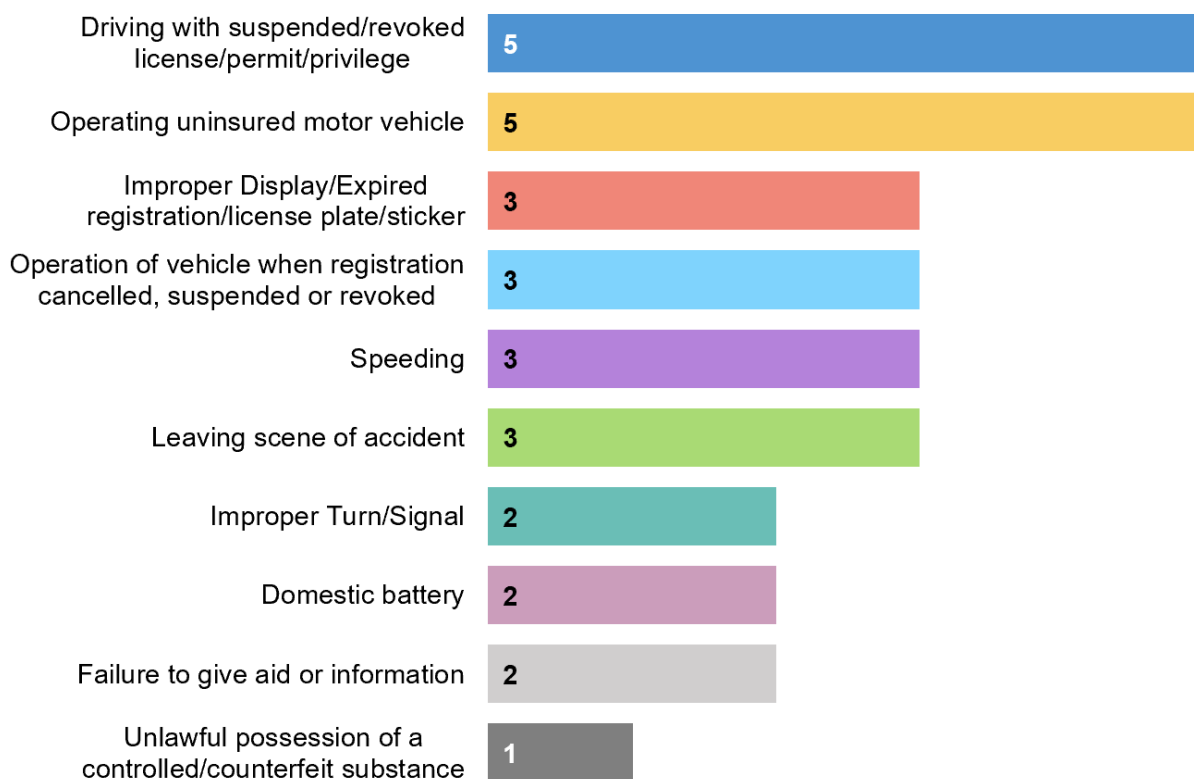

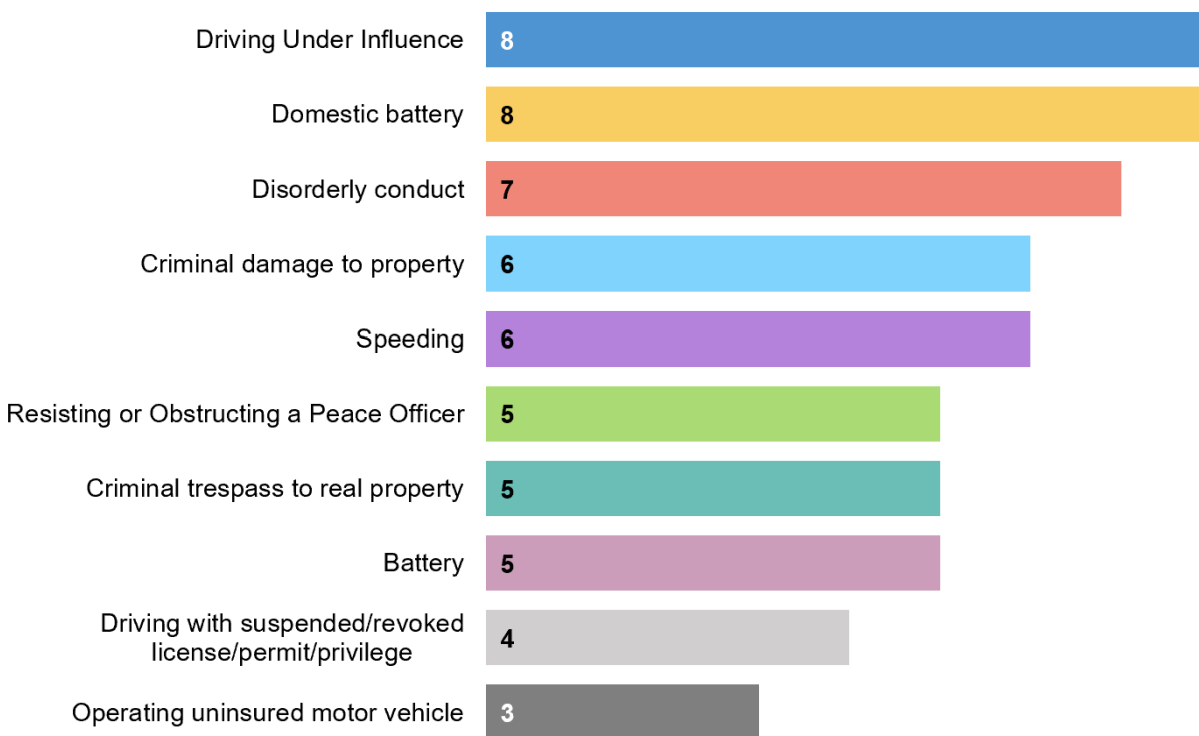

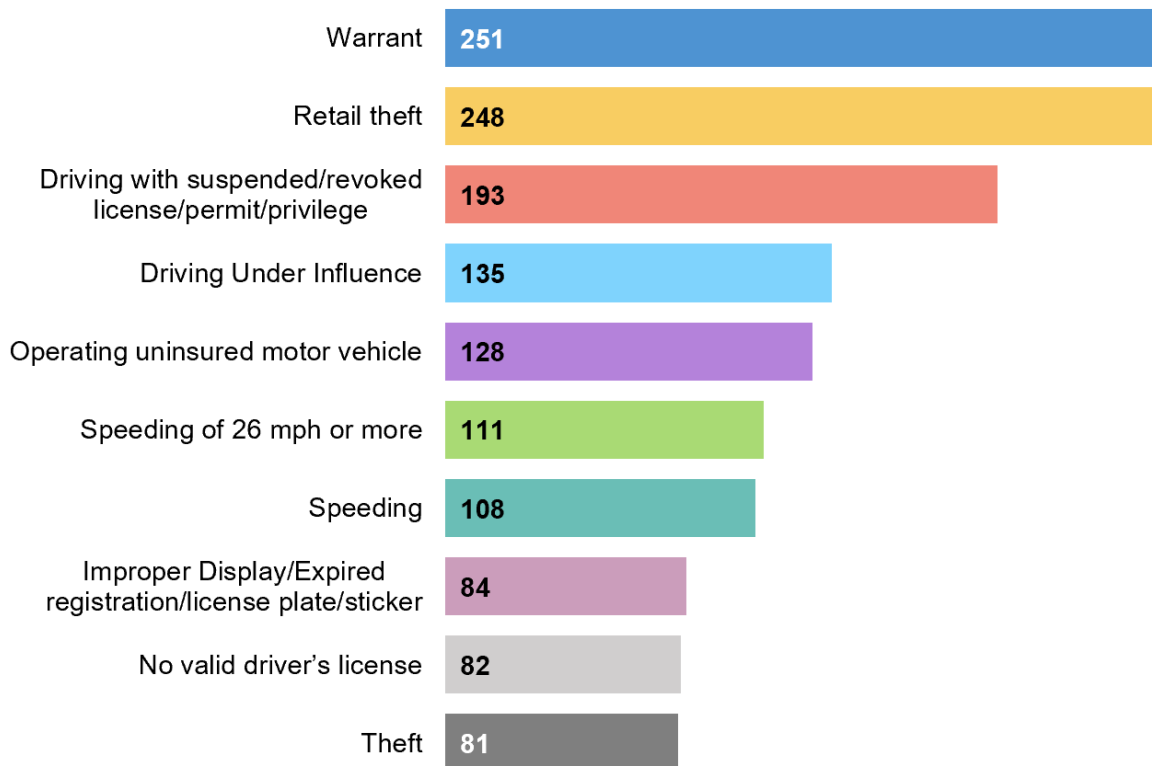

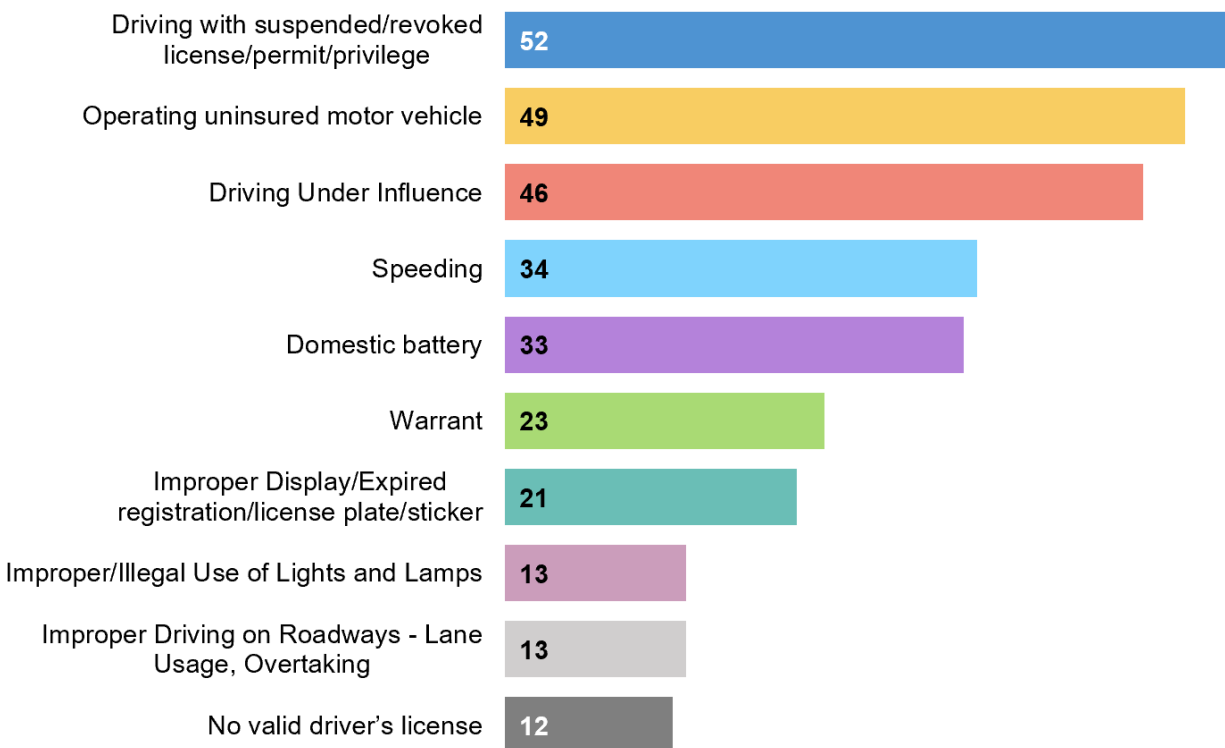

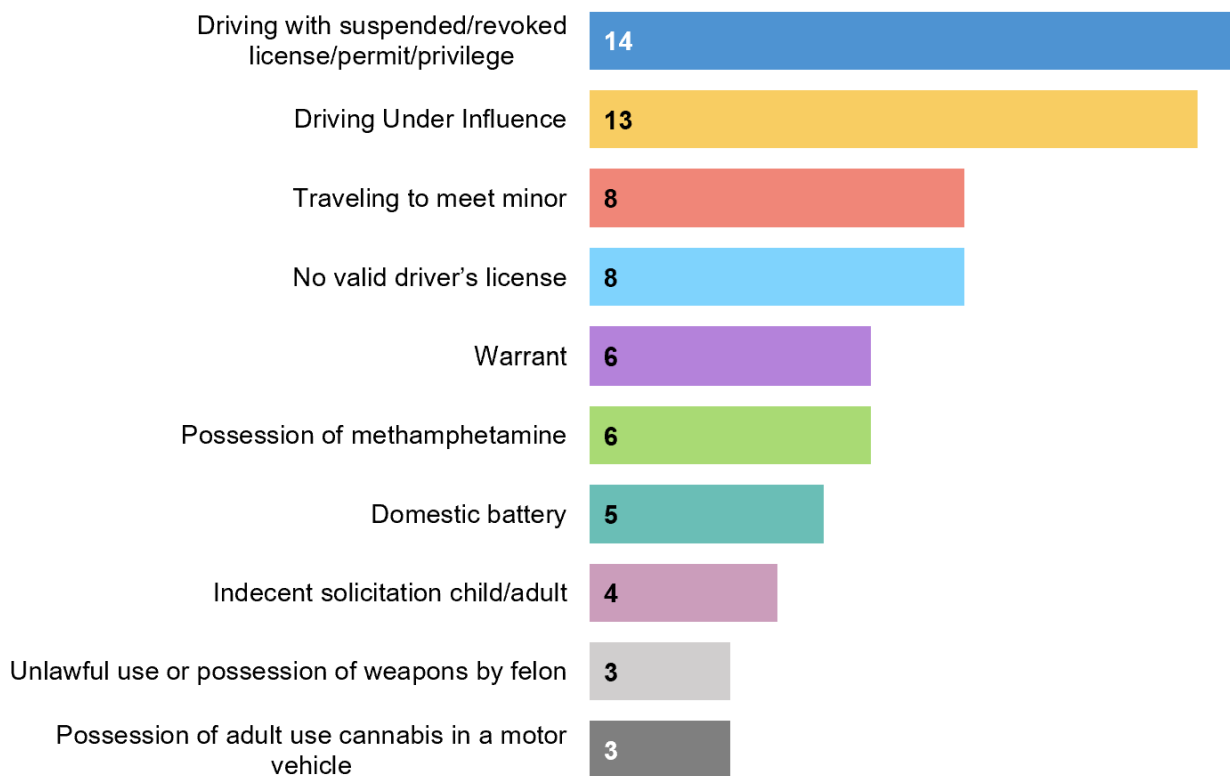

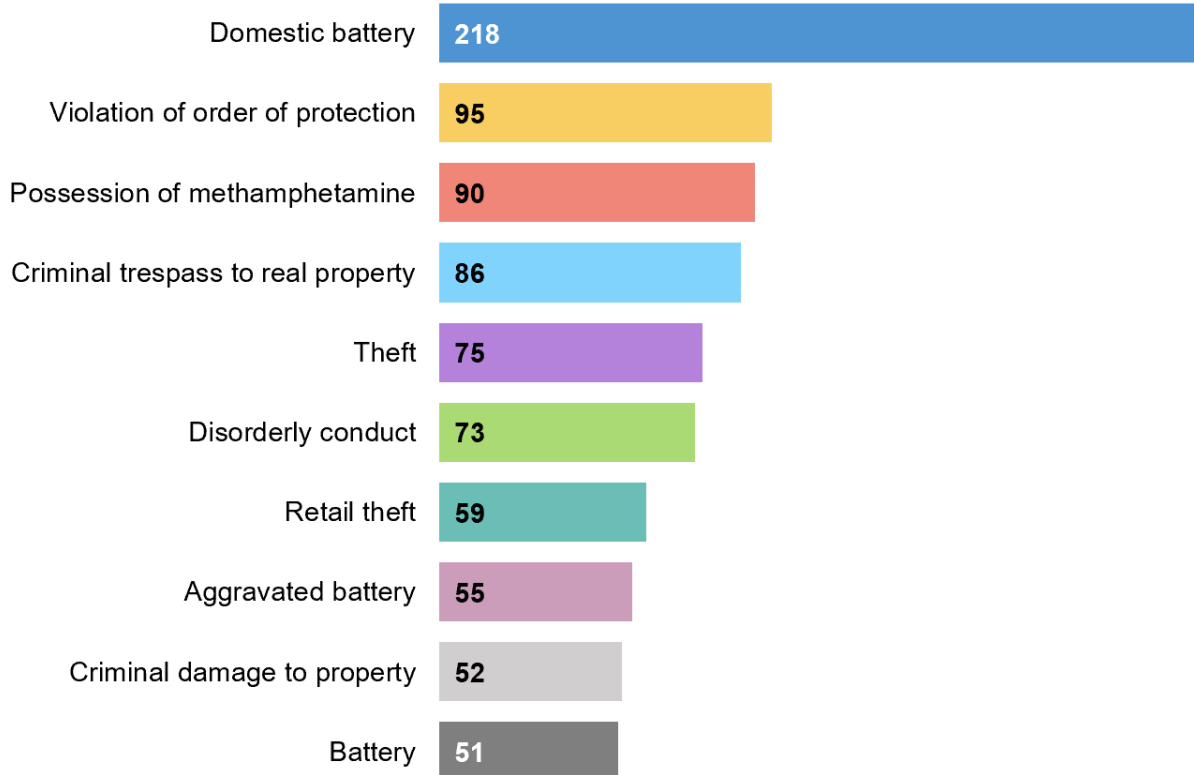

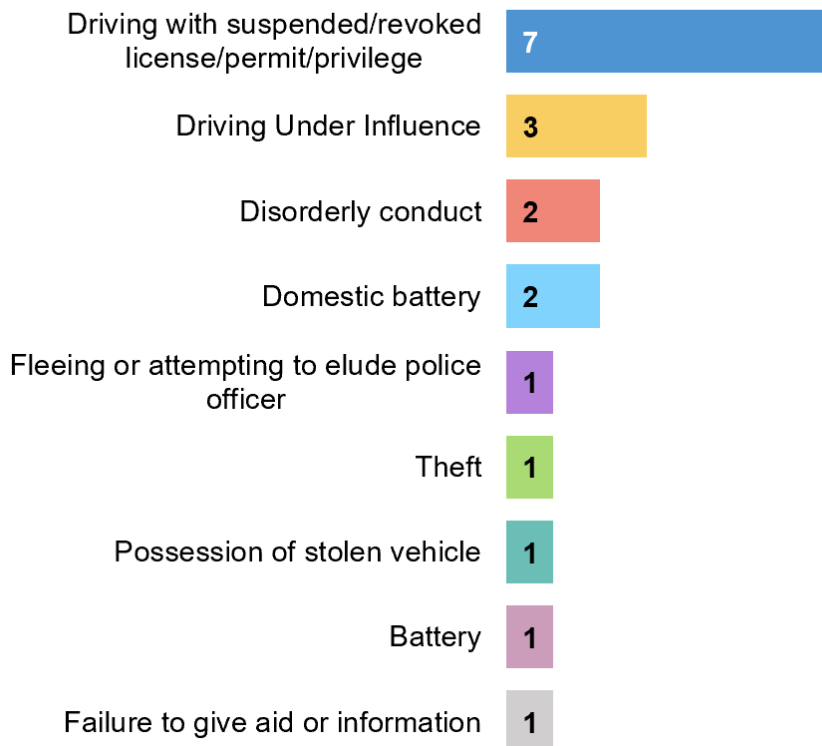

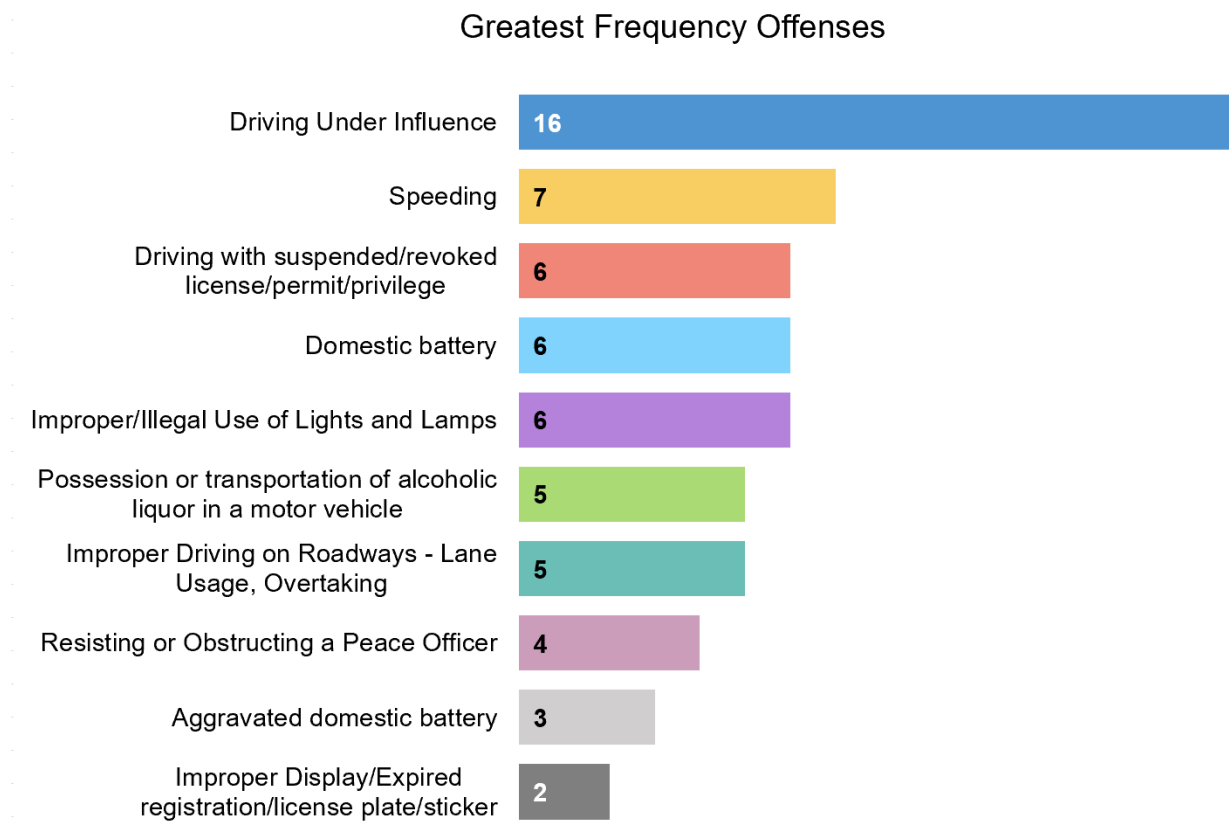

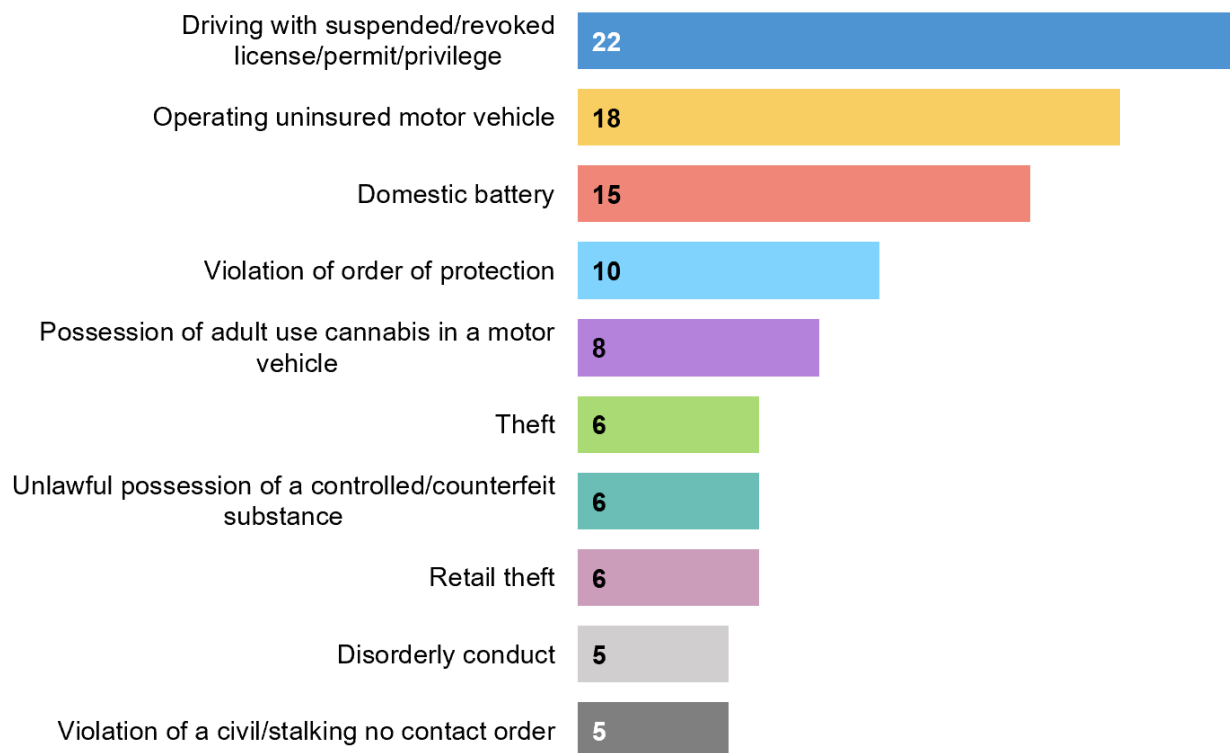

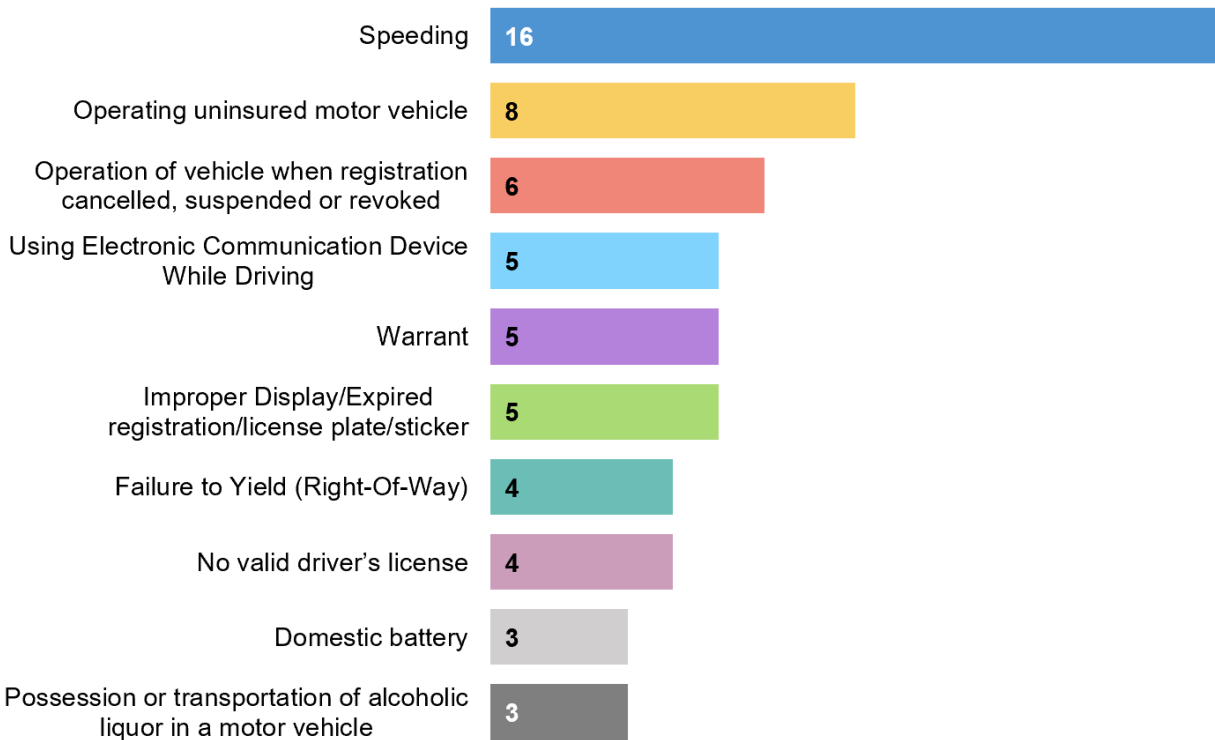

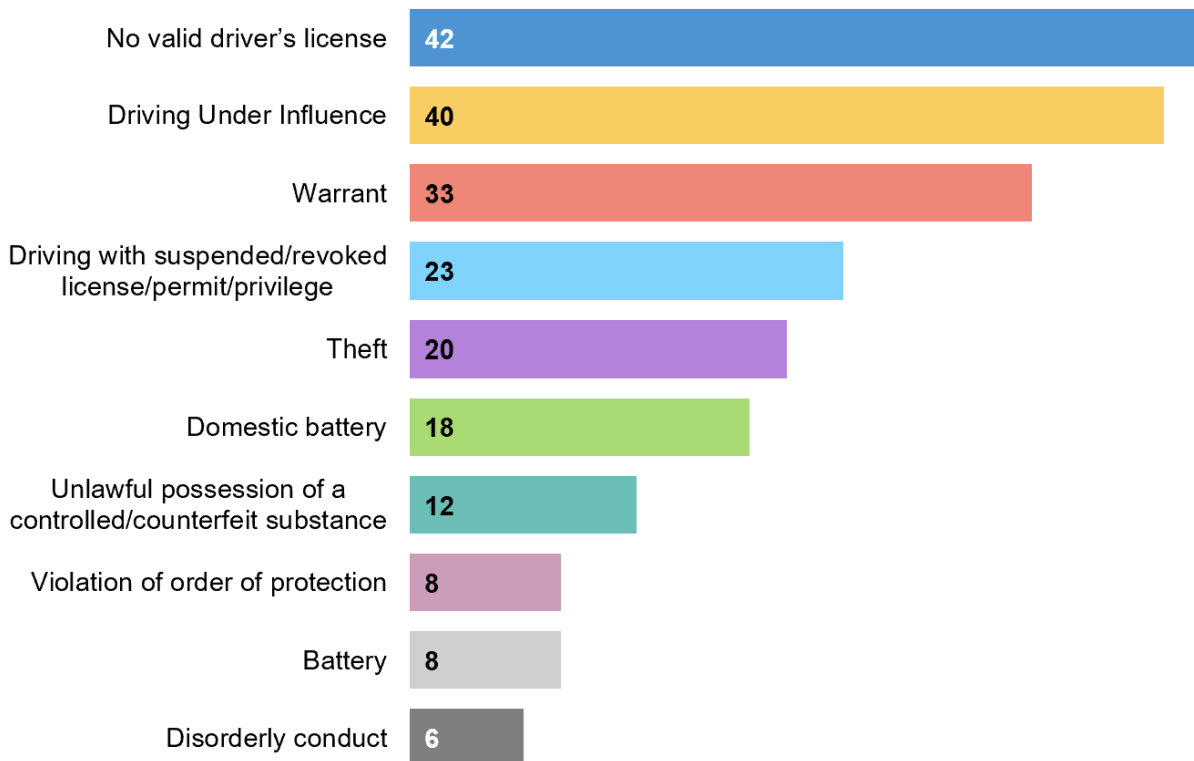

Prairie State College Police Department consists of twenty (20) sworn officers, who utilize twenty-one (21) Axon body worn Cameras

Technical Issues

Prairie State College Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

Review Process

Prairie State College Police Department's Technical Service Officer reviews all video recordings on the Axon body worn cameras. All videos are retained for a minimum of ninety (90) days period. Some retention categories are retained longer than ninety (90) days.

Prospect Heights Police Department consists of twenty-three (23) full-time and two (2) part-time sworn officers who utilize twenty-five (25) Axon Body 4 body worn cameras.

Prospect Heights Police Department's immediate supervisor of each officer is responsible for reviewing two (2) body worn camera videos monthly for every officer under their supervision. The outcomes of each review are meticulously documented, and any identified policy violations are communicated through the appropriate chain of command.

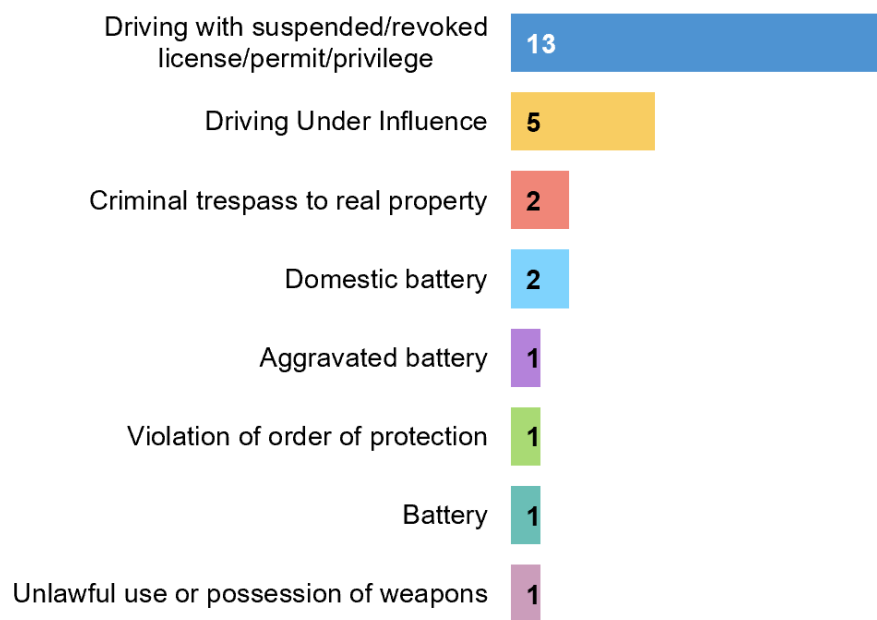
Review Process

Quincy Police Department's supervisors, sergeant or above, have the ability to review all body worn camera footage recorded and uploaded to the Coreforce DMS website in case of a citizen complaint, a review of tactics, an ongoing investigation, reported technical issues, for report writing purposes, reported or suspected misconduct, reported or suspected policy/procedure violations, internal affairs investigations, etc. Supervisors do not review body worn camera footage randomly for the sole purpose of locating infractions of policy/procedure to take disciplinary action against an officer.

Incidents

Quincy Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Ridge Farm Police Department

Ridge Farm Police Department's report does not provide department or body worn camera information.

Technical Issues

Ridge Farm Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

Review Process

Ridge Farm Police Department's report does not include a formal review process.

They review significant events, conduct monthly random reviews to assess performance and equipment use, and complete a documented annual review to ensure policy compliance and identify training needs, using footage as appropriate for coaching and guidance.

Incidents

River Forest Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – River Grove Police Department

River Grove Police Department consists of thirty-two (32) full-time and four (4) part-time sworn officers who utilize thirty-six (36) Axon body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

River Grove Police Department reports zero (0) technical issues.

Review Process

River Grove Police Department's supervisors are responsible for reviewing body worn camera recordings. Access for labeling, redacting, and duplicating recordings is restricted to the BWC Coordinator. Files may be viewed upon supervisor's approval for official investigations, training evaluations by Field Training Officers, or in response to lawful public records requests.

To ensure technical and policy compliance, the BWC Coordinator conducts ten (10) random reviews of body worn camera recordings monthly. The findings of these audits are compiled into a report submitted monthly to the Deputy Chief for final oversight.

Incidents

River Grove Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Riverdale Police Department

Riverdale Police Department consists of twenty-eight (28) sworn officers who utilize seventeen (17) Axon body worn cameras. 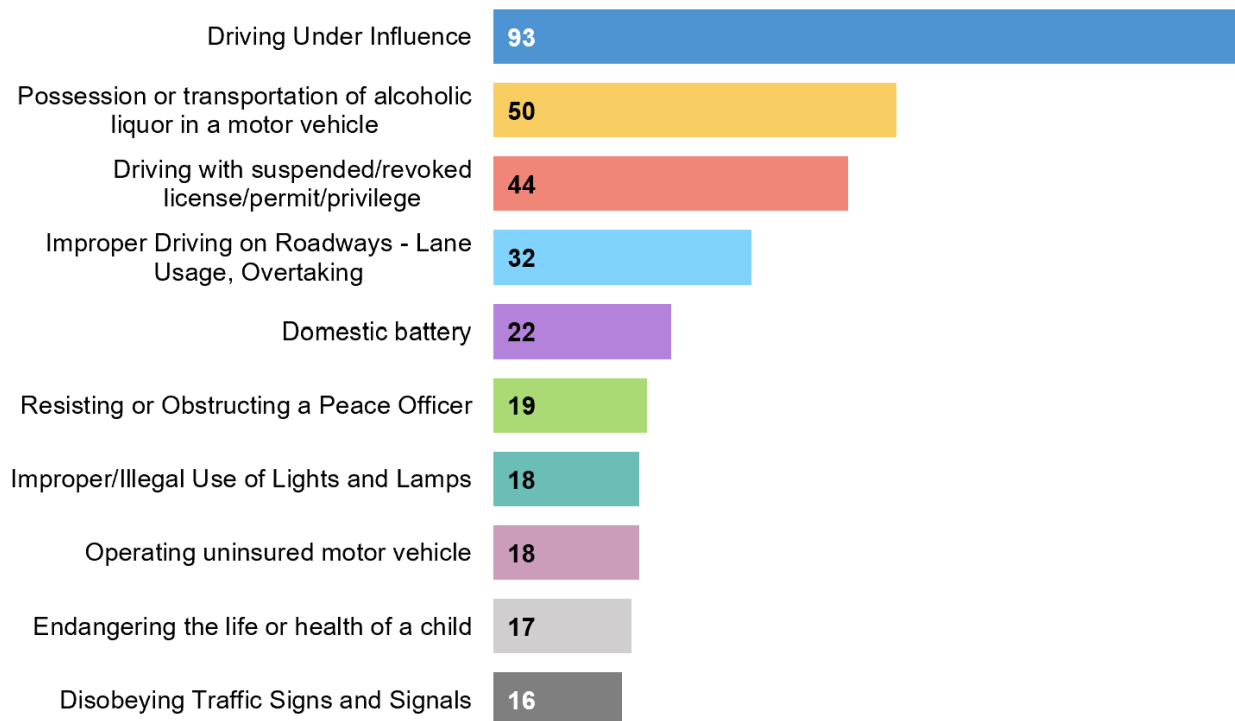

These bi-monthly reviews are documented on a supervisory review form.

Riverwoods Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Rochester Police Department

Rochester Police Department consists of nine (9) full-time and two (2) part-time officers who utilize an Axon Body 4 body worn camera each.

Technical Issues

Rochester Police Department reports one (1) issue where the body worn camera was damaged by an airbag in a traffic crash and the front button on the camera would no longer function. The officer was issued a different body worn camera.

Review Process

Rochester Police Department's supervisors review body worn camera recordings upon a complaint or threat of complaint on an officer, prior to any distribution (Subpoena, FOIA, etc.) of a recorded incident monthly, and randomly throughout the year.

Incidents

Rochester Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Rock Island County Sheriff’s Office

Rock Island County Sheriff’s Office consists of sixty-five (65) sworn deputies who utilize sixty-seven (67) body worn cameras. Two (2) extra cameras are used as spares in the event of camera malfunction.

Rock Island County Sheriff’s Office reports one (1) technical issue or malfunction with a body worn camera not holding a charge. The camera was replaced with a spare camera, and the inoperable camera was sent to the vendor for repair.

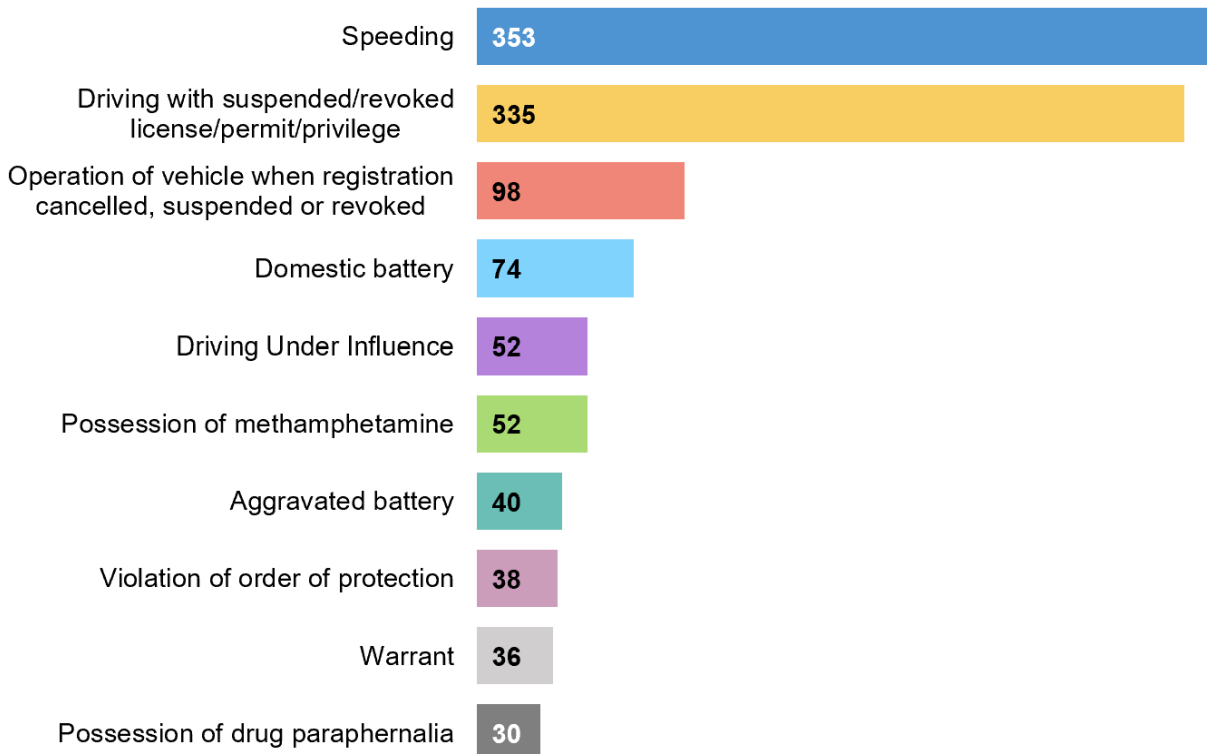

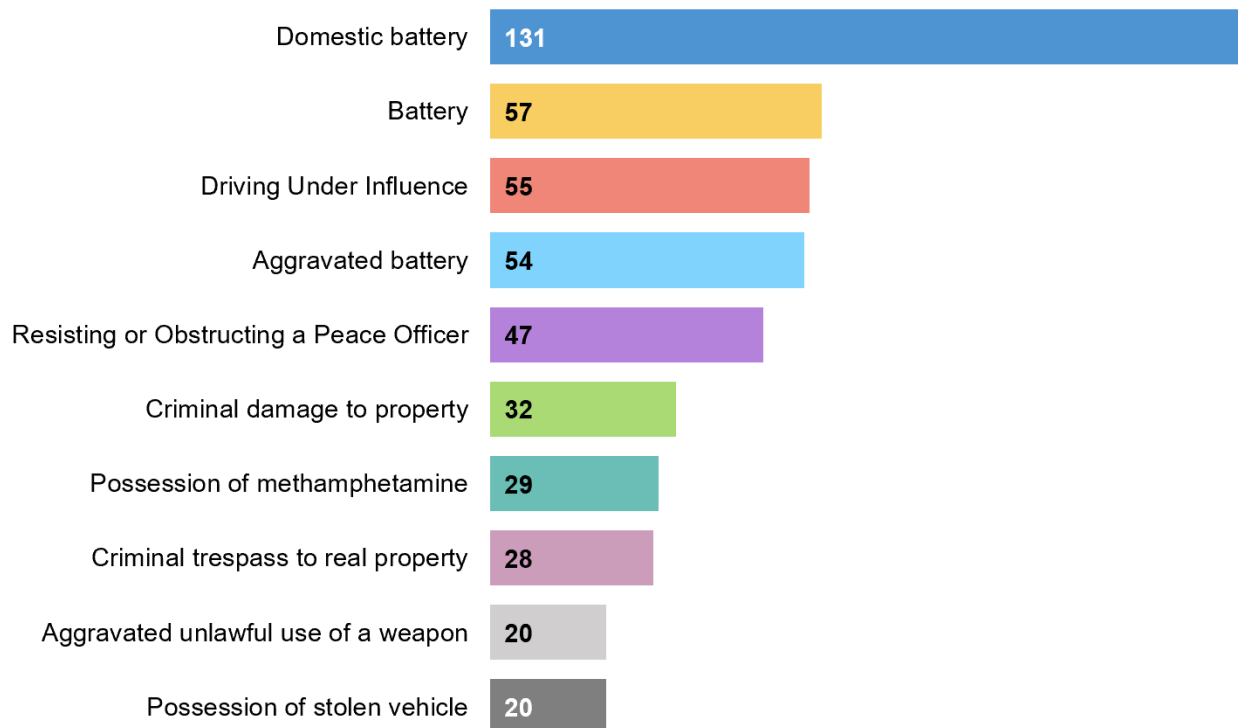

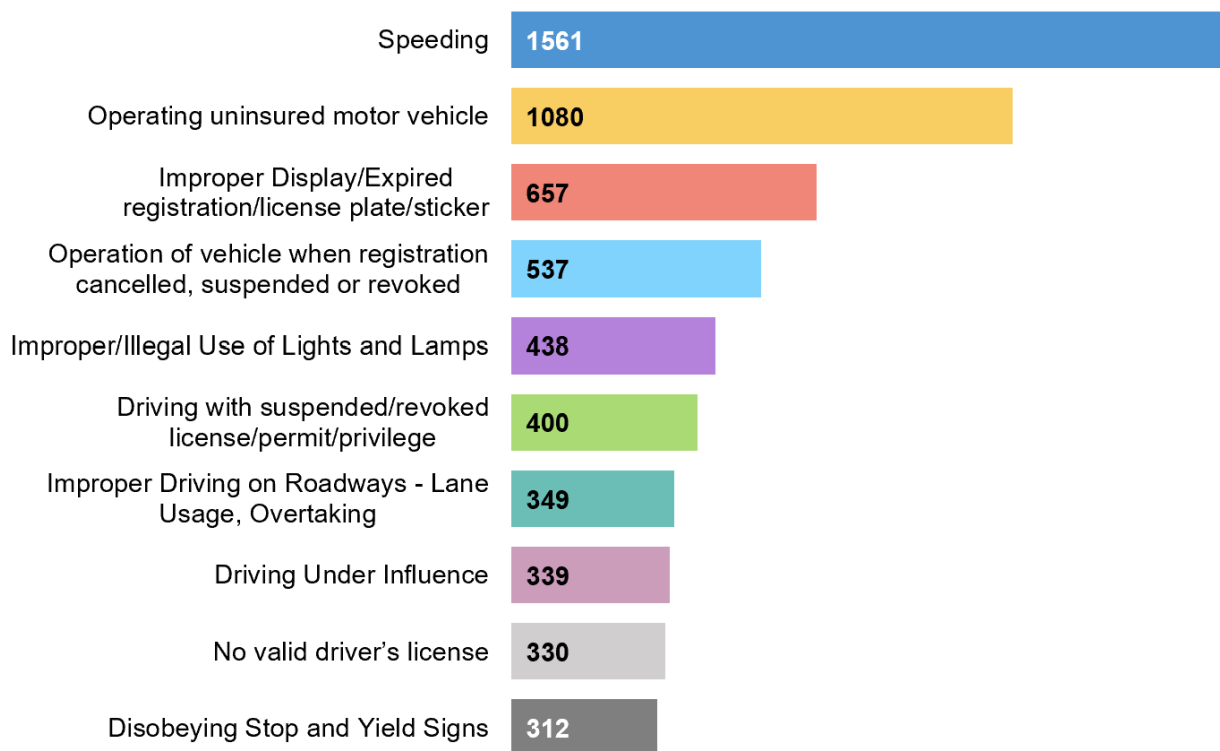

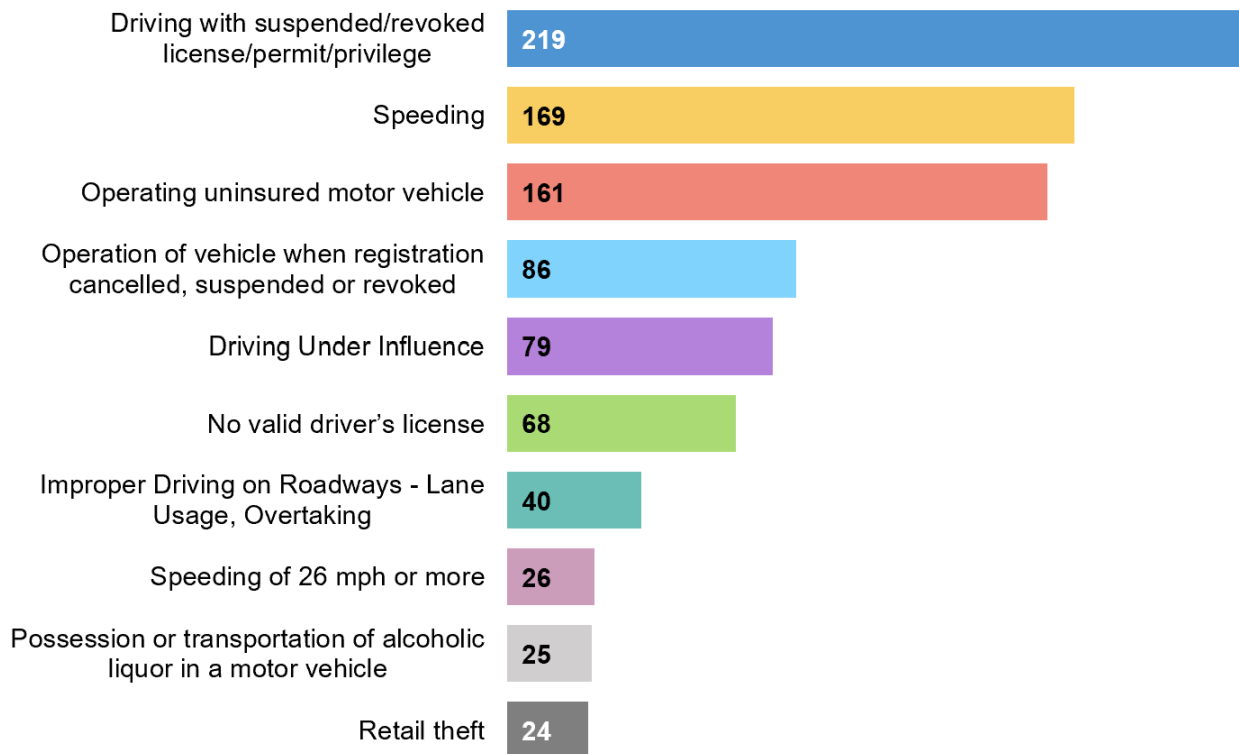

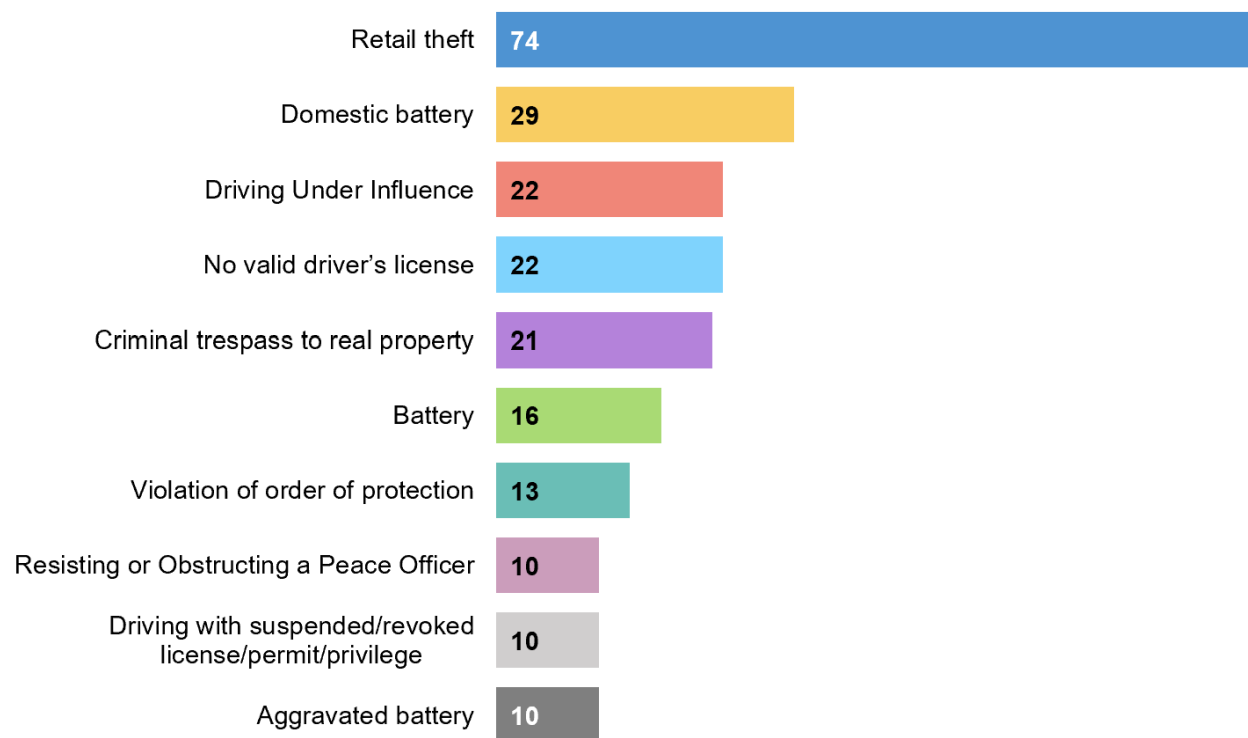

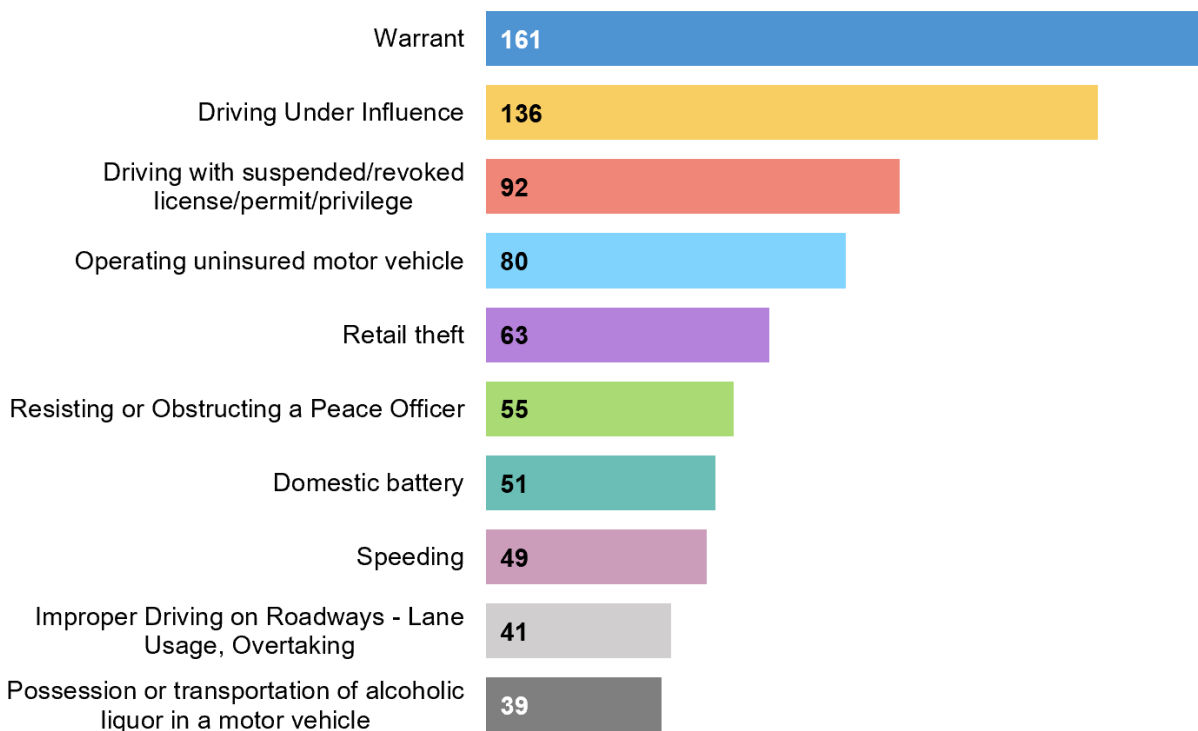

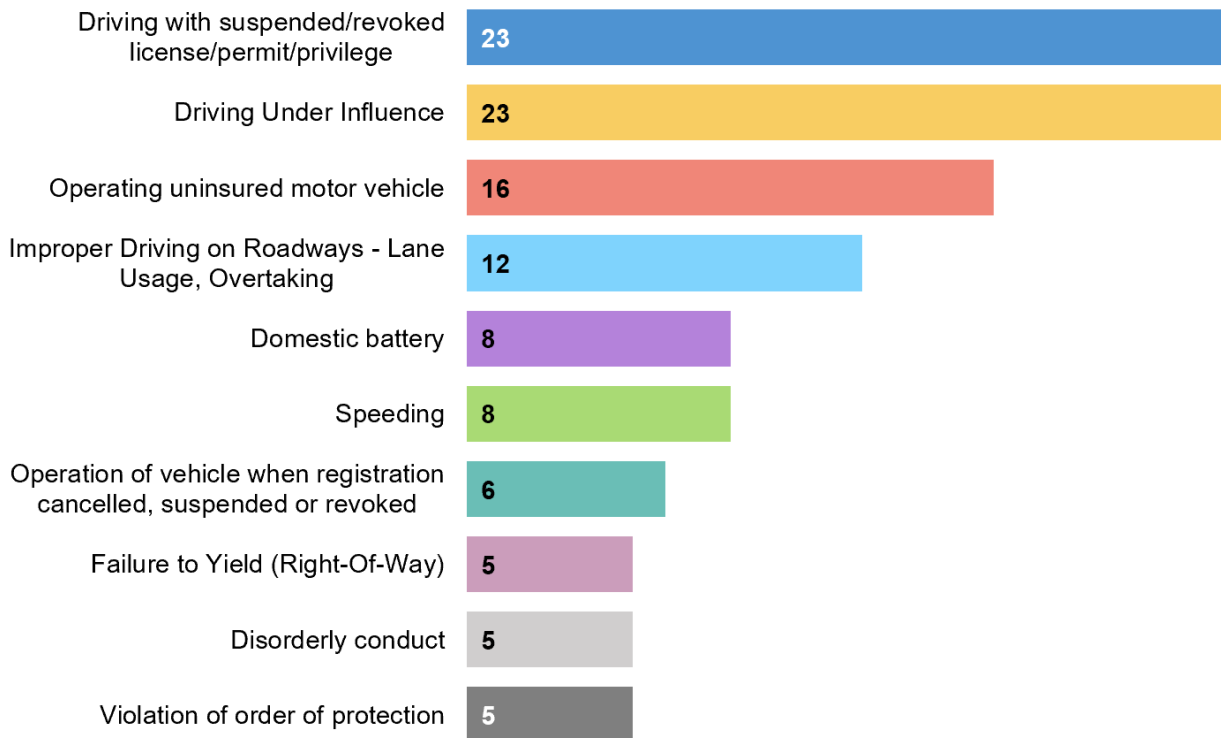

Areas where additional guidance or training is required are identified after reviewing camera footage. Supervisors do not review recordings to search for violations of policy or law not related to a specific complaint or incident.

Incidents

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, the Roselle Police Department logged two hundred forty-five (245) arrests, five thousand four hundred fifty-three (5,453) traffic contacts resulting in five thousand seven hundred twenty-five (5,725) tickets and twenty (20) Village Ordinance Violations. Of these, the department forwarded body worn camera video to either the Cook or DuPage County State's Attorney's Office at their request for use in prosecutions, during thirty-two (32) incidents leading to one hundred eleven (111) offenses being charged. The department does not provide individual incident data.

Round Lake Beach Police Department reports one (1) issue with the body worn camera declared inoperable with Motorola error "Initial Error0100". The camera was replaced by Motorola.

Review Process

Round Lake Beach Police Department's recording officer and his or her supervisor may access and review body worn camera recordings prior to completing incident reports, provided that the officer or his or her supervisor discloses that fact in the report or documentation. Supervisors may access and review body worn camera recordings on the Evidence Library platform. All access and activity on the platform are monitored and are available for management audits.

Incidents

Round Lake Beach Police Department's report does not include incidents data.

Department Overview – Round Lake Heights Police Department

Round Lake Heights Police Department consists of five (5) full-time officers including the Chief of Police and three (3) part-time officers who utilize five (5) Motorola body worn cameras.

Round Lake Heights Police Department's management conducts periodic/semi-annual review of officers' body worn camera to confirm compliance with policy and adherence to law. 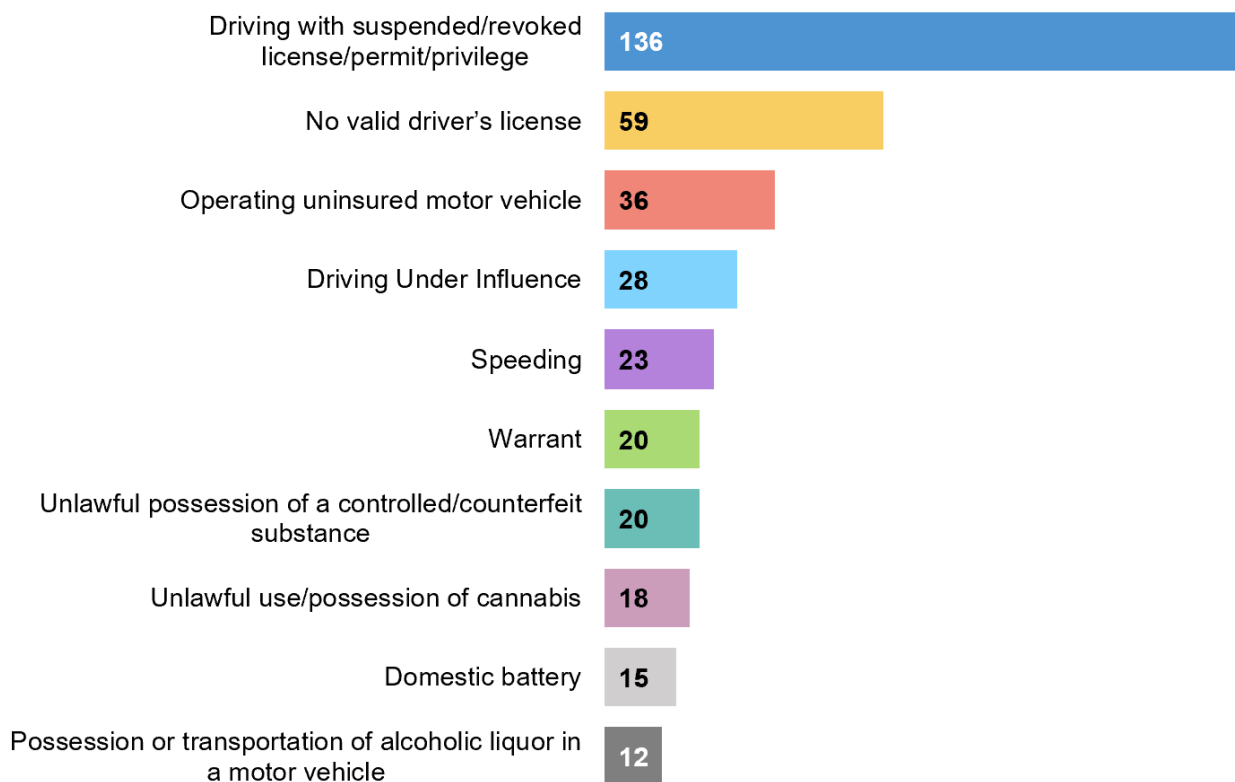

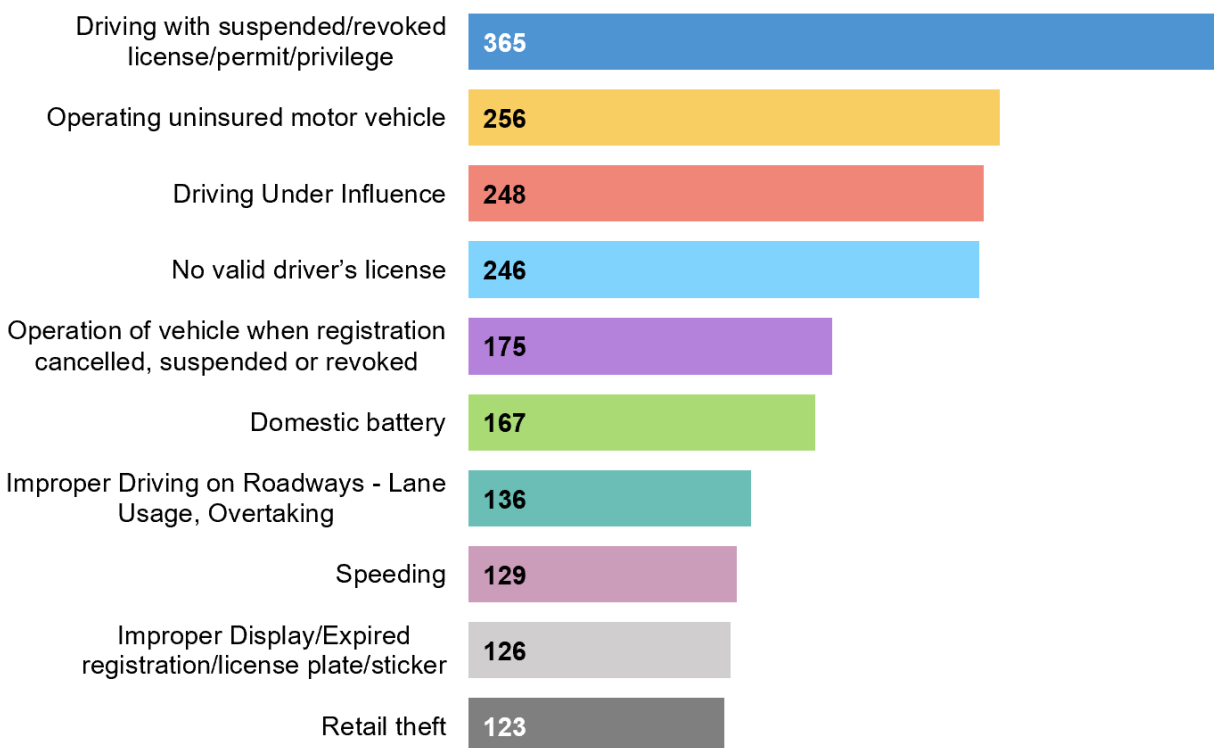

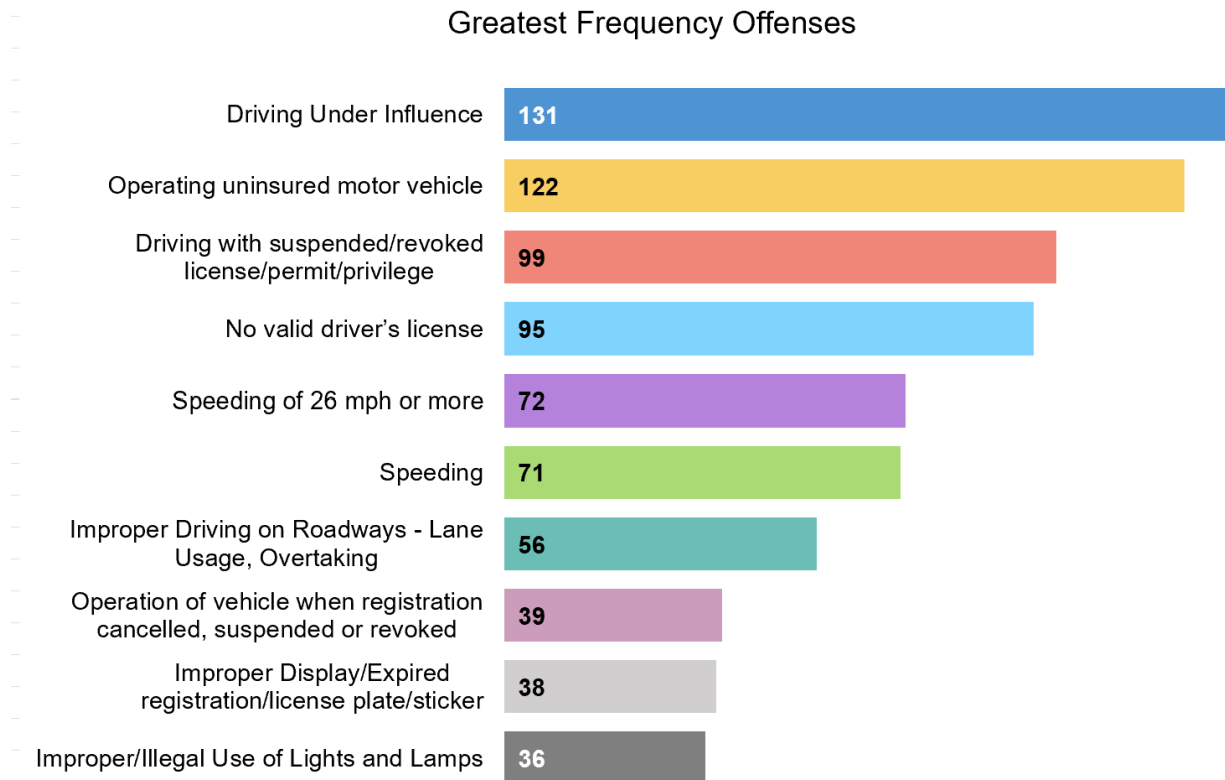

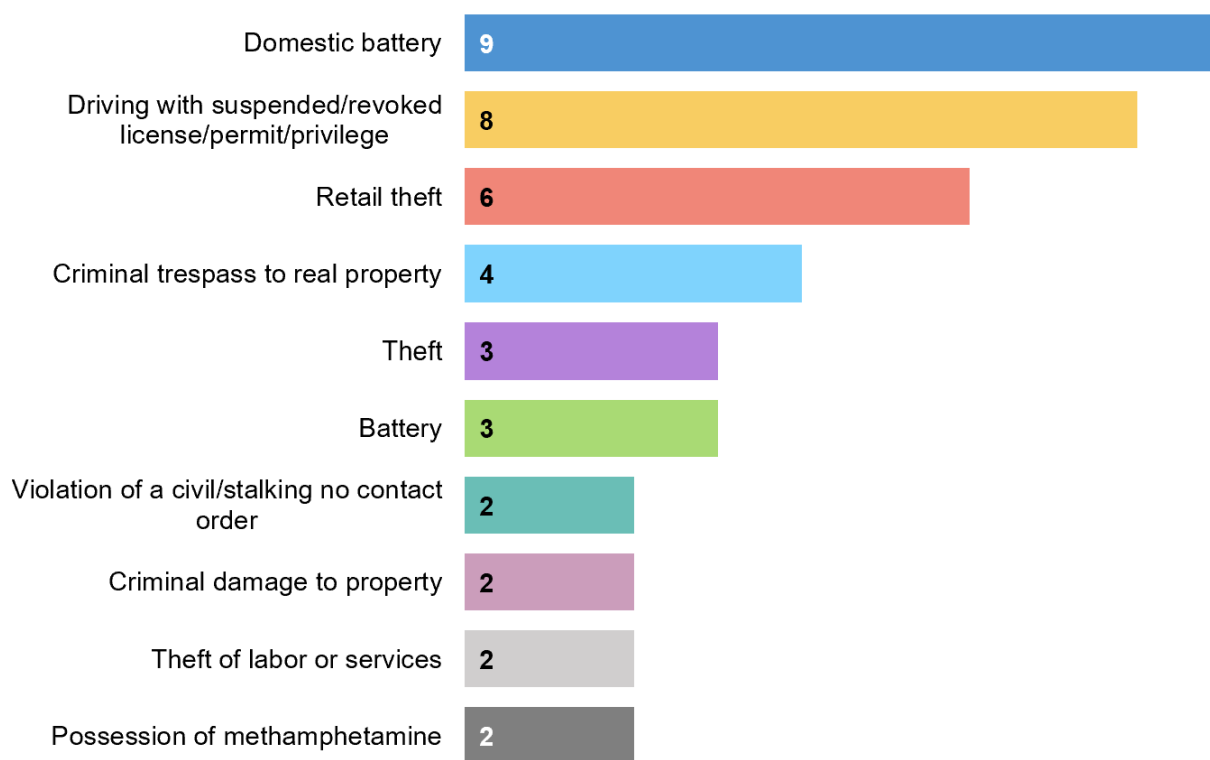

Shorewood Police Department consists of thirty-three (33) sworn personnel who utilize a Motorola V700 body worn camera each.

Technical Issues

Shorewood Police Department reports several technical issues with body worn camera equipment. These included cameras failing to properly record or retain data, devices requiring warranty repair or replacement, equipment requiring service. These issues were addressed through manufacturer warranty claims, flat-rate repair services, equipment replacement, and vendor troubleshooting.

Review Process

Shorewood Police Department's supervisors, including Sergeants and the Deputy Chief access and review body worn camera recordings for legitimate law enforcement purposes. Supervisory review is conducted in all use of force incidents, vehicle pursuits, citizen complaints, and any other circumstance where review is deemed necessary.

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, Shorewood Police Department reports four thousand one hundred ninety-six (4,196) events. But the report does not include individual incident data.

Department Overview – Skokie Police Department

Skokie Police Department consists of one hundred seven (107) sworn officers who utilize one hundred thirteen (113) (two (2) officers have two (2) cameras assigned to them) Axon 4 body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

Skokie Police Department reports a few issues with body worn cameras including cameras not being charged when in dock or plugged in with a USB-C, syncing issues with Evidence.com, cracked LED screen, LCD Display Screen not displaying any information, connectivity issues, and broken magnet and pocket mounts. The issues were remedied by restarting or with IT support within agency or being replaced by Axon.

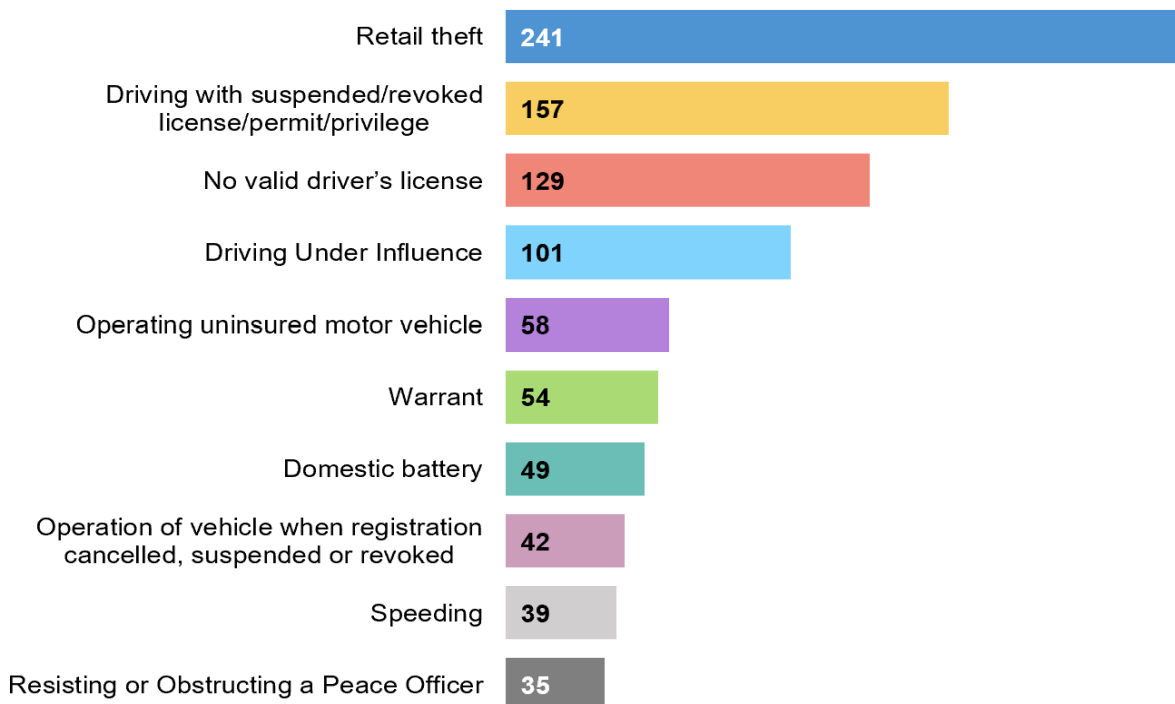
Review Process

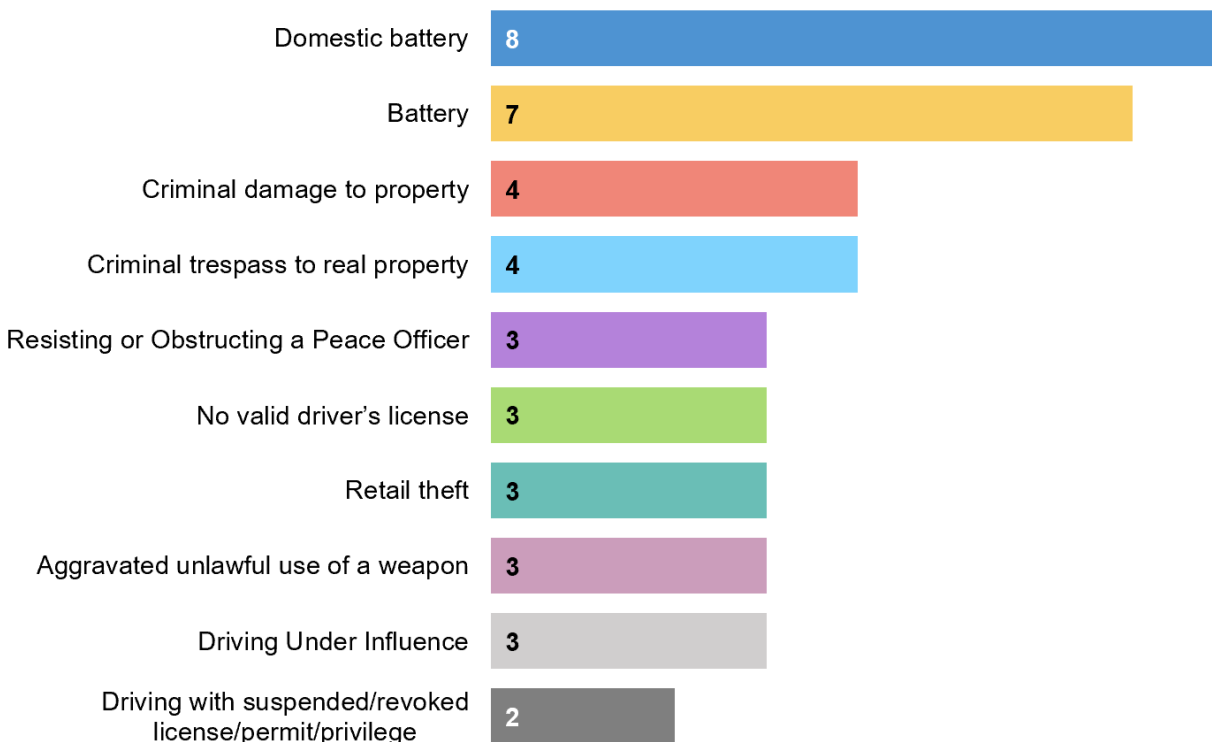

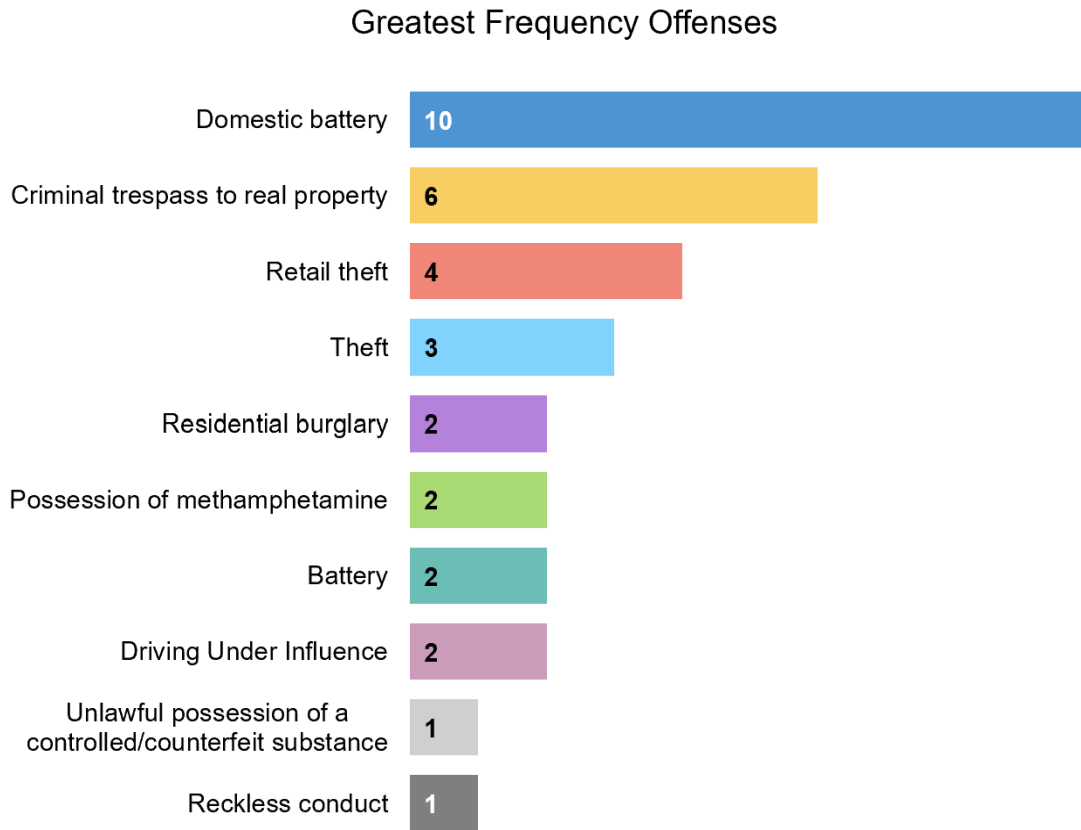

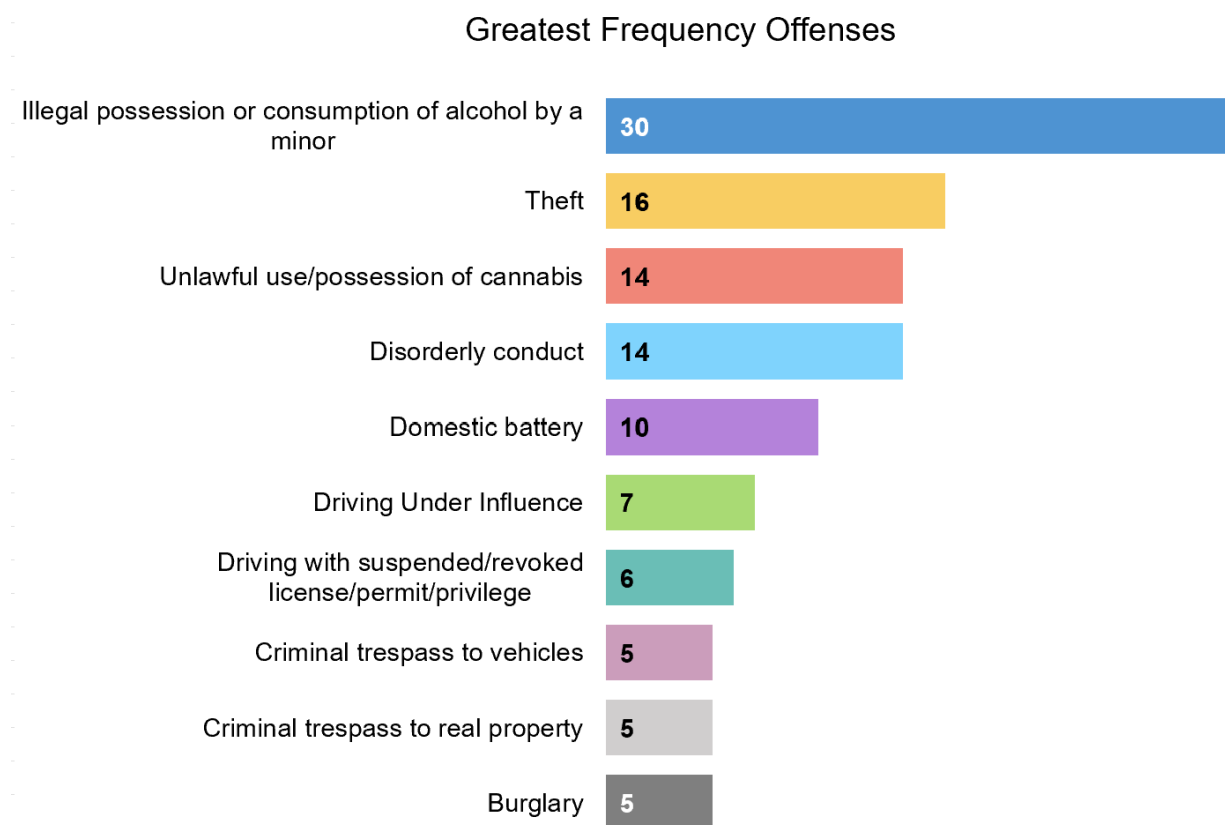

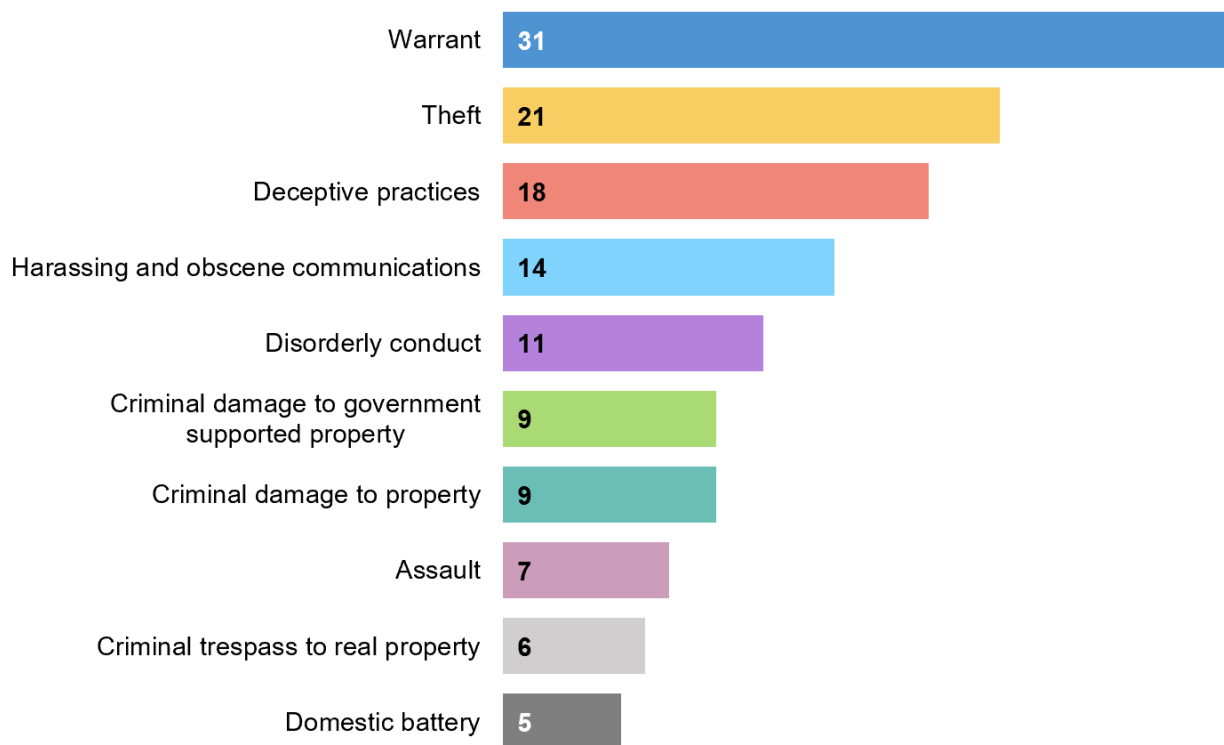

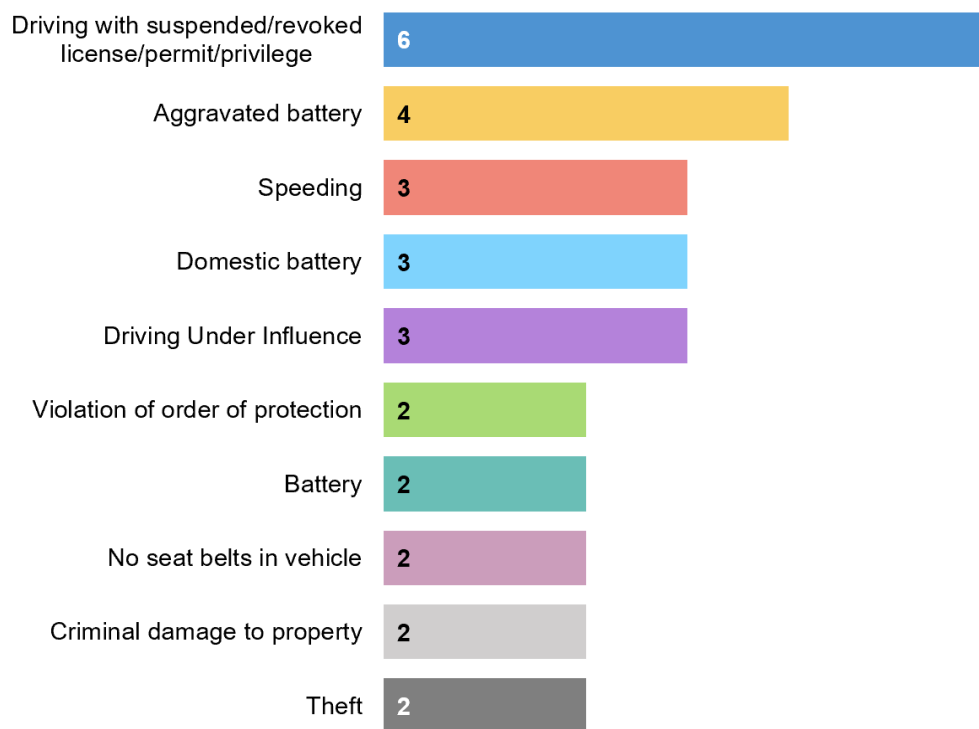

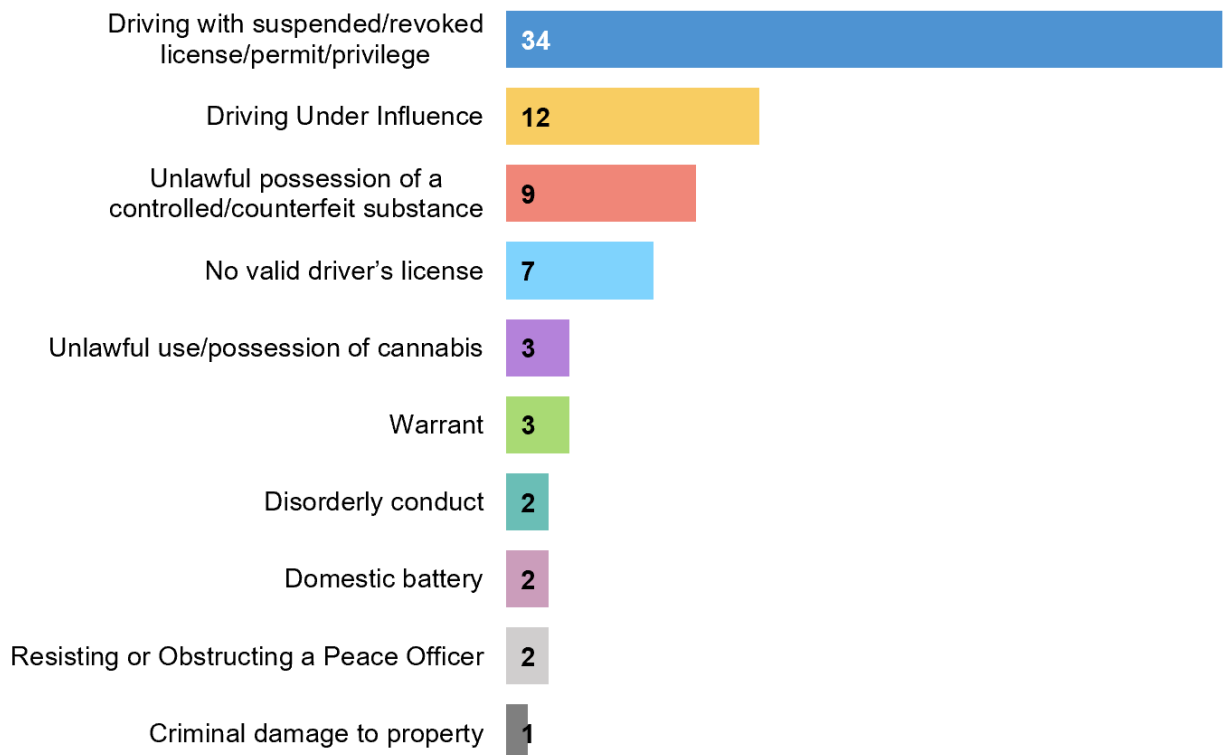

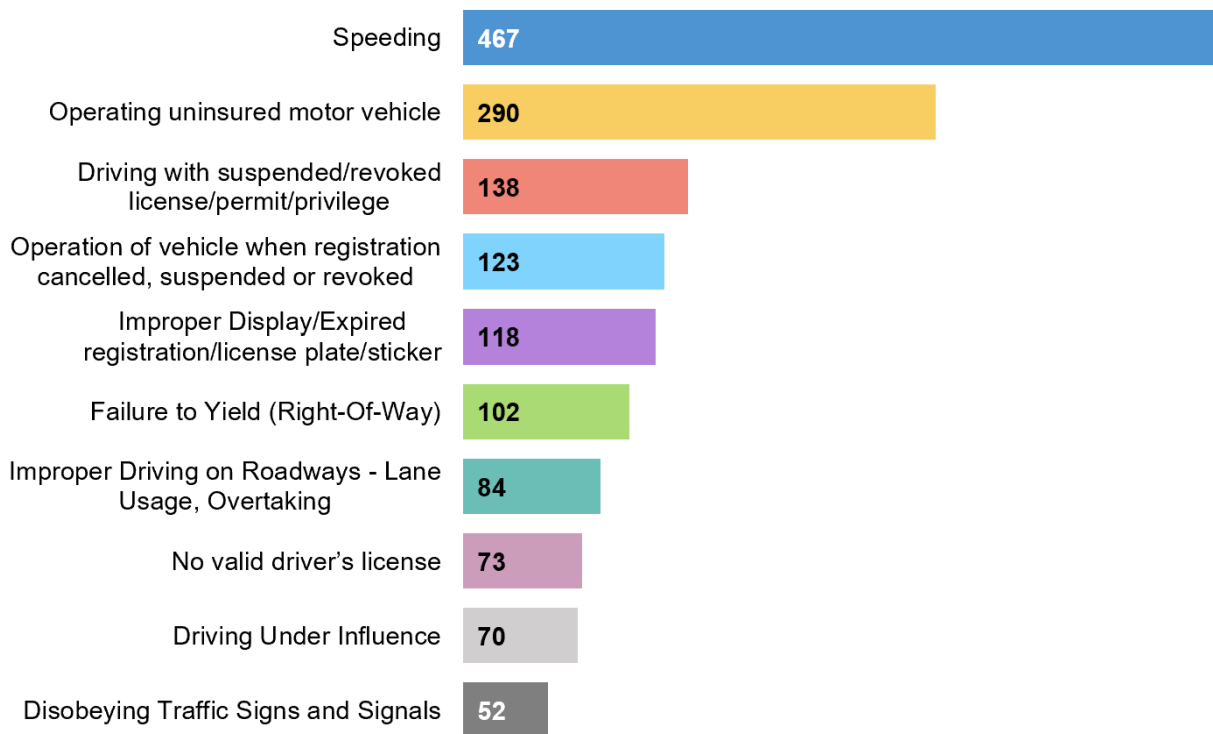

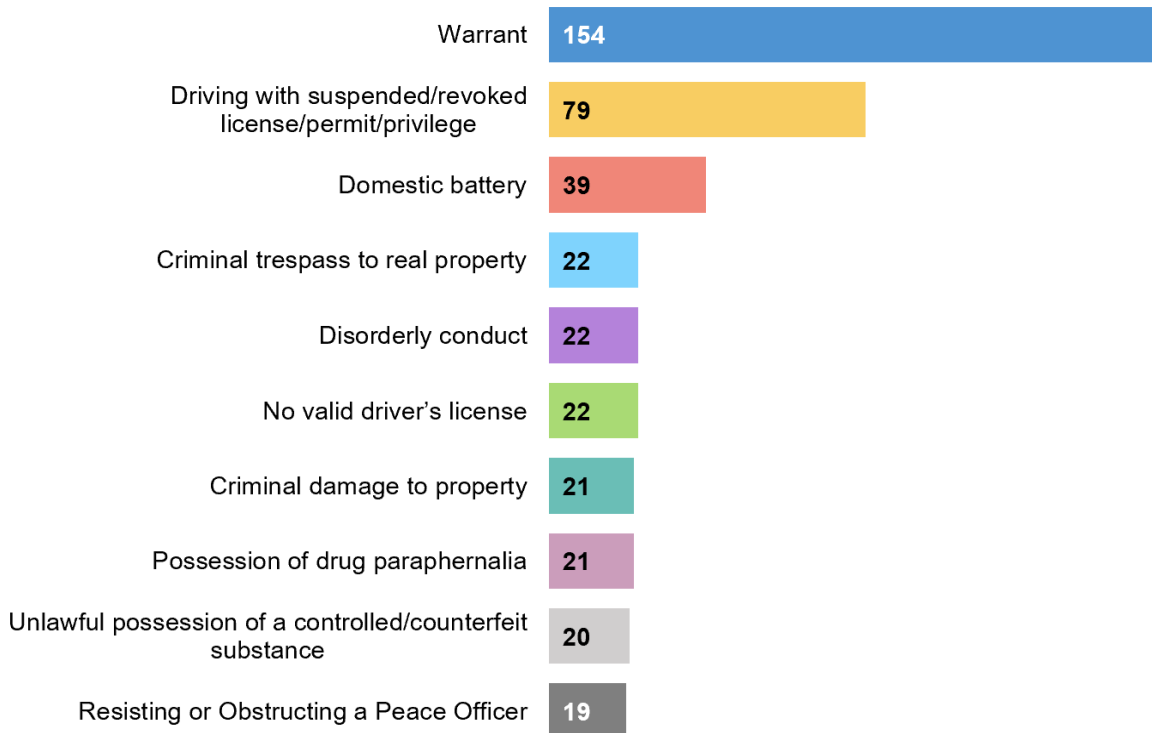

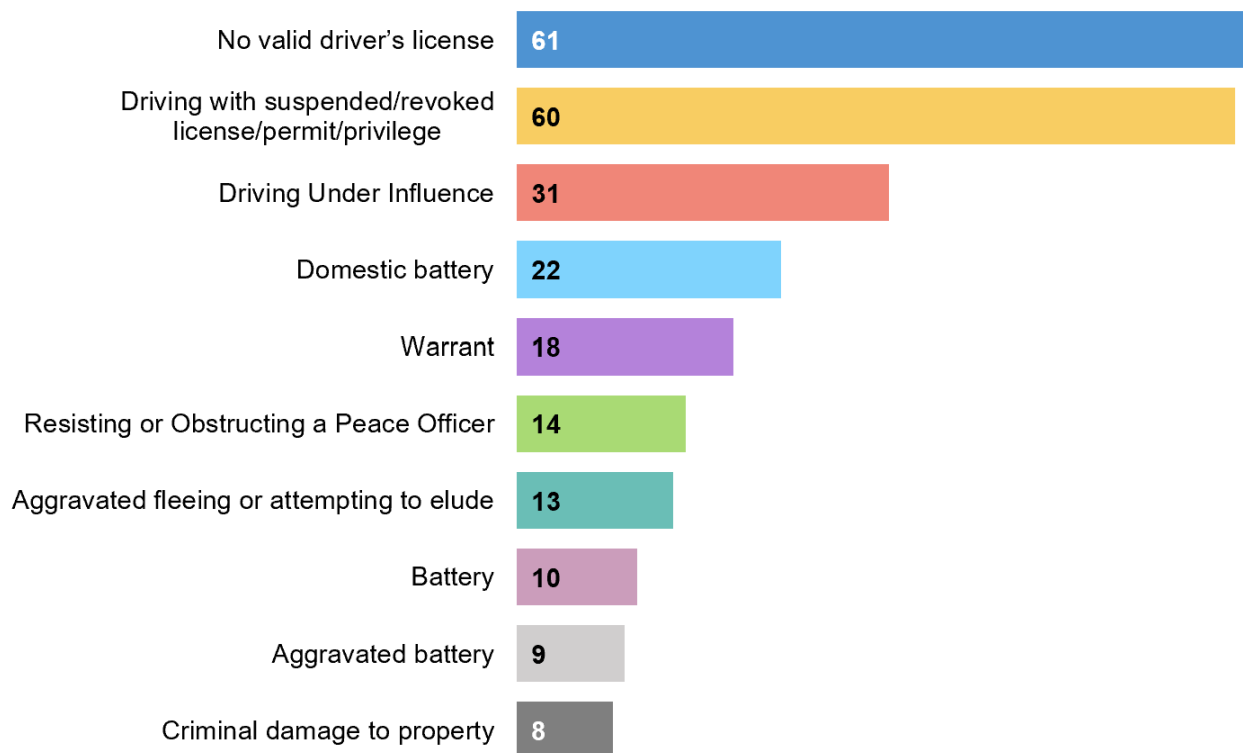

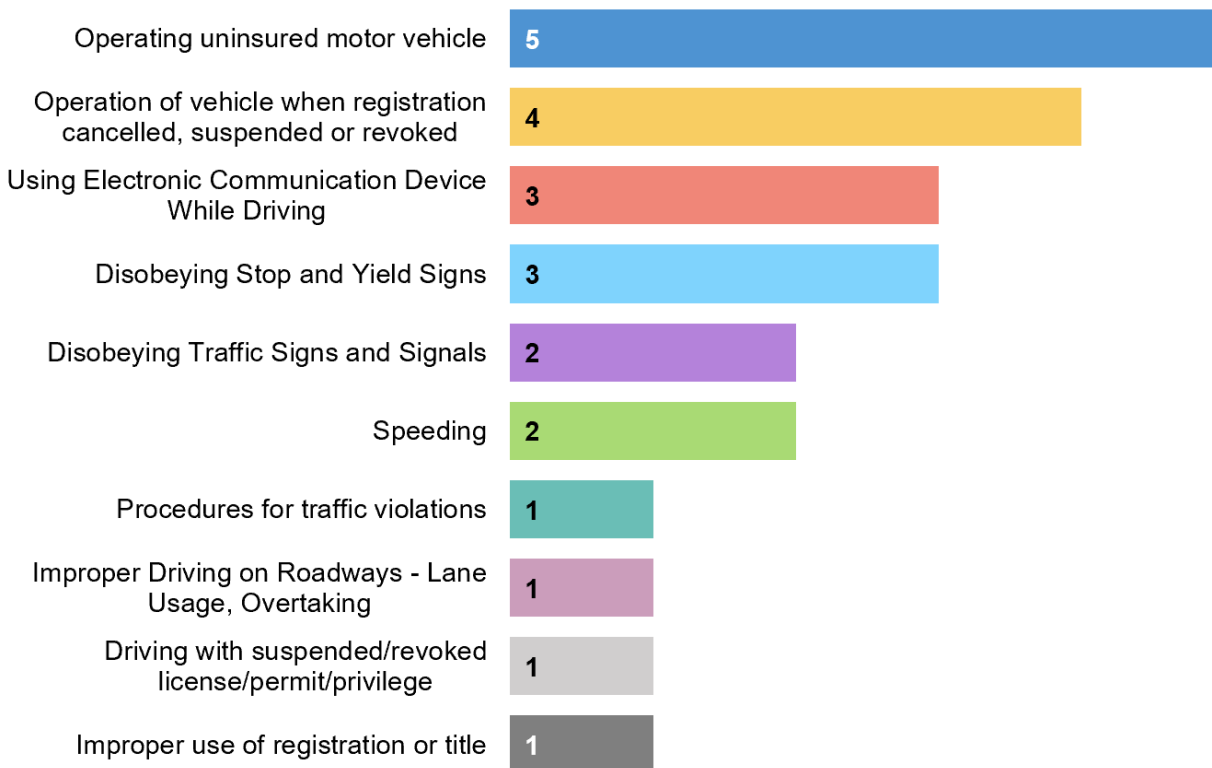

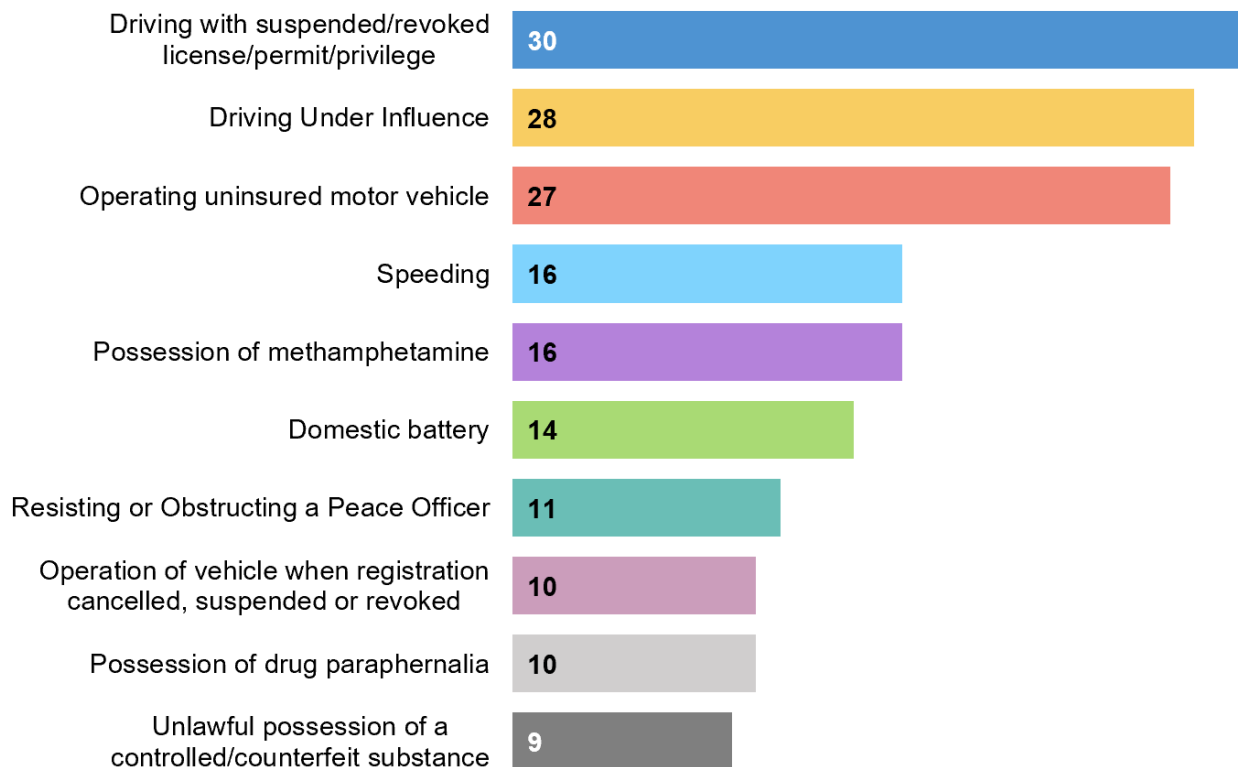

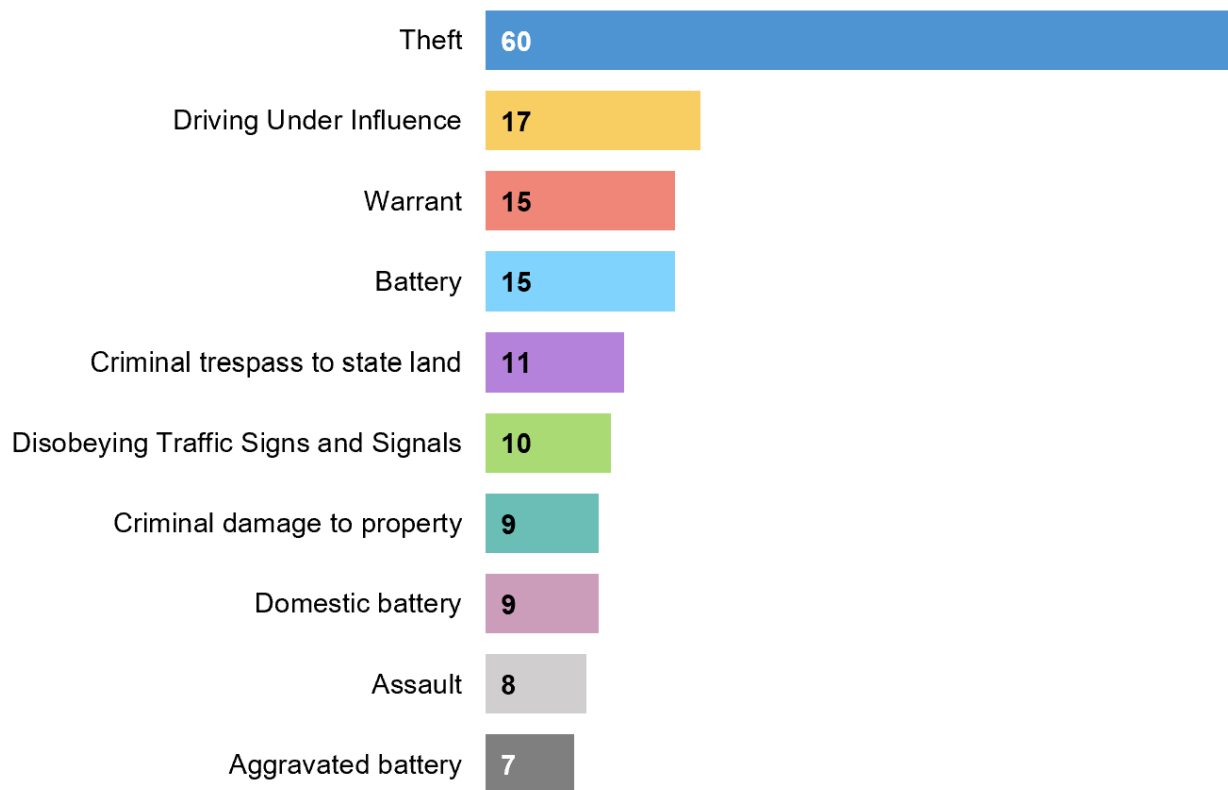

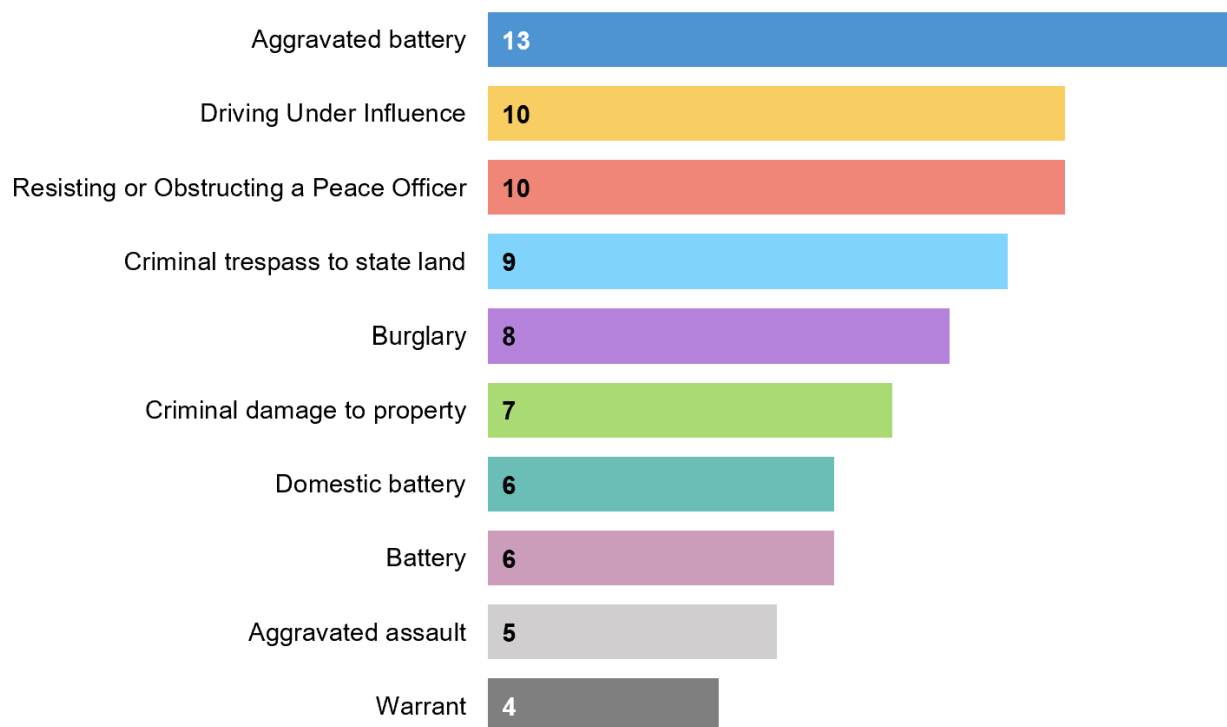

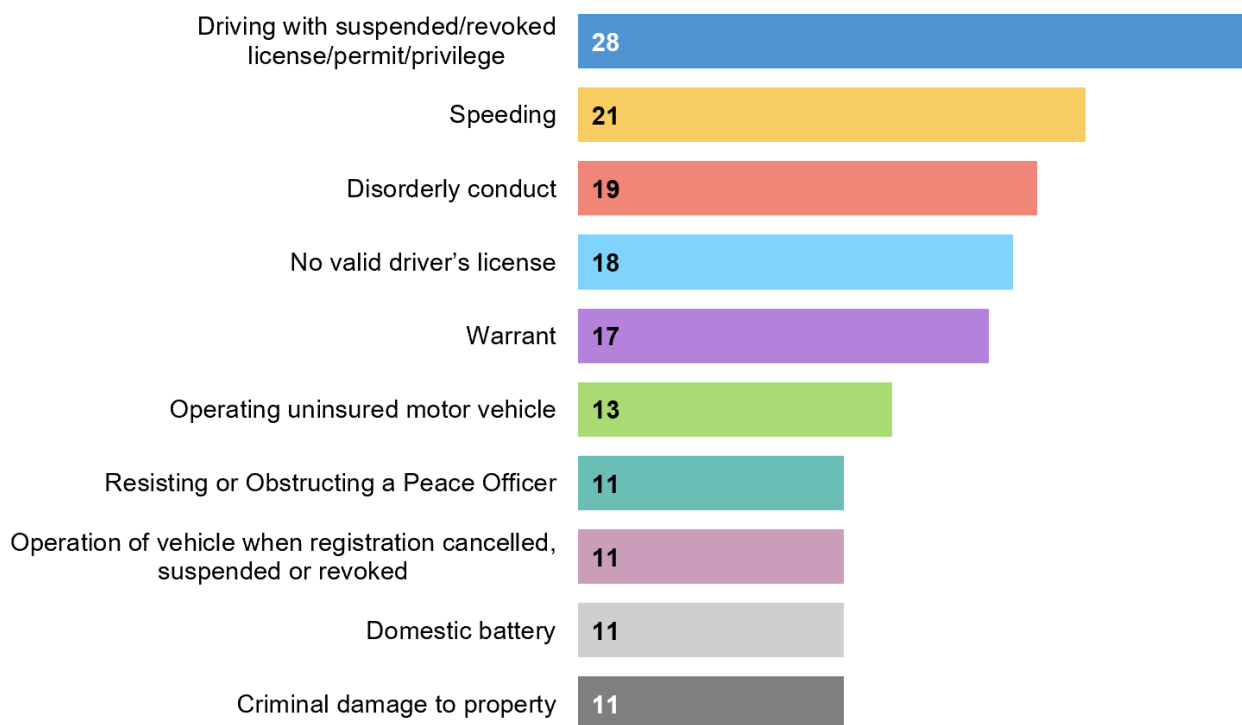

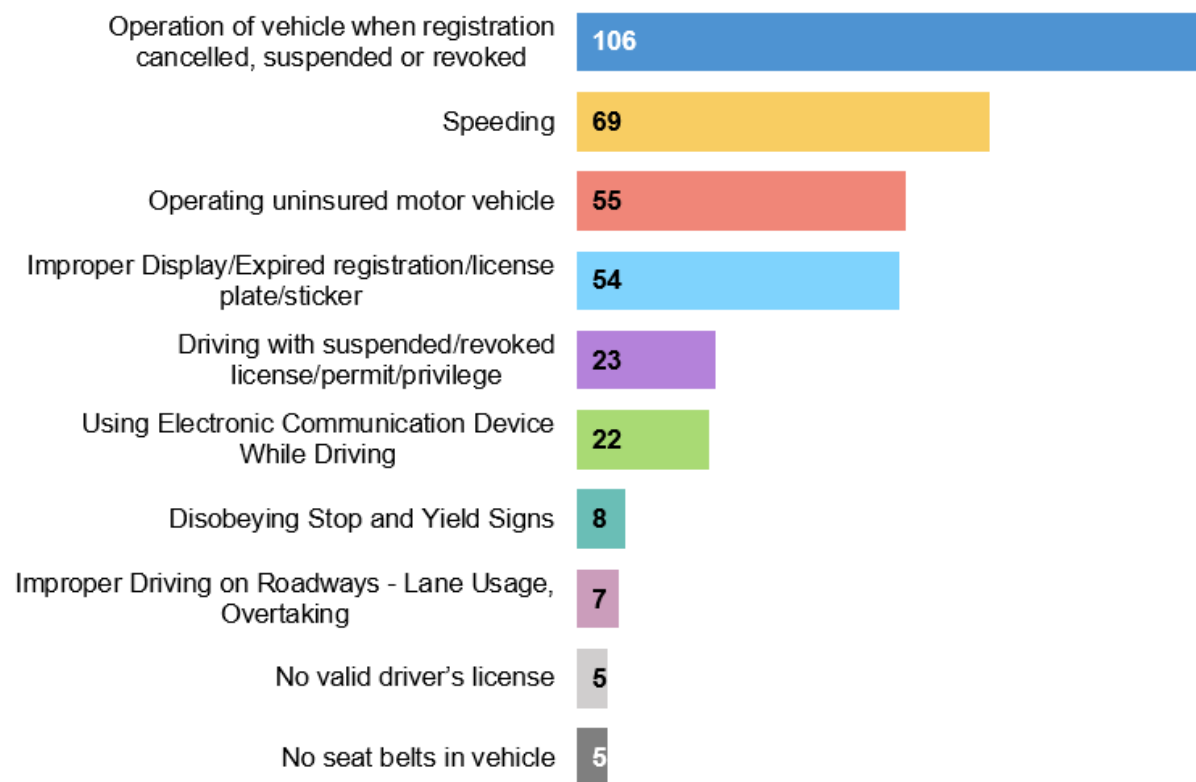

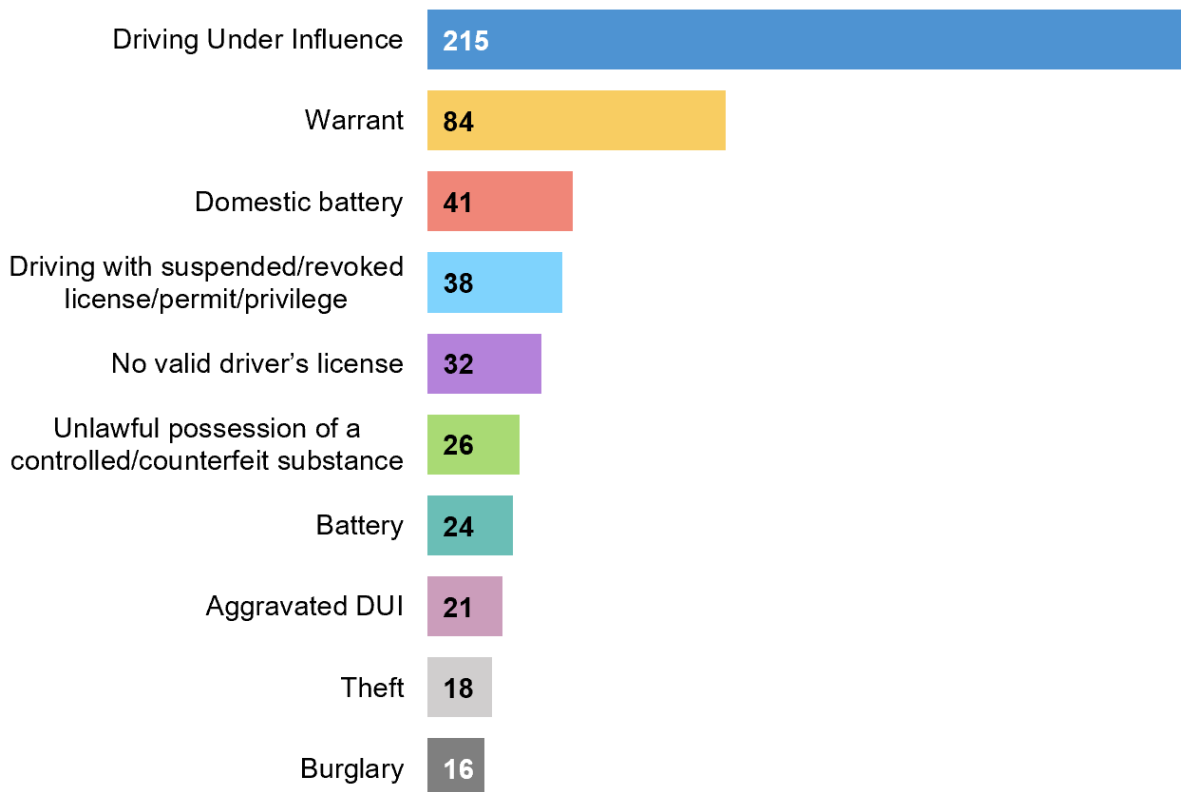
Review Process

Shift supervisors review ten (10) random recordings a month to ensure officers use body worn cameras in compliance with West Chicago Police Department policy and procedures.

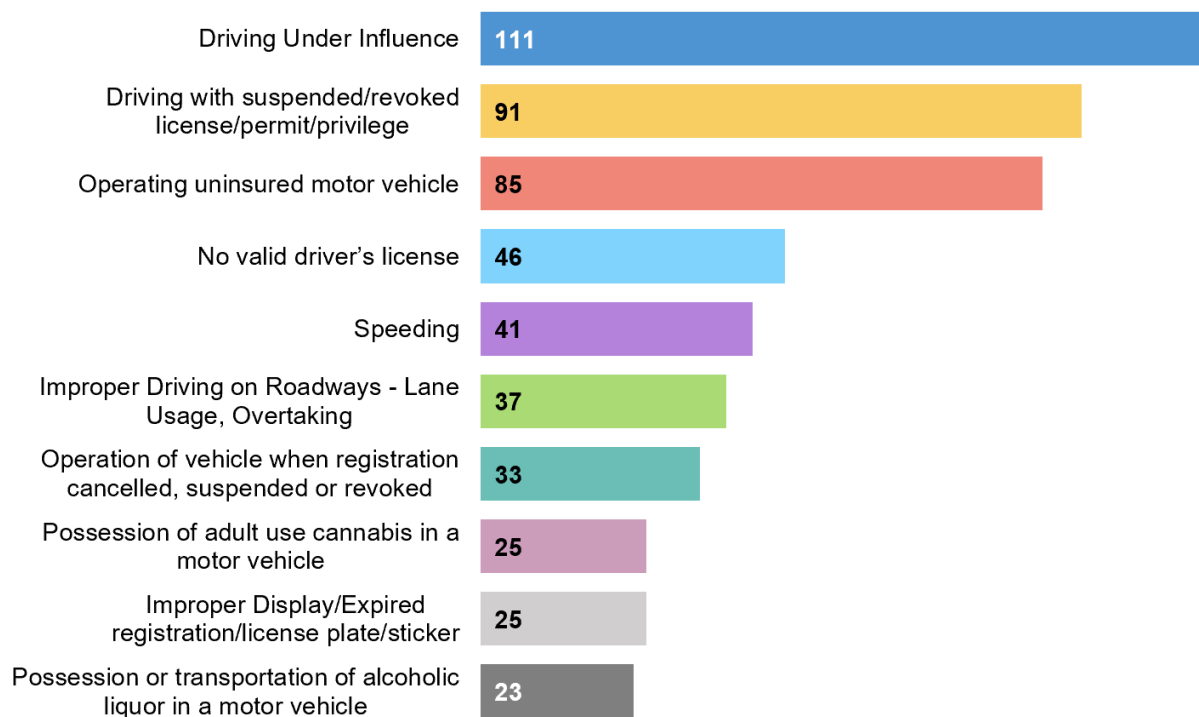
Review Process

Between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025, West Frankfort Police Department had fourteen thousand eighty (14,080) calls for service, conducted two thousand one hundred thirty (2,130) traffic stops resulting in five hundred sixty-one (561) citations and made eight hundred fourteen (814) arrests resulting in one thousand two hundred fifty-four (1,254) charges. The department does not provide individual incident data.

Department Overview – West Salem Police Department

West Salem Police Department consists of one (1) full-time officer who utilizes two (2) Provision Bodycam 4 body worn cameras.

Technical Issues

West Salem Police Department reports technical issues which included the body worn camera being stuck in upload mode while in the dock, which required the system to be rebooted. The other issue was body worn cameras switching on their own from covert mode to normal mode.

Review Process

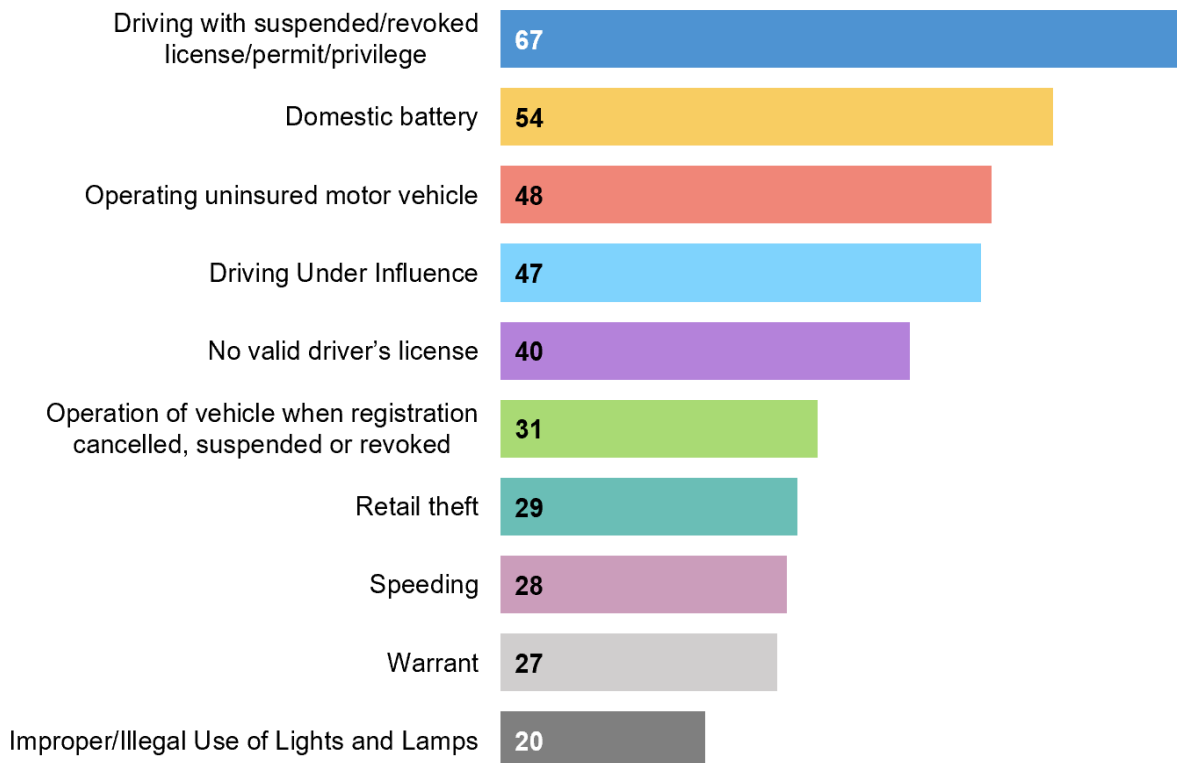
Review Process

Wheaton Police Department reports twenty-one (21) issues with the body worn cameras including activation issues, issues with auto-tagging and erroneous video file uploads.

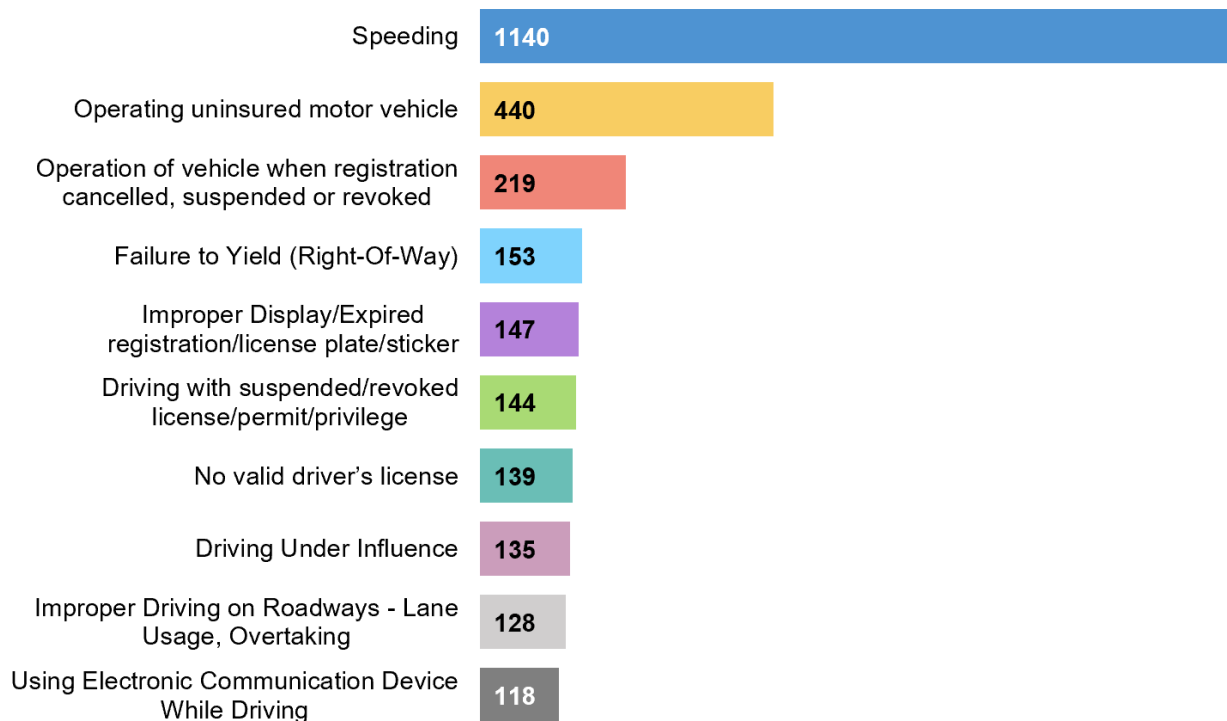
Review Process

The supervisors review only those recordings necessary and relevant to their investigative scope, forwarding the information via the chain of command when appropriate.

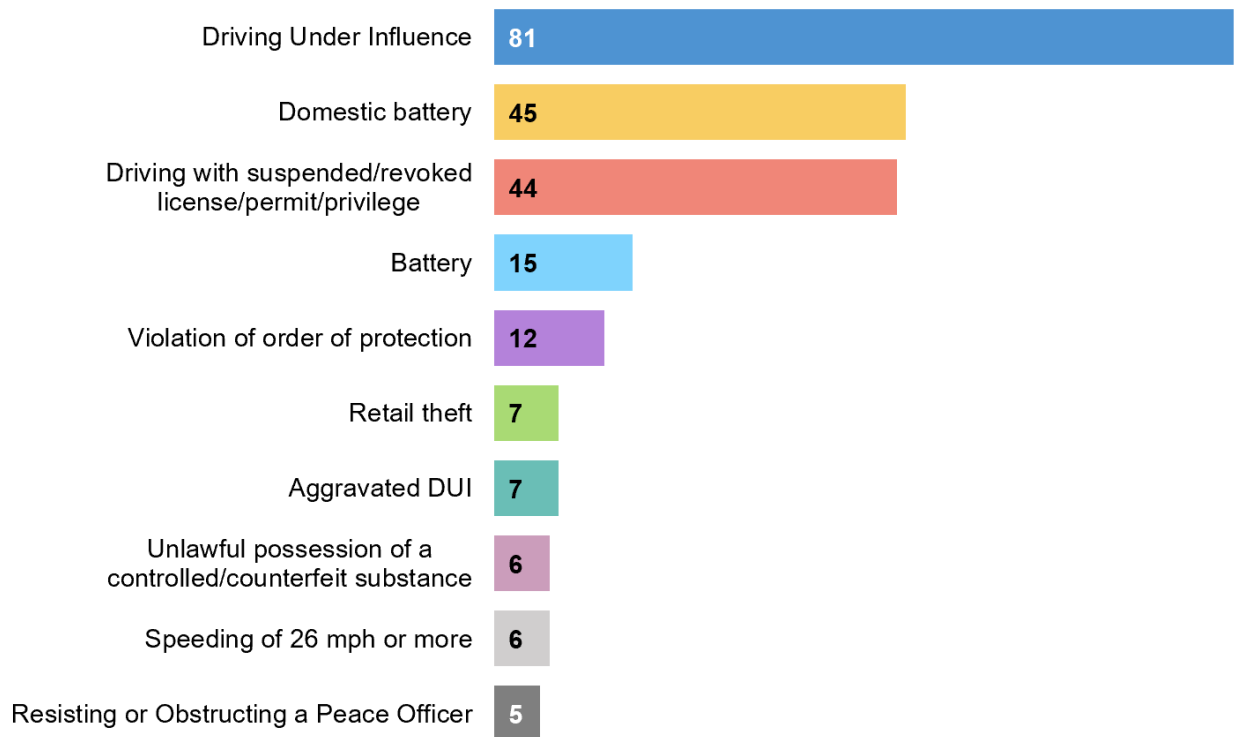

Department Overview – Will County Sheriff's Office

Will County Sheriff's Office consists of the Sheriff, Under Sheriff, Chief Deputy, five (5) Deputy Chiefs, two (2) Commanders, one hundred eighty-two (182) Enforcement Deputies, thirty-four (34) Enforcement Sergeants, seventeen (17) Correctional Sergeants, eleven (11) Enforcement Lieutenants, five (5) Correctional Lieutenants, and over two hundred (200) sworn Correctional Officers. Two hundred twenty-one (221) sworn staff members utilize Axon Body 4 body worn cameras, and one hundred (100) cameras are distributed amongst detention facility staff.

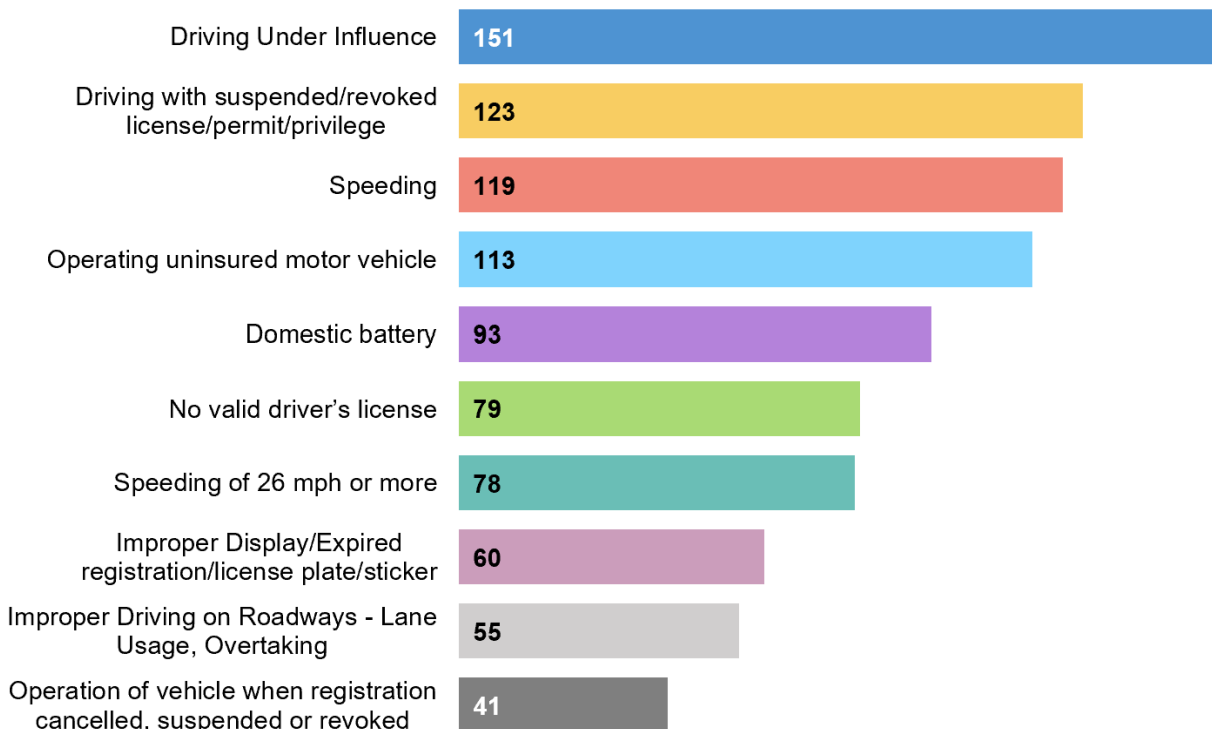
Review Process

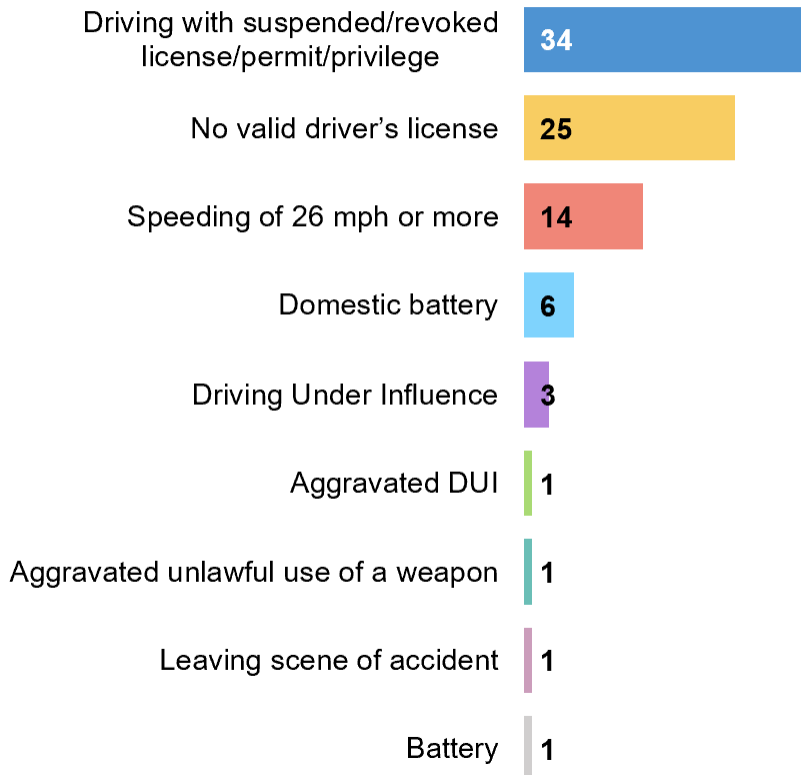

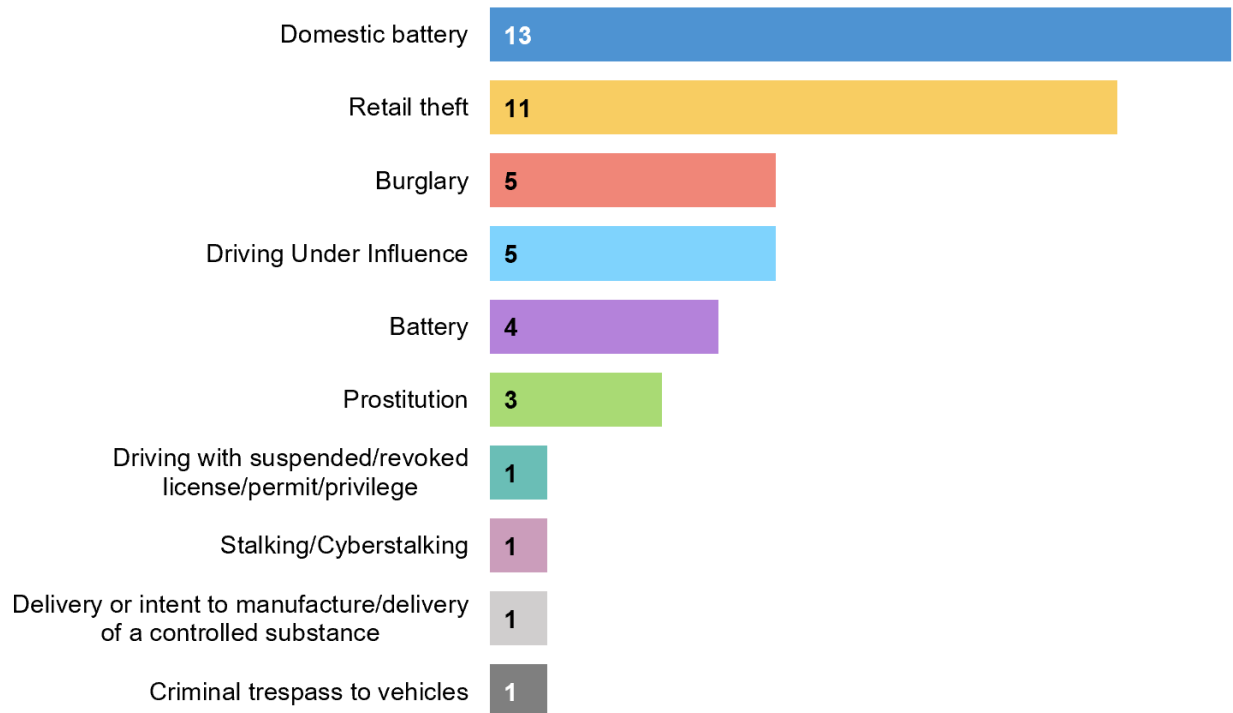

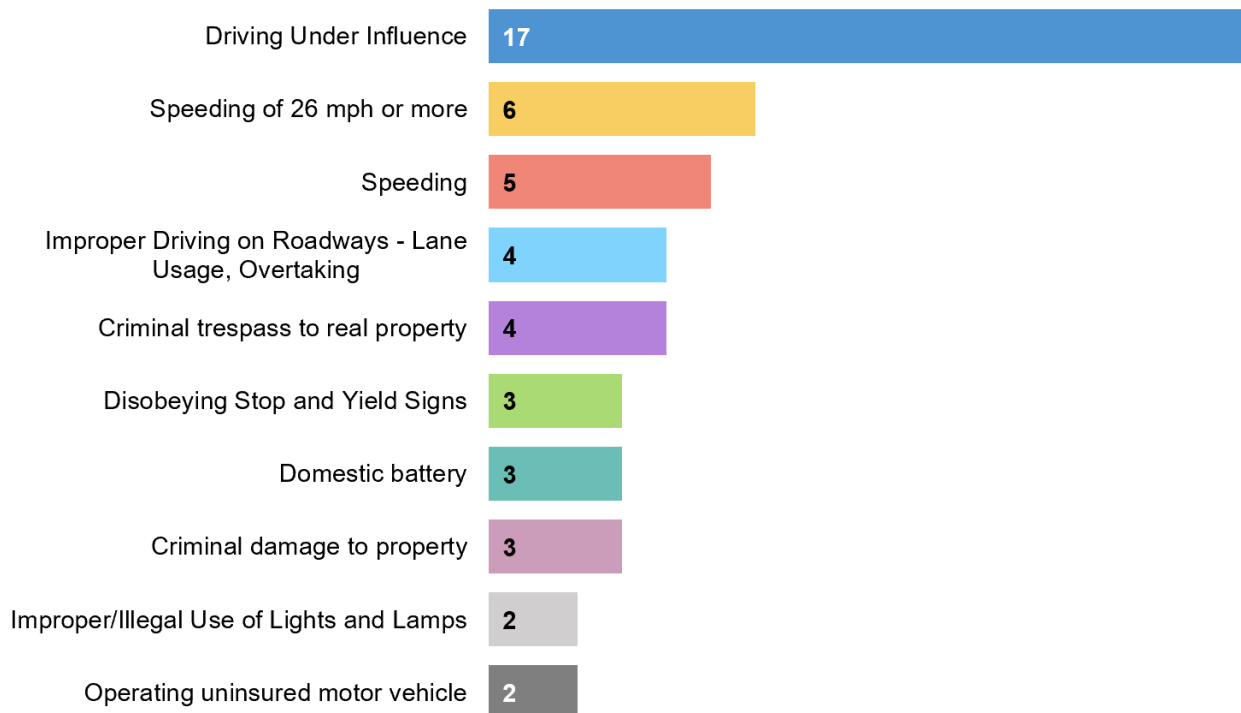
Review Process

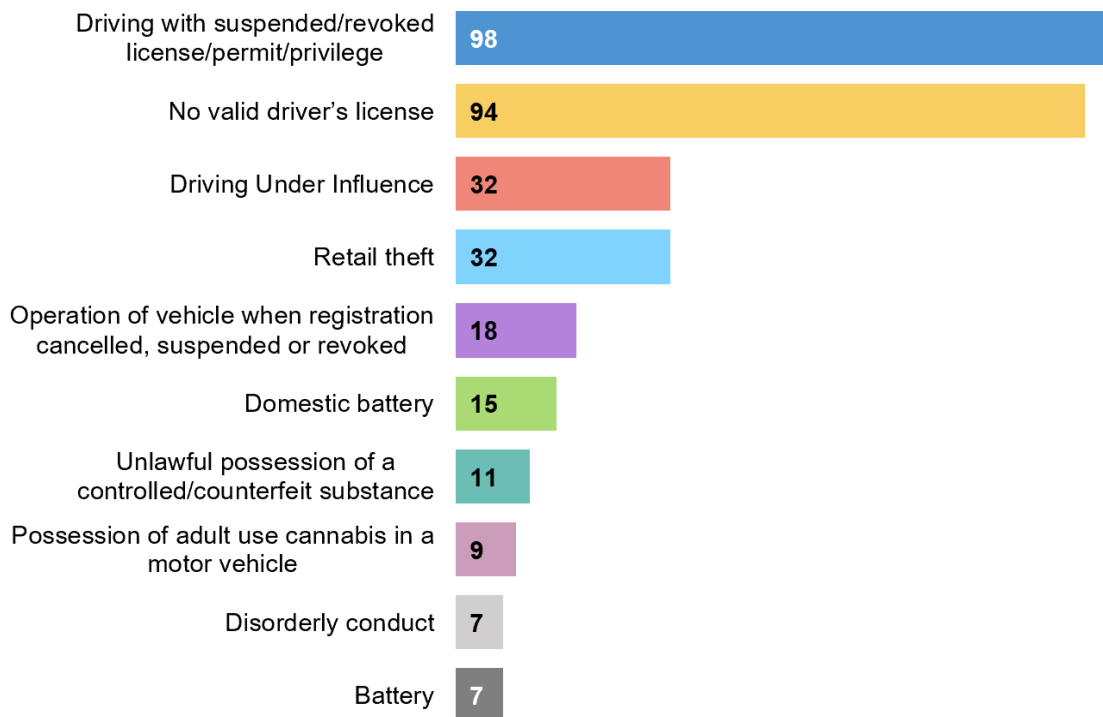

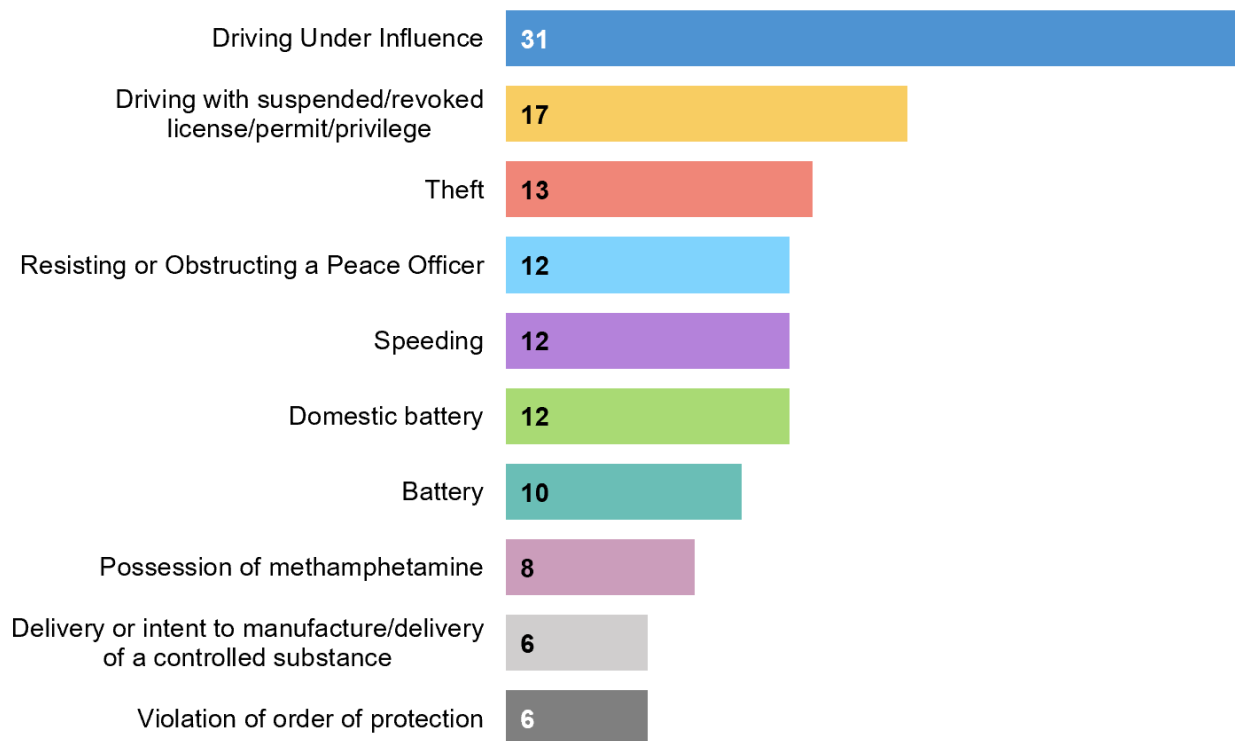

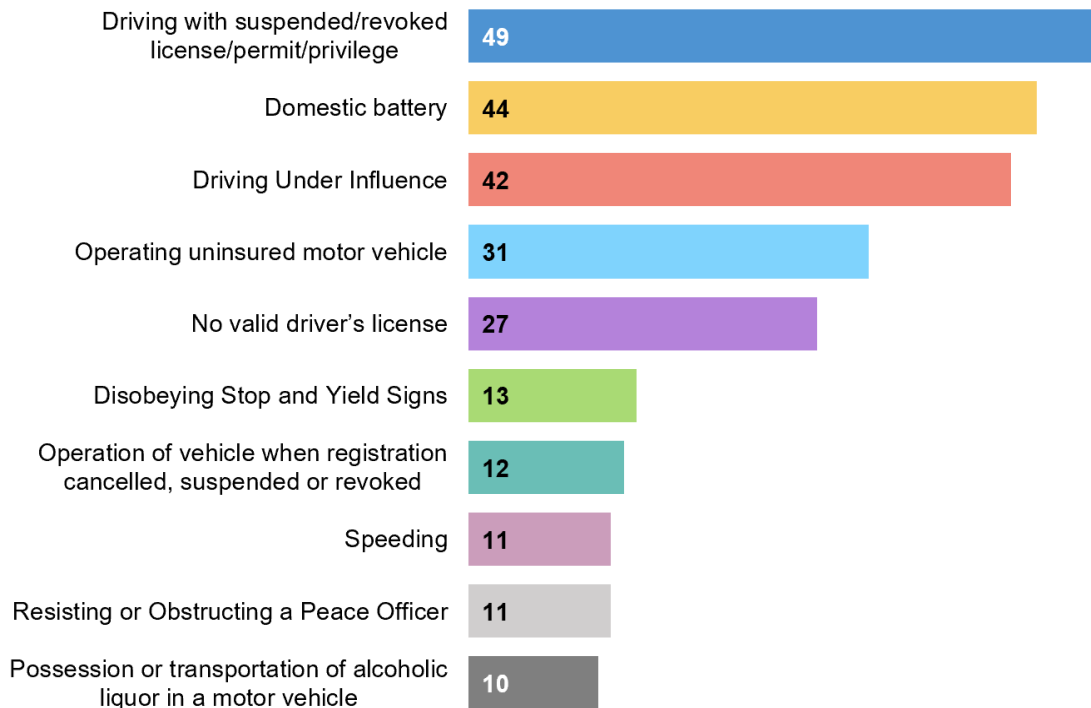

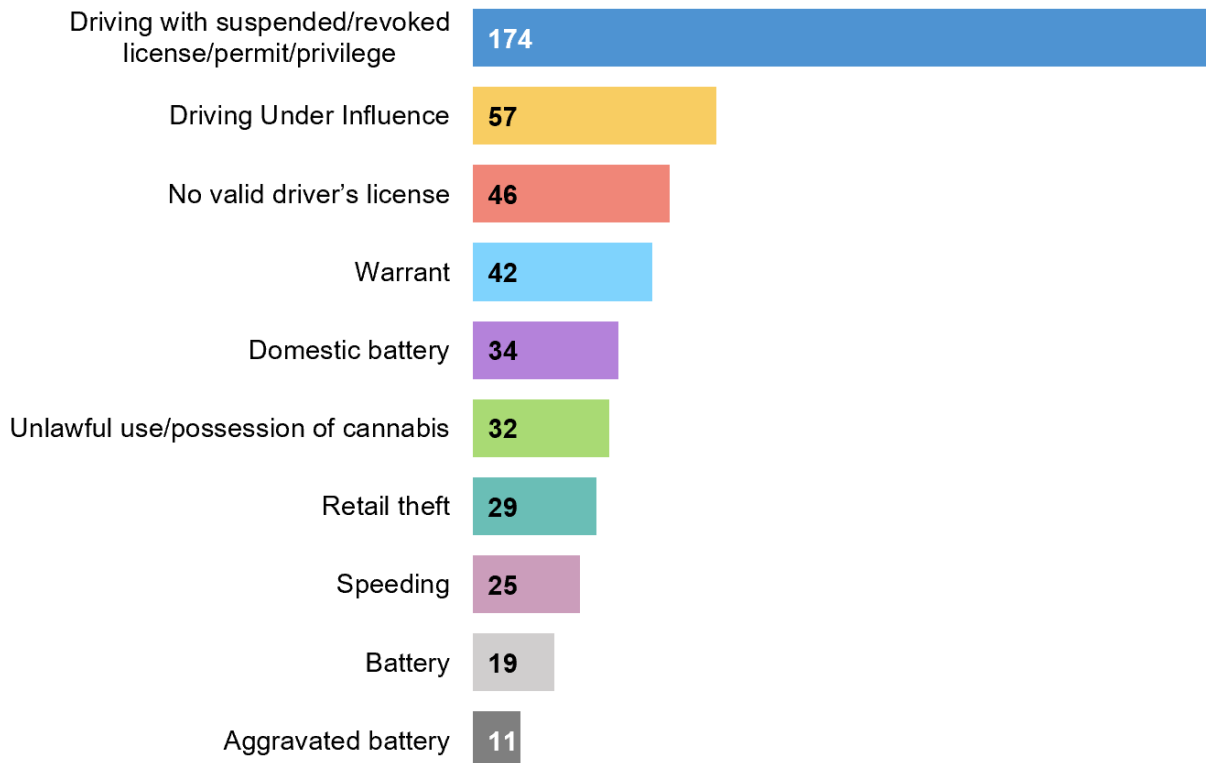

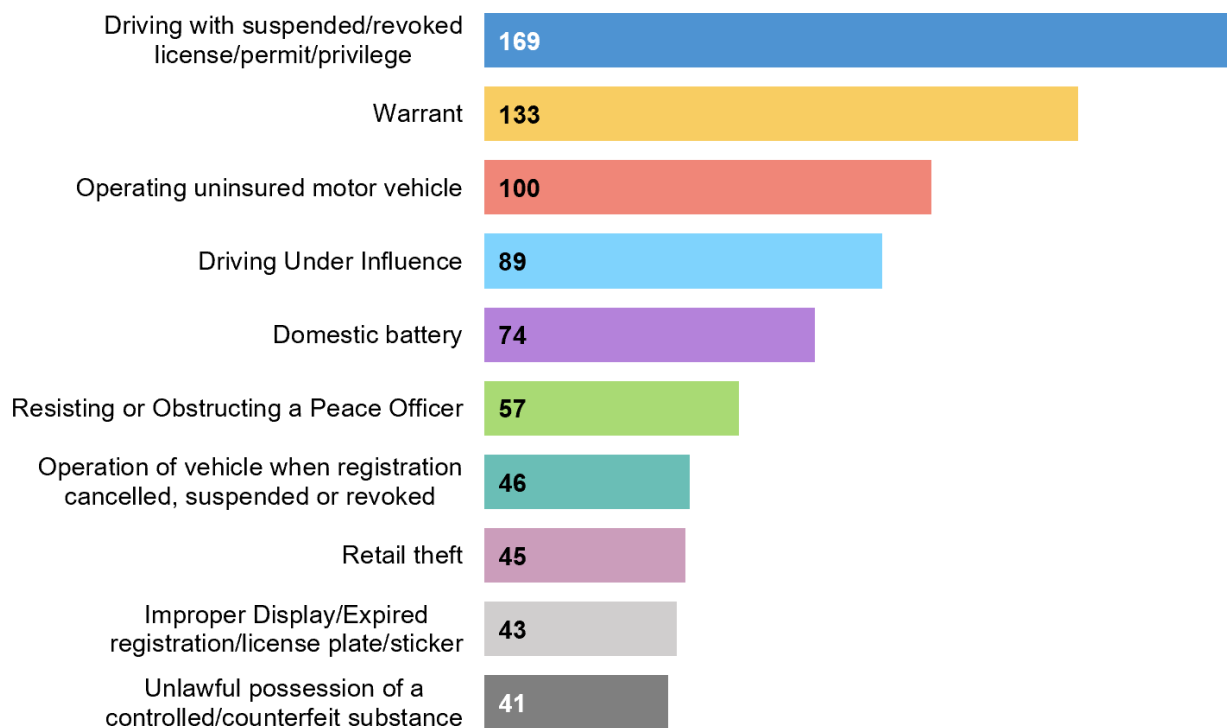
