I. CALL TO ORDER

The June 3, 2026 Curriculum Committee meeting was called to order by Vice Chair Mitchell Davis at 2:02 p.m.

III. APPLICATION FOR SCHOOL/COURSE CERTIFICATION ~ *Barbara Wood*

Wood presented the Juvenile Officer 16-Hour Refresher Course. She explained that the course is designed to help Juvenile Officers remain current on juvenile law, as well as juvenile communication and development. The course will be incorporated into the Juvenile Officer Program. Wood noted that the course content will be updated periodically to reflect changes and developments in the field. The refresher course will be required every four years and will be structured to address county-specific requirements.

Motion was made by Williams, seconded by Schassburger, and carried by all members present to approve the Juvenile Officer 16-Hour Refresher course.

IV. IN-SERVICE, ADVANCED AND SPECIALIZED COURSES for CERTIFICATION/RECERTIFICATION ~ Paul Petty

Petty asked for a motion to approve the In-Service training courses submitted through the Mobile Team Units & Executive Institute from February 21, 2026 through May 4, 2026 found under Tab K in the Board book. He noted the list of classes is substantially longer than normal due to a new platform being provided which requires all courses to be recertified.

Motion was made by Schassburger, seconded by Ryan, and carried by all members present to approve the In-Service training courses submitted through the Mobile Team Units & Executive Institute from February 21, 2026 through May 4, 2026.

V. LEAD HOMICIDE INVESTIGATORS 32-HOURS APPROVED CONTINUING EDUCATION COURSES for CERTIFICATION/ RECERTIFICATION ~ Barbara Wood

Wood asked for approval of Lead Homicide Investigators 32-Hour Continuing Education Courses submitted from February 21, 2026 through May 4, 2026, located under Tab M in the Board book.

Motion was made by Ryan, seconded by Williams, and carried by all members present to approve the Lead Homicide Investigator 32-Hour Continuing Education courses submitted from February 21, 2026 through May 4, 2026.

Vice Chair Davis requested guidance on the correct process to follow to get good outside training certified by the Board to help officers cover mandates. Petty responded that the Board is recognizing a greater number of training programs than in the past. He noted that officers have participated in training outside the Board's purview for decades, and the Board's goal is to recognize those courses that meet its standards and mandates. Petty explained that, without a course curriculum, outline, detailed course description, learning objectives, or lesson plans, the Board cannot determine whether a course satisfies specific mandate requirements. As a result, such courses may receive credit for attendance but cannot be applied toward mandate compliance.

Petty further stated that some training providers are unwilling to share the level of detail necessary for the Board to evaluate and assign mandate credit. He recommended that agencies contact the Board in advance when planning to bring in an outside course. Under Board policy, course information must be submitted at least 45 days before the training date for consideration and certification. Individuals or companies seeking certification for courses they wish to offer should work through the MTUs to complete the approval process.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

A. Police Chaplain Program ~ Paul Petty

Petty directed members to refer to Tab K in the Board book. There is currently no police chaplain program recognized through the Board and Petty asked that the Committee recognize the International Conference of Police Chaplain's (ICPC) program as a resource to encourage agencies to seek their services in times of need. He noted the last page of the report identifies the Basic Program ICPC follows for accreditation, and that this program is not specific to any religion but is universal to all. The ICPC is recognized in 20 countries and has its largest outreach in the United States.

B. Juvenile Officer Program ~ John Keigher

Keigher noted this item is on the agenda tomorrow for approval but has been brought to the Committee for discussion. The idea of a certification for juvenile officers has been a concern for a while as currently this designation has no update or continuing educational requirements. Keigher noted the proposal is included under Tab E, which is the framework to allow staff to move forward to set standards through Administrative Rules. In general, it would set up a four-year process for Juvenile officers, much like the Board's other specialty programs require. Once the primary course is completed there will be 16 hours of additional training required during each four-year period. The 16 hours would be split between juvenile communications and juvenile law. The agency will also be required to inform the Board when an officer is appointed to Juvenile Officer status, since they are currently not required to do so. Keigher noted he will have Administrative Rules ready for the September Board meeting.

III. FINANCIAL MATTERS

A. Financial Items ~ Courtney Bott

Bott noted Tab F contains the breakdown of FY26 expenditures and cash flow analysis through April 30, 2026. She stated the Board has consumed roughly 40% of its appropriated budget for FY26, and it is anticipated to close out the year around 60%.

The FY26 camera grant application period closed on December 31, 2025. The grant team received 183 applications requesting almost \$38M in funding. This grant opportunity awarded 137 agencies roughly \$20M in awards which is the largest camera grant total since the SAFE-T Act program update in 2018.

HB 111 SAM 3 passed both houses on June 1st and is headed to the Governor to finalize the FY27 Budget. This bill included increased headcount to fulfill the SAFE-T Act, additional funding for law enforcement training, and cashflow shifts due to fluctuations in revenue streams.

The In-Service funding for FY27 is listed below. Staff intend to also include salary adjustments to ensure parity across the MTU Directors, which mirrors ILETSB's budget request therefore the Board should be fully funded for FY27.

Motion was made by Idleburg, seconded by Gomez, and carried by all members present to recommend the Fiscal Report and the FY27 In-Service Funding for approval at the Quarterly Board Meeting.

B. Personnel Matters & DEIA Report ~ Amber Nevill

Nevill directed attention to Tab G in the Board book. As the recently appointed Board staff member to replace Ellen Petty, effective April 1st, Nevill introduced herself and provided the Committee members with a brief overview of her professional background.

Nevill reported total staff headcount is currently at 58. She noted that seven positions are currently pending posting, as listed on page two of her report. Planned FY27 positions are listed on page three.

C. Legislative and Litigation Update ~ Andrew Janetzke

Janetzke reported that there has been no recent activity in existing litigation matters. However, two new lawsuits have been filed against the Board. Regarding the first case, the officer, who is currently undergoing decertification proceedings, filed injunctions in both Federal Court and the Court of Appeals to halt proceedings. Both requests were denied. The matter is currently awaiting a ruling on a Motion to Dismiss. In the second case, the officer who requested relief from the Waiver Review Committee at the March 2026 Board meeting has filed a lawsuit in Cook County seeking review of the Committee's decision.

Janetzke stated the pending legislation from the Spring included the 10-year extension of the statutory provision that provides funding for the Board from the insurance code. There were three other initiatives that did not pass committee. However, the bills that staff had concerns with did not pass, except for one change that had only minor modifications to the CIT curriculum.

Motion was made by Idleburg, seconded by Feld, and carried by all members present to recommend the Personnel Matters & DEIA Report and the Legislative and Litigation update for approval at the Quarterly Board Meeting.

IV. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

SAFE-T Act Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher reported the Board completed its first evidentiary hearing related to discretionary decertification in April. It was one of the final items to be completed for the SAFE-T Act. The next evidentiary hearing is already set for next week.

Keigher stated that several recent published articles have been critical of the implementation of the SAFE-T Act. However, it was also noted that the Board's efforts were highlighted in these articles and that the progress achieved over the past year reflects favorably on the Board.

The FY26 training budget was over \$128M, and the Board's expenditures as of April 30, 2026 were just over \$51M which is 40% of the budget. Regarding personnel matters, Amber Nevill assumed the role of HR Labor Relations Manager on April 1st, and she reported the Board has 58 employees, with seven job postings in the pipeline. Idleburg stated the Legislative and Litigation update will be given later in this meeting.

Motion was made by Redd, seconded by Heuerman, and carried by all members present to approve the Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee report, and the Joint Finance & Legislative and Executive Committee report.

X. EXECUTIVE MATTERS

A. Financial Items ~ Courtney Bott

Bott noted Tab F contains the breakdown of FY26 expenditures and cash flow analysis through April 30, 2026. She stated the Board has consumed roughly 40% of its appropriated budget for FY26, and it is anticipated to close out the year around 60%.

The FY26 camera grant application period closed on December 31, 2025. The grant team received 183 applications requesting roughly \$37.9M in funding. This grant opportunity awarded 137 agencies roughly \$20M in awards which is the largest camera grant total since the SAFE-T Act program update in 2018.

HB 111 SAM 3 passed both houses on June 1, 2026 and is headed to the Governor to finalize the FY27 Budget. This bill included increased headcount to fulfill the SAFE-T Act, additional funding for law enforcement training, and cashflow shifts due to fluctuations in revenue streams.

The In-Service funding for FY27 was presented. Bott noted that it is intended to also include salary adjustments to ensure parity across the MTU Directors, which mirrors ILETSB's budget request therefore the Board should be fully funded for FY27.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to approve the Fiscal Report.

B. Personnel Matters & DEIA Report ~ Amber Nevill

Nevill directed attention to Tab G in the Board book. She then introduced herself as the recently appointed Board staff member to replace Ellen Petty, effective April 1, 2026, and provided a brief overview of her professional background.

Nevill reported total staff headcount is currently at 58 as of June 1, 2026, and seven positions are currently posted.

Motion was made by Gomez, seconded by Redd, and carried by all members present to approve the Personnel Matters & DEIA Report.

C. Legislative and Litigation Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher stated that several bills were stalled during the legislative session with the exception of HB 3798. It requires the CIT courses to include a reference to CESSA and 988 options if available in a particular region.

Keigher also noted the budget passed providing the Board with the requested amount for FY27 spending. Accompanying HB 111 was SB 3508 which extended the Board's revenue base for an additional 10 years.

SB 2323 (PA 104-159) was passed last year requiring the Board to establish guidelines related to human trafficking. Staff have been working with the Illinois State Police, and the guidelines will be posted to the Board's website before the July 1, 2026 deadline.

Finally, Keigher mentioned two new cases have been filed and both involve the new decertification and review process. The first one is from an officer seeking to proceed in court rather than through the Board's hearing process. The second one, also seeking to proceed in court, is an appeal of the waiver denial that the Waiver Review Committee finalized at the last meeting.

D. Division of Professional Standards

1. *Notice of Violations ~ Kent Bragg*

Bragg reported staff has received an additional 318 complaints during the period of February 1 through April 30, 2026, for a total of 415 complaints received in 2026. In comparison, as of April 30, 2025, staff received a total of 89 complaints, this is an increase of 326 complaints.

2. *Waiver Disposition Quarterly Report ~ Kent Bragg*

Bragg noted the Waiver and Reactivation Disposition Report can be found under Tab H in the Board book. He noted the report has been broken into five separate reports. The reporting period for all reports is February 1, 2026 through April 30, 2026. During this time the Certification department processed a total of 443 waiver requests, with 420 requests approved and 23 requests denied. A breakdown of the processed waivers is as follows:

a. Municipal - Law Enforcement: 283 waivers approved; 11 denied

Motion was made by Tyler, seconded by Williams, with Redd, and Johnson recusing, and carried by all other members present to approve the Municipal Law Enforcement Waiver Disposition Report.

b. Counties:

- County Police Deputies: 52 waivers approved; 2 denied
- Correctional Officers: 21 approved, 5 denied
- Court Security Officers: 18 approved, 2 denied

Motion was made by Tyler, seconded by Redd, with Heuerman, Idleburg and Schassburger recusing, and carried by all other members present to approve the County Law Enforcement, Corrections and Court Security Waiver Disposition Report.

- c. State & Others - Law Enforcement: 69 approved, 3 denied

Motion was made by Tyler, seconded by Redd, with Ryan, Schassburger, and Feld recusing, and carried by all other members present to approve the State & Others Law Enforcement Waiver Disposition Report.

3. *Decertification ~ Pat Hahn*

Hahn stated his report on Nondiscretionary and Voluntary Decertification Cases can be found under Tab I in the Board book. He then presented the 2 officers listed in his report who have received convictions, and the one officer who submitted a voluntary request for decertification (shown below). He stated notice was given to all, a chance to respond was given to all, and none responded. Hahn asked that they be stricken from the list of certified officers in the State of Illinois:

Nondiscretionary:

1. Officer Bartholomew O. Ilenikhena (65148710)
2. Officer Michael Joseph Rhein (65151164)

Voluntary:

1. Officer Landen H. Graham (65146286)

Hahn then gave a brief description of Discretionary Decertification and noted in 2025 the Board received 499 Form Qs to review and process with more than 500 being received by the beginning of June 2026. There are currently five formal complaints pending, with the first hearing scheduled for next week in Chicago. Hahn discussed the new hearing portal and thanked all those critical to the success of the program. Hahn noted that staff have executed 18 written refusals to reactivate and of those nine have filed formal appeals for hearings with one being dismissed by the ALJ, and one has been withdrawn by the officer's attorney. Staff have received one emergency suspension due to the officer being convicted of a felony and automatically decertified as a matter of law. Finally, Hahn noted that the administrative hearings have begun.

Davis noted that he would like to have further discussion at some point regarding the issue of officers applying for a lateral move as soon as they exit the academy.

Motion was made by Gomez, seconded by Davis, and carried by all other members present to approve the Decertification Report.

4. *Verification Update ~ David Catlin*

Catlin introduced himself, he is the Special Projects Policy Advisor. He reported that work on the SAFE-T Act verification section is nearing completion for the

A–G verification group. Of the 11,718 officers in the initial verification pool, only 126 verifications remain outstanding, resulting in a 98.92% completion rate. The next step is to conduct targeted follow-up with the remaining agencies before beginning the audit phase and preparing the next verification sweep (H–O). Final A–G verification numbers are expected within the next few weeks.

Motion was made by Tyler, seconded by Redd, and carried by all other members present to approve the Verification Report.

Director Calloway made note that the mission of this project was never about decertification or to make officers inactive. He stated this has always been about compliance, and the Board’s role is to be helpful and supportive.

It was also noted that a large part of the one percent that are not compliant are made up of officers currently out on extended leave.

XI. PROGRAM PROGRESS REPORTS AND CONCEPTS

A. Illinois Law Enforcement Executive Institute ~ Heather Hotz

Hotz reported on several recent training and professional development initiatives. The 17th Annual Women in Criminal Justice Conference was held in April with record-breaking attendance and keynote speakers. Attendees completed more than 2,300 mandated training hours, and the conference included a preconference de-escalation session and a banquet recognizing excellence in the profession.

Hotz reported significant growth in the Online Learning Network (OLN). Over the past five years, OLN has delivered an average of 228,400 training hours annually, totaling more than 1.16 million hours and representing 30% growth. Compared to ten years ago, annual course completions have increased from approximately 1,500 to more than 100,000, while annual training hours have increased from 9,600 to 249,000. This represents a nearly 6,557% increase in participation and more than a 2,482% increase in training hours. Future OLN efforts will focus on modernization, enhancements, and course updates.

Hotz also provided an update on the Executive Summits series, launched in late 2020 to provide leadership and command-level training. Programming has increased 300% since FY22, with an additional 65% increase in offerings during the past year. A brief discussion followed around a new offering for established chiefs and sheriffs that was very well received by attendees.

B. A Statewide System of In-Service Training (ASSIST) Program ~ Paul Petty

Petty noted his report can be found under Tab K in the Board book. He reported 4,239 classes totaling over 28,000 hours which is an increase of over 6,000 hours and over 600 classes, in all 97,103 officers were trained in over 357,000 hours. The three fundamental areas reported to the Governor’s office are training officer per

hour, training day for the officer per hour and the instructional per hour cost. These three items continue to stay about 15% less than anticipated, however they did rise by about 1% this past quarter mainly for the rush to complete verification. Petty then recognized two MTU directors expected to retire in June, Penny Abbott from MTU 9 and Brad Oyer from MTU 13.

C. CIT, Mental Health Training & Therapy Dog Initiative Update ~ John Keigher for Jennifer Wooldridge

Keigher stated that Deputy Director Wooldridge is currently in Florida for training and to share the new Illinois CIT Crisis Response Therapy dog certification program. From her notes Keigher reported the statewide CIT and mental health training programs continue to experience strong interest, with FY27 proposals being received for CIT, mental health awareness, peer support, officer wellness, de-escalation, co-responder, and therapy dog trainings. Recent efforts included a statewide CIT instructor retreat and a successful CIT Concepts train-the-trainer course focused on consistency, collaboration, and best practices. Significant progress was also reported on the CIT Crisis Response Therapy Dog certification program following the Board's adoption of certification parameters in December. Illinois hosted the nation's first law enforcement CIT Crisis Response Therapy Dog certification program in April in Cook County, certifying 11 therapy canine teams representing seven agencies through an intensive three-day program. The program continues to expand, with additional certification opportunities and growing statewide interest.

In partnership with the Cook County Sheriff's Office Tails of Redemption, key components of Public Act 104-106 have been implemented, including online certification applications, statewide outreach materials, and dedicated contact information for communities seeking therapy dog assistance. Therapy dog teams also participated in numerous outreach, wellness, school, conference, airport, and remembrance events throughout the state, providing comfort and strengthening community relationships. The Illinois program has received national recognition through invitations to present at CIT International and the International Association of Chiefs of Police Conference, highlighting Illinois' leadership in CIT, crisis response, and therapy dog initiatives.

D. Specialized Programs Update ~ Paul Petty for Barbara Wood

Petty noted the report can be found under Tab M of the Board book. It includes Lead Homicide Investigator and School Resource Officer items, and the courses for specialized training.

E. Basic & Part-Time Training Update ~ Ryan Snow

Snow stated his report can be found under Tab N in the Board book and announced a new head of the Chicago Police Academy, Karla Johnson. He introduced Deputy Chief Johnson and gave a brief description of her educational and work background. Snow also reported on strategic outlook and asked the Board for their insight and guidance moving forward. He asked members to prioritize what they would like to see in the academy system and to contact him with any suggestions.

Chief Davis asked about an academy in the Cook County, south suburbs area and Chief Schassburger responded that his academy will have a Metro South Academy class beginning the end of August at their Moraine Valley location.

F. Information Technology Update ~ Kelly Ingram

Kelly, whose report can be found under Tab O, reported that the InformaCast system was implemented at the end of March, noting that ILETSB is only one of three state agencies implementing and maintaining their own information emergency service. Staff is in the primary stages of implementing Windows Server 2025, and the “Always-On” VPN Services are in the planning stages and will be implemented post completion of the firewall upgrades.

Motion was made by Tyler, seconded by Heuerman, and carried by all members present to approve the Program Progress Reports.

XII. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. SAFE-T Act Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher reported that the Board conducted its first evidentiary hearing related to discretionary decertification. It was held in April, with an Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) decision expected soon. A second hearing is scheduled for the following week, with additional hearings planned throughout the summer. The Board also noted that the verification process has been successful during its first year and that corresponding reports will be developed as required under the SAFE-T Act. These activities represent some of the final major implementation requirements under the Act.

Looking ahead, staff plan to review internal notes and recommendations regarding Administrative Rules to organize procedures and provide ongoing guidance. Stakeholder input will also be solicited, with a comprehensive proposal of rules and policies expected to be presented to the Board in September. Despite recent critical coverage of the SAFE-T Act’s implementation, Keigher noted that the Board’s work and progress have been positively recognized, reflecting significant behind-the-scenes efforts and strong stakeholder relationships. Keigher expects to provide further updates in September as staff move into the next phase of implementation.

B. Military Reciprocity Update ~ John Keigher

Keigher noted that a draft of the Administrative Rules will be presented at the September meeting. Staff reported that the Department of Military Affairs advised that some National Guard members now complete military police training at Fort Leonard Wood under the training plan approved in last year’s policy revision. Based on this information, staff are requesting an amendment to Board policy to allow National Guard members who meet the Board’s training and experience requirements to qualify under the Out-of-State Trained Reciprocity Process and Military Law Enforcement Reciprocity Policy. Applications will require an individual history review and will be processed on a case-by-case basis. Keigher requested

approval to include: *Reciprocity applications from members of the National Guard and Reserve components, to be reviewed and approved on a case-by-case basis.*

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Schassburger, and carried by all members present to approve the Military Reciprocity Updated language.

XIII. NEW BUSINESS

A. Police Chaplain Program ~ Paul Petty

Petty reported that the training department was tasked with identifying a standardized training program to support police chaplains throughout Illinois and identified the International Conference of Police Chaplains (ICPC) as a suitable program. Established in 1973 by the U.S. Department of Justice, ICPC provides standardized training and continuing education for chaplains in 20 countries, with the Midwest as its largest service region. In March, the training department attended ICPC's annual conference in Springfield, Illinois to review its curriculum and continuing education opportunities. Petty noted that a memo and additional information regarding ICPC are included under Tab K in the Board book and asked for the Board's support in recognizing ICPC as a training resource for Illinois police chaplains. Chief Davis expressed support for the program, noting that ICPC's President is from Chicago Heights and that the program is non-denominational, allowing chaplains of any religious denomination to benefit.

Motion was made by Gomez, seconded by Heuerman, and carried by all members present to recognize the ICPC [as a resource] which has a curriculum that chaplains statewide can look to and continue their education, and serve the law enforcement community.

B. Juvenile Officer Program ~ John Keigher

Keigher reported that the Board has discussed reviewing the Juvenile Officer designation and related training requirements, noting that the designation currently has no continuing education or update requirements. Following a review of the statutory provisions, it was determined that the Board has the authority to establish training requirements, including periodic updates, for Juvenile Officers. The proposed requirements would require agencies seeking to officially appoint a Juvenile Officer under the Juvenile Court Act to report the appointment to the Board and require officers to complete 16 hours of updated training every four years, in addition to the initial training. This is similar to the current process for SROs and Lead Homicide Officers. Board staff will begin developing administrative rules and will seek input from stakeholders and the public throughout the process. Keigher noted he will present more details at the September meeting.

During the discussion that followed, it was noted that the Juvenile Officers program was created approximately 30 years ago and that the existing statutory

language allows the Board to move forward with the proposal, with the Juvenile Court Act establishing the framework and deferring to the Board regarding training requirements. The proposal would also establish a reporting requirement for Juvenile Officers, as they are not currently required to report to the Board. It is estimated that there may be between 1,000 and 6,000+ Juvenile Officers statewide. When asked, Director Calloway clarified that the Board does not track Illinois State Police (ISP) officers' training nor do they have any involvement in their training, therefore the proposal would not affect ISP officers. He further noted that if an ISP officer leaves their agency and seeks to come under the Board's jurisdiction, the officer would be required to complete the waiver review process, consistent with other officers. Calloway stated that the goal of this program is to ensure compliance while supporting successful implementation. The Illinois Sheriffs' Association requested an opportunity to speak on the matter and Board member Sheriff Heuerman requested that additional research be completed to assess statewide implications for sheriff's offices, including required training hours and the approval process.

Motion was made by Davis, seconded by Heuerman, and carried by all members present to have the Board convene a working group inclusive of ISP and the Sheriff's Association, and others to create a framework to bring back to the Board at the next meeting to be considered for Juvenile Officer training.

XIV. PUBLIC INPUT

- A. Andrew Janetzke stated that he recently attended an Open Meetings Act seminar and recommended that the following proposed re-wording of the Public Input rules for Board and Committee meetings be adopted: *The floor will now be open for public comment. The Board asks that these comments remain under three minutes each, be relevant to the ~~meeting~~ business of the Board, and remain respectful to all.*

Motion was made by Heuerman, seconded by Gomez, and carried by all members present to approve the proposed re-wording of the Public Input rules for Board and Committee meetings.

- B. Vice Chair Idleburg noted there were no public comments at this time.

XV. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Vice Chair Idleburg announced the next Curriculum and School Standards Advisory Committee, and the Joint Finance & Legislative and Executive Committee meetings will be held on September 9, 2026, and the next Quarterly Board meeting will be held September 10, 2026 in the Metro East Area.

XVI. ADJOURNMENT

Before the Board moved to adjourn Chief Tyler recognized Chief Mitchell Davis, and stated that in July, Chief Davis will take his place as President of the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives (NOBLE)

Motion was made by Tyler, seconded by Heuerman, and carried by all members present to adjourn the meeting at 10:35 a.m.

Fiscal Year 2025:

Grant Oversight

A major improvement over the last year was shifting all grantee monitoring to a new electronic system. This upgrade has modernized how grantee expenditures and activities are tracked, improved reporting accuracy, and strengthened timely communication with grantees. We have seen positive results across the board.

For example, consider the 59 Recruitment and Retention grants awarded in FY2025. These grants support local governments, public institutions of higher education, and qualified nonprofits to boost both the quality and quantity of officer recruitment statewide while offering meaningful incentives to support retention. About \$6.7 million was awarded.

In the 12 months since award, 17 grantees (29%) have fully completed their projects, spending about \$1.27 million. In total, grantees have reported on about \$4.5 million in expenditures tied directly to recruitment/retention activities, which is roughly 67% of awarded funds.

These results show strong progress, improved oversight and the clear impact of our streamlined monitoring process, which is helping us manage funds more efficiently while supporting grantees in meeting their goals.

REPORT ON PERSONNEL MATTERS

September 2026 Quarterly Board Meeting

HIGH LEVEL OVERVIEW OF HIRING PROGRESS **SINCE THE PASSAGE OF THE SAFE-T ACT**

- Headcount as of 08/12/2026 is 59
 - 84 positions have been filled:
 - 16 internal promotions.
 - 5 internal transfers.
 - 30 new hires to State of Illinois employment.
 - 25 promotions from other agencies.
 - 1 reinstatement from another agency.
 - 7 transfers from other agencies.
 - 25 positions have been vacated:
 - 9 employees have transferred out to other agencies.
 - 10 employees have retired.
 - 2 employees have resigned to take a different job.
 - 3 employees have been discharged.
 - 1 employee was returned to work due to an arbitration award & then retired.
- 2 employees are on LOA
- 1 retiree is back on a PSC and will work on special projects.
- 7 positions are currently in various stages of the hiring process.
- At this time, three additional jobs will need to be posted to backfill before the end of FY27, due to a retirement, and an employee leaving to accept a job at another agency.
- 10 additional job descriptions remain to be developed, approved, posted, and filled through the end of FY28. of those, GOMB denied 8 for FY 27.
- The agency headcount included in the approved FY26 budget allowed for 66 employees.
- *Headcount we requested was 86 (+20) for FY27.* We were approved for a headcount of 74, with specific positions being included in the approved count, but we cannot hire the 4 additional Field Investigators prior to January 2027 (this does not include the 2 existing Field Investigator positions that we are backfilling currently). However, we have been advised that if we reached that max headcount before the end of the fiscal year, we would be approved to hire for the 4 additional Field Investigators (for a total of 8 new Field Investigator positions) at that time.

PERSONNEL UPDATES SINCE LAST QUARTERLY REPORT

- Headcount as of August 12, 2026 is 59, an increase of 4 employees since our last Board Report. The headcount reflects 4 new hires, one internal promotion, one employee leaving for a promotion at another State Agency, and one resignation.
- There has been one tentative job offer made with an anticipated start date of September 1, 2026. A second tentative job offer has the possibility to be made prior to the Board Meeting which could result in an increased headcount.

DETAILED STATUS OF HIRING SEQUENCES CURRENTLY IN PROGRESS

As of August 11th

1. Assistant General Legal Counsel: Interviews concluded August 6, 2026. Once the top candidate is identified, the background process will begin, and a job offer will be made when appropriate.
2. Curriculum and Testing Counsel: Tentative offer has been made and we are awaiting acceptance. We hope to have this candidate onboarded by the September Board meeting.
3. Internal Auditor & Reporting Manager: Initial job posting failed to produce any qualified candidates. The job description and interview questions are currently being reviewed by the supervisor ahead of posting for any potential changes before it is re-posted.
4. GATA/GATU Specialist – Executive I: The candidate accepted the job offer with a start date of August 16, 2026 and will be onboarded by the September Board meeting.
5. Payroll Coordinator & Timekeeper: Job has been posted to backfill. The posting closes August 12, 2026 and we anticipate having the position filled by the December Board meeting.
6. Police Training Specialist Advanced: This job has a posting both in Sangamon and Boone counties to backfill a position previously vacated due to internal promotion and in anticipation of a pending retirement of a current employee. The postings for both come down August 21, 2026. We anticipate having these positions filled by the December Board meeting.
7. Manager of In-Service Training: Preliminary work has been done to prepare for posting to backfill due to an employee recently transferring to another agency. Posting will go live soon. We hope to have this position filled by the December Board meeting.

STATUS OF REMAINING FY27 HIRING SEQUENCES PLANNED

Director's Confidential Assistant – This position has been vacant since August 16, 2025, due to the resignation of the incumbent to accept another non-state position. This is an appointed position. As soon as the Director has identified a suitable candidate, this appointment will be made. (No change from previous Board meeting)

This training is strongly encouraged for agency management and Board members. There is no change to the following- no confirmation of a submission deadline for the FY2025 thru FY2026 Strategic Plan. Our DEIA Coordinator has been advised that the Office of Equity will share that date as soon as it becomes available.

We've received our FY2026 Agency EEO/AA Profile from the Illinois Department of Human Rights. This profile walks through several compliance criteria and affirmative action performance, and I am happy to report that ILETSB is in compliance. In prep for FY 27, our agency's Affirmative Action Plan for FY 27 was due on September 1st, 2026, and has been submitted to the Illinois Department of Human Rights.

We are now working with a Recruitment Central Program Expert from CMS's Bureau of Personnel Recruitment and Retention to assist us with broadening our outreach with upcoming jobs and job postings. Aside from what we currently share within our own networks, this new partnership will allow us to reach candidates from all over the State of Illinois.

Employee Engagement Activities in FY27:

August – Ice Cream Social- we had an 'ice cream truck' come around to pass out frozen treats to show employee appreciation.

September – We are planning another 'Back to School' event. Many of the activities mimicking the ones we created last year.

TO BE NOTED

Since early May, the Human Resources Department has fully cooperated with the external auditing firm contracted by the Office of the Auditor General by furnishing all requested information, and supporting documentation, in a timely fashion, as well as answering follow-up questions when necessary. For us, this process includes gathering, reviewing, and compiling information to ensure that the audit requests are addressed. It is our goal to provide them with documents accurately and comprehensively.

A project that has been 3 years in the making; the implementation of the AFSCME MOU has moved to its final stages. Ellen Petty, HR/Labor Relations Manager before me, came back on PSC (Personal Services Contract) to finalize these adjustments. Just recently, she submitted to CMS the information necessary to get incumbents moved over from the 'old' positions to the 'new' positions in EC (Employee Central- the system which now houses the official personnel records of all State of Illinois employees). This feat required her continuous efforts reaching out to CMS, AFSCME, and CMS Labor to work through the issues that remained a holdup for so long. The issue for the semi-auto advancement between the old and the new positions has now been rectified. Completing this task has allowed us to post these positions for backfill in Boone and Sangamon Counties. It also allows us to prepare for the 4 new positions we can onboard in January 2027, and the additional 4 we hope to receive permission to post and fill in April 2027. Without Ellen's continuous efforts, this would likely have been pushed out another year. I need to highlight that this has been a project of hers for 3 whole years, and I know we are all excited to see her hard work pay off.

We released a newly revised ILETSB Personnel Manual. The changes became effective August 1, 2026. Numerous contributors within the agency have been working on this comprehensive update for the past 10 months, so it's definitely been a group effort.

Notice of Violation/Form-Q complaints

The Certification Section received 363 Notice of Violation/Form-Q complaints during the period of May 1 through July 31, 2026. That brought our total to 778 complaints received. In comparison, as of July 31, 2025, we received a total of 180 complaints for the calendar year. An increase of 598 complaints.

Waiver and Reactivation Disposition Report

The information for the Waiver and Reactivation Disposition Report is broken into five separate reports. The reporting period for all reports is May 1 through July 31, 2026. Voluntary Request for Decertification

1. **Deputy Blake A. Bredeman (65158041)**, inactive, last employed by Henderson County Sheriff's Office, agreed by court order to a written surrender of his law enforcement certification on May 27, 2026 (McDonough County 2026-CM-70).
2. **Officer Juan McCoy (65062854)**, inactive, last employed by East St. Louis Police Department, agreed to surrender and forfeit permanently any and all law enforcement and police officer certifications and licenses on February 25, 2026. (St Louis County, US v. McCoy 3:24-CR-30120-NJR)

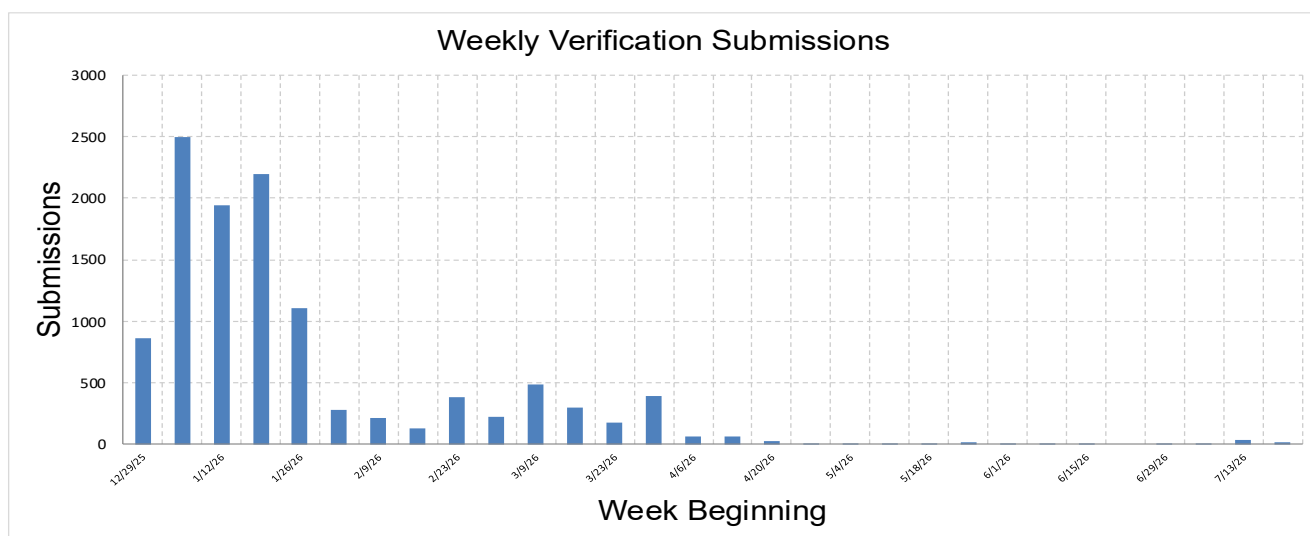
The SAFE-T Act introduced a new verification process for all active, certified, law enforcement officers. 50 ILCS 140/8.4. Officers are required to submit a Compliance Verification form every three years affirming that the officer has:

1. Completed all mandatory training required by statute and ILETSB;
2. Accurate law-enforcement and security employment history on record; and
3. Not committed disqualifying misconduct under Section 6.1 of the Police Training Act.

We currently have 11,682 officers identified in the verification pool, A-G; of which, we only have 78 outstanding verifications. This works out to a 99.33% completion rate.

This great work could only be achieved by the hard work and dedication of the Board staff. Our current focus is a targeted follow-up with the remaining officer to confirm status and close out the initial verification pool. This progress will allow us to begin the audit phase of the A–G verification project, while simultaneously preparing for the next initial verification sweep, covering H–O. Preparations for the H–O group will begin in the coming weeks and will run alongside our finalization work for A–G.

Reporting Periods: The reporting period for those officers whose last names start with A-G began on 1/30/2023 and concludes on 1/29/2026 with verifications due by 1/30/2026. The reporting period for those officers whose last names start with the H-O began on 1/30/2024 and concludes on 1/29/2027 with verifications due by 1/30/2027.

This first quarter report for fiscal year 2027 provides an update on activities of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Executive Institute housed at Western Illinois University.

CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Five Manners of Death – Kiersten Reif

On July 23, 2026, the Executive Institute hosted its ninth Law Enforcement Webinar Series (LHI) presentation featuring returning instructor Kiersten Reif, D-ABMDI. The two-hour webinar, *The 5 Manners of Death: Investigative Essentials for Law Enforcement*, provided participants with practical investigative strategies for responding to and evaluating deaths classified as natural, accidental, suicidal, homicidal, or undetermined. Attendees explored key death investigation principles, including scene assessment, evidence considerations, collaboration with medicolegal death investigation agencies, and postmortem examination processes. Through interactive discussions and real-world case studies, participants gained insight into how investigative approaches and decision-making evolve based on the suspected manner of death. Kiersten's unique combination of law enforcement, crime scene, and medicolegal death investigation experience provided valuable instruction and practical guidance for law enforcement professionals involved in death investigations.

Create a Culture of Accountability Through Team Alignment – Tess Fyalka

On August 12, 2026, the Executive Institute hosted Create a Culture of Accountability Through Team Alignment in Burr Ridge, Illinois. The one-day leadership development program, presented by Tess Fyalka, brought together law enforcement command staff to examine the critical relationship between leadership alignment, organizational culture, accountability, and operational effectiveness.

The course focused on the challenges facing modern law enforcement agencies, including increased public scrutiny, staffing concerns, communication barriers, inconsistent accountability practices, and evolving operational demands. Participants explored how leadership behaviors influence department culture and learned practical strategies to strengthen communication, build trust, establish shared expectations, and foster greater accountability throughout their organizations.

Drawing on more than 25 years of leadership development and organizational coaching experience, Tess Fyalka provided attendees with actionable tools and frameworks for creating stronger leadership teams and healthier organizational climates. The training emphasized that effective leadership begins with internal alignment and that organizations are better positioned to meet external challenges when command staff operate with a unified vision, consistent standards, and a culture of ownership and accountability.

This program furthered the Executive Institute's mission of providing contemporary leadership education that equips law enforcement leaders to strengthen organizational performance, improve morale and retention, and enhance public trust through effective and accountable leadership practices.

Ethical Decision Making – Gordon Graham

On August 18, 2026, the Executive Institute hosted a Leadership Webinar Series presentation, Ethical Decision Making, featuring nationally recognized law enforcement speaker, attorney, and risk management expert Gordon Graham. The two-hour webinar provided participants with a practical framework for improving decision-making within law enforcement and public safety organizations.

During the presentation, Graham discussed the importance of ethical and effective decision-making, emphasizing that many leaders have never received formal instruction on the decision-making process itself. Participants were introduced to GRIDM (Graham's Rules for Improving Decision Making), a ten-step model designed to help leaders evaluate options, consider consequences, and make sound, ethical decisions in complex and often high-risk situations.

Drawing from more than three decades of law enforcement experience, legal expertise, and a career dedicated to risk management, Graham reinforced his well-known philosophy that "predictable is preventable." The webinar highlighted how thoughtful decision-making and proactive risk management can help agencies reduce liability, improve organizational performance, and better prepare for critical incidents and other low-frequency, high-risk events.

This webinar supported the Executive Institute's commitment to providing law enforcement leaders with practical strategies to strengthen organizational effectiveness, enhance ethical leadership, and promote sound risk management practices throughout their agencies.

Illinois Advanced Search and Seizure for Law Enforcement Supervisors – Anthony Bandiero

On August 25, 2026, the Executive Institute hosted Illinois Advanced Search and Seizure for Law Enforcement Supervisors in East Peoria, Illinois. Presented by attorney and nationally recognized legal instructor Anthony Bandiero, the course provided Illinois law enforcement supervisors with an in-depth review of constitutional search and seizure principles and the legal standards that guide proactive policing practices.

The training focused on the practical application of the Fourth Amendment and relevant Illinois and federal case law, helping participants better understand the legal requirements governing searches, seizures, detentions, and consensual encounters. Through a high-energy and interactive instructional format, attendees examined key legal concepts including state action, what constitutes

a search or seizure, consent searches, apparent authority, investigative detentions, and other commonly encountered law enforcement scenarios.

Bandiero emphasized the importance of making legally defensible decisions that protect both officers and agencies from liability while ensuring constitutional rights are respected. By utilizing real-world examples and current case law, the course provided attendees with practical knowledge and decision-making strategies that can be immediately applied in the field and within supervisory roles. Participants also received a Search & Seizure Survival Guide to serve as an ongoing reference resource.

This course supported the Executive Institute's mission of delivering contemporary legal education to Illinois law enforcement leaders, strengthening their ability to supervise constitutional policing practices, reduce organizational risk, and enhance public trust through legally sound law enforcement operations.

Bulletproof Report Writing for Law Enforcement Supervisors – Anthony Bandiero

On August 26, 2026, the Executive Institute hosted Bulletproof Report Writing for Law Enforcement Supervisors, presented by Anthony Bandiero, Senior Legal Instructor for Blue to Gold Law Enforcement Training. The course provided law enforcement supervisors with practical strategies for improving report-writing and articulation skills to ensure reports are accurate, comprehensive, and legally defensible.

During the training, Bandiero emphasized the critical role effective report writing plays in successful criminal investigations and prosecutions. Participants examined techniques for clearly documenting observations, investigative actions, reasonable suspicion, probable cause, and enforcement decisions. The program highlighted how detailed and well-articulated reports can reduce the need for follow-up information from prosecutors, support charging decisions, discourage suppression motions, and improve officer credibility in court proceedings.

Drawing upon more than two decades of constitutional law study, legal practice, and law enforcement experience, Bandiero provided attendees with practical examples and guidance for strengthening the quality and effectiveness of their written reports. The training underscored the importance of articulation as a core professional skill and reinforced the supervisor's role in promoting report-writing standards within their agencies.

This training supported the Executive Institute's commitment to providing law enforcement leaders with relevant, legally based professional development opportunities that enhance organizational effectiveness, improve case documentation, and strengthen the overall administration of justice.

Leader Armor – Edward Pallas

On September 10, 2026, the Executive Institute hosted the Leader Armor 2026 Executive Summit Series, presented by Dr. Edward Pallas, Detective Captain and Director of the Major Crimes Division for the Montgomery County Department of Police in Maryland. The one-day leadership program focused on developing the foundational skills, mindset, and preparation necessary to lead effectively in high-pressure environments.

During the training, Pallas emphasized that effective leadership is rooted in responsibility, accountability, and preparation rather than position or authority. Participants explored the concept of “Leader Armor,” a framework designed to help leaders anticipate challenges, communicate with clarity, make sound decisions under pressure, and maintain a mission-focused approach during periods of uncertainty and change.

The program highlighted several key leadership principles, including decisive thinking, courageous communication, structured planning, adaptability, and personal ownership. Through practical discussion and real-world leadership examples, attendees examined strategies for building trust, fostering accountability, and creating organizational cultures centered on purpose, consistency, and performance.

Drawing upon his extensive law enforcement leadership experience and academic background in organizational leadership and behavioral science, Pallas provided participants with tools and techniques that can be applied across a variety of leadership roles and organizational settings. The training reinforced the importance of self-awareness, strategic thinking, and disciplined leadership practices in achieving long-term organizational success.

This training supported the Executive Institute’s commitment to providing current and emerging law enforcement leaders with practical leadership development opportunities that strengthen organizational effectiveness, enhance professional growth, and promote a culture of accountability and service.

New Chiefs of Police Orientation

Empowering Leaders: Motivating and Growing Your Team – Brenda Dietzman

On September 22, 2026, the Executive Institute hosted Empowering Leaders: Motivating and Growing Your Team, presented by retired Colonel Brenda Dietzman as part of the 2026 Executive Summit Series. The workshop focused on understanding and leveraging the strengths of multiple generations in today's workforce, providing leaders with practical strategies for building resilient, engaged, and high-performing teams.

During the training, Dietzman explored the unique characteristics and experiences that shape Baby Boomers, Generation X, Millennials, and Generation Z employees. Participants examined how generational influences affect workplace expectations, communication styles, motivation, and leadership development. The program emphasized the importance of recognizing and utilizing the strengths of each generation to improve organizational effectiveness and foster a positive workplace culture.

The workshop also highlighted research-based approaches to career mapping, employee development, and workforce resilience. Through discussion and practical examples, attendees were introduced to strategies for motivating employees, developing future leaders, and creating environments that support professional growth and long-term organizational success.

Drawing upon nearly three decades of law enforcement and corrections leadership experience, Dietzman provided valuable insights into leadership, employee engagement, and organizational development. Her presentation reinforced the critical role leaders play in building trust, promoting professionalism, and cultivating a workforce prepared to meet current and future challenges.

This training supported the Executive Institute's commitment to providing law enforcement leaders with practical, evidence-based leadership development opportunities that strengthen organizational performance, enhance employee well-being, and promote professional excellence throughout their agencies.

Learned Excellence – Dr. Eric Potterat and Alan Eagle

On September 24, 2026, the Executive Institute, in collaboration with MTU 14, hosted Learned Excellence, featuring Dr. Eric Potterat, retired U.S. Navy Commander and former lead psychologist for the Navy SEALs, and Alan Eagle, bestselling author and executive speechwriter at Google. The program focused on the mental disciplines and performance habits that enable individuals to excel in high-pressure environments and sustain success over time.

During the training, Potterat and Eagle explored the concept of "learned excellence," emphasizing that qualities such as confidence, focus, resilience, and composure are developed through intentional practice rather than innate talent. Participants examined how elite performers, including military personnel, athletes, business leaders, and law enforcement professionals, build mental habits that allow them to perform effectively during periods of stress, uncertainty, and adversity.

The presenters highlighted strategies for strengthening mental readiness, maintaining focus under pressure, recovering from setbacks, and leading with emotional control and presence. Attendees were introduced to practical techniques for improving decision-making, building resilience, and developing the mindset necessary to consistently perform at a high level in demanding leadership roles.

Drawing from their extensive experience working with elite military units, professional athletes, Fortune 500 executives, and other high-performing organizations, Potterat and Eagle provided research-based insights and real-world examples demonstrating how excellence can be cultivated through deliberate preparation and disciplined thinking. The program reinforced the importance of cognitive readiness, self-awareness, and continuous personal development in effective leadership.

This training supported the Executive Institute's commitment to providing law enforcement leaders with innovative professional development opportunities that enhance resilience, strengthen leadership effectiveness, and promote organizational excellence.

Intentional Leadership – Dean Crisp

On September 30 through October 2, 2026, the Executive Institute hosted **Intentional Leadership**, a three-day leadership development program presented by Dean Crisp, a nationally recognized law enforcement leader, educator, and former chief of police. The training focused on the principles and practices of intentional leadership, emphasizing the importance of personal growth, accountability, and the deliberate development of others as essential components of effective organizational leadership.

Throughout the program, Crisp challenged participants to view leadership as a daily commitment to continuous improvement rather than a position or title. Attendees explored strategies for developing modern leadership skills, fostering employee growth, creating positive organizational cultures, and leading with purpose and consistency. The training emphasized that intentional leaders actively invest in both their own development and the success of those they serve and supervise.

Participants examined practical leadership approaches designed to enhance communication, build trust, strengthen accountability, and improve organizational performance. Discussions focused on the long-term impact leaders have on employee engagement, agency effectiveness, and the legacy they leave within their organizations. The program reinforced the principle that sustained leadership success is achieved through deliberate actions and a commitment to serving others.

Drawing upon 38 years of law enforcement experience, including 21 years in command-level positions and 17 years as a chief of police, Crisp shared real-world examples and leadership lessons gained throughout his distinguished career. His practical and engaging approach provided attendees with actionable strategies that can be immediately applied within their agencies and leadership roles.

This training supported the Executive Institute's commitment to providing law enforcement leaders with advanced leadership development opportunities that enhance organizational effectiveness, promote professional growth, and strengthen the profession through principled and intentional leadership.

PSR21C – Belleville Rendition

The Executive Institute's Police Supervisor Role (PSR21C) program is a comprehensive leadership development course designed to prepare current and emerging first-line supervisors for the complex responsibilities of modern law enforcement leadership. The curriculum emphasizes supervisory effectiveness, communication, accountability, officer wellness, critical incident management, community relations, and organizational leadership. Through instruction from experienced law enforcement and leadership professionals, participants develop the skills necessary to lead personnel, manage organizational challenges, and foster professional, ethical, and effective policing practices. The PSR21C program supports the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board's commitment to developing competent supervisors who can successfully navigate the evolving demands of law enforcement organizations.

PSR21C Belleville Session Overview

The PSR21C session held in Belleville during August and September 2026 provided participants with ten days of in-depth supervisory training. This offering was in collaboration with MTU 14. The program covered a broad range of topics including supervisory transition and role alignment, behavioral communication through the DISC model, integrity and accountability, managing problematic employees, critical incident response, adaptive leadership, use-of-force investigations, cultural competence, interactions with individuals experiencing mental illness or behavioral challenges, and organizational stress management. Collectively, these courses provided supervisors with practical tools to enhance leadership effectiveness, strengthen decision-making, improve employee performance, and promote positive organizational outcomes within their agencies.

WEB-BASED LEARNING AND SOCIAL MEDIA

Part-Time Basic Law Enforcement Academy

The Executive Institute continues to provide technological support for the web-based Part-Time Basic Law Enforcement Academy. Staff is currently conducting a quality management audit.

Online Learning Network

The ILETSB Executive Institute continues to develop and promote the Online Learning Network (OLN), a cost-free learning management system available to law enforcement and county correctional officers. The information below provides a snapshot of the fiscal year 2025 fourth quarter activity and fiscal year 2026 first quarter activity:

CPR/AED Certification Submission Process Through the Online Learning Network (OLN)

Beginning in March 2024, the ILETSB Executive Institute implemented a process allowing officers to submit CPR/AED certification credentials through the Online Learning Network (OLN). CPR/AED certification is a federally recommended credential for all emergency services personnel. To align with training requirements, officers are permitted to complete the Emergency Medical Response mandate through OLN once every two years.

To support officers who obtain CPR/AED certification through certified training providers, the Executive Institute allows officers to upload their CPR/AED certification cards through the OLN portal for training and mandate credit consideration. The certification issue date listed on the submitted card is used to determine the applicable training class. For example, an officer who completes CPR/AED training in September will be assigned to the September training class, and the Emergency Medical Response mandate will remain valid for one year from the certification date.

This process was developed to assist officers who complete CPR/AED training through certified training centers affiliated with the American Heart Association (AHA) or the American Red Cross (ARC).

Since the implementation of this initiative in March 2024, the Executive Institute has processed a total of 8,737 CPR/AED certification submissions. Of those submissions, 7,433 certifications were approved and 1,304 were rejected, resulting in an approval rate of approximately 85%.

Course Development

The ILETSB Executive Institute continues to develop and update courses for the Online Learning Network. Staff is currently working on developing new courses to meet the new mandates in this calendar year. Quality management updates are done on a continual basis.

Social Media

The ILETSB Executive Institute continues to maintain a social media presence using LinkedIn, Twitter, Facebook, and a website that promotes the mission, vision, and activities of the organization. The various social media platforms offer an overview of upcoming events and training courses, access to publications, the Online Learning Network, the Center for Homeland Security Leadership, the Professional Research Pool for Criminal Justice Sciences, and the Leadership Fellow Program.

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND RESEARCH

Technical Assistance

The Executive Institute provides a range of technical assistance activities to endorse its mission and core values that promote the professionalism of policing.

Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Executive Institute

This report provides an update of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board Federal Homeland Security Grant funded through the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council (HSAC).

TRAINING AND FUNDING

ILETSB has been a voting member of the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council and recipient of homeland security funds since 2002. ILETSB has four active awards, Federal Fiscal Years 2021, 2022, 2023, and 2024; years 2021, 2022, and 2023 the award is \$391,000. For FFY 2024 the award is in the amount of \$136,000. The decrease is the result of a 10 percent reduction to the State of Illinois Homeland Security Grant Program. This 10 percent reduction impacted all stakeholders receiving homeland security funds in Illinois. ILETSB is currently in Federal Fiscal Year 2022 with the performance period ending June 30, 2026.

ILLINOIS HOMELAND SECURITY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The HSAC met on July 22 at 10:00am at IEMA-OHS.

Next full quarterly meeting of the HSAC will be on October 28, 2026 at 10:00 am at IEMA-OHS.

CENTER FOR HOMELAND SECURITY LEADERSHIP

Program Director – Derek Carle

Derek Carle continues to serve on the Illinois Homeland Security Advisory Council (IHSAC) and serves on three sub-committees of the IHSAC: Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Committee, Cyber Security Committee and, Prevention Committee.

Derek serves on three national committees pertaining to law enforcement and incident management. Derek is a member of a law enforcement committee to address incident command/NIMS to law enforcement executives, command staff and officers. Derek is also on the Incident Commander and Intelligence/Investigations committees.

Derek is also a credentialed Type 2 Incident Commander for the State of Illinois.

Planning Workshops

During this quarter the Mobile Training Units held 16 workshops for 277 officers totaling 3,933 hours of training. UASI held 0 workshops. The workshops were paid out of the FFY2022 and FFY 2023 HSGP.

The ILETSB-Executive Institute using Homeland Security funds hosted an Advanced SWAT training at T1G in West Memphis, Arkansas, June 8-12. 32 participants from SWAT teams across Illinois completed this very dynamic training.

This training will be addressing gaps in Illinois that will bring the basic SWAT officer to a level that will help them in a response for a “lone wolf” assailant to multiple assailants in a complex-coordinated attack, crowded spaces and soft targets.

I am pleased to announce a Shoot House Instructor course September 14 – 18 will be held at T1G in West Memphis, Arkansas. 32 participants will be attending this course with approximately 20 officers on a waiting list.

Several police departments in Illinois have built or are building shoot houses within their jurisdictions. This training will address gaps in certified instructors in order to teach tactics and safe procedures while using the shoot house.

Illinois Active Threat Master Instructor Course

The Fall 2026 IATMI course flyer has been pushed out across the state.

The Illinois Active Threat Master Instructor Certification Program builds upon the ITOA’s (Illinois Tactical Officers Association) TPO (Tactical Patrol Officer) program by offering an advanced certification for current instructors throughout the state.

The 4-week program will certify instructors to teach: Use of Force, Safety Officer/Scenario Based Instruction, High Risk Patrol Tactics, Active Threat/Rapid Deployment, Solo Officer Response, Rescue Task Force, and Urban Tactic/MACTAC (Multiple Assault Counter Terrorist Action Capabilities).

Homeland Security Workshop Catalog

With guidance from Mobile Team Unit Coordinators, staff continues to review and revise the workshop catalog. Coordinators are encouraged to submit new workshops for consideration.

Based on the desire of the Illinois Homeland Security Director and the IHSAC, the homeland security grant guidance and catalog will be going through a small revision. The core courses for the catalog will consist of the Active Threat Master course, Active Threat End-User courses, Community Behavioral Threat Assessment (different from school based Behavioral Threat Assessment), Digital Threat Assessment, Cyber Security, Domestic Violent Extremism, Soft Targets/Crowded Spaces and a few of the popular courses that address the Vision 2028 Homeland Security Strategy.

Illinois School and Campus Safety Program

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program provides awareness and preparedness training to enhance organizational capacity to plan for, respond to, and recover from an emergency or disaster. The Program also runs the Illinois School and Campus Safety Resource Center website.

Presentations and Work Groups

Derek Carle, the Program Director for the Illinois School and Campus Safety Program, serves on the Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Subcommittee, and the Cybersecurity Subcommittee of the HSAC. Derek attended the Illinois School Resource Officer's Association annual conference in Normal.

National Domestic Preparedness Consortium (NDPC)

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program works in collaboration with NDPC members, including the Energetic Materials Research and Testing Center at New Mexico Tech, to bring courses to Illinois.

Behavioral Threat Assessment and Online Threat Assessment

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working to deliver training regarding the threat assessment & management process and online threat assessment.

The Program continues to work with David Okada, past President of the Association of Threat Assessment Professionals, on sessions of the K-12 class Threat Assessment Team Training (TATT).

The Program continues to work with Dr. Gene Deisinger and Jeffrey Cugno on both the K-12 class Behavioral Threat Assessment and Management in a School Setting (BTAM) and the higher ed class Campus Threat Assessment and Management (CTAM).

Furthermore, the Program continues to work with Safer Schools Together on sessions of Digital Threat Assessment® (DTA), Advanced Digital Threat Assessment® (ADTA), and Current Online Behavioral Trends and Updates (COBT), as well as with Rich Wistocki on sessions of Preventing Targeted Violence Through Leakage and Cyber Investigations (PTVTLCI).

The Program held a session of BTAM on Sept. 9-10th and has a session scheduled for Nov. 4-5th; has a session of CTAM scheduled for Nov. 30th-Dec. 1st; held a session of DTA on Sept. 30th, has a session of ADTA scheduled for Nov. 10th, held a session of COBT on Sept. 24th, and has a session of TATT scheduled for Oct. 8-9th. The Program is also hosting 3 more sessions of the monthly 2-hr COBT classes, which are scheduled for Oct. 22nd, Nov. 19th, and Dec. 17th.

The Program is presently working on scheduling sessions of the classes for 2027.

Cybersecurity and Cyber Safety

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working with Safer Schools Together on sessions of the Cyberbullying, Sextortion, and the Pathway to Radicalization class. The Program held a session of the class on August 28th, 2026.

Additionally, the Program has a session of Cybersecurity in Education: Risk Assessment, Mitigation, and Management with Safer Schools Together scheduled for Oct. 6th, 2026.

Site Safety Security Assessment

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working to deliver sessions of the Site Safety Security Assessment training. The Program held a session on July 30th and plans on scheduling more sessions for 2027.

Crisis Communications

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working with Deputy Chief Chris Covelli on sessions of Effective Communication Principles Before, During, and After Critical Incidents. Sessions are scheduled for Oct. 15th and Dec. 3rd, 2026, and the Program plans on scheduling additional sessions in 2027.

Crisis Response and Reunification

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program is working with the “I Love U Guys” Foundation to schedule sessions of the 2-Day SRM-REx training, which includes a full-day SRP/SRM (Standard Response Protocol and Standard Reunification Method) Train the Trainer and a full day of reunification exercises. The Program is working on sessions of the class in 2027.

The Program also has sessions of the Critical Incident Response and Management class scheduled, including a session held on Sept. 3rd and a session scheduled for Oct. 29th, 2026.

Trauma-Informed Practice and Interpersonal Violence

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program continues to work with Michelle Denault to hold sessions of her class “It IS Your Business”: Grooming and Sexual Assault Awareness for K-12 Schools and Institutions of Higher Education. The Program plans on scheduling additional sessions of her class in 2027.

The Program is working with Safer Schools Together on sessions of their Trauma-Informed Safe and Caring School Communities class. The Program has a session scheduled for Dec. 9th, 2026.

Website

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program continues to promote and update the Illinois School and Campus Safety Resource Center website. The website features a comprehensive resource compendium of school safety topics, has a multimedia platform that features public service video work, features many of our collaborative state and federal partners, and provides information about the Illinois School and Campus Safety Program. We are continuing to seek input from both K-12 and higher education institutions and associations to drive the content of the website. Staff is also currently working on adding additional resources and topic areas to the website, as well as testing and updating links.

Weekly Update Emails

The Illinois School and Campus Safety Program continues to promote school safety topics and spread awareness through our Weekly Update emails, which go out weekly to over 24,000 individuals in the School and Campus Safety directories. The Weekly Update emails feature important school safety topics, share breaking news/resources, promote upcoming classes, and provide links to the Illinois School and Campus Safety Resource Center website. Past Weekly Update emails are added to the Resource Center website to make their content accessible to individuals who do not receive them via email.

K-12 School Directory and Institution of Higher Education Directory

Staff continue to update the K-12 public and private school directory and the statewide institution of higher education directory. Presently the directory has over 24,000 contacts. For July through September, staff worked on updating the K-12 directories for ROE 9, ROE 17, ROE 32, ROE 35, ROE 39, ROE 40, ROE 41, ROE 45, ROE 49, ROE 51, ROE 53, and ROE 54.

Executive Institute A.S.S.I.S.T. Program

The Executive Institute - A.S.S.I.S.T. Program (A Statewide System of In-Service Training) was started at the end of July 2023. This program consists of three major sections: State Law Enforcement Agencies (Course Certification, Instructor Approval, and class recognition), ILETSB K9 Certification/IDOT Grant Section and the ILETSB IROCC (Illinois Retired Officer's Concealed Carry) Program, along with several entities that do not fall within these sections directly.

The EI - A.S.S.I.S.T. Program also works directly with the rest of the Executive Institute and ILETSB staff with assistance in conferences and training. We have been working with several State Law Enforcement Agencies, as well as the F.B.I. and the TSA Federal Air Marshals on training they provide not only to their agents, but local agencies as well. Working with them and their courses help the State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies get mandate credit for the training.

It should be noted that courses that are vetted to be sent for Certification by ILETSB in the EI-A.S.S.I.S.T. Program are for State Law Enforcement Agencies intra-departmental trainings, which sometimes have outside agencies attend. Federal Agencies that offer trainings in-house that Illinois Law Enforcement Agencies (all) attend are also vetted by the EI-A.S.S.I.S.T. Program to ensure that those officers receive the appropriate mandate credit for the training provided. This process has been overwhelmingly well received by the State Law Enforcement Agencies.

A meeting was held in the fall of 2025 and in the spring of 2026 here at the ILETSB building with several State Law Enforcement Agencies. This meeting was to help agencies understand our Program and goals, along with put a name to a face of the other State Law Enforcement Agencies throughout the state. One of our top goals is for the different agencies throughout the state to work with each other to gain the best training opportunities for each agency. We had several agency representatives that showed up such as: ILETSB, Illinois Attorney General's Office, Illinois Secretary of State Police, Illinois State Police, Illinois Department of Revenue, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Illinois Gaming Board, CMS Illinois State Police Protective Services Unit, Illinois Supreme Court Marshal's Office, along with Executive Institute Director, Heather Hotz. Director Hotz went into great detail regarding what the Executive Institute Offers from online learning to conferences that they can attend, answering any questions they had. The meeting itself was informal,

with open discussions, suggestions, and questions. There was an overwhelming reception regarding what was discussed, with several wanting to have this meeting two to four times a year. This meeting, putting several State Law Enforcement Agencies in the same room, was highly beneficial and probably does not happen normally. Their information was shared, so they have direct contact with each agency, along with agencies sharing trainings that they conduct, which they will open up for other State Law Enforcement Agencies to attend when available. The Agencies understand the importance of the trainings, the Safe-T Act, along with the required mandates and they strive to train beyond the minimum.

The VirTra Simulator Training System located in the ILETSB building has been utilized by Agencies for training, with more being scheduling and growing interest to use as word gets out.

The K9 Certification/Re-certification team, which includes ILETSB Legal Counsel, has been looking at ways of updating the program. This is to help ensure accurate information on forms and keep the certification process up to date. For Program statistical updates and other program information, see the attached form.

The IDOT Grant is also a part of the EI-A.S.S.I.S.T. Program, which helps with related trainings throughout Illinois presented by the Mobile Training Units. For details of the training for the IDOT Grant FY26, see the attached report.

The IROCC Program had a major change in the last 5 months with its new online application and scheduling system. It has shown to be an overall resounding success! People can get their applications submitted online along with payment, be processed and get scheduled all within a very short window of time, usually about 24 hours. This has cut the time for processing an application from weeks (due to the USPS) to days. All while providing the security of not having to send a check in the mail. This opens the application process to a system that is accessible 24 hours a day. While most retirees are applying and scheduling online, applicants can still submit paper applications if they choose.

Executive Institute A.S.S.I.S.T. Program
JT Wooldridge, Program Director

The Executive Institute A.S.S.I.S.T. Program (A Statewide System of In-Service Training) was started at the end of July 2023. This program consists of three major sections: State Law Enforcement Agencies (Course Certification, Instructor Approval, and class recognition), ILETSB K9 Certification/IDOT Grant Section and the ILETSB IROCC (Illinois Retired Officer's Concealed Carry) Program, along with several entities that do not fall within these sections directly. The EI - A.S.S.I.S.T. Program also works directly with the rest of the Executive Institute and ILETSB staff with assistance in conferences and training.

Since the inception of the EI – A.S.S.I.S.T. Program, several State Law Enforcement agencies have used our program to get their courses ILETSB certified, along with getting their instructors approved to provide the instruction. This is helping agencies to fulfill mandate requirements per the Illinois Safe-T Act.

Another meeting is being set up for this fall by EI-A.S.S.I.S.T. with several State Law Enforcement Agency Training Coordinators and other personnel at the ILETSB building. Present at the prior meetings or via Webex were several agency representatives that showed up such as: ILETSB, Illinois Attorney General's Office, Illinois Secretary of State Police, Illinois State Police, Illinois Department of Revenue, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Illinois Gaming Board, Illinois Commerce Commission Police, Illinois Liquor Control Commission, along with Heather Hotz from Executive Institute. The Agencies understand the importance of the trainings, the Safety Act, along with the required mandates and they strive to train beyond the minimum.

The VirTra System located at the ILETSB building is being utilized by departments with more looking to start. We have added even more ILETSB certified courses for the system, to give more opportunities to get training and mandates needed. More courses are being reviewed to add as well.

The K9 Certification/Re-certification team, which includes ILETSB Legal Counsel continually discusses the program for improvements and keeping up on related legislative topics. This is to help ensure accurate information on forms and keep the certification process up to date. This program has scheduling in several locations around the state with dates scheduled throughout the year to assist the Department's K9 handlers and the K9 assessors. We have gone back to using a fiscal

year calendar for record keeping. For updates on the 1st quarter of fiscal year 2027 K9 Program statistics, see the included report.

The IROCC Program, which consists of nearly 10,000 applicants yearly, recently implemented their new website and applications process. It has come with overwhelming positive reviews from applicants, due to being more user friendly and a much smoother process throughout. IROCC's major change in the last 5 months, the new online application and scheduling system has had its share of bumps but is overall a resounding success! People can get their applications submitted online along with payment, be processed and get scheduled all within a very short window of time, usually about 24 hours. This has cut the time for processing an application from weeks (due to the USPS) to days. All while providing the security of not having to send a check in the mail. This opens the application process to a system that is accessible 24 hours a day. While most retirees are applying and scheduling online, applicants can still submit paper applications if they choose

This report provides an update on the administration of the Mobile Training Unit program. Section one provides a summary of Mobile Training Unit funding and training activity/productivity in Fiscal Year 2026. Section two addresses Fiscal Year 2027 funding requests.

Fiscal Year 2026

Attachment I provides a summary of total State funding awarded to the Mobile Training Units in Fiscal Year 2026. The Board awarded State funds totaling \$14,776,251.43 to 13 Mobile Training Units in Fiscal Year 2026, under the authority of Public Act 82-0674.

Attachment II provides a complete summary of Mobile Training Units training activity/productivity in Fiscal Year 2026. Collectively, the Mobile Training Units conducted 70,673.5 hours of instruction at various sites and locations throughout the state. A total of 298,677 local and county law enforcement registrants participated in training courses coordinated by the Mobile Training Units. Various law enforcement agencies throughout the State committed 1,203,436 personnel hours to training conducted by the Mobile Training Units. This high level of MTU training provides evidence of the Mobile Training Units' continuing impact upon, and service to, the law enforcement community.

The Mobile Training Unit's Advisory Boards, Coordinators and staff deserve special recognition and credit for another outstanding training year in providing quality service to the law enforcement agencies throughout the state. As required annually, the Mobile Training Units will receive an audit and or review by an audit firm to be reviewed by the Training Board.

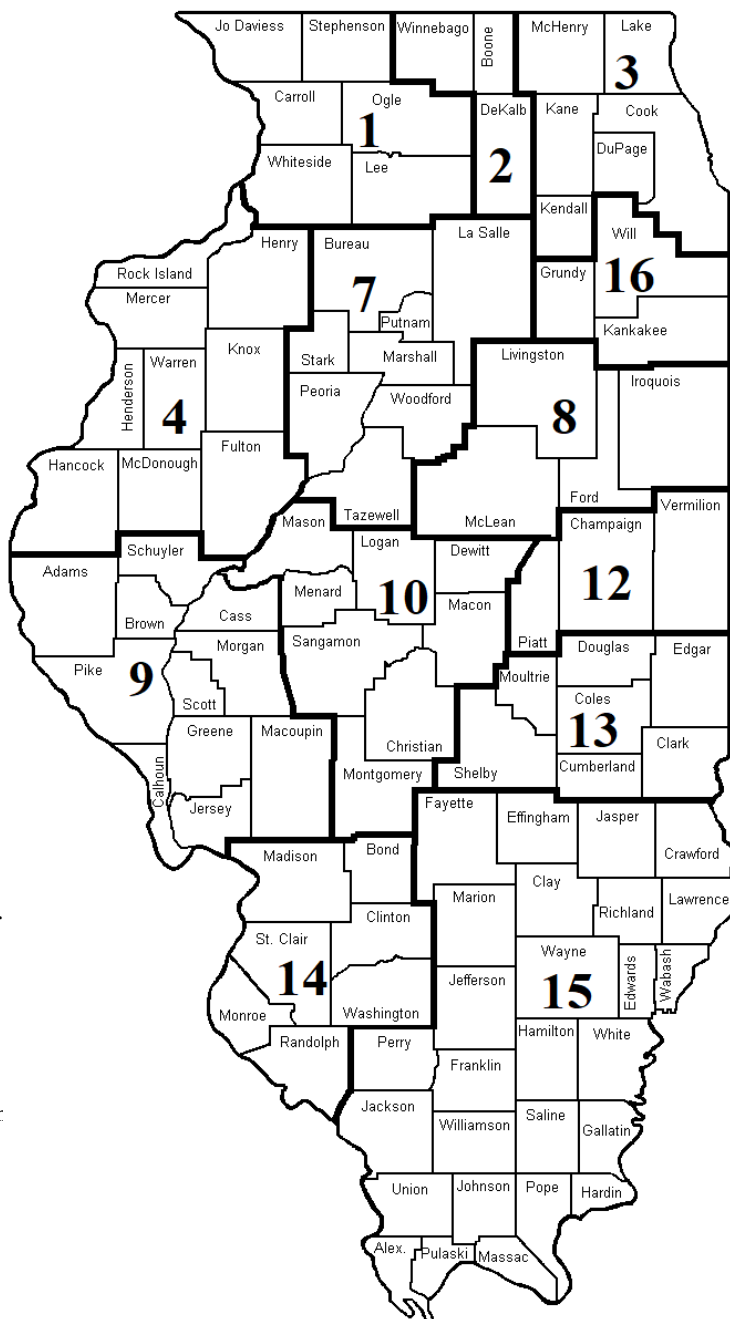

CRASH RECONSTRUCTION MEMO

In September 1986 the Illinois Law Enforcement Training & Standards Board adopted a formal Crash Reconstruction program, in order to validate the professional expertise of individuals engaging in crash reconstruction in Illinois.

This program requires an applicant complete specific training courses that cover the areas of (basic) On- Scene Crash Investigation, (Advanced) Technical Crash Investigation, Vehicle Dynamics and Crash Reconstruction. Upon completion of these courses an application is submitted to Board staff for review. If the application is approved, the applicant is required to take and pass all three parts of a state exam with a score of 70% or better.

The following individuals have successfully completed all portions of the exam. Board staff recommend these 11 individuals be approved as Crash Reconstruction Specialists:

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CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM TRAINING (CIT)

September 2026 QUARTERLY REPORT

This report provides an update on the administration of the Board's Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training programs, therapy dog initiative and various related mental health and de-escalation trainings.

CIT Training Courses/Series:

As mentioned at the June Quarterly Board meeting, interest in the CIT training programs and related mental health related trainings remain strong. For this fiscal year, staff has tentatively approved over \$1.7 million for training around the state in CIT (those classes falling under the CIT umbrella), mental health awareness, peer support, officer wellness, crisis response, therapy dogs, de-escalation/conflict resolution and co-responder trainings. We are grateful for our MTU partners and thank them for their assistance with all these important programs.

Also included within the FY27 funding is continued assistance (through MTU 3) for the Haymarket Center of Chicago. The Haymarket Center (whose mission is to aid people with substance use disorders in their recovery) have once again asked if our trainers would be able to provide (6) one-day trainings (which include role play) for their staff on de-escalation/CIT concepts. In an email from their director, she states in part,

"Haymarket has gained so much knowledge, and John (Williams) and his team have helped us shift the culture here of 120+ staff who are now better equipped to handle the complex nature of our clients who have significant social detriments of health which creates crises on consistent basis. We have never had a training team as outstanding as John that has helped our organization create a culture shift. We have many new to the field counselors and non-clinical staff who don't necessarily have a sound foundation in crisis intervention.....Our staff can now better recognize when a client is moving towards a crisis and have been better able to recognize the signs and symptoms of clients who are in significant distress.....We treat 12,000 clients annually and as with all non-profits, we tend to have a high staff turnover, so on-going trainings are always critical for our staff of 250 employees....."

In lieu of payment, they have offered (again)/provided in-kind assistance for these trainings to include participation in our 40-hour CIT training courses (sharing stories/journeys/recovery and resources), assistance with recruiting and training those with lived-experiences for work in our

trainings as well as other in-kind assistance. We are excited about this partnership and look forward to the continual work with their team.

A couple additional notes about the CIT training program and the courses under its umbrella: first, I'd like to mention that, like every year, our team of statewide stakeholders recently met to go over the forty-hour CIT training student performance objectives. Our team did suggest some minor changes, so I intend to bring those to the Board for review and consideration at the December quarterly Board meeting.

Second, attached to my report, are two courses that will be brought to the Curriculum Committee for review. The first is the CIT Dispatch course that while already certified, did have some small changes. Notably, while the course maintains the same core outline, wording for instructor qualifications was amended slightly, we generalized the section on signs and symptoms of mental illness and reduced the discussion on psychotropic medication. The only notable addition is a brief overview of the criteria for a petition, which helps telecommunicators ask callers appropriate questions to assist responding officers. The second course that I will present to the Curriculum Committee is a one-day advanced CIT Dispatch course. It requires completion of Day 1 (basic CIT for Dispatch) and may be taken as a refresher or consecutively.

The three focus areas are:

- Review and enhancement of active listening and engagement skills
- Expanded wellness skills
- Scenario training (5 hours)

If approved, those courses will be available through the MTU's within the next couple of months.

CIT K-9 Therapy Dog Initiative:

Since last reported at the June Board meeting, the CIT Crisis Response Therapy Dog Certification program continues to jump by leaps and bounds! Our law enforcement therapy dog teams remain a steady and visible presence in the communities we serve, providing consistent outreach and support at both the celebratory and challenging events. This quarter saw visits across Illinois and Florida including (but not limited to): Brevard County Florida Paws and Stripes College to work on advanced handling skills, attend and had a table at the first Therapy Dog Team Conference in Sebring Florida, visited Encore Village, a Senior Life Plan Community in Schaumburg, presented and had a table at the CIT Resilience Event (Schaumburg), visited the Cook County Juvenile Detention Center, Hines VA Hospital, Midway International Airport, Orlando International Airport, presented at CIT International Conference in Orlando to a standing room only crowd, presented and had a table at the IACP Midwest Expo in Tinley Park and followed the IL COPS bicycle across Illinois riders on a four day journey across the state to name just a few.

Here are some other highlights and additional details of the therapy dog initiative since last reported in June:

*** Continuing Training and Community Events:**

Trooper and I have attended not only CIT trainings around the state, but also TOR sponsored continuing skills training for K-9 therapy dogs and their handlers (meet at least once monthly). These trainings reinforce basic skills, provide tricks to acquiring more advanced techniques/approaches, and allows for team interacting events and site visits. Here's some highlights since last reported in June:

- Paws and Stripes, Brevard County FL – therapy K9 team training and recertification (June 2026)
- Therapy Dog Conference, Sebring FL - attendee and vendor table (June 2026)
- CIT Resilience Event, Schaumburg – presented and vendor table (June 2026)
- Encore/Assisted Living Center, Schaumburg – met with staff and residents (June 2026)
- CIT Crisis Response Certification Training, Chicago - attended/participated in outings (Media present) (July 2026)
- Midway International Airport, Chicago – visited with travelers and staff (July 2026)
- IL COPS Bicycle Across Illinois – travelled along with the riders on the four-day event – starting in Edwardsville, ending at Chicago Police Headquarters (July 2026)
- National Night Out Events including Hines V.A. Celebration, Hines V.A. hospital and Morton Grove PD – (August 2026) - *(letter attached)*
- CIT International, Orlando FL – presented on therapy dogs to a standing room only crowd (August 2026)
- IACP (Illinois) Midwest Expo, Tinley Park – vendor table and presenter (August 2026)
- Official launch of the 24/7 call-out number and email for Crisis Response Therapy Dog Teams (August 2026) *WBBM radio interview and Press Release (attached)*

One other important training note is that at the Curriculum Committee, I will ask for approval to begin offering mandate credit for attending the monthly CIT crisis response therapy dog continuing trainings. Similar to the offerings presented to this body in the past (i.e. Coffee with Joe), we believe that those participating should receive credit for attending the instructor led trainings sessions based on the topics covered. Along the same lines, we do anticipate presenting a CIT Crisis Response Therapy Dog Recertification Course to the Curriculum/Board members for approval as well as some minor modifications to the three-day Certification Course at the December quarterly meeting.

And while I know I mentioned this in my last Board report, it's important to share again that IL COPS has entered into a partnership with the CIT therapy k-9's to support and be a resource available to the IL COPS Critical Incident Memorial Team when they respond to line of duty deaths throughout Illinois. This partnership brings together organizations with shared commitments to taking care of those who serve and supporting families and friends in the aftermath. We are proud to be a part of this initiative and any support we can offer those in need. I believe a press release from IL COPS will be forthcoming. I'll keep the Board apprised.

Redemption staff (along with multiple therapy dog teams). Each presenter's focal point was not only being advocates for our own wellness, but for the health of their teams and communities. The highlight of the afternoon was when the attendees got a chance to name six puppies that are therapy dogs in training! Special thanks to Heather Hotz, Cindi Bricker and the entire staff at the Executive Institute for their tireless work on this conference; we truly couldn't do it without them!

Upcoming Notable Conferences:

I'm thrilled to share that not only has the CIT Crisis Response Therapy Dog Certification presentation been accepted as a break-out session at the IACP (International) Conference this October in Orlando, but we recently learned that our therapy dog break-out session was also selected for CIT International - Canada! We are humbled for these opportunities as we know the submissions are very competitive, but very excited that we'll be able to share the incredible work being done in Illinois with the CIT Crisis Response Therapy Dog certification and teams! I will keep the Board apprised as these events move forward.

CESSA:

Just a quick update to let you know that the CESSA statewide group continues to meet as well as the subcommittees. Progress is being made for implementation around the state; however, because of the enormous task at hand, a new legislative extension (via bill) has been submitted was approved to extend the deadline until July 2027. I will keep the Board apprised of substantive updates.

Along the same lines, the CESSA Training Subcommittee has approached the Board for assistance in creating an 8 hour in-person de-escalation course (including scenarios) for all PSAP's (public safety answering point). We are currently working on an Intergovernmental Agreement with the Department of Human Services to accomplish this task.

Girls – We Lead Initiative:

I'm happy to report that Deputy Director Williams and I recently completed the Spring 2026 session as mentors in the Lieutenant Governor's Office: Girls – We Lead Initiative. Cherylynn and I will hosted two grade school students interested in leadership roles women hold in state government and the impact they have on Illinois. The two participants, visited with us over the summer and learned about our agency while still being able to tailor their shadowing to their particular interest (one to Sangamon County Court as she was interested in becoming a defense attorney) and the other to the State Capitol, where she was able to sit in Lieutenant Governor Stratton's desk chair. Our whole office enjoyed having them with us and look forward to continuing this program in the future.

CIT International Conference:

As noted above, I'm happy to report that the Board was once again selected to speak at the CIT International Conference in Orlando, Florida. Our team of instructors for the 'Pawsitive Impact: Incorporating Therapy Dogs in Crisis Response' presentation, included the Director of Cook County's Tails of Redemption Program, Jerry Roman (with K-9 Zilly), Officer Curtis Schwartzkopf from SIUE (with K-9 Chase), CCSO Animal Welfare Coordinator, Veronica Grigorio, our chief legal counsel, John Keigher and I (along with Trooper) where we showcased the newly signed legislation on certifying law enforcement therapy dogs, the Tails of Redemption program, the use of these law enforcement therapy dogs around the state for officer wellness and community events and how this new initiative will also allow for a mutual aid response should there be a need. The response from the standing room only crowd was overwhelming, to the fact we are still receiving inquiries from other states wanting to implement something similar in their jurisdictions! Not only that, we had two long serving CIT International Board members approach us to say, 'that is all they were hearing about – the missing piece; incorporating CIT therapy dogs in the community on the good and bad days.....you guys nailed it!' I took that as a huge form of flattery. What we have started in Illinois is making a difference and being looked to as a model for other states; I'm truly humbled! Illinois and the Board are truly onto something huge!!

CIT and Mental Health Awareness Training and Resource Institute:

As the Board has been offering the basic CIT training since 2003 and various off-shoots of mental health training including the CIT series, Mental Health Awareness and Response – and Intro to CIT, peer support pilot programs, officer wellness, etc. we are looking to the future to the possibility of creating a CIT and Mental Health Awareness Training & Resource Institute – perhaps in conjunction with the 988/CESSA roll out. It is really just a larger defined umbrella to the works we are already doing including but not limited to:

- CIT training series for in-service
- Intro to CIT training in academies (CIT Concepts)
- CIT resources
- MHA and Response Training and Resources
- Peer support training and resources (model policies and best practices)
- Support pilot programs on peer support
- Officer wellness training and resources
- Resources for families of law enforcement officers
- Co-responder model policy and best practices
- Therapy/Comfort dog assistance – Tails of Redemption (TOR) through the Cook County Sheriff's Office and Operation TT through the PBPA
- Add on training for social workers, paramedics, fire and additional courses for dispatch (as allowed)
- De-escalation training by CIT Instructors
- Provide opportunities for ICAT training
- Summits/conferences (may also assist with training mandates)
- Increase awareness of resources via first responder app
- Become a repository for best practices statewide
- Create a reporting mechanism (to assist with getting federal funds)
- Ongoing research and curriculum updates/development

Although we have not yet begun on this initiative, as soon as the Board retains additional staff to help support such an extensive resource platform, we will move forward with this concept.

Course Instructor Requirements.

This course is team taught by a mental health subject matter expert, a CIT-trained officer, and a telecommunicator with leadership experience. Preferred requirements for the mental health subject matter expert include licensing as a mental health professional with experience in community-based mental health service or comparable education and experience. The CIT-trained law enforcement professional should have at least 5 years of sworn experience and 3 years as a CIT officer to instruct. Both the mental health subject matter expert and CIT-trained LEO must have taught in the CIT 40-hour Basic Training Program for a minimum of 2 years. The telecommunicator instructor for this course should have at least 10 years of dispatch experience and should preferably worked in a leadership role that includes responsibility for the well-being of their personnel.

Student Requirements.

The student must be a dispatcher, 911-call taker or law enforcement officer with a minimum of 1 year as an active CIT officer to attend this course.

Course Instructor Requirements: This course is team-taught by a CIT-trained law enforcement officer with practical experience in crisis intervention, a telecommunicator with leadership and teaching experience, and a professional actor. Requirements for the law enforcement officer (active or retired) include certification as a CIT officer with credentials and experience appropriate to facilitate topics taught. The CIT officer and actor must have instructed for ILETSB's 40-hour curriculum or other ILETSB-approved CIT course for a minimum of two years to encourage cohesion of concepts and goals within ILETSB's programming. The telecommunicator instructor for this course should have at least 10 years of dispatch experience and should preferably have worked in a leadership role that includes teaching, coaching, and mentoring.

Student Prerequisite: Student must have attended *CIT Concepts for 9-1-1 Personnel (Day 1)*. As in *Day 1*, the student must be a dispatcher, 911-call taker or law enforcement officer with a minimum of 1 year as an active CIT officer to attend this course. Prospective students outside of those categories may also be approved to attend this course at the discretion of the lead instructor.

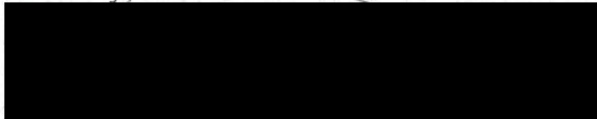

ILETSB Launches Dedicated 24/7 Line for Illinois' State-Certified CIT Crisis Response Therapy Canine Program

The only state-certified public safety therapy canine program in the nation now offers a single point of contact for communities requesting support

Springfield, IL — The Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB) and the Cook County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) today announced the launch of a dedicated 24/7 callout line and email address for the Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Crisis Response Therapy Canine Certification Program, making it easier than ever for schools, first responders, local governments, businesses, community organizations and residents across Illinois to request the support of certified crisis response therapy canine teams.

Whether responding to a critical incident, supporting a community after a traumatic event, or assisting local wellness initiatives and public engagement as team availability permits, these certified therapy canine teams are available to serve communities across Illinois.

“This program exists to support people when they need it most—whether that follows a tragedy or simply during moments when a comforting presence can make a meaningful difference,” **said Sean Smoot, Chairman of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board.** “By establishing a dedicated number and email, we’re making it easier for communities throughout Illinois to access this unique resource whenever it is needed.”

The announcement also reinforces Illinois' national leadership in public safety therapy canine standards. ILETSB's CIT Crisis Response Therapy Canine Certification Program is the only state-certified therapy canine program in the United States. Established under **Public Act 104-0106** and developed in close collaboration between ILETSB and CCSO, the program certifies therapy canine teams specifically for public safety and crisis response, ensuring they meet rigorous standards designed for deployment in schools, disaster response, law enforcement, victim services and other sensitive environments.



Certified CIT Crisis Response Therapy Canine teams are available to assist organizations like Illinois Concerns of Police Survivors (IL COPS), supporting families of fallen officers when needed, alongside their primary mission to aid communities, schools, first responders and public safety agencies across Illinois during critical incidents, and traumatic events.

Unlike civilian therapy dog certifications, ILETSB certification was created specifically for law enforcement agencies and co-responder units, and reflects the specialized training, evaluation and operational readiness required to serve communities during both routine outreach and crisis response.

Therapy canine teams may be requested for a wide range of situations, prioritizing critical response and accommodating other events as team availability permits, including:

- Critical incidents and crisis response
- School support following traumatic events
- Community healing events
- Public safety outreach and engagement
- Wellness events for first responders, students and community members
- Other community events where therapy canine support may provide comfort and connection

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BASIC AND PART-TIME ACADEMY TRAINING

September 2026 Quarterly Board Report

Ryan Snow

This report provides an update on the Basic Law Enforcement and Basic Corrections Officer programs. The data presented was acquired in the fourth quarter of FY26 (Mar-Jun '26).

Task Force Development

Two task forces were developed to present suggestions to the Board regarding updates to the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules and the Basic Corrections Officer curriculum. Chief Schassburger and Van Muschler agreed to lead the task forces and have begun meeting to discuss goals and related work for the projects.

The JCAR Task Force will conduct a comprehensive review of existing administrative rules to eliminate discrepancies between written statute/law and day-to-day ILETSB operations. The task force will collaborate directly with the ILETSB legal team to draft proposed rule changes, which will then be submitted for future Board consideration and eventual presentation to JCAR. The BCO Task Force will evaluate and overhaul the instructional content to ensure alignment with modern correctional best practices and evolving operational demands across the state.

Law Enforcement Training Management (LETM) System

To modernize administrative workflows and enhance data accuracy across all certified academies, ILETSB is rolling out direct roster management capabilities within the Law Enforcement Training Management (LETM) system. Academy staff will now directly input, manage, and update class rosters within LETM. This replaces manual paper/email submissions and eliminates the back-and-forth correspondence regarding recruit additions or drops. This process is expected to result in a single-source data entry process that will significantly reduce clerical errors and miscommunications between academy directors and ILETSB staff.

I would like to extend sincere gratitude to the ILETSB IT Department, specifically Kelly Ingram, Keith Wallace, and Travis Mansholt, for their outstanding work in implementing and configuring this rollout. Their technical leadership and dedicated support were essential to launching this system smoothly and positioning our academies for long-term operational success.

Academy Recognition

Under the direction and vision of Executive Director Keith Calloway, ILETSB is currently developing a formal site recognition initiative to honor certified training facilities across Illinois. This effort will provide tangible, on-site recognition to each facility, officially distinguishing them as accredited providers authorized to deliver state-mandated training for both Basic Law Enforcement and Basic Corrections Officer recruits.

This recognition reinforces the Board's position as a statewide leader in establishing and maintaining rigorous training, certification, and accreditation standards. Earning and maintaining certified academy status requires adherence to strict benchmarks regarding instructional quality, facility capabilities, and curriculum fidelity. By visibly highlighting this certified status at each location, we assure recruit classes, law enforcement leadership, and the public that our academies operate at the highest level of professional excellence. Equally important, this initiative underscores ILETSB's role as an active partner and support system for our academy network. Rather than serving solely as a regulatory oversight body, the Board is dedicated to walking alongside academy administrators and instructional staff, providing the ongoing assistance and resources needed to deliver premier training to the recruits who will serve communities across the state.

National Engagement and Professional Development

In June, I represented ILETSB at the International Association of Directors of Law Enforcement Standards and Training (IADLEST) annual conference in Fort Worth, Texas. This conference is the premier national forum for training directors, academy administrators, and curriculum specialists, offering an invaluable opportunity to engage directly with peer leaders nationwide and examine evolving best practices in public safety education.

Throughout the event, I met with representatives from numerous state training boards and leading curriculum design experts. These discussions focused on evaluating national trends, refining training delivery methodologies, and identifying practical strategies to enhance Illinois' current operational and instructional processes. A particularly valuable aspect of the conference was our dedicated regional caucus, which brought together leaders responsible for law enforcement education in our neighboring states. This meeting provided a direct forum to exchange ideas on shared operational challenges, benchmark our standards against surrounding jurisdictions, and reaffirm Illinois' leadership in progressive law enforcement education.

I also attended several specialized sessions focused on modernizing the recruit training experience and integrating emerging instructional technologies into basic academy environments. As training methodologies evolve, understanding how to apply advanced simulations, interactive platforms, and modern adult learning strategies is essential. The insights and technology solutions gathered in Fort Worth will directly inform our ongoing curriculum revisions and academy support initiatives, ensuring that Illinois law enforcement recruits receive the most effective, forward-looking training possible.

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Information Services Board Report – 3rd Quarter – September-2026

Disaster Recovery/Contingency Planning:

ILETSB's Disaster Recovery Plan (DRP) is currently under review to incorporate the steps necessary to return functionality to operational state in the event of catastrophic disruption - Information Services completed a thorough Risk Assessment in coordination with the Department of Innovation and Technology – The assessment provides insight to the strengths and remediations to vulnerabilities of ILETSB's Technical Service provisions – A Business Impact Analysis (BIA) will be conducted to identify and prioritize critical business functions to minimize disruption and support effective recovery efforts in the event of unforeseen service interruptions – Additional service provisions will include data synchronization between the the Springfield and Chicago Offices for purposes of redundancy and off-site data storage – Continual research and preventative measures are conducted to strengthen ILETSB's cybersecurity posture, particularly in response to the rapid advancement of AI-driven threats.

On-Line Testing Services:

ILETSB's Testing Services has successfully conducted over 5,000 certification exams for Law Enforcement Candidates in the State of Illinois – Current efforts are underway to provide categorical analysis of Test Results to provide insight in to the areas where Candidates excel in understanding and where there is need for focus and improvement - Testing locations include the ILETSB Chicago and Springfield Facilities, as well as Partner MTUs and Academy Facilities – Based on logistical considerations, the inclusion of multiple Testing Sites provide Candidates with the opportunity to attend based on proximity to Training Locations – Review of testing services continues to identify potential enhancement, performance & security features

Network & Security Services:

Migration of Data to the new Server Environment continues and is anticipated to finalize this coming Fall 2026 – Operating System upgrades and security patching has been the primary focus of the Infrastructure Team for the past several months – Fine tuning the current network service provisions will be completed prior to the implementation of enhanced Firewall Services to reinforce ILETSB's current Cyber-Security capabilities – “Always-On” VPN Services are in the planning stages and will be implemented post completion of the FireWall Upgrades - Per Federally Mandated ADA Guidelines, the ILETSB Web-Site has been reviewed and modified to satisfy compliance requirements – Review of the Web-Site continues to provide informational updates and feature enhancements for those with Disabilities to conduct web-based interactions – A HelpDesk solution was fully implemented in July to provide Staff with a simplified method to request assistance – The application also provides an overview of the functional status of ILETSB Systems, allowing the Information Services to address issues before they become problematic – The Remote Assistance Application has proven beneficial and is currently providing staff with virtual Helpdesk Services, which has all but eliminated the need for in-person resolution and allows for remote Server Administration

Data Services:

Additional Information Services are being identified and implemented as necessary to accommodate the changing operational requirements of ILETSB's operational data provisions – Evidentiary Intake and Digital Document Archiving are expected to require significant capacity requirements for storage, backup and availability purposes – Research and vendor engagements are being conducted to identify potential and best solutions for both - Information Services continues to review, manage and implement the Data Storage Services based on priority and need - With the implementation of the Data Storage Expansion, future Back-Up Services will provide real-time synchronization and preservation of ILETSB Databanks - Active Directory Service restructuring has streamlined data availability and Departmental collaboration –Data Mapping and Classification is regularly reviewed to provide the most efficient back-up and restoration capabilities in the event of circumstantial compromised data

Chicago Office:

Several projects continue at the Chicago Office

- ILETSB continues to work with CMS Property Services on implementation of Security Cameras - The process is currently with CMS Project Management with expectations that completion will occur sometime this Fall
- AV Hardware for two Testing and Meeting Rooms are in process of implementation
 - The rooms will accommodate the presentations needs for Trainings, Testing & Legal Hearing Proceedings
 - ILETSB is working in conjunction with Vendors and DoIT Services for fulfillment by end 2027
- Cellular Extenders have been installed at the facility to enhance Telecom Services for Staff and Guests

ILETSB In-House Applications:

Development Steering Committee meetings are conducted on a regular basis with ILETSB Departmental & Affiliate Representation for opportunity to provide input, approval and testing of functional improvements, reporting provisions and legal requirements of the applications – With the expansion of Technical Services and the anticipation of new Applications, plans are being made to incorporate an additional Programmer to the Development Team

PTB/LEDI:

PTB is utilized internally to provide records management to ILETSB Staff in the areas of basic training, specialized certification, Professional Conduct records, and data reports for officers and their agencies – LEDI serves as a document records submission portal, to assist agencies in reviewing and maintaining compliance with legal requirements to State of Illinois mandates – LEDI Mandate Reports have been updated to track when Mandated Classes are approaching or have past expiration - Development of the applications continue with regular improvements and feature enhancements

LETM:

Utilized by ILETSB Staff and affiliated Training Partners, the Law Enforcement Training Management (LETM) was Developed to track and document the course, class and student records of State Law Enforcement – Regular review and development of the application provides enhanced functionality and a more intuitive end-user experience - Targeted development and extensive analysis has been conducted to ensure functional services perform with integrity - Development continues with the incorporation of recommended modifications and enhancements

Officer Portal:

Provides Officers with the opportunity to review their individual Law Enforcement Records and Training Requirements - With the integration of the Professional Conduct Database, individuals are able to review and respond to Professional Conduct Reports Electronically - The Portal currently supports more than 38,000+ registered accounts, which is nearly 90% of Active Law Enforcement Officers throughout the State of Illinois – Expiration notices are sent to Officers to provide advance notice of Mandates that will expire within 60-days - The Officer Verification Process, which is required on a 3-year recurring mandate, has been implemented with notifications disseminated to applicable Law Enforcement Officers – As of August 2026, 11, 487 Officers have utilized the new Verification Process - Review and development of the Portal is on-going in conjunction with the PTB-LEDI applications.

CIT Therapy Dog Tracking:

Created to track certification State of Illinois Therapy Dogs and their Handlers - The Application is currently operational, with Development discovery dialogues are on-going to identify and implement additional features and enhancements

Legal Hearing System:
